

DAIRY MARKET NEWS AT A GLANCE

CME GROUP CASH MARKETS (7/10)

BUTTER: Grade AA closed at \$1.6500. The weekly average for Grade AA is \$1.6500 (-0.0288).

CHEESE: Barrels closed at \$1.5600 and 40# blocks at \$1.5475. The weekly average for barrels is \$1.5270 (+0.0507) and blocks \$1.5150 (+0.0862).

NONFAT DRY MILK: Grade A closed at \$1.5550. The weekly average for Grade A is \$1.5160 (-0.0759).

DRY WHEY: Extra grade dry whey closed at \$0.6900. The weekly average for dry whey is \$0.6790 (-0.0060).

BUTTER HIGHLIGHTS: Domestic butter demand varies from steady to lighter throughout the country. Export butter demand varies from steady to strong. Spot cream loads are tighter following the holiday weekend, but there is enough available to meet the needs of butter manufacturers. Demand from butter makers is generally stronger. Stakeholders in the West and Central regions report stronger production schedules than stakeholders in the East region. Spot loads of 80 and 82 percent butterfat butter are available. Bulk butter overages range from 3 below to 5 above market across all regions.

CHEESE HIGHLIGHTS: East region cheese production is steady, though extreme heat is trimming milk volumes and components. Seasonal July demand softness and lighter private label contracting persist. Some inventories sit slightly above year-ago levels but are manageable, leaving the market tone steady to slightly weaker. Central region cheese production is steady to stronger. Demand is mixed with steady retail, light food service, and strong exports despite pressure from declining European prices. West region milk and cream output are lighter, but cheese plants are receiving expected deliveries. Class III spot milk is available, with moderate demand. Cheese production is stable. Spot loads vary from tight to accessible, and domestic and international demand is steady.

FLUID MILK HIGHLIGHTS: Warmer temperatures nationwide are affecting cow comfort, contributing to declining milk production and lower milk components. In addition to lower milk volumes, some producers are having trouble transporting milk and cream. Class I demand is seasonally light with no expected changes in the coming weeks. Class II manufacturers are pulling large volumes of milk cream to meet seasonal demand for ice cream. The majority of spot cream sales are going to Class II facilities. Class III milk demand is increasing in the Central region and steady to light in all other areas. Spot prices for Class III milk range from \$3-under to \$5-over Class. Contacts indicate the top of the spot range increased as many facilities are using all available volumes. Class IV demand is steady. Some facilities were

buying spot cream for churns at the end of last week due to the holiday, but spot cream availability tightened as the week progressed. Condensed skim volumes are less available this week compared to last. Some buyers can still find spot volumes, but prices are lower this week. Cream multiples for all Classes range: 1.12 – 1.47 in the East; 1.17 – 1.37 in the Midwest; 1.00 – 1.22 in the West.

DRY PRODUCTS HIGHLIGHTS: Nonfat dry milk prices moved lower across all regions and heat levels, except for a notable increase at the top of the Central and East price range for low/medium heat. Dry buttermilk prices in the Central and East were steady at the top but declined at the lower end, and prices weakened across the full series in the West. Dry whey pricing was unchanged in all regions aside from a decrease at the top of the Central range. Lactose eased at the top of the price range while the mostly series firmed at both ends, bolstered in part by the addition of Q3 contract pricing. Whey protein concentrate 34% strengthened at the top of the price range while holding steady elsewhere. Dry whole milk prices increased at both ends of the range, with most trading occurring in the lower half. Acid and rennet casein both posted significant increases, with the largest gains occurring at the lower end of each price range.

ORGANIC DAIRY MARKET NEWS: The Pennsylvania Monthly Organic Dairy Report, a report created as part of the Organic Dairy Initiative sponsored by the 2018 farm bill, covering April 2026 was released on July 10, 2026. This report showed the weighted average price for fluid milk increased by 9.99 percent from March. The Vermont Monthly Organic Dairy Report showed the weighted average price for fluid milk increased 3.47 percent from March. The Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS) releases monthly export data which includes export volumes and values for organic milk categorized as HS-10 code 0401201000. Recently released data for May 2026 indicated organic milk exports were 359,258 liters, down 2.4 percent from the month prior, but up 35.7 percent from May 2025. A large Dutch organic milk processor announced that the guaranteed price for organic farm milk in July 2026 is 63.50 EUR/100kg (\$72.63 USD), up 1.75 from June 2026.

WEEKLY GROCERY STORE ACTIVITY: This week conventional dairy ads decreased 8 percent, and organic ads are down 14 percent. Most conventional commodities appeared in fewer ads in Week 28, but ads for flavored milk, cheese, and yogurt increased. In the organic aisle, the only commodities present in last week's survey that appeared in more ads this week are cheese and milk.

BUTTER

EAST

Cream for butter churns was readily available late last week due to the holiday, with some processing plants closing early. Cream began tightening by the end of the week. Early this week, contacts noted stronger nationwide interest in cream, particularly for Class II. Heat across the region is beginning to influence milk flows, lowering volumes and component levels, and creating transportation challenges. These developments layer onto the typical July slowdown in butter production. As churns drop schedules and reduce operations to five days a week, retail demand is still steadily met, and inventories are aligned with expectations. Overall, the market remains steady with tightening cream supplies, as conditions return to normal.

WEST

Although milk and cream production is lighter in the West, stakeholders note some inexpensive, available spot loads of cream. Spot cream demand from butter manufactures is moderate. Butter producers generally report all their churns are active, keeping production and inventories stable. 80 and 82 percent butterfat butter spot loads are available. Domestic butter demand varies from steady to somewhat lighter this week. Many butter manufacturers note year-to-date sales are up, especially bulk butter sales. Export demand is steady.

CENTRAL

In the Central region high temperatures are negatively impacting milk output and component levels. Contacts say cream production is declining week-to-week but remains up from this time last year. Demand for cream picked up following the long holiday weekend and cream multiples are pushing higher this week. The strongest demand is from Class II manufacturers, who are pulling in the majority of the cream on the market. Some butter makers say they are purchasing some cream to keep churns full. Butter makers are running full production schedules and building inventories for use later in the year. Contacts say domestic butter demand is steady to light. Spot loads of 80 percent butterfat butter are available. Export demand is strong, but lighter than it was earlier in the year, and spot inventories of 82 percent butterfat butter are snug.

CHEESE**EAST**

Cheese production in the East remains steady, supported by adequate milk supplies, though contacts indicate recent extraordinarily high temperatures are affecting milk volumes and component levels. Demand has softened, in line with typical July trends, and reduced contracting activity for private-label and value-priced cheese. Some contacts report Inventories are marginally above year-ago levels but are not considered burdensome, and the overall market tone is steady to weaker.

