GENERAL RULES

- 1. The Wicomico County Fair welcomes and is open to all competitors, without regard to county or state of residence.
- Premium lists and pre-registration entry forms are available in this publication and online at www.wicomicofair.com.
 Register online or mail forms to: WFHS; P.O. Box 493; Salisbury, MD 21803.
 Online registration and mailed entries must be received no later than Monday, Aug. 4, 2025.
- 3. Junior exhibitors must be at least 8 years old by Jan. 1, 2025, and have not reached their 19th birthday by Jan. 1, 2025.
- 4. All articles for exhibit (excluding livestock, rabbits and poultry) must be signed in at the Carriage House between 4 8 p.m. on Wednesday, Aug. 13. All items must be in place by 8 p.m., and the doors to the Carriage House will be closed at 8:30 p.m.
- 5. Livestock, rabbits and poultry are to be signed in on Thursday, Aug. 14, from 2 9 p.m., and must be in place by noon, Friday, Aug. 15.
- 6. All articles exhibited (other than livestock) must be the work of the exhibitor, must have been made in the last 3 years (unless otherwise stated in the department rules) and not previously have been exhibited in the Wicomico County Fair.
- 7. Every article exhibited shall be under the control of the Directors of the Fair.
- 8. During the judging of indoor entries, the Carriage House will be closed to entrants and spectators. Only judges, directors and department chair people will be permitted to enter.
- 9. No exhibitor will be allowed to remove any entries from the grounds until after the awards ceremony on Sunday evening (ends approx. 6 p.m.). Early removal of items will result in forfeiture of premiums (awards).
- 10. The judges will award only such premiums as they deem proper, whether there be competition or not. ALL JUDGES' DECISIONS ARE FINAL. In the event that there is only one entry in a class, the placing shall depend upon the merit of that entry, and the award made at the discretion of the judges. Best in Show will be chosen from 1st place entries only.
- 11. Articles to be exhibited must be in the container specified by the department rules.
- 12. "Miscellaneous" items must not meet the criteria of any other class of the department and must be identified on the entry form as to what they are.
- 13. Separate entry forms must be used by adult & junior exhibitors, and 4-H/FFA members in all divisions. Entry forms must have a complete 911 address and correct phone number.
- 14. Every effort will be made to protect all entries while in the custody of the Fair committee. The Fair committee disclaims any responsibility for loss or damage to property or person.
- 15. No person may enter more than 1 item per class, except in livestock, poultry and rabbit classes.
- 16. Under no circumstances will any entry be accepted from persons judging that department.
- 17. For articles left after the fair closes on Sunday, please contact wicomicofairpremiums@gmail.com and make arrangements for pick-up. After October 1, articles become the property of the Wicomico County Fair.
- 18. All premium checks must be cashed within 60 days of issue date.
- 19. Any changes or exceptions to pre-registered entries must be pre-approved by current Carriage House Committee.
- 20. All 4-H or FFA members from Wicomico County and other counties enter in the 4-H Dept. If a class is not offered by 4-H, the entry can be entered in Open Class Junior Dept. A 4-H member may not enter the same class in both Open and 4-H.
- 21. The name of the exhibitor must not be on the entry. If the name is a permanent part of the item, it must be completely covered to assure fair judging.

All poultry entries will be judged for standard, market and production qualities with special emphasis on those qualities which are of economic significance. Particular attention will be paid for vigor, size, type and color. In entries made up of more than one bird, uniformity of the characteristics will be important.

- 1. All exhibitors must comply with rules and regulations.
- 2. The requirements for exhibition are as follows:
 - All poultry, including ducks, geese, turkeys and guineas, at exhibition shall originate from the United States, Pullorum-Typhoid clean, or equivalent flocks, OR shall have had a negative Pullorum-Typhoid Test within 90 days of its movement to an exhibition if not from a Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Flock. This information shall be documented on an NPIP Form 15 (Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Flock), NPIP Form 3-B (Flock Inspection Form) or similar certificates which shall accompany poultry on exhibition. A Junior exhibitor may substitute a statement signed by a

- Maryland Agriculture Extension Agent, or the Maryland Department of Agriculture, indicating that exhibited poultry has originated from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Flock within the previous 12 months.
- Growers of all broilers and roasters exhibited from a commercial flock may substitute a statement signed by the flock supervisor that the birds originate from a Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Flock and will be slaughtered after exhibition.
- 3. All birds must be owned by the exhibitor by July 15, 2025.
- 4. Exhibitors are responsible for providing food and water for their animals.
- 5. All poultry exhibited must be in good health.
- 6. The Wicomico County Fair will not be responsible for any losses.
- 7. In poultry, there will be a limited number of coops available, so please get your entries in early if you wish to have coops for your birds.
- 8. Exhibitors are limited to entering a total of 10 birds. There may be no more than 2 entries per class.

