Highlights will also be present, plus comprehensive coverage of the 2009 Phillips 66 Big 12 Men's Basketball Championship in March.

The Big 12 Conference has established a consistent level of national success on the field and in the classroom as it enters its 13th season in 2008-09.

Since it began play in 1996-97, the Conference can boast of 31 team crowns and over 385 individual NCAA Championships. The success continued during 2007-08 as Kansas captured the Big 12's first national title in men's basketball, while the league added 31 individual crowns.

Over the past four seasons a total of 12 NCAA trophies have been hoisted by Big 12 institutions, with at least one national crown won in all but one year for the Conference, including each of the past 11 seasons.

The Big 12 leads all conferences with five appearances in Bowl Championship Series title games. League squads have played for the football national championship five times in the last nine years with berths in 14 BCS games overall, including two in 2007. The Big 12 led all conferences with four teams ranked in the Top 10 in the final national polls a season ago. In addition, an all-time high eight league players earned consensus All-America recognition in 2007, more than any other conference.

In basketball, nine men's and women's teams have advanced to their respective Final Fours in the past seven seasons as the Big 12 continues its place among the elite intercollegiate athletic conferences. The six men's Final Four participants since 2002 is more than any conference. Numerous national honors have been won by basketball student-athletes during the league's history, with Michael Beasley (Kansas State), D.J. Augustin (Texas) and Courtney Paris (Oklahoma) the most recent to garner accolades as consensus All-America in 2007-08.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

Big 12 student-athletes also do well in garnering national academic recognition. Sarah Pavan (Nebraska) was named Academic All-America of the Year in volleyball the past two seasons by ESPN The Magazine and College Sports Information Directors of America with a 4.0 grade-

point average in Biochemistry. She also won the national academic honor presented for all sports in 2006-07 and was named recipient of the prestigious 2006-07 Honda-Broderick Award as Collegiate Woman Athlete of the Year. She is the first athlete since the Big 12 was formed to earn the accolade. In addition to his athletic accomplishments, Augustin was an Academic All-America First Team choice. In its history, the conference has totaled over 300 academic honorees, averaging more than 25 each season.

The Big 12 is proud of other stories that combine on and off the field success. Patience Knight (Texas Tech) was the recipient of the Honda Inspiration Award in 2008, given to an outstanding female college athlete who overcomes adversity to excel in her sport. She was diagnosed with a cancerous tumor in 2007, but rebounded to win All-America honors at the 2008 NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships.

Competitive excellence, scholarship and sportsmanship are all equal components of the Big 12 philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and Academic All-Big 12 squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons.

At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsperson of the Year

Institutions can also nominate student-athletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships at the end of each academic year. A total of 201 scholars have received over \$1.2 million in postgraduate financial aid through the first 12 years of the program.

The Big I2 sponsors 2I sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The conference is made up of 12 institutions that have shared many traditional rivalries throughout their histories. Member schools include -Baylor University, University of Colorado, Iowa State University, University of Kansas, Kansas State University, University of Missouri, University of Nebraska, University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma State University, University of Texas, Texas A&M University and Texas Tech University.

The institutions created a league that encompasses seven states, over 45 million people and television households in 18 of the top 100 markets within its geographic footprint.

The conference conducts championships for 20 of its 21 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition. The winner of the Big I2 football championship game earns the league's berth into the prestigious Bowl Championship Series.

In the last several years the Big 12 has increased its bowl agreements and expanded television opportunities for all sports through contracts with ABC/ESPN, FSN and CBS College Sports. Most recently, the league renewed and expanded its multi-year arrangement with ABC/ESPN, Inc. The new contract begins in 2008-09.

In its first 12 years, the Conference has distributed more than \$1 billion to its 12 member institutions.

The Big 12 staff administers to over 4,600 student-athletes in 21 sports. The conference is headquartered in Irving, Texas.

### ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

Performance in the classroom is just as important as accolades on the field when looking at the student-athlete. The Big 12 Conference recognizes student-athletes in four areas for academic achievement. Those areas include the Commissioner's Honor Roll, Academic All-Big 12 teams, the Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, and the Big 12 Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship.

### **ACADEMIC ALL-BIG 12 TEAMS**

Recognizing those student-athletes who excel in the classroom and on the field and court, the Big 12 has academic all-conference teams for all sports.

Nominated by the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services and the Athletic Media Relations Directors, members of the all-academic teams have posted at least a 3.00 grade point average either cumulative or the previous two semesters and are regulars (i.e. letterwinners) on his or her respective team. First-team honorees are regulars who have at least a 3.20 GPA.