CENTRAL

High temperatures in recent weeks have negatively impacted milk output in the Central region. Contacts say they are getting fewer spot milk offers. Prices for Class III milk increased slightly this week and range from \$3.00-under to \$2-over Class. Cheesemakers anticipate spot prices to increase in the coming weeks, as milk production continues to decline seasonally. Cheese production is steady to stronger, as plants returned to operating full schedules following the long holiday weekend. Spot loads of cheese are available. Retail cheese demand is steady, and contacts say food service sales remain light. Export demand is strong, but some contacts say declining cheese prices in Europe are negatively impacting international interest.

WEST

Milk and cream production are lighter in the West, but cheese manufacturing facilities are receiving expected milk deliveries. Class III spot milk loads are available and demand from cheese manufacturers is moderate. Cheese production schedules are stable and are keeping pace with demand. Some manufacturers report spot loads are tight, while traders indicate loads are generally available. Demand from domestic and international buyers is steady.

FOREIGN

Foreign type cheese demand is steady from the retail sector and varies from steady to stronger from the food service sector. Stakeholders indicate seasonal upticks in vacationers are beginning to show, increasing demand from buyers in Southern Europe. Industry sources note mozzarella cheese demand is particularly strong. In Europe, temperatures are heating up and milk production is lighter. European cheese manufacturers report production schedules are lighter along with decreases in milk output, but inventories are in good balance with demands from buyers. Spot loads are available, but not plentiful.

EAST

Milk processing is returning to more typical levels this week after last week's holiday. Reports indicate that heat is affecting milk volumes, component levels, and transportation, with some tankers being rejected for temperature issues, when moving milk and cream long distances. Class II is absorbing most of the available cream as ice cream manufacturing continues through July, and yogurt demand remains steady. Ice cream manufacturing is currently at its peak. Within Class III, cheese demand is reported as declining, typical for July. Reduced demand is also being influenced by the conclusion of contracts from buyers in the Midwest. Class IV to make cream for butter manufacturing is seasonally declining. Buyers of condensed skim benefited during the holiday week from excess supplies, which are returning to more restrictive volumes again. Contacts note a heightened sense of urgency among Class II users to secure condensed skim milk last week, with top-end trades reported modestly above Class. Other skim milk markets are described as sloppy, with trades occurring close to Class values.

CENTRAL

In the Central region high temperatures are contributing to declining milk output. Some plants had downtime for Independence Day last week but are running full schedules this week. Class I demand remains seasonally light, while demand for Classes II and IV is unchanged. Class III demand is increasing. Some cheesemakers in the region are searching for additional spot loads of milk, but volumes are difficult to find, limiting spot trades this week. Spot prices for Class III milk range from \$3-under to \$5-over Class. The top of the range increased from last week as some cheesemakers are hesitant to sell spot loads. Cheesemakers are running full production schedules, but some say they will need additional spot milk in the coming weeks. Milk component levels are declining in the region, negatively impacting cream production. Cream multiples increased across the range this week. Demand for cream picked up following last week's holiday. Class II processors are purchasing most of the spot cream available, though butter makers are increasingly interested in spot volumes. Churning is active in the region.

WEST

California milk production is seasonally decreasing but still supplying the needs of dairy commodity manufacturers. Processors report milk and cream production is high enough to push back any anticipated equipment downtime at their facilities. Stakeholders indicate no changes to spot milk load availability. Farm level milk output is lighter in Arizona. Some processing equipment issues are reducing manufacturing capacity, making spot loads of milk more available. Farm level milk output is lighter in New Mexico. Milk production in the Pacific Northwest is seasonally lighter. Manufacturers report contractual intakes are being received, but spot loads of milk are tight. Stakeholders note temperatures are heating up for dairy farms east of the Cascades and triple digits are forecasted for at least parts of Idaho, anticipating a toll on milk production. Utah and Colorado handlers indicate week-to-week milk production varies from steady to lighter. Spot loads of milk are available in the mountain states. Class I, II, III, and IV demands are steady. Cream production is meeting contractual commitments and spot load needs. Cream multiples moved lower at the top of both ranges. Cream demand is steady. Condensed skim milk loads are available and demand is steady, but some buyers note transportation availability is tighter.

NONFAT DRY MILK - CENTRAL AND EAST

Central and East region low/medium heat nonfat dry milk (NDM) prices declined at the bottom of the range but increased at the top. Both ends of the mostly price series moved lower this week. Inventories are tight in most of the Central and East regions, and some manufacturers in the East say they are moving loads at premium prices due to their limited availability. Contacts say some spot loads are available in the Southwest and inventories are more plentiful in the West. Domestic demand remains light and contacts say international purchasers continue to favor lower priced skim milk powder available from other countries. Some stakeholders say interest from buyers in Mexico is steady to higher and they anticipate demand to strengthen in the coming weeks. Drying operations are running full production schedules, following the long holiday weekend. Plant managers are prioritizing low/medium heat NDM, which is limiting high heat NDM production. Prices for high heat NDM continue to decline, following the market for low/medium heat. Demand for high heat NDM is steady, but contacts note that it is very difficult to find spot loads in the Central and East regions.

NONFAT DRY MILK - WEST

In the West, the low/medium heat nonfat dry milk (NDM) prices moved lower at both ends of the range and mostly price series. Domestic demand varies from steady to lighter. Demand from international buyers is lighter. Production schedules are mixed as a few manufacturers are allocating more dryer time to high heat NDM or whole milk powder production. Manufacturers report their low/medium heat NDM spot load availability remains somewhat tight, but production is more aligned with demand compared to this time last month. High heat NDM prices moved lower. Production schedules are busier for some manufacturers. Demand varies from steady to somewhat stronger.

DRY BUTTERMILK - CENTRAL AND EAST

Dry buttermilk powder markets are modestly tighter this week, according to contacts. Several production interruptions over the past four to five weeks have limited output at multiple facilities, and unplanned downtime in the West has further restricted supply. Spot interest was noted in the Midwest last week, though offerings remain limited.

Eastern buyers continue to report difficulty securing spot buttermilk powder, as inventories remain tight. Butter production remains steady, maintaining liquid buttermilk availability for drying; however, dryer time continues to favor nonfat dry milk, constraining buttermilk powder output. The bottom of the price range was lowered by two cents on trade activity.

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DRY BUTTERMILK - WEST

In the West, dry buttermilk prices moved lower at both ends of the range and mostly price series. Domestic demand varies from steady to lighter. Demand from international buyers is steady. Cream production continues to push downtime for butter churns down the road, making plenty of liquid buttermilk for drying. Dry buttermilk production is steady, but not robust, as open dryer time is tight for some processors. Manufacturers report their spot load availability generally remains tight.

