DAIRY MARKET NEWS AT A GLANCE

CME GROUP CASH MARKETS (11/14)

BUTTER: Grade AA closed at \$1.5750. The weekly average for Grade AA is \$1.5275 (+0.0280).

CHEESE: Barrels closed at \$1.6425 and 40# blocks at \$1.5400. The weekly average for barrels is \$1.6605 (-0.0495) and blocks \$1.5880 (-0.0680).

NONFAT DRY MILK: Grade A closed at \$1.1825. The weekly average for Grade A is \$1.1625 (+0.0280).

DRY WHEY: Extra grade dry whey closed at \$0.7800. The weekly average for dry whey is \$0.7520 (+0.0380).

BUTTER HIGHLIGHTS: Domestic butter demand varies from steady to strong in the East region, from light to stronger in the Central region, and is mixed in the Western region. Demand from international buyers varies from steady to strong. Export demand for competitively priced 82 percent butterfat butter is limiting domestic bulk butter load availability. Cream volumes are more than sufficient to cover contractual obligations and accommodate spot load requests. Spot cream demand from butter makers varies from steady to stronger. Butter churns are heavily active for the most part. Bulk butter overages range from 2 cents below to 5 cents above market across all regions.

CHEESE HIGHLIGHTS: Cheese production in the East is steady as plants work to keep inventories in check. Bulk and processed cheese movement is stable, and retail demand continues at a steady pace. Export interest remains slow, with little change from recent weeks. Cheese makers in the Central region are keeping schedules steady, though some facilities are operating below capacity due to maintenance downtime. Retail orders are improving, while foodservice demand is softer. Cheese barrel volumes are tightening, even as other varieties remain available. Western manufacturers report sufficient milk volumes to support steady production. Spot load demand varies by plant, with some buyers more active than others. Domestic demand ranges from moderate to steady, while export activity continues to offer support. Some stakeholders note early interest in securing loads into early 2026. Availability of some varietal cheeses is mixed.

FLUID MILK HIGHLIGHTS: Nationwide, milk production is steady to stronger. Cooler temperatures are contributing to increased cow comfort. Contacts report milk output is up from last year. Milk components remain high, contributing to large volumes of cream in the market. Class I demand is strong, and some facilities are moving more loads of milk to bottling than they typically would. Class II demand is steady to stronger. Seasonal dairy products, like eggnog, are in demand from retail and food service outlets. Class III production is steady. Most manufacturers can use contract loads to meet demand. Spot sales of Class III milk are light. Sales for Class III spots are from \$2 under to \$1.5 over Class. Class IV production is steady. Butter producers are seasonally producing more butter but not taking spot loads of cream as

contract loads are sufficient. Cream demand continues to strengthen for Class II and III. Condensed skim is tight in the Central and East regions and readily available in the West. Spot sales are strong, with sales ranging from flat to \$0.20 over Class price. Cream multiples for all Classes range: 1.15 - 1.32 in the East; 1.08 - 1.29 in the Midwest; 1.00 -1.21 in the West.

DRY PRODUCTS HIGHLIGHTS: In the Central and East regions, low/medium heat nonfat dry milk (NDM) prices are unchanged, but prices increased in the West across the price range and at the top of the mostly price series. The top of the Central and East high heat NDM price range moved lower but the bottom was unchanged. High heat NDM prices decreased in the West across the price range. The bottom of the Central and East dry buttermilk price range moved higher. Buttermilk prices decreased at the top of the range in the Central and East region, and across the price range and mostly price series in the West. Dry whey prices increased across the price range in the East and at the bottom in the West. Increases were also seen across both the Central and West mostly price series this week. The top of the lactose mostly price series moved higher, but prices were unchanged at the bottom of the mostly price series and across the range. The price range for whey protein concentrate 34% expanded, as prices decreased at the bottom and increased at the top. Prices for dry whole milk fell across the range. Both acid and rennet casein prices are unchanged.

ORGANIC DAIRY MARKET NEWS: The Pennsylvania Monthly Organic Dairy Report covering August 2025 showed the weighted average price for fluid milk, total volume of milk produced, average daily production per cow, and average monthly production per cow decreased from the prior month. The Vermont Monthly Organic Dairy Report covering August 2025 showed the weighted average price for fluid milk decreased, total volume of milk produced, average daily production per cow, and average monthly production per cow decreased from the prior month. In a recent report from a Pacific Northwest livestock auction, the top 10 organic cull cows and the overall average for organic cull cows traded lower than conventional cull cows. Total organic ads increased in the two retail surveys released in November. The most advertised organic commodity is milk.

