



Weekly Cotton Market Review

Agricultural Marketing Service

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Spot quotations averaged 491 points lower than the previous week, according to the USDA, Agricultural Marketing Services Cotton and Warehouse Program. Quotations for the base quality of cotton (color 41, leaf 4, staple 34, mike 35-36 and 43-49, strength 27.0-28.9, and uniformity 81.0-81.9) in the seven designated markets, averaged 78.18 cents per pound for the week ending Thursday, September 10, 2026. The weekly average was down from 83.09 cents last week but up from 62.02 cents reported in the corresponding period a year ago. Daily average quotations ranged from a low of 77.24 on Friday, September 4, to a high of 79.46 cents on Thursday, September 10. Spot transactions reported in the Daily Spot Cotton Quotations for the week ended September 10 totaled 2,570 bales. This is compared to 6,975 reported last week and 6,154 bales reported the corresponding week a year ago. Total spot transactions for the season were 16,193 bales compared to 22,028 the corresponding week a year ago. The ICE Oct settlement price ended the week at 84.64 cents, compared to 83.36 cents last week.

Southeastern Markets Regional Summary

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Spot cotton trading was slow. Supplies were light. Demand was moderate. Producer offerings were light. Average local spot prices were lower. Trading of CCC-loan equities was inactive.

Partly cloudy skies with intermittent sunshine was observed across the lower Southeast region during much of the week. Seasonably light daytime high temperatures in the mid-to-upper 90s cooled slightly as the week progressed. Nighttime lows were in the 70s. A few showers developed throughout the period. The heaviest precipitation totals were recorded along the Atlantic and Gulf coastal areas. Weekly accumulated rainfall measured from one to three inches. Widespread improvements occurred in the Florida Peninsula and adjacent southeast Georgia following widespread heavy rains, according to the U.S. Drought Monitor. Conditions improved in fields where dry conditions had persisted in recent weeks. Producers maintained irrigation schedules which helped the top-crop develop in immature fields. The crop will benefit from additional rain forecasts across the region in the approaching weekend. Producers continued to scout fields and reports indicated insect pressure remained light and easily controlled. According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service's (NASS) Crop Progress report released September 8, bolls opening advanced to 44 percent in Alabama and 39 percent in Georgia.

Breezy and partly cloudy conditions mixed with sunshine prevailed across the upper Southeast during the period. Seasonably hot daytime high temperatures in the upper 90s cooled into the high 80s to low 90s as the week progressed. Stray shower activity brought

precipitation to cotton growing areas of the eastern Carolinas and Virginia as the week progressed. Accumulated rainfall totals measured from around one-quarter to one inch, with slightly heavier measurements observed in localized areas. The moisture benefited later planted fields. A few locations in eastern North Carolina received enough rainfall to lessen precipitation deficits and boost soil moisture, according to the U.S. Drought Monitor. According to NASS, cotton bolls opening reached 44 percent in Virginia, 39 in North Carolina, and 29 percent in South Carolina.

No inquiries or sales were reported from domestic mill buyers. Most mills have covered their immediate to nearby raw cotton needs. Yarn demand remained slow to moderate. Mill buyers maintained a cautious undertone as they balanced raw cotton needs with finished product orders.

Demand through export channels was slow to moderate. Vietnamese mill buyers inquired for a moderate volume of color 31, leaf 3, and staple 36 for prompt shipment. Agents for mills in Mexico inquired for a moderate volume of color 41 and 42, leaf 4, and staple 34 and longer for prompt through October delivery. No sales were reported.

- A very light volume of 2025-crop cotton, color 31 and 41, leaf 2 and 3, staple 32 and longer, mike 35-49, strength 27-30, and uniformity 78-81 sold for around 83.00 cents per pound, FOB car/truck, Georgia terms (Rule 5, compression charges paid, 30 days free storage).

South Central Markets Regional Summary

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North Delta

Spot cotton trading was slow. Supplies and producer offerings were light. Demand was very light. Trading of CCC-loan equities was inactive. Average local spot prices were lower. No interest in forward contracting was reported.