DRY WHOLE MILK

Dry whole milk prices increased at both ends of the range, with most trading occurring in the lower half. Values are similar to year-ago levels. Demand remains steady and inventories are manageable, with production largely directed toward fulfilling contracted needs. There is limited interest in spot purchases. Overall market activity is quiet and steady, supporting a stable market tone.

DRY WHEY– CENTRAL

Dry whey markets are holding steady, and Central region prices are unchanged at the bottom of the range but decreased at the top. Both ends of the mostly price series held steady this week. Spot loads are available, but some manufacturers remain sold out of dry whey, while others have inventory. Domestic demand is unchanged but varies by manufacturer. Contacts say international demand is steady, though some note an upcoming tender from Japan could pull some inventory from the market. Dry whey production is steady to stronger, as plant managers are running full schedules after taking some time off for last week's holiday. Markets for whey protein concentrates remain at record highs and some manufacturers are, reportedly, shifting more production to these products away from dry whey in the coming weeks. Prices for animal feed whey are unchanged. Production remains very limited and inventories are tight. Demand for animal feed whey is light, as purchasers continue to secure other feed options at lower prices.

DRY WHEY– EAST

Limited trading is reported for spot whey. The price reported on the National Dairy Price Sales Report shows minimal price movement, in line with the CME, keeping the price range stable. Manufacturers continue prioritizing whey protein concentrates, such as WPC 80% and WPI, over Extra Grade and Grade A dry whey. Export activity remains stable, supported by firm demand and a price advantage. Market participants describe sentiment as generally steady, with no significant shifts expected in the near term, barring changes in export demand or protein markets.

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DRY WHEY– WEST

In the West, dry whey prices are unchanged at both ends of the range and mostly price series for a second consecutive week. The CME daily cash trading price decreased by 1.25 cents at the beginning of week 28 before returning to \$0.6850 on July 9th. The CME posted \$0.6850 for dry whey every trading day in the prior week. No changes in dry whey demand are reported this week. Availability of dry whey is mixed depending on brand. Dry whey production schedules are stable, but protein concentrates and isolates are receiving priority for some manufacturers.

WHEY PROTEIN CONCENTRATE

Whey Protein Concentrate (WPC) 34% prices increased at the top of the range and held steady through the remainder of the price series. Production is tightening as some manufacturers plan to cease output within the next couple of months. Inventories remain limited, with some shipments reportedly moving to Mexico and Brazil.

Demand is very strong, with contacts noting when product is available, certain buyers are willing to pay whatever it takes to secure loads. Conversely, other contacts indicate growing fatigue with persistently high prices. Overall, the market tone is firm.

WPC 80% volumes are tight, with frequent requests and pricing generally in the \$12.50 to \$13.00 range, while instant WPC 80% is noted in the upper \$12s to around \$13. Whey protein isolate (WPI) is priced in the upper \$13s to \$14 as availability has tightened slightly compared to recent weeks. Demand continues to increase for high-protein products, but some buyers are showing resistance to further price increases.

LACTOSE

Lactose eased at the top of the price range while the mostly range firmed at both ends, supported in part by the addition of Q3 contract pricing in this week's report. The market remains tight, with production constrained and some manufacturers already sold out into Q4. Inventories are limited with few spot loads available. Demand is strong and contract driven, with buyers occasionally willing to pay into the mid to upper \$0.70s. Oceania interest for standardization continues, though nothing is available to offer. Substitution with milk protein concentrate, maltodextrin, and sugar is increasing, including for some international contracts. China demand is steady in the low \$0.70s, while unground lactose has traded in the low to mid \$0.60s. Overall, the market tone remains firm.

CASEIN

The price range for acid casein increased this week as manufacturers shifted into Q3 quarterly contracts. Spot demand is seasonally light in Oceania. Spot loads are available, but inventories are not excessive. Milk output is light in Oceania, limiting acid casein production. Plant managers are primarily producing acid casein to meet contractual obligations.

Prices for rennet casein increased across the range this week. Manufacturers have shifted into Q3 contracts, pushing prices up from previous weeks. Demand is softening in Europe, but interest from purchases in other regions is unchanged. The USDA AMS National Organic Program (NOP) provides an email notification service, the Organic Insider, to send out updates to the organic community. The NOP Organic Insider from July 7th discussed the new Common Organic System Plan (OSP) released for organic farmers, businesses and certifiers. The plan describes how a farm or business can follow USDA organic rules and includes information on different processes and protecting organic products as they move through the supply chain. This new plan was developed to streamline and strengthen certification and provides clear expectations on documenting compliance with USDA organic rules and regulations.

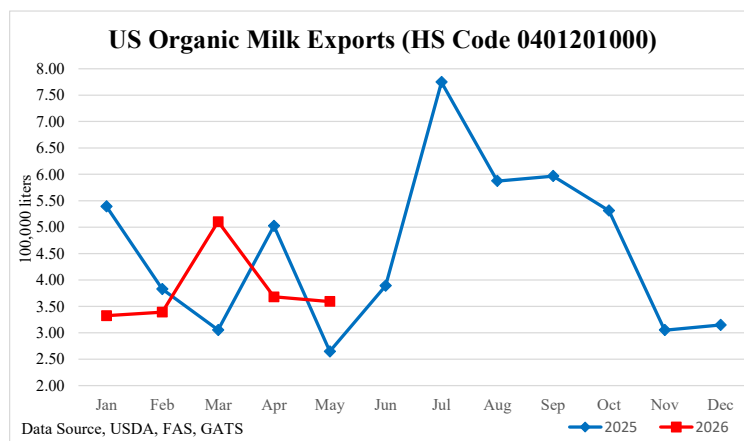

ORGANIC DAIRY FLUID OVERVIEW

The Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS) releases monthly export data which includes export volumes and values for organic milk categorized as HS-10 code 0401201000. Recently released data for May 2026 indicated organic milk exports were 359,258 liters, down 2.4 percent from the month prior, but up 35.7 percent from May 2025.

Exports of organic milk from the start of the year through May, 1,908,916 liters, are down 4.3 percent, compared to the same time period last year.



A large Dutch organic milk processor announced that the guaranteed price for organic farm milk in July 2026 is 63.50 EUR/100kg (\$72.63 USD), up 1.75 from June 2026. The processor stated the increase is to correct for the previous period, due to reference companies milk prices, as the market remains steady. The guaranteed organic price applies to 100kg of milk with standard component levels: 3.58 percent protein, 4.45 percent fat, and 4.53 percent lactose. The amounts apply to an average supply of 550,000 kg of milk annually.