Last year, a few academic teams in the Big 12 exceeded 100 student-athletes recognized by the conference. In addition, student-athletes have gained recognition by being named to ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America teams.

### **COMMISSIONER'S HONOR ROLL**

Acknowledging all participants, the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll is an inclusive honor for all sports sponsored by the membership of the league. The Honor Roll is recorded and released each semester and recognizes those student-athletes who registered a 3.0 or better grade point average the previous semester.

Submitted through the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services at each institution, those honored are not necessarily the stars on the field and court but those who participate on the team. They include the letterwinners and non-letterwinners and recognize every student-athlete who has excelled in the classroom.

More than 2,000 Big I2 student-athletes are named to the Commissioner's Honor Rolls at the end of each of semester.

### PHILLIPS 66 CLASSROOM CHAMPIONS

As Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, the conference recognizes 30 student-athletes per school who have excelled in competition and in the classroom. Chosen through the Big 12 membership, those honored are recognized throughout the year on the Big 12 Network in conjunction with ESPN Regional and FSN.

### DR. PRENTICE GAUTT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

With 120 student-athletes from all Big 12 schools honored over the last five years, the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships' list has grown to 201 recipients since the 1996-97 academic year.

Additional funding prior to the 2002-03 selection process allowed each school to name two outstanding scholars to the annual list of honorees. Conference officers also voted to name the postgraduate scholarship program awards after longtime Big 12 and Big Eight Conference Associate Commissioner and student services' pioneer Dr. Prentice Gautt in 2004. Dr. Gautt passed away on March 17, 2005.

The all-time group has solid representation of scholars throughout the 21 sponsored Big 12 sports and has provided \$1,205,600 through the 2007-08 academic year for much-needed financial aid. Three faculty representatives, one senior woman administrator and one director of athletics form the selection group for the prestigious awards, which help the students to continue their formal education. Since its inception the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship program has produced over a dozen physicians, several attorneys for the underprivileged, college professors, Peace Corps volunteers and positions of national prominence.

Criteria for these awards include a cumulative grade point average of 3.500 on a 4.0 scale, participation in at least two years of intercollegiate athletics at the scholar-athlete's respective institution, and completion of athletics' eligibility. The scholar-athletes also must graduate from their respective member institutions within 15 months of their selection as postgraduate scholarship recipients and are expected to enroll in graduate/ professional schools within 15 months after they graduate.

The \$2,500 individual annual grants began in 1996-97, were raised to \$5,000 in 1999 and increased to \$6,900 prior to the 2003-04 term. In 2006-07, the awards climbed to \$7,500. Most honorees in recent years have also been named to Academic All-Big 12 Conference teams as well as the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll.

### **CHICK-FIL-A COMMUNITY OF CHAMPIONS**

The Big 12 Conference, in conjunction with Chick-fil-A, recognizes numerous student-athletes during the academic year with the Community of Champions program. In order to be eligible for consideration, student-athletes must meet the following criteria:

- Academics ~ An academic standard of a 3.0 grade-point average or higher must be maintained.
- Community Service ~ The designated student-athlete should be involved with at least one community service program. The program(s) could be a student organization on campus or within the athletic department. For example, the Student Athlete Advisory Committee or Big Brothers/Big Sisters.
- **Leadership/Sportsmanship** ~ The student-athlete should demonstrate leadership and sportsmanship on and off the field. Examples would include being team captain, maintaining a leadership role within the athletic department or leadership roles in a campus student organization(s).

### Institutional Awards

In the separate, institutional part of the program, all athletic departments will receive \$3,000 from Chick-fil-A. One institution will receive an additional \$2,000 (\$5,000 total) for outstanding activities in its community. The Community of Champion rules state that the grand prize "will be awarded based on the winning institution's overall positive impact on its community." When multiple institutions are engaged in the similar community activities, the winning institution will be selected by Chick-fil-A with input provided by the Big I2 and ESPN Regional Television.



Prentice Gautt was the first black football player at Oklahoma. He became a two-time All-Big Eight selection and was the 1959 Orange Bowl MVP. He was also named to the Academic All-America Team his senior campaign.

### **BIG 12 CONFERENCE AWARDS**

The Big I2 annually recognizes its top male and female athlete and sportsperson. The Athlete of the Year Awards are selected based on athletic performance, academic achievement and citizenship within the academic year of nomination. The Sportspersons of the Year Award was started prior to the 2000-01 academic year to recognize student-athletes who displayed an extraordinary degree of sportsmanship and/or community service from within the conference. Honorees are selected by a media panel.

