For your reading assignment, you MUST read *The Hiding Place* by Corrie ten Boom. (Do NOT read the young reader's version!)

- You must write/submit a Response Journal and you must also do a presentation. All of the directions are listed below in Part 1 and Part 2.
- There will also be a test on this book during the first full week of school. Please look below at Part 3.

Please plan your summer accordingly- I do not recommend waiting until the last minute.

Summary: The Hiding Place by Corrie ten Boom

At one time Corrie ten Boom would have laughed at the idea that there would ever be a story to tell. For the first fifty years of her life nothing at all out of the ordinary had ever happened to her. She was an old-maid watchmaker living contentedly with her spinster sister and their elderly father in the tiny Dutch house over their shop. Their uneventful days, as regulated as their own watches, revolved around their abiding love for one another. However, with the Nazi invasion and occupation of Holland, a story did ensue.

Corrie ten Boom and her family became leaders in the Dutch Underground, hiding Jewish people in their home in a specially built room and aiding their escape from the Nazis. For their help, all but Corrie found death in a concentration camp. *The Hiding Place* is their story. (https://www.goodreads.com/book/show/561909.The Hiding Place)

Below you will find five questions to ponder during your reading. Answer <u>all five</u> of the questions and compose a journal entry of 100 words (or more) for each question.

Format: All entries should be typed using Times, size 12 font and double-spaced. It is not necessary to use a new page for each entry. Please make sure to put a word count at the end of each entry.

Questions:

- 1. Chapter 2: Casper ten Boom (Corrie's father) is an incredibly wise Christian man. His actions and words teach many lessons.
 - Using text examples from Chapters 1 and 2, (more examples are found in Chapter 2) describe one or two things that we can learn from Casper. Give at least two quotes as text evidence, and cite the page number where you found the quote. For each quote, explain how the quote you chose explains Casper's character.
- 2. Chapter 4: Compare and contrast Otto's character with Casper ten Boom's (Corrie's father) character. Describe at least one specific character trait for each person, and give at least one example of how we see that character trait shown in what they say or what they do. Include two quotes with page numbers.
- 3. Chapter 5: "The rumors tended to get more spectacular with each repetition. But always they featured things we believed were wrong in the sight of God. Stealing, lying, murder. Was this what God wanted in times like these? How should a Christian act when evil was in power?" (71).

Explain why this question is important to think about (then AND now)! Give at least one specific example of how this relates to another historical event, or something that exists in our society now. (Text to world connection). Give two pieces of text evidence from the book that support your examples.

4. Chapter 12:

"Betsie," I wailed, "how long will it take?"

"Perhaps a long, long time. Perhaps many years. But what better way could there be to spend our lives?"

I turned to stare at her. "Whatever are you talking about?"

"These young women. That girl back at the bunkers. Corrie, if people can be taught to hate, they can be taught to love! We must find the way, you and I, no matter how long it takes..."

She went on, almost forgetting in her excitement to keep her voice to a whisper, while I slowly took in the fact that she was talking about our guards. I glanced at the matron seated at the desk ahead of us. I saw a gray uniform and a visored hat; Betsie saw a wounded human being.

- What is different about Corrie and Betsie's perspectives about their current situation?
- What is a situation where you have experienced a situation in a different way because your perspective shifted?
- 5. Chapter 15: Why do you think that we read this book? What do you take away from this book?

In addition to the Response Journal, you will need to do a presentation. The directions follow:

Part 2: Multimedia Presentation

- Choose <u>one</u> of the options to present your information. Due Monday, August 14th.
- Your class presentation about your project needs to be 2-4 minutes long—no longer!! Please compose notecards to help in your presentation. You will be marked down if you read your note cards—practice; your note cards are just prompts.

Option #1: Dress Up Like a Character from Your Story

Select a character for your story and dress up like him/her. Tell their story in a first person voice and make sure to include details from the story. Props will also be helpful. Have fun. Remember that your performance is 2-4 minutes long.

Option #2: A Time Capsule

This is one of my favorites! Create a time capsule that contains important symbols from your book: these should not just be pictures. You should have 5-10 pieces of information and your time capsule itself should be related to your book somehow (decorate a shoe box to look like something in the book, etc.). Be prepared to do a two-four minute presentation. You may use note cards but they should only be for reference.

Part 3- Test

There will be a test on this book during the first full week of school in August. The exact date of the test will be communicated when school starts. To help you prepare for the test, you may fill out the chapter questions included in this packet. **The chapter questions are not required**; however, they would be a helpful tool when reviewing for the test you will be taking the first full week of school in August.