In a recent report from a Pacific Northwest livestock auction, the top 10 organic cull cows and the overall price for organic cull cows traded higher than conventional cull cows. The average price for the top 10 organic cows auctioned was \$216.06 per hundredweight, compared to an average price of \$193.03 per hundredweight for the top 10 conventional cows auctioned. The average weight for the top 10 conventional cows was 1,1418.5 pounds compared to 1,422.5 pounds for the top 10 organic cows.

The overall price for organic cows auctioned was \$185.72 per hundredweight with an average weight of 1,156.6 pounds, while the overall price for conventional cows auctioned was \$152.60 per hundredweight with an average weight of 1,260.0 pounds.

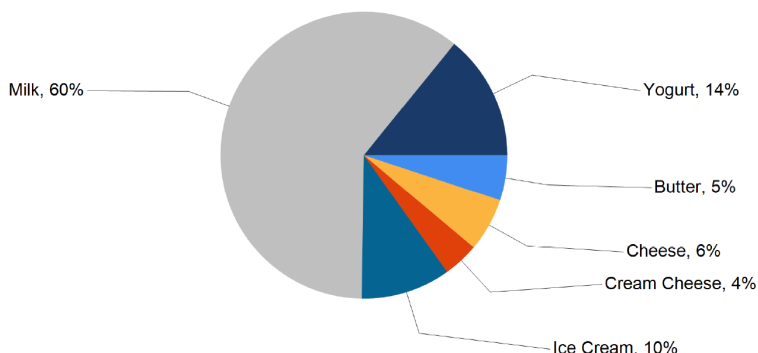
NATIONAL ORGANIC GRAIN AND FEEDSTUFFS

The following was reported by USDA AMS Livestock, Poultry, and Grain Market News (LPGMN) in the National Organic Grain and Feedstuffs Report. Trade activity was light with good demand for feed grade organic grain. Country Elevator: no comparison available for spot market organic feed corn or soybeans; organic feed corn forward contracts this period set to deliver Q1 2027. Organic feed soybean forward contracts set to deliver Q3 2026-Q2 2027. Feed mill: organic feed corn spot market sales \$1.00 higher with forward contracts delivering Q3 2026-Q2 2029. Organic feed soft red winter wheat forward contracts this period are for Q3 2026 delivery. Crush facility: spot market organic feed soybeans sold 10 cents lower this period; forward contracts for Q4 2026 delivery. The next report will be published on Wednesday, July 22, 2026.

ORGANIC DAIRY RETAIL OVERVIEW

Organic dairy advertisements are down 14 percent, and most organic commodities present in last week's survey appeared in fewer ads this week. Cheese and milk are the only organic commodities featured in more ads in Week 28. Cottage cheese and sour cream did not make an appearance in surveyed ads, after appearing last week. Milk remained the most advertised organic commodity this week.

Percentage of Total Organic Ads by Commodity



Ads for organic milk are up 9 percent in week 28. Ads for half gallon milk increased by 182 percent this week, while half gallon milk ads decreased slightly. Half gallons are the most advertised milk product again this week, and the weighted average advertised price (average price) decreased 23 cents to \$4.18. The average price for conventional half gallon milk is \$1.85, leaving a week 28 organic premium of \$2.34.

Yogurt overtook ice cream as the second most advertised organic commodity, despite appearing in 2 percent fewer ads this week. Ads for the most advertised organic yogurt product, regular style yogurt sold in 32-ounce containers, increased 3 percent. The average price for this product is down 32 cents, to \$5.82. Conventional regular style 32-ounce yogurt has an average price of \$2.88. This week's organic premium for regular style 32-ounce yogurt is \$2.94.

The third most advertised organic commodity, ice cream, appeared in 52 percent fewer ads this week. Ads for 48-64-ounce ice cream decreased 20 percent, and 14-16-ounce ice cream ads are down 68 percent. The average price for organic 14-16-ounce ice cream is \$6.61, up \$1.87. This product's conventional counterpart has an average price of \$3.52, leaving an organic premium of \$3.09 for week 28.

Organic cheese ads are up 30 percent in week 28. The most advertised organic cheese product in week 27 was 6-8-ounce shred style, which did not appear in surveyed ads this week. Meanwhile, organic 6-8-ounce block cheese appeared in week 28 ads, after taking last week off. The most advertised organic cheese product for week 28 is 6-8-ounce sliced. This product appeared in 347% more ads, and the average price increased 89 cents to \$5.44. Conventional 6-8-ounce sliced cheese has an average price of \$2.52. This product's week 28 organic premium is \$2.92.