SEPTEMBER MILK PRODUCTION (NASS): Milk production in the 24 major States during September totaled 18.3 billion pounds, up 4.2 percent from September 2024. August revised production, at 18.8 billion pounds, was up 3.6 percent from August 2024. The August revision represented an increase of 44 million pounds or 0.2 percent from last month's preliminary production estimate. Production per cow in the 24 major States averaged 1,999 pounds for September, 30 pounds above September 2024.

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The number of milk cows on farms in the 24 major States was 9.15 million head, 235,000 head more than September 2024, and 38,000 head more than August 2025.

NATIONAL RETAIL REPORT: In the week 46 retail dairy survey, conventional ads are up 18 percent, and organic ads increased 19 percent. Yogurt is the most advertised conventional commodity, and total ads are up 35 percent. The most advertised organic commodity, milk, appeared in 45 percent more ads. Organic yogurt are down 90 percent. The most advertised conventional yogurt product is 4-6-ounce Greek. Conventional milk ads are up 13 percent and organic milk ads increased 45 percent.

BUTTER MARKETS

EAST

In the East, butter production remains steady. Contract loads of cream are sufficient to meet current production schedules. Churns are operating seven days a week but are not at full capacity. Most retailers have received their holiday inventories. Some manufactures have shifted focus from retail to food service sized packaging. Food service demand for butter is steady to strong. International demand for butter is strong. Lower prices are contributing to an uptick in export activity. Butter inventories are steady. Contacts indicate that sales are balanced with production.

WEST

A few butter manufacturers convey milk intakes are below anticipated volumes, however, plenty of spot cream loads are available to make up any shortages from lower milk intakes. Spot cream demand is stronger for butter producers. Butter production schedules are strong. Retail and bulk butter production lines are heavily active. Some butter producers in the region report their bulk butter production lines are primarily focused on loads for international customers. This is tightening availability of bulk butter loads for domestic buyers. Stakeholders anticipate this to continue into next year. Salted 80% butterfat butter loads are readily available, while unsalted 80% butterfat butter loads are somewhat tight. Domestic butter demand is mixed. Export butter demand varies from steady to stronger.

CENTRAL

Milk output is steady in the Central region, but contacts say component levels are up from this time last year. Cream production is steady, but contacts say inventories are somewhat tightening. Some butter makers are increasing their internal usage of cream and reducing the volume of cream they are selling. Demand for cream is steady from butter makers, but Class II sales are picking up. Butter production is strong. Retail butter demand is strengthening as the holiday approaches, but food service sales remain light. Export demand is strong as domestic 82 percent butterfat butter is being offered at competitive prices compared to loads produced in Europe.

CHEESE MARKETS

EAST

Cheese production in the Northeast remains balanced. Cheesemakers are limiting production to keep inventory levels low. Milk in region is available for spot purchase, but most manufacturers are using only contract loads. Bulk cheese production is steady to light. Processed cheese manufacturers have fulfilled holiday demand and back to normal production runs. Retail demand is steady, with little change from last week. Export demand of cheese is slow.

CENTRAL

Cheesemakers are running busy production schedules in the Central region, though some say they are operating below capacity, due to scheduled downtime. Milk production is steady in the region and some contacts say they continue to send volumes to bottling operations, reducing Class III sales. Spot Class III demand remains light as some cheesemakers say they have volumes available and are not purchasing additional loads. As of report publication, Class III milk prices range from flat to \$1.5-over. Retail cheese demand is strengthening, while food service sales remain somewhat light. Some contacts say lower prices for cheese in Europe is having a negative impact on export demand. Spot loads of cheese blocks are available, but contacts report cheese barrel inventories are tighter.

WEST

In the West, cheese manufacturers are receiving sufficient volumes of milk. Spot milk load demand from cheese producers varies from steady to stronger. In a few cases, milk production is below anticipated volumes and cheese producers are securing Class III spot milk loads along with taking in contractual volumes of milk. Cheese production schedules are steady. Domestic demand varies from moderate to steady. Export demand varies from steady to strong. Stakeholders convey demand among buyers for securing Q1/Q2 2026 loads is active. Availability of varietal cheese loads is mixed.