- Exhibitors must state the number of animals and number of pens needed at the time of making entries.
 Each individual livestock entry must include animals ID tag # or tattoo.
- 4. All livestock must be accompanied by a current approved Health Certificate signed by a licensed vet and pre-approved by MD Dept. Of Agriculture.
- 5. Delaware residents must have DE Department of Agriculture papers.
- 6. All exhibitors will be limited to two entries per class.
- 7. Any animal shown in a fitting and showing class must be shown in a competition class, and all persons

- showing in fitting and showing class must enter a competition class.
- 8. If there is only one entry in a class, placing shall depend on the merit of the entry and award made at the judge's discretion.
- 9. All animals must be shown by owner unless prior approval has been granted by Livestock Chairperson.
- 10. All entries must be signed in on Thursday, Aug. 14, between 2 and 9 p.m. and must be in place by noon on Friday, Aug. 15. Livestock weigh-in will be from 9 a.m. until noon on Friday.
- 11. Judging will begin at 2 p.m. on Friday, Aug. 15.
- 12. Each exhibitor will provide their own food and bedding for Livestock.
- 13. Animals must stay in pens. Animals are not permitted outside Livestock Area.
- 14. Lights out and no grooming of animals will be allowed after 11 p.m.
- 15. Every effort will be made to protect the animals while in the custody of the show. The Farm & Home Show Committee disclaims any responsibility for the loss or damage to property or person.
- 16. Pen space must be cleaned up after removal of animals, or premiums will be forfeited.
- 17. Animals cannot be removed until completion of Sunday Awards Ceremony.
- 18. No Junior livestock exhibitor may spend the night on the grounds without a parent or guardian present.
- 19. Adult exhibitors cannot show any animal entered by a Junior exhibitor. Animal must be registered to the exhibitor.
- 20. Adult exhibitors will be awarded ribbons and premiums ONLY. No trophies will be awarded.
- 21. Discrepancies are at the discretion of the Fair Board of Directors
- 22. Dress Code Tan or green pants and white collared shirt. Dairy All white.
- 23. Market Animals MUST be wethered PRIOR to the show.
- 24. Market Animals CANNOT be shown in wether or breeding classes

4-H Rules & Regulations for the 4-H Section Wicomico County Fair Aug 15-17, 2025

4-H Exhibitors: Must be enrolled as a 4-H member within Wicomico, Somerset or Worcester County, Md. Each child must be current with their online enrollment and paid enrollment fee. Each child's membership will be verified through their home 4-H county. 4-H memberships must be registered by June 1. Failure to complete the Maryland 4-H registration process will result in disqualification. Competitive exhibitors must be between the ages of 8-18 as of Jan. 1 of the current year.

4-H Age Divisions: Exhibitors may only exhibit in a class designated for their age division. Based on age as of Jan. 1: Junior (age 8-10); Intermediate (age 11-13); Senior (age 14-18).

4-H Clovers Exhibitors: Clover 4-H'ers (age 5-7 as of Jan. 1) can enter in any division/class in a non-competitive manner. Fair registration for Clovers will be taken through the 4-H office, not the fair's online system. Please contact Melissa at the 4-H office if you have a Clover who would like to participate. Green participation ribbons will be handed out.

Exhibiting in "OPEN": 4-H members are encouraged to show in 4-H Divisions. However, if 4-H does not have a class, (*class – the specific entry type*) but OPEN does, you are allowed to show your items in the OPEN class. You are not permitted to show in both OPEN and 4-H for the same class. You will need to register for the OPEN section separately.

Animal Classes: 4-H does not have a Division for any animal classes, so members must show in "OPEN." You must register separately for "OPEN" classes.

How to Enter: Premium lists and pre-registration entry blanks/forms are available here and online at www.wicomicofair.com. Register online or mail form to WFHS; P.O. Box 493; Salisbury, MD 21803. Online or mailed registration must be received no later than Aug. 4, 2025.

Entry Drop Off: All articles for exhibit must be placed between 4 – 8 p.m. at WinterPlace Park Carriage House on Wednesday, Aug. 13. All items must be in place by 8 p.m.

Entries: Entries may be moved at the discretion of the 4-H Fair and/or judges and placed in a more appropriate class if necessary. All entries displayed must have been grown or made by the exhibitor and not entered in any other previous Wicomico 4-H Fairs. Every effort will be made to protect all entries while in the custody of the Wicomico 4-H Fair, but the Fair disclaims any responsibility for loss or damage to property or person.

Judging: Exhibitors and family members of exhibitors are not permitted in the judging areas. Entries will be judged by the numerical system of "1st Place," "2nd Place," or "3rd Place." The placing shall depend upon the merit of the entry and will be left to the sole discretion of the judges. In the event there is only one entry in a class, the placing shall depend upon the merit of that entry and the award made at the discretion of the judges.

Entry Pick Up: All entries must be picked up after the awards program on Sunday. No exhibitor will be allowed to remove any article from the grounds until after the awards ceremony is over. Entries removed early without permission will forfeit any premium (award) monies. These are the rules of the Wicomico County Fair.

Unclaimed Entries: Entries left after the show closes will be considered unwanted and disposed of.

Awards: Ribbons will be awarded to the 1st, 2nd and 3rd place entries in each class. Premium money award amounts will match the OPEN section awards of \$6, \$5 and \$4. A medallion and a \$10 award will be awarded to one Champion in each Division if there are sufficient entries, as determined by the Superintendent. Checks are to be picked up following the awards ceremony on Sunday evening or from the 4-H office the week after the Fair.

Exhibitor Expectations: Exhibitors and entries must comply with the "General 4-H Rules & Regulations," these "Division Rules & Regulations" and the applicable "Section Rules & Regulations." The Maryland 4-H Youth Development Program expects all 4-H members to abide by the rules and guidelines presented in the documents "Maryland 4-H Code of Conduct" and "Maryland 4-H Disciplinary Policy And Procedures." All documents are available from a 4-H office or the State 4-H Office. Exhibitors who do not obey rules will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action as established in the Code of Conduct. 4-H members who are disciplined and removed from the fair forfeit all premiums.