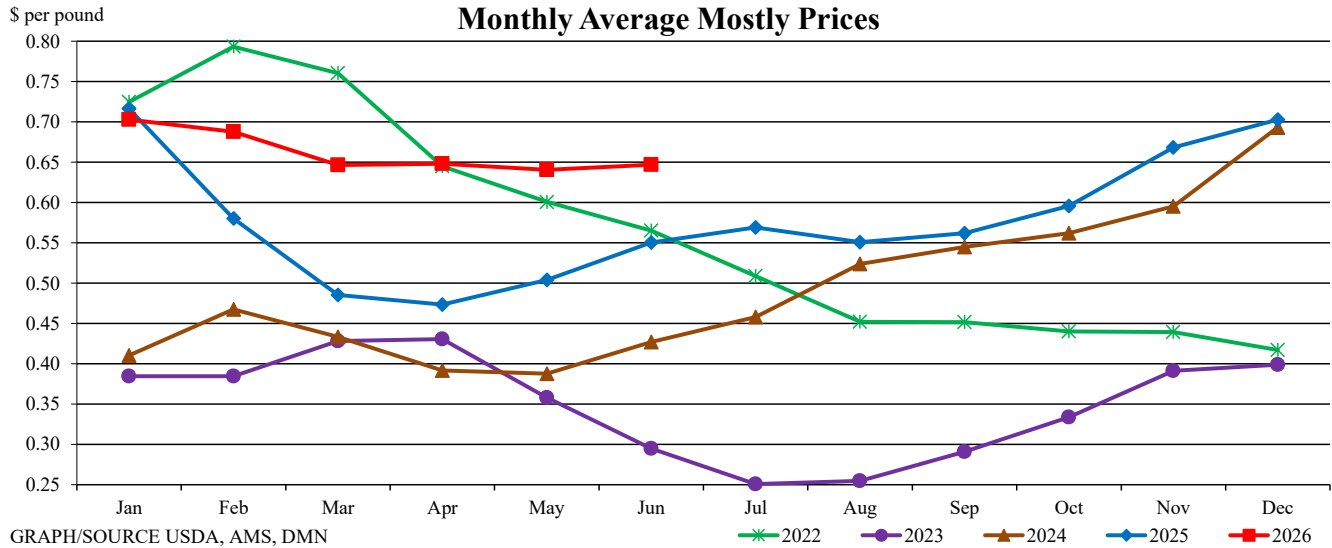

Central U.S. Dry Whey Monthly Average Mostly Prices

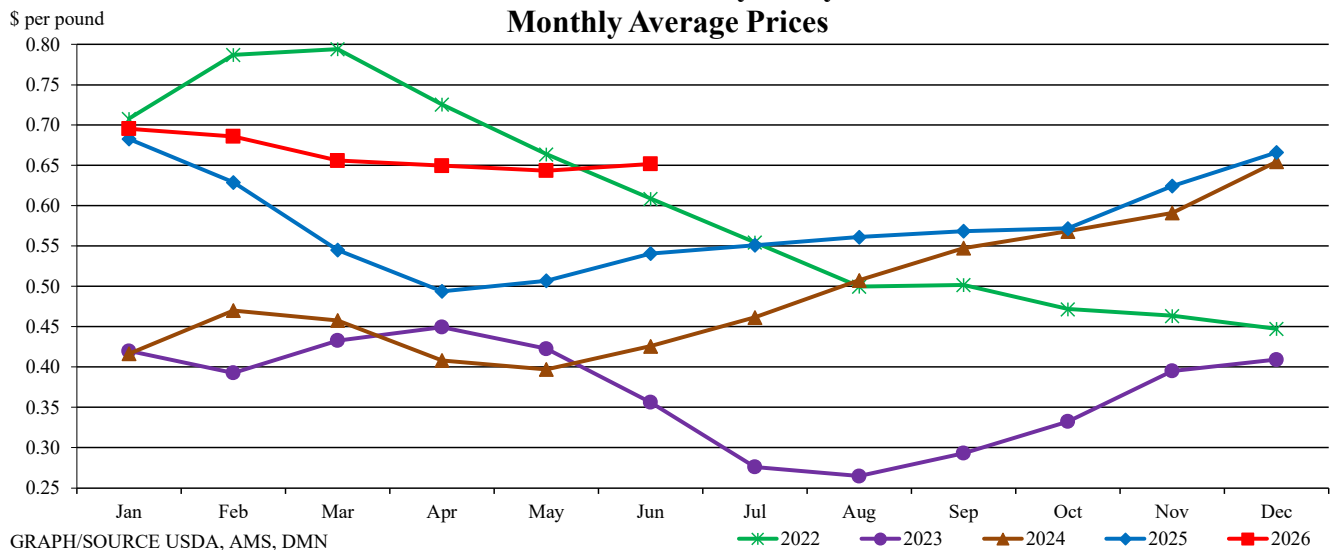

Northeast U.S. Dry Whey Monthly Average Prices

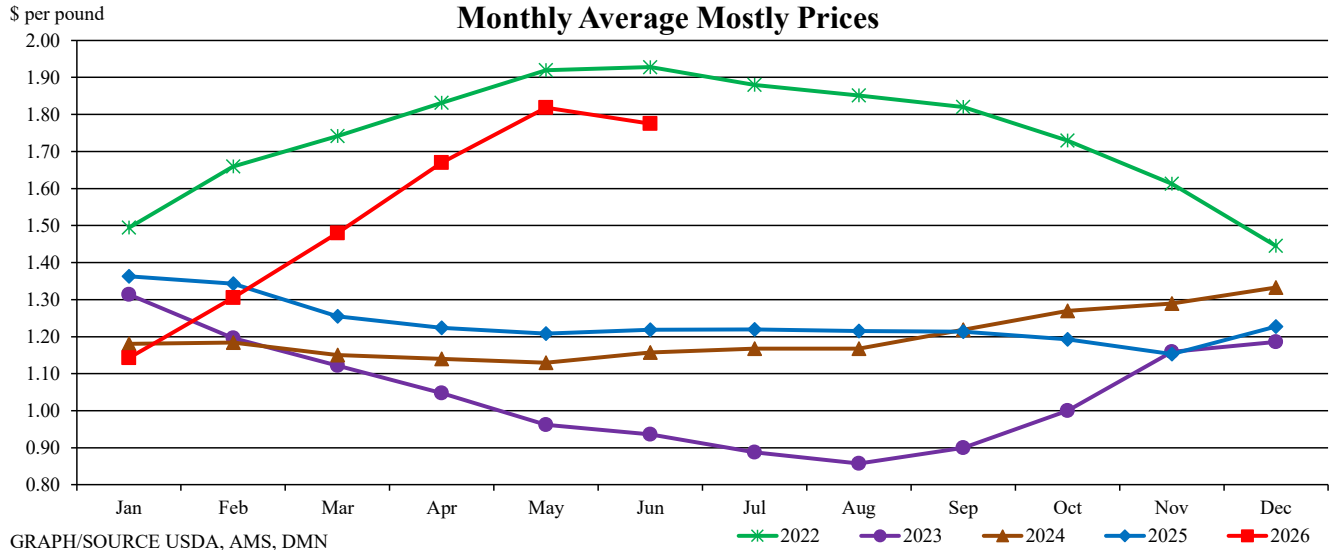


West U.S. Dry Buttermilk Monthly Average Mostly Prices