FOREIGN

Retail and food service foreign type cheese demands vary from steady to strong. Stakeholders indicate ordering to prepare for November and December holiday demands is picking up steam. Price declines have increased sales activity throughout European countries for the most part. Demand from international buyers is stronger with prices for European Union produced cheese loads making ground in competitiveness. Availability of foreign type cheese spot loads is mixed. Some manufacturers convey being booked with orders until mid-December. Although week over week European milk production varies from somewhat lighter to somewhat stronger, year over year farm level milk output in Europe generally remains up. Industry sources indicate milk payment prices are falling for some European dairy farmers, signaling a potential impact on milk production the remainder of the year. European cheese production schedules are mostly steady. Stakeholders note foreign type cheese load prices are firmer compared to recent months.

FLUID MILK AND CREAM

EAST

Fluid milk output in the East region remains seasonally strong. Contacts state milk demand is higher than anticipated. Manufacturing facilities are using most of their contract loads, leaving some milk available for spot sales, but not as much as in previous weeks. Class I demand is strong in the Southeast and steady in the Northeast. Bottlers in the South are shipping milk from other states to meet demand. Class II demand is steady. Manufacturers continue to produce seasonal dairy products to fulfill retail and food service demand. Class III production is steady. Many cheese and whey producers are happy with the current market demand for whey derivatives, keeping cheese production in a steady state. Class IV production is steady to strong. Butter producers are operating churns seven days a week. Some butter producers are choosing to sell some of their cream to Class II and Class III manufacturers due to the high multiples for those products. The cream multiple range dropped slightly at the top of the range, but there were more reported sales at the high end of the range this week. Condensed skim supply is tight. There were a few reported sales this week going for \$0.20 over Class price. Demand for condensed skim is steady.

CENTRAL

In the Central region, milk production is steady though contacts say output is up from one year. Class I demand is strong, and some contacts say they are moving more loads to bottling operations than they typically would this time of year. Demand from Class II processors is steady to higher. Spot sales of Class III milk remain light. Contacts say they are primarily moving volumes of milk from cheese plants to bottling, due to strong demand. Some cheesemakers say they are not actively buying spot volumes of milk, as they have sufficient volumes within their network to run steady production schedules. A few plant managers say they are selling spot volumes of Class III milk, due to downtime, to nearby cheesemakers at prices ranging from \$2-under to \$1.5-over Class. Contacts report milk component levels are up from last year, contributing to strong cream production. Class II cream demand continues to strengthen, though interest from butter makers is steady. Butter churns are active, and some butter makers say they are using more cream internally, rather than selling spot volumes.

WEST

California milk production is stronger. Handlers report November 2025 year over year milk output is up significantly. Some manufacturers note milk intakes have been above anticipated volumes. Stakeholders convey stronger milk production is expected to continue. According to the California Department of Water Resources, as of November 11, 2025, the state precipitation total is above the historical mean and the statewide reservoir storage level is above the historical average for the 2025-26 Water Year. Farm level milk output in Arizona and New Mexico is stronger. Week over week milk production in the Pacific Northwest is mixed. Some manufacturers note milk intakes are lower than anticipated volumes. In the mountain states of Idaho, Utah, and Colorado, milk production varies from steady to stronger. Stakeholders in Idaho and Utah report spot milk loads are tighter, especially in the Idaho area. Fat components in milk output vary from steady to decreasing. Colorado handlers convey the peak of spring 2025 farm level milk output was later than typical in the state due to some delays in breeding that pushed seasonally lower farm level milk output into later weeks of the year. Class demands are unchanged throughout the region. Cream continues to be steadily available in the region. Near term demand for cream is stronger, however, some stakeholders report demand for next year is lighter than this time a year ago. Cream multiples moved slightly lower at the top of both ranges. Stakeholders note a few distressed cream sales at multiples below the bottom of the All-Class range. Condensed skim milk loads are available to fill steady spot buyer demand.

NONFAT DRY MILK - CENTRAL AND EAST

Low/medium heat nonfat dry milk (NDM) prices are unchanged in the Central and East regions across the range and mostly price series. Domestic demand is steady from week to week, but contacts say near term interest is somewhat light. Exports interest is mixed. Contacts say they are moving fewer loads to Asia compared to a year ago, while sales to Mexico are steady. Inventories are tight in the Central and East regions, but contacts say spot loads remain available in the West. Low/medium heat NDM production is steady in the Central and East regions. High heat NDM prices decreased at the top of the range. Contractual demand for high heat NDM is steady, but spot interest is light. High heat NDM production is limited, as plant managers say they are primarily focused on low/medium heat.