Abundant sunshine dominated the weather pattern throughout most of the period. Daytime high temperatures in the lower 100s dipped into the 90s. The U.S. National Weather Service issued heat advisories, with heat index values reaching up to 109 degrees in areas of Arkansas, Missouri, and Tennessee. Overnight lows remained in the 70s. Isolated thunderstorms and rainfall in the nearby forecast were expected to cool temperatures into the 80s. The region received less than one-quarter of an inch of rain, and additional moisture is needed for later-planted cotton fields. Yield expectations varied due to heat-stressed crops. Later-planted cotton continued to advance, and harvesting was expected to begin in early October. Fields were sprayed for plant bugs by crop dusters in Arkansas. Gins expect to begin accumulating modules on gin yards in late September or early October. According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service's (NASS) Crop Progress report released on September 8, cotton bolls opening advanced to 56 percent in Arkansas, 52 in Tennessee, and 13 percent in Missouri. Virtual and in-person meetings were scheduled and attended at state and national levels.

South Delta

Spot cotton trading was inactive. Supplies and producer offerings were light. Demand was light. Trading of CCC-loan equities was inactive. Average local spot prices were lower. No interest in forward contracting was reported.

Throughout most of the reporting period, plentiful sunshine dominated the weather pattern. Heat advisories were issued by the U.S. National Weather Service, but occasionally cloudy skies helped moderate seasonably hot temperatures. Heat indexes reached up to 108 degrees. Daytime high temperatures in the 100s gradually dropped into the 90s, while overnight lows remained in the 70s. Stray showers during the week produced between one-half of an inch to two and one-quarter inches of rainfall. Harvest had begun in Mississippi. Plentiful heat units advanced crop maturity. No plant bug activity was reported in Louisiana. According to NASS, cotton bolls opening increased significantly, reaching 70 percent in Louisiana and 55 percent in Mississippi. Gins indicated that cotton modules were expected to begin arriving on gin yards next week. Gins were preparing to begin pressing operations for the season. Virtual and in-person meetings were planned and attended at state and national levels.

Trading

North Delta

- A light volume of 2025-crop CCC-catalog cotton, containing color mostly 41, leaf 5 and better, staple 36-38, mike 44-50, strength 29-33, uniformity 81-83, and containing 100 percent extraneous matter (plastic) sold for around 35.66 cents, FOB warehouse (compression charges not paid).

South Delta

- No trading activity was reported.

Southwestern Markets Regional Summary

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East Texas-South Texas

Spot cotton trading was slow. Supplies and producer offerings were light. Demand was light. Average local spot prices were lower. Trading of CCC-loan equities was inactive. Forward contracting activity was light. Foreign mill inquiries were light. Interest was best from India, Peru, and Vietnam.

Predominately hot and partly cloudy conditions were observed in central Texas and the Blackland Prairies, with heavy thunderstorms early and mid-week bringing rainfall to areas of the Brazos River Bottoms. Daytime high temperatures were in the 90s to the 100s. Nighttime lows were in the 70s. Precipitation totals ranged across the region, with some areas receiving only light accumulations up to one and one-half inches in the Brazos River Bottoms. Fields were drying out as the week progressed. Producers applied defoliants and made final preparations to begin harvest. In South Texas, hot, windy, and dry conditions persisted. Daytime temperatures were in the 90s to the 100s. Nighttime temperatures were in the 70s to the 80s. Inconsistent, spotty showers produced only light accumulations of moisture, with two-tenths of an inch of rainfall reported in the lower Rio Grande Valley. Harvest activities in South Texas were ongoing. Local sources report a large portion of the crop has been harvested in the lower Rio Grande Valley and the Coastal Bend region. Ginning operations continued, modules were transported from fields to gin yards. Gins were operating multiple shifts to work through cotton stored on yards. The Corpus Christi Classing Office reported a season total of 38.7 percent for color 31, 49.6 percent for leaf 3, staple averaging 36.76, mike averaging 4.39, strength averaging 31.38, and uniformity averaging 82.18 for week ending September 10. According to the same report, 34 gins were in operation and sending samples for classing services.

West Texas-Kansas-Oklahoma

Spot cotton trading was slow. Supplies and producer offerings were light. Demand was very light. Average local spot prices were lower. Producer interest in forward contracting was light. Trading of CCC-loan equities was inactive. Foreign mill inquiries were light. Interest was best from India, Peru, and Vietnam.