West U.S. Dry Buttermilk Monthly Average Mostly Prices



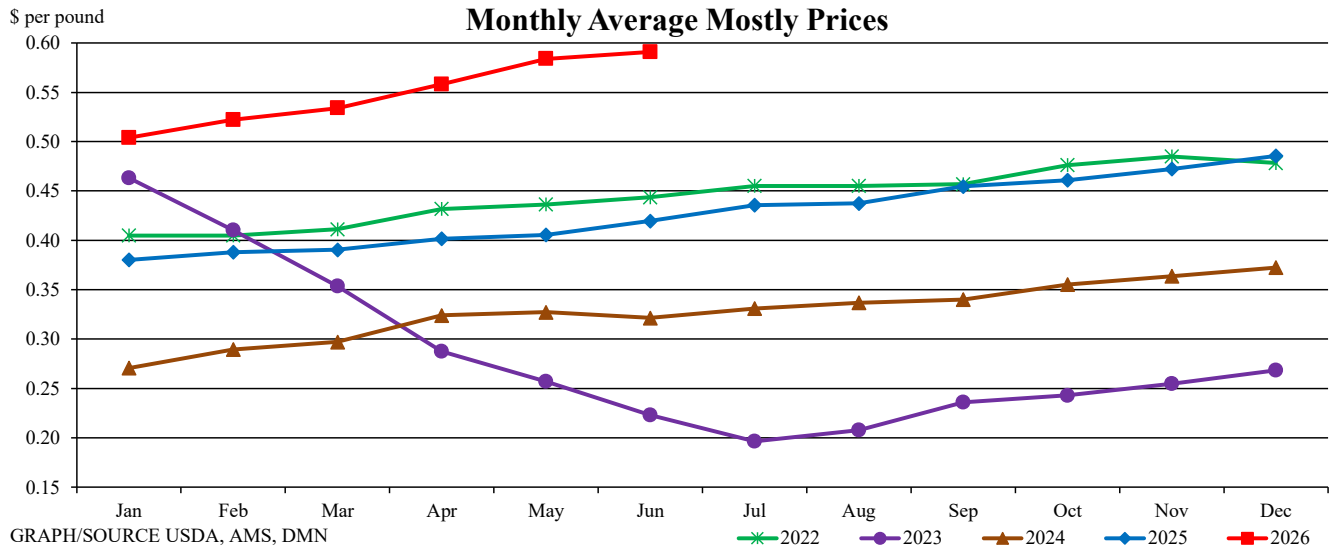

Central & West U.S. Lactose Monthly Average Mostly Prices



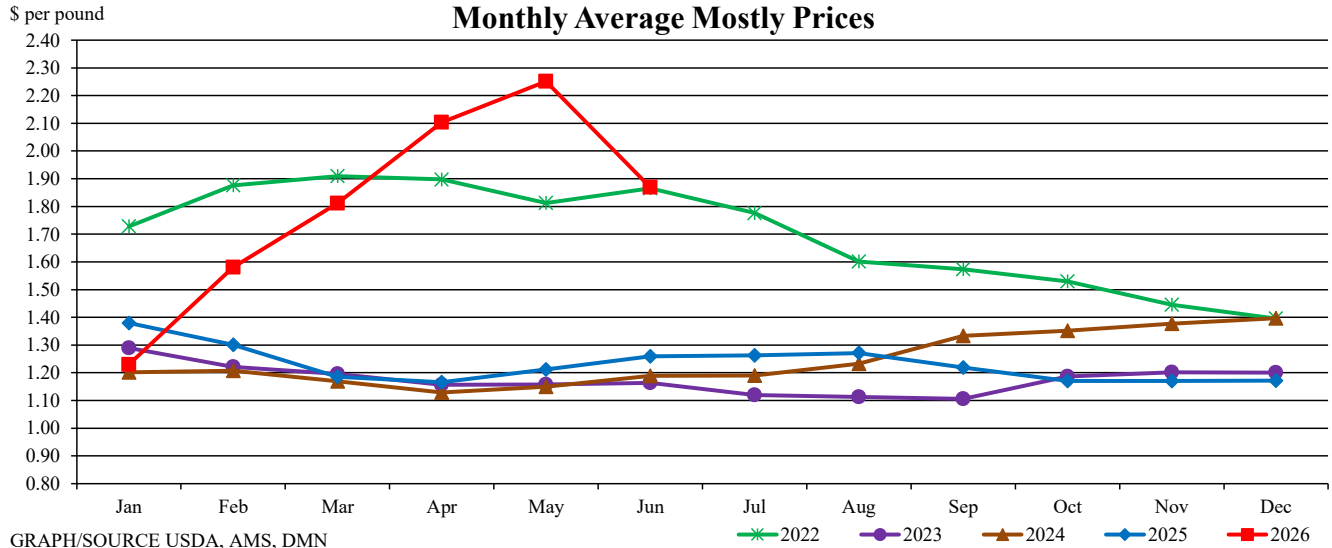

East & Central U.S. Low/Medium Heat Nonfat Dry Milk Monthly Average Mostly Prices