NONFAT DRY MILK - WEST

Low/medium heat nonfat dry milk (NDM) prices moved 1 cent higher for both ends of the range and the top end of the mostly price series in the West. Domestic demand varies from steady to lighter. Some stakeholders report offers are more frequent than requests for NDM loads. Export demand is steady and buyers in Mexico are active. Production schedules vary from somewhat lighter to somewhat stronger. High heat NDM prices moved lower on both ends of the range, bucking against low/medium heat NDM price movement. High heat NDM production is mixed. High heat NDM demand is lighter.

DRY BUTTERMILK - CENTRAL AND EAST

The buttermilk powder (BMP) market is slow in the Central and East regions. Contacts state there is more product than demand in the area. Prices were higher this week at the bottom of the range, but some contacts think last week's low prices were an anomaly. The top end of the range dropped one cent this week. BMP production is steady. Butter producers continue to have full churns providing buttermilk for drying. Inventory levels of BMP are heavier than suppliers would prefer.

DRY BUTTERMILK - WEST

In the West, dry buttermilk prices moved slightly lower at both ends of the range and mostly price series. Domestic demand varies from steady to somewhat stronger, with November and December at-home holiday baking around the corner, and commercial bakeries producing more holiday goods. Demand from international buyers is steady. Butter churns are heavily active and producing plenty of liquid buttermilk. Dry buttermilk production schedules are steady. Manufacturers continue to fulfill contractual obligations, keeping their spot load availability snug. Traders report loads are available for spot purchasing.

DRY WHOLE MILK

Dry whole milk prices slipped at both the top and bottom of the range this week. Buyers kept activity focused on routine coverage, with little interest in extra spot loads. Plants maintained steady production and similar volumes to recent weeks, which left only limited product available outside contracted needs. Demand held firm, and the overall market tone stayed quiet without any meaningful shifts.

DRY WHEY- CENTRAL

In the Central region, the price range for dry whey is unchanged, but prices increased across the mostly price series. Stakeholders say spot inventories are tight and only a few manufacturers have inventory available to ship in the near term. Domestic demand for dry whey is steady, though contacts report interest varies somewhat by manufacturer. Contacts report whey protein concentrate 80% and whey protein isolate markets are bullish, and demand continues to outpace production. Plant managers say they continue to focus production schedules on these products, limiting dry whey output. The market for animal feed whey remains quiet and contacts report steady prices from last week. Animal feed whey production is light, and contacts say lower prices for other feed options are having a negative impact on demand.

DRY WHEY- EAST

The dry whey market is strong, and demand continues to rise. Dry whey and whey derivatives continue to outpace other powder markets. Extra grade and Grade A sales are strong with prices slowly increasing to catch up with the CME. The price range rose at both ends this week. Manufacturers are working on securing 1st Quarter contracts. Demand remains strong for both domestic and international markets. Inventory levels of whey are low and some spot sales are getting pushed to December deliveries.

DRY WHEY- WEST

Dry whey prices moved higher for the bottom end of the range and both ends of the mostly price series in the West. Regional availability of spot loads remains much more on the tight end than the loose end. Manufacturers note some product quality issues and fast approaching planned downtime are likely contributing to tight spot load availability. Contractual obligations continue to be fulfilled. Dry whey production schedules are steady for week 46. Dry whey demand varies from moderate to stronger.

WHEY PROTEIN CONCENTRATE

Whey protein concentrate 34% (WPC 34%) prices split directions this week, with the bottom of the range easing while the top moved higher. The mostly series held steady. Demand stayed active, and buyers kept a steady pace of purchasing to cover ongoing needs. Production schedules remained similar to recent weeks, keeping volumes stable and spot availability tight. The market tone stayed firm as interest continued to exceed the limited product available outside contracts.

LACTOSE

Lactose prices held steady across the full price range this week, while the top of the mostly series moved higher. Export demand remained strong and active, with Southeast Asia continuing to drive consistent interest. Domestic buying stayed stable, if not slightly stronger, as regular users maintained steady order patterns. Production and volumes tracked closely with the past several weeks, keeping spot availability tight and overall market conditions firm.

CASEIN

The price range for acid casein is unchanged this week. Contract demand for acid casein is strong and contacts say spot demand in Oceania and for export to other regions is steady. Spot loads of acid casein are available for purchase. Production is steady in Oceania, as milk output remains strong in the region.