Hot and dry conditions persisted across Texas, with daytime highs generally in the upper 80s to low 100s and nighttime temperatures in the 70s. A brief period of cooler weather late in the week increased the chances for light rainfall. Any precipitation would be beneficial, particularly for the few remaining unharvested dryland fields. Irrigated stands continued to perform relatively well, and additional moisture would help finish out the remaining acres. Beneficial insects have moved into fields and contributed to improved pest management. Yield expectations across West Texas continued to vary, according to local sources. Several field days and industry meetings were held throughout the region. The Texas Flow Meeting convened in Lubbock on September 9 and 10, hosted by the American Cotton Shippers Association, and featured discussions on cotton market developments, supply chain concerns, and industry innovations.

In Kansas, daytime temperatures ranged from the upper 80s to mid-100s, while nighttime lows varied in the 60s and 70s. A brief 24-hour cool down in the 80s brought light rainfall to localized areas, before returning to triple-digit temperatures. Precipitation would be beneficial and improve overall sentiment. Irrigation was finalized ahead of spraying defoliants and boll openers.

Across Oklahoma, conditions remained extremely hot and mostly clear, with daytime temperatures holding in the mid-100s and nighttime lows in the 70s. Prolonged heat and the absence of meaningful rainfall continued to stress stands, leading to further deterioration in many areas. A slight chance of precipitation was forecast late in the period, and industry members adjusted yield expectations accordingly.

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Trading

East Texas/South Texas

- A lot containing a moderate volume of new-crop cotton, color 22 and better, leaf 2 and 3, staple 36 and 37, mike averaging 42.4, strength averaging 30.6, and uniformity averaging 82.3 sold for around 80.75 cents per pound, FOB warehouse (compression charges not paid).

West Texas, Kansas, & Oklahoma

- In Texas, lots containing a light volume of old-crop cotton color 23 and better, leaf 1 and 2, staple 33-35, mike 33-46, strength 27-31, and uniformity 78-82 sold for 71.25 to 75.50 cents per pound, FOB car/truck, (compression charges not paid).
- A light volume of 2025-crop cotton color 31 and better, leaf 3 and better, staple 33 and 34, mike 39-49, strength 27-30, and uniformity 77-80 sold for 66.50 to 70.00 cents, same terms as above.

Western Markets Regional Summary

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Desert Southwest (DSW)

Spot cotton trading was inactive. Supplies and producer offerings were light. Demand was light. Average local spot prices were lower. Foreign mill inquiries were light.

Sunshine and mostly dry conditions continued across the DSW this week. Daytime highs varied across the region, with temperatures in the 90s up to 110s in southwestern Arizona. Nightly lows varied from the 60s to the 80s. Showers produced precipitation totals ranging from trace amounts up to three-quarters of an inch. In El Paso, TX, the crop made good progress, and the rain received will be helpful to improve heat-stressed fields as stands enter into the final stages of maturity. Pesticides were applied. Producers anticipate harvest to begin in late October. According to local sources, the light rain received may result in some lint discoloration in areas of southern Arizona. The crop continued to progress in Arizona. Harvest activities continued in Yuma, AZ. Gins began working through modules accumulated on the yards.

San Joaquin Valley (SJV)

Spot cotton trading was inactive. Supplies and demand were light. No forward contracting or domestic mill activity was reported. Average local prices were lower. Foreign mill inquiries were light.

Predominately sunny and open skies were observed in the SJV during the period. Daytime temperatures warmed back up into the 90s and the 100s this week after last week's brief cool down.

Nighttime lows were in the 60s and 70s. No rainfall was reported. Bolls were cracking open, and the crop was progressing well. Some producers began applying defoliants, and final pre-harvest activities were underway.

American Pima (AP)

Spot cotton trading was inactive. Supplies were moderate. Demand was light. No forward contracting or domestic mill activity was reported. Average local spot prices were steady. Light foreign mill inquiries were reported.

Mostly sunny skies prevailed in the Far West, with daytime highs ranging in the 90s to the 110s across the region. Nighttime lows continued in the 60s to 80s. The crop was maturing well in El Paso, TX and New Mexico. Recent rainfall in El Paso, TX will be helpful to minimize heat stress. Pesticides were applied. Harvest continued in Yuma, AZ. Gins began processing modules in Yuma, marking the beginning of the ginning season in Arizona. In the SJV, the crop was maturing well. Some producers began applying defoliants.