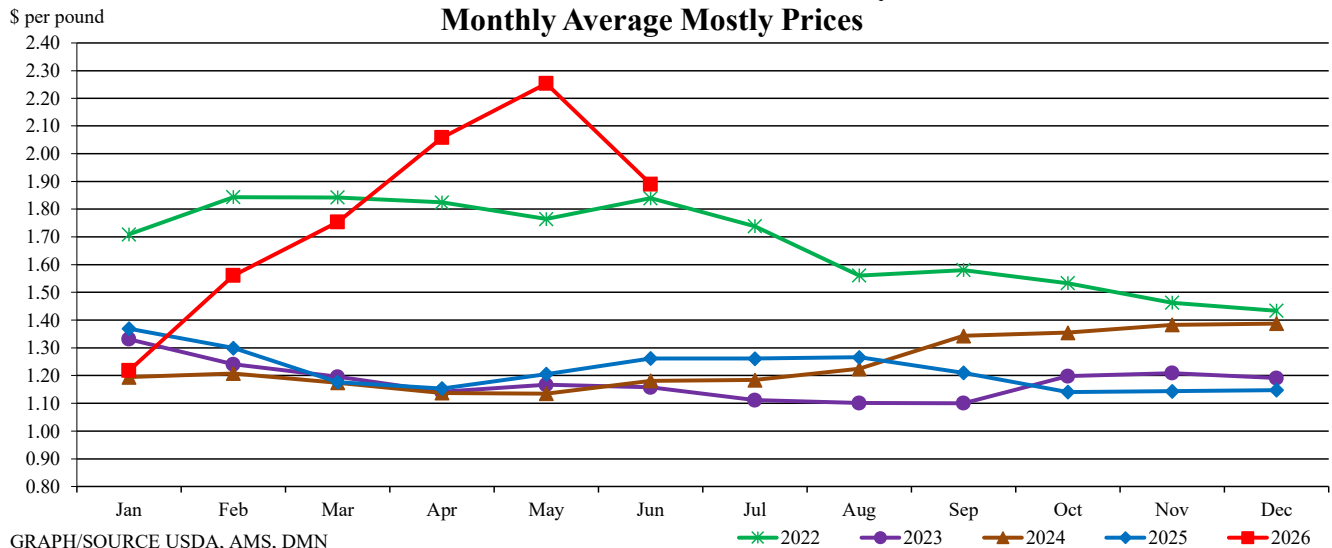

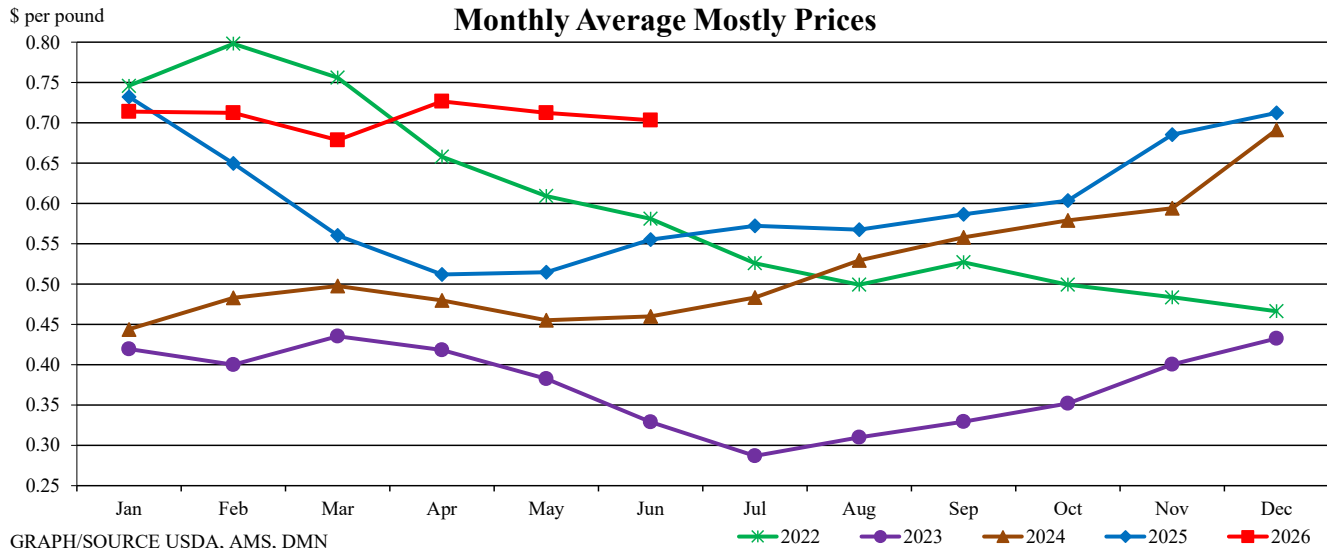

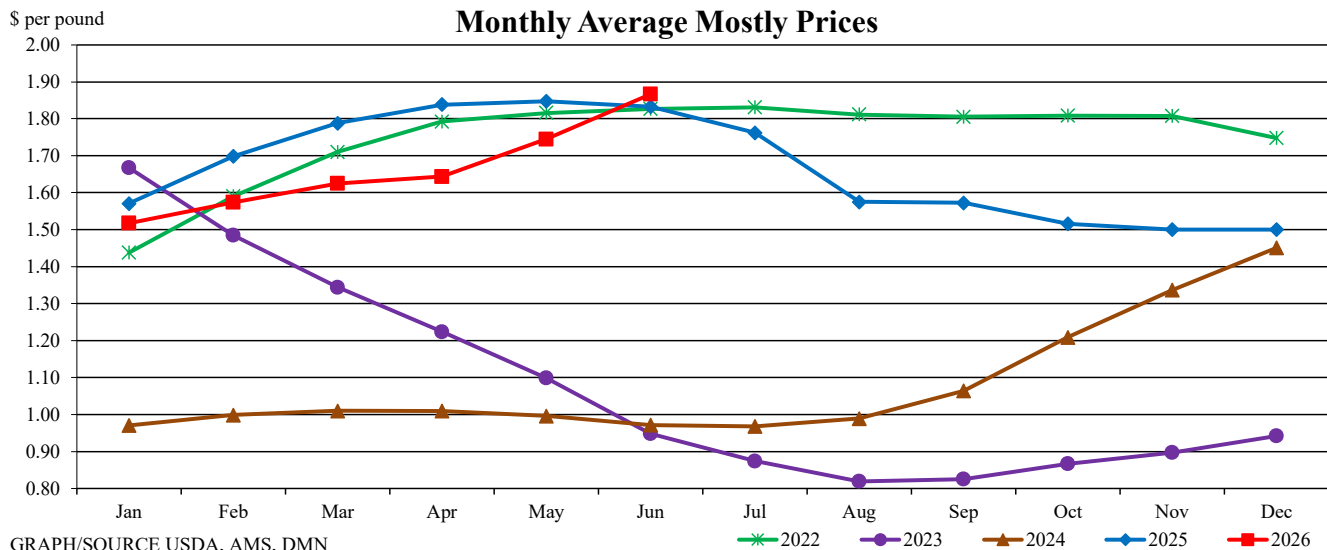

Advertised Prices for Dairy Products at Major Grocery Store Outlets ending during the period of 7/4/2026 to 7/16/2026

The information contained in this report reflects prices advertised by major grocery retailers to consumers through circulars and digital promotions and gathered by USDA through a weekly survey.

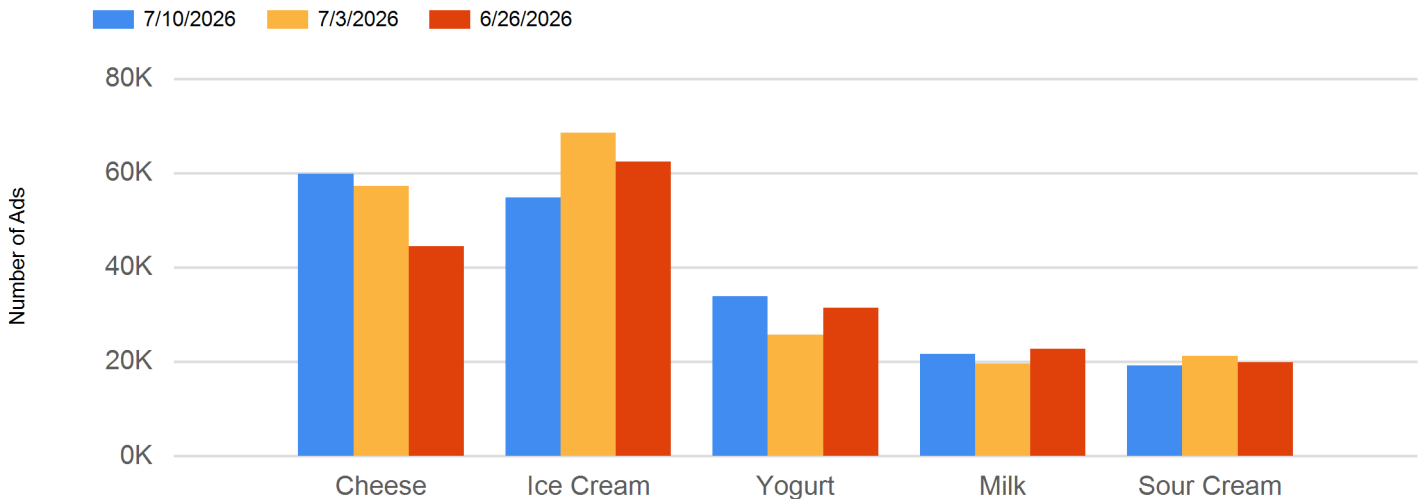
This week conventional dairy ads decreased 8 percent, and organic ads are down 14 percent. Most conventional commodities appeared in fewer ads in Week 28, but ads for flavored milk, cheese, and yogurt increased. In the organic aisle, the only commodities present in last week's survey that appeared in more ads this week are cheese and milk. Organic cottage cheese and sour cream were absent from surveyed ads after being present in Week 27. Cheese is the most advertised conventional dairy commodity. The most advertised organic commodity is milk.