Prices for rennet casein are holding steady. Contacts in Europe say demand is unchanged both within the region and from purchasers in other regions. Rennet casein is available for purchasing, though spot purchasers note inventories are not excessive. Rennet casein makers are focused on meeting contractual needs and are running steady production schedules.

ORGANIC DAIRY FLUID OVERVIEW

In a recent report from a Pacific Northwest livestock auction, the top 10 organic cull cows and the overall average for organic cull cows traded lower than conventional cull cows. The average price for the top 10 organic cows auctioned was \$111.30 per hundredweight, compared to an average price of \$155.06 per hundredweight for the top 10 conventional cows auctioned. The average weight for the top 10 conventional cows was 1,590.5 pounds compared to 994.0 pounds for the top 10 organic cows.

The overall price for organic cows auctioned was \$92.36 per hundredweight with an average weight of 941.7 pounds, while the overall price for conventional cows auctioned was \$116.17 per hundredweight with an average weight of 1,214.2 pounds.

NATIONAL ORGANIC GRAIN AND FEEDSTUFFS

The following was reported by USDA AMS Livestock, Poultry, and Grain Market News (LPGMN) in the National Organic Grain and Feedstuffs Report. Compared to the last period, trade is active and demand is good for organic feed corn. The bulk of activity is for new crop spot market transactions. Trade activity is good with moderate demand for organic feed soybeans. Trade activity is light for all other organic grains. The next report will be published on Wednesday, November 26, 2025.

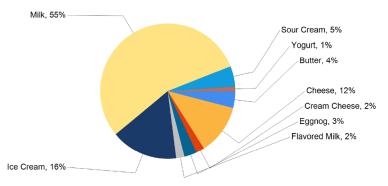

ORGANIC DAIRY RETAIL OVERVIEW

The end of year holidays are having a positive impact on organic dairy ads, as total organic ads increased 55 percent in the first retail survey released in November and are up 19 percent in week 46. In the week 46 survey, organic butter ads grew 545 percent, the largest percentage increase for any organic commodity. Ads for the most advertised organic commodity, milk, are up 45 percent.

Gallons of organic milk appeared in surveyed ads last week but are absent in the week 46 survey. Half gallons are the only advertised package size of organic milk and ads for this product are up 50 percent. The weighted average advertised price (average price) for organic half gallon milk is up 5 cents to \$4.42. Conventional half gallon milk has an average price of \$1.84, leaving an organic premium of \$2.58.

Ice cream is the second most advertised organic commodity, and ads are up 73 percent. Total ads for 48-64-ounce ice cream are up 82 percent. Ads for the most advertised organic ice cream product, 14-16-ounce containers, are up 65 percent and the average price is down 44 cents to \$7.12. The average price for this product's conventional counterpart is \$4.14. The organic premium for 14-16-ounce ice cream is \$2.98.

Cheese was the second most advertised organic commodity in week 45 but fell to third this week as ads declined 28 percent this week. The most advertised organic cheese product is 6-8-ounce sliced, which appeared in 10 percent more ads this week. Ads for 6-8-ounce shred style cheese increased 602 percent and the average price for this product is up 60 cents to \$4.60. Conventional 6-8-ounce shred style cheese has an average price of \$2.42, the organic premium for this product is \$2.18.

Organic sour cream ads are up 120 percent, and 16-ounce containers are the only sour cream product present in this week's survey. The average price for organic 16-ounce sour cream is down 27 cents to \$3.73, and the average price for conventional sour cream in the same package size is \$2.28. The organic premium for 16-ounce sour cream is \$1.45.

September Milk Production

Milk production in the 24 major States during September totaled 18.3 billion pounds, up 4.2 percent from September 2024. August revised production, at 18.8 billion pounds, was up 3.6 percent from August 2024. The August revision represented an increase of 44 million pounds or 0.2 percent from last month's preliminary production estimate.

Production per cow in the 24 major States averaged 1,999 pounds for September, 30 pounds above September 2024.

The number of milk cows on farms in the 24 major States was 9.15 million head, 235,000 head more than September 2024, and 38,000 head more than August 2025.