- No trading activity was reported.

American Pima

- No trading activity was reported.

Cotton Production

All cotton production is forecast at 13.2 million 480-pound bales, down 3 percent from the previous forecast and down 5 percent from 2025. The average yield is forecast at 776 pounds per harvested acre, down 22 pounds from the previous forecast and down 76 pounds from 2025.

Supply and Demand

The U.S. cotton projections for 2026/27 show lower production, consumption, and beginning and ending stocks compared to last month. Projected imports and exports are unchanged. Production is reduced by 3 percent to 13.2 million bales as the national average yield is also lowered by 3 percent to 776 pounds per harvested acre. Regionally, yields and production are lower in the Delta and Southwest while slightly higher in the Southeast and West. Projected mill use is reduced to 1.50 million bales as the U.S. textile base continues to contract. With smaller supplies due to reductions in beginning stocks and production, the forecast for ending stocks is reduced by 10 percent to 3.60 million bales, for a stocks-to-use ratio of 26.1 percent, down from 28.8 percent last month. The projected season average farm price for upland cotton is 78 cents/lb., up from 75 cents/lb. last month.

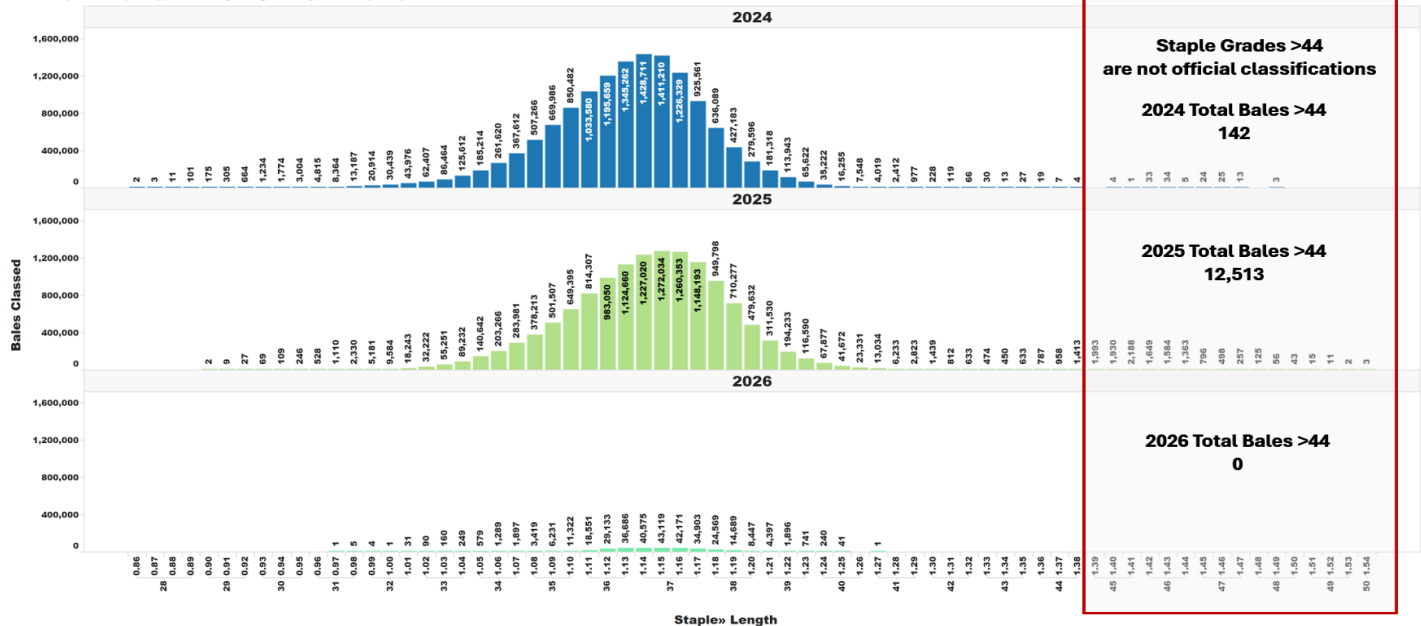

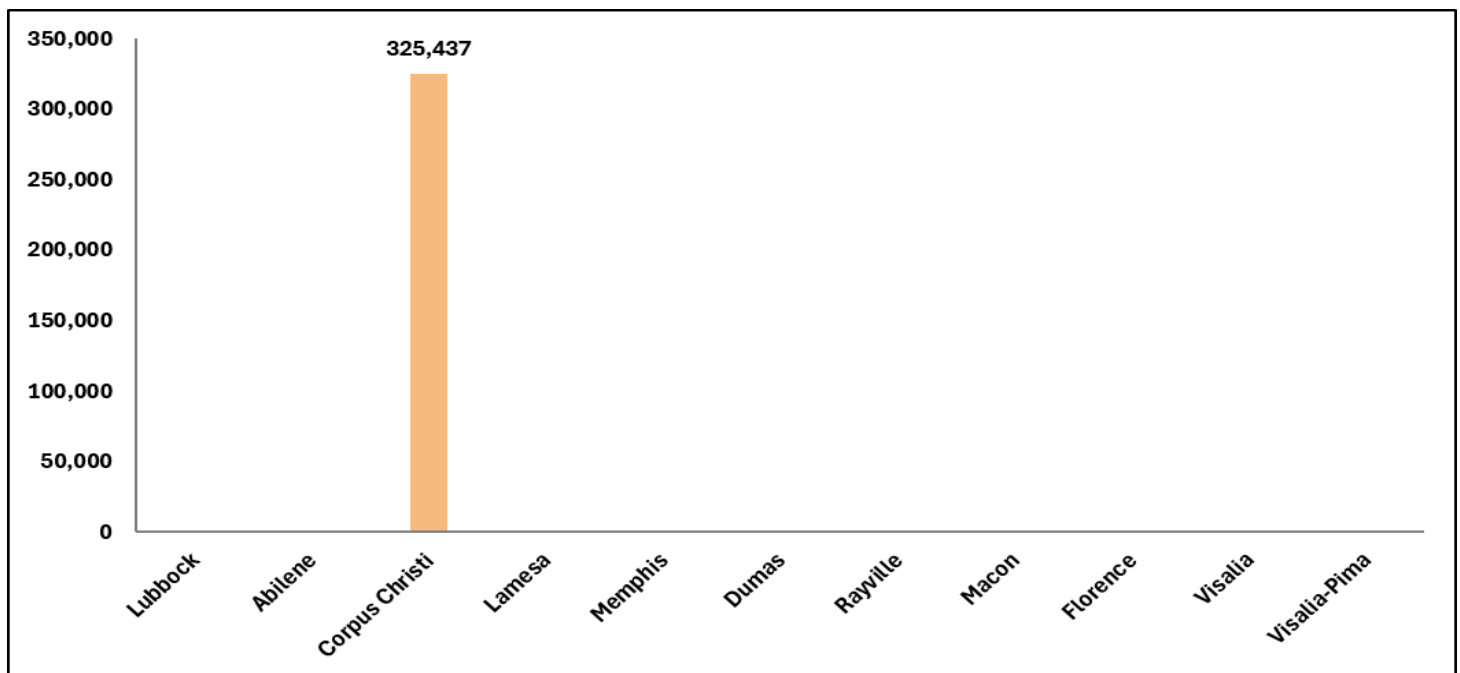

Net sales of Upland totaling 73,900 RB for 2026/2027 were primarily for Pakistan (19,400 RB), Vietnam (17,500 RB, including decreases of 100 RB), Mexico (11,900 RB, including decreases of 200 RB), Bangladesh (10,500 RB), and India (9,500 RB), including decreases of 6,700 RB). Total net sales of 2,500 RB for 2027/2028 were for Mexico. Exports of 177,800 RB were primarily to Vietnam (50,300 RB), India (47,000 RB), Pakistan (17,600 RB), Honduras (11,800 RB), and Mexico (11,000 RB). Net sales of Pima totaling 10,000 RB for 2026/2027 were primarily for India (6,600 RB), Peru (1,900 RB), Thailand (500 RB), Bangladesh (400 RB), and Italy (400 RB). Exports of 5,200 RB were to India (2,400 RB), Pakistan (1,700 RB), Thailand (700 RB), Peru (300 RB), and South Korea (200 RB).