Conventional cheese appeared in 4 percent more ads this week. Ads for the most advertised conventional cheese product, 6-8-ounce shred style, increased 6 percent, and the weighted average advertised price (average price) increased 31 cents to \$2.61. Organic cheese ads are up 30 percent, and 6-8-ounce shred style cheese ads were absent from surveyed ads after appearing last week. In Week 27, organic 6-8-ounce shred style cheese had an average price of \$4.77.

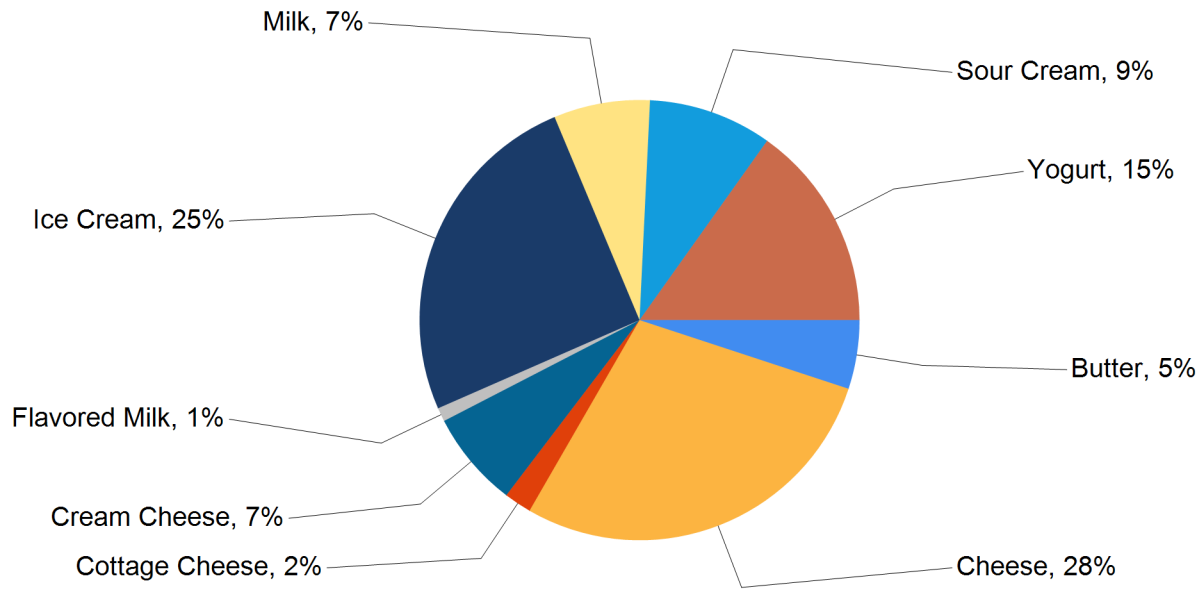
Ice cream fell below cheese to become the second most advertised conventional commodity after appearing in 19 percent fewer ads. Organic ice cream ads are down 52 percent. The most advertised conventional ice cream product is sold in 48-64-ounce containers. Ads for this product decreased 9 percent, and the average price is \$4.50 up 68 cents. Organic 48-64-ounce ice cream ads are down 20 percent, and the average price increased \$1.68 to \$9.29. The Week 28 organic premium for 48-64-ounce ice cream is \$4.79.

Conventional milk ads are up 11 percent, and ads for organic milk increased 9 percent. Conventional gallon milk ads increased 4 percent, and the average price is down 3 cents, to \$3.21. Ads for organic gallons are up 182 percent, and the average price is \$7.45, down \$1.17. The organic premium for gallon milk is \$4.24 for Week 28.

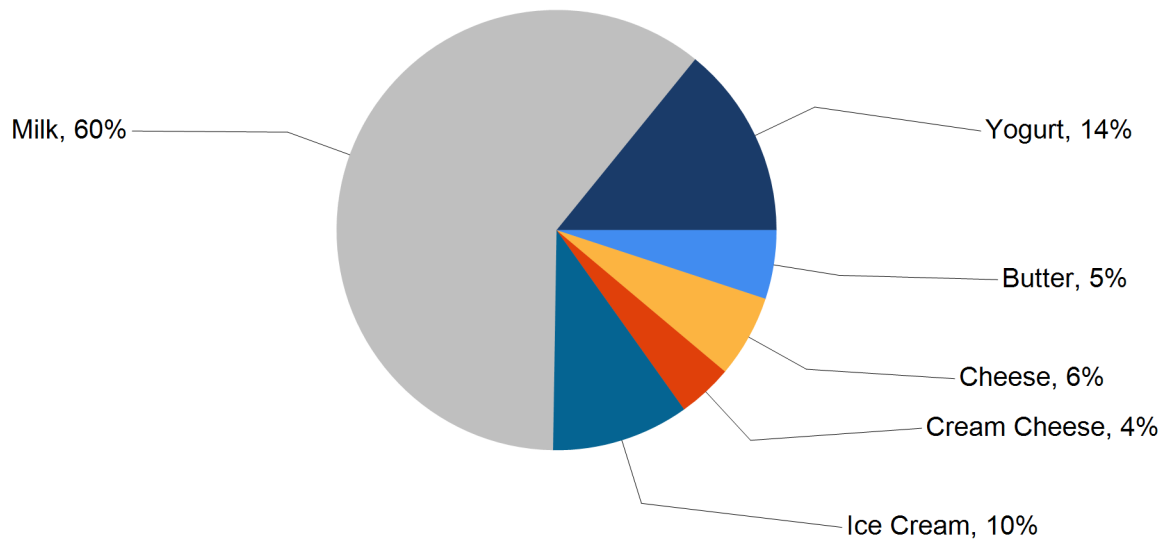
Top 5 Commodities Featured This Week