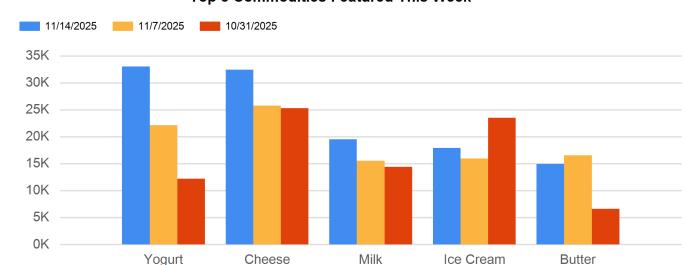
In the week 46 retail dairy survey, conventional ads are up 18 percent, and organic ads increased 19 percent. Yogurt is the most advertised conventional commodity, and total ads are up 35 percent. The most advertised organic commodity, milk, appeared in 45 percent more ads.

Organic yogurt are down 90 percent. The most advertised conventional yogurt product is 4-6-ounce Greek. Conventional 4-6-ounce Greek yogurt ads are up 22 percent, and the weighted average advertised price (average price) is \$1.33. There are no ads for organic 4-6-ounce Greek yogurt this week.

Cheese is the second most advertised conventional commodity and ads increased 32 percent. Organic cheese ads fell 28 percent. Conventional 6-8-ounce sliced cheese appeared in more ads than any other conventional cheese product. Ads increased 66 percent this week, and the average price is down 8 cents, \$2.11. Organic 6-8-ounce sliced cheese ads increased 10 percent, and the average price is \$4.53. The organic premium for this product is \$2.42.

Ice cream overtook butter as the third most advertised conventional product while appearing in 6 percent more ads than last week. Organic ice cream ads increased 73 percent and moved from the fourth most advertised organic commodity in week 45 to second this week. Conventional 48-64-ounce ice cream ads are up 42 percent, and the average price is \$3.73, down 42 cents. This product's organic counterpart appeared in 82 percent more ads, and the average price declined \$1.03, to \$8.49. The organic premium for 48-64-ounce ice cream is \$4.76.

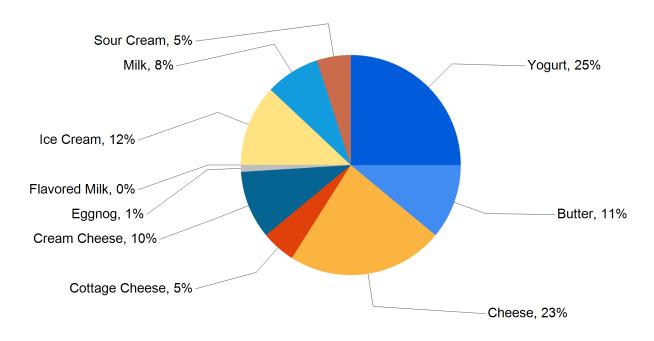
Conventional milk ads are up 13 percent and organic milk ads increased 45 percent. Gallons are the most advertised package size of conventional milk and appeared in 29 percent more ads this week. The average price for conventional gallon milk is down 23 cents to \$2.73 this week. There are no ads for organic gallon milk present in this week's survey.



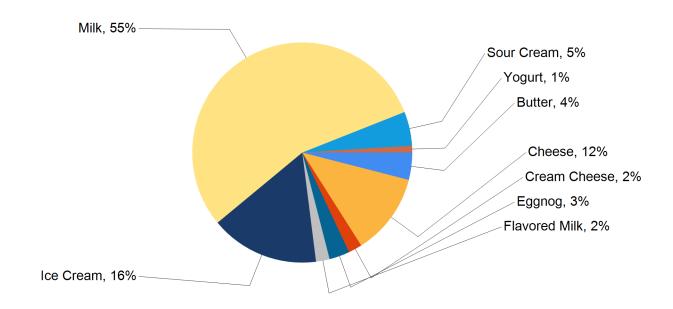
Top 5 Commodities Featured This Week

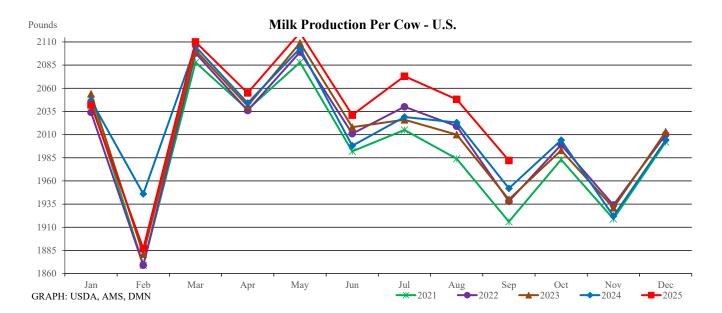
