

New Faculty Fellows to Join Berkley Center

April 28, 2015—Eight faculty members from departments across Georgetown University are joining the Berkley Center as Faculty Fellows for the 2015-2016 school year.

In making the announcement, Tom Banchoff, center director and vice president for global engagement said: "The fellows are distinguished scholars across disciplines who enrich our intellectual community at Georgetown. We are delighted to welcome them as collaborators in the Berkley Center's ongoing work at the intersection of religion, peace, and world affairs."

Berkley Center Managing Director Michael Kessler said: "The Faculty Fellows will enhance the scholarly mission of the center as we enter our tenth anniversary year and beyond. The support we can provide for the fellows' scholarship and teaching is part of our core academic mission."

This year's fellows include:

Marjorie Mandelstam Balzer is a research professor in the Department of Anthropology and the Center for Eurasian, Russian and East European Studies specializing in social theory, interethnic relations, religion, and anthropology of the Russian Federation, especially Siberia.

Erin Cline is an associate professor in the Department of Theology, with a focus on classical Confucian and Daoist ethical, political, and religious thought and comparative ethics.

Loubna El Amine is an assistant professor in the Department of Government and a political theorist interested in non-Western traditions of thought, with a focus on early Chinese political thought.

Lise Morje Howard is an associate professor in the Department of Government, researching international relations, comparative politics, conflict resolution, civil wars, peacekeeping, and Africa.

Terrence Johnson is an associate professor of Religion and African American Studies, with a focus on ethics, political theory, African American religions, and religion and public life.

John Langan, S.J. is the Cardinal Bernardin Chair in Catholic Social Thought in the Department of Philosophy, specializing in ethics and international affairs.

Fathali M. Moghaddam is a professor in the Department of Psychology and editor-in-chief *Peace and Conflict: Journal of Peace Psychology* (APA), with expertise in the psychological foundations of democracy, dictatorship, conflict, and radicalization.

Jonathan Ray is the Samuel Eig Associate Professor of Jewish Studies in the Department of Theology, with an expertise in medieval and early modern Jewish history.