In 2007-08, the Big 12 Athletes of the Year were Chase Daniel (Missouri) and Sarah Pavan (Nebraska). The Sportsperson of the Year winners were Mamadou Diene (Baylor) and Katie Martincich

(Kansas).

Daniel finished fourth in the Heisman Trophy balloting in 2007 while leading Missouri to a share of its first Big 12 North division title and first appearance in the Dr Pepper Big 12 Football Championship Game. The junior quarterback was a finalist for the O'Brien, Walter Camp and Manning awards. He also excelled in the classroom, earning Academic All-Big 12 First Team honors.

Pavan, honored for the second consecutive year, is the most decorated volleyball student-athlete in Big 12 history. For the 2007 season she was named Volleyball Magazine National Player of the Year, AVCA All-America First Team and Big 12 Player of the Year. She graduated with a 4.00 grade point average in biochemistry and was selected a 2008 NCAA Today's Top VIII Recipient.

Since his arrival from the Senegal, Diene has been active in the Baylor community participating in service

The Big 12 captured its first NCAA Men's Basketball Championship when Kansas cut down the nets in San Antonio in April. The Jayhawks topped North Carolina and Memphis en route to their fifth national crown. The NCAA title was the 31st team championship in any sport in the conference's 12-year history.

### **BIG 12 THE BEST AGAINST TOP 25 FOES**

The Big 12 posted the most non-conference wins in league history a year ago. In fact, the Big 12 record was set before the postseason began (other years included postseason play). The total victories and win percentage also rank favorably nationally. The Big 12 led the nation in victories against nationally-ranked non-league opponents.

### **BIG 12 WAS ALONE WITH TWO IN ELITE EIGHT**

The Big 12 sent two teams - Kansas and Texas - to regional final competition last season. The conference was the only one in the nation with multiple schools in the Elite Eight. It is the fifth time in the 12-year history of the league that more than one Big 12 squad has advanced to the Elite Eight. Since the Big 12 began play in 1996-97, half of its teams (ISU, KU, MU, OU, OSU, UT) have made the regional final round.

### **BIG 12 IS SWEET OVER THE PAST SEVEN YEARS**

Since the 2002 season, the Big 12 is second nationally in the number of NCAA regional semifinalists. The conference has had 17 squads advance to the "Sweet 16" during that time. A total of three teams nationally have played in the Sweet 16 in five of the last seven years, and two are from the Big 12. Kansas, Texas and Duke are the only squads who can boast the feat.

### OU HOPES TO MAKE IT TWO IN A ROW FOR BIG 12 IN NIT SEASON TIPOFF

Oklahoma will be the Big 12 squad competing in the annual NIT Season Tipoff and will be one of four regional round hosts, with two games guaranteed in Norman. The Sooners will face

Mississippi Valley State in the first game. OU will then play either 2008 NCAA regional finalist Davidson or James Madison in a second contest, which will be played regardless of the result of the outing versus MVSU. It marks Oklahoma's first appearance in the event since 2001. Texas A&M won the NIT Season Tipoff a year ago, the second time in Big 12 history (Kansas, 1997) a league squad has won the event.

### **DOUBLE-DOUBLES HAPPEN HERE**

In the last 10 years, the Big 12 has produced 12 players who have averaged a double-double in a season. The total is the most of any major conference (ACC, Big 12, Big East, Big Ten, Pac-10, SEC) in the country.

Since 1998-99, only three schools nationally have had three or more players average a points-rebounds double-double in a season. Two of the schools are from the Big 12.

A year ago, Damion James of Texas averaged a double-double with 13.2 points and 10.2 boards. He is the fourth Longhorn player (Kevin Durant, Chris Mihm, James Thomas) since '98-99 to accomplish the feat. Kansas (Drew Gooden, Nick Collison, Wayne Simien) and Notre Dame are the two other schools to have three players reach both marks in that time.

### **BIG 12 COACHES HAVE FINAL FOUR EXPERIENCE**

Despite the fact that there have been 11 new head coaches at nine Big 12 schools since 2006-07, half of the mentors have Final Four experience in their backgrounds.

### BIG 12 FRESHMEN BECOMING REGULARS ON AP ALL-AMERICA FIRST TEAM

Make it back-to-back years for a Big 12 freshman named Associated Press All-America First Team. Kansas State's Michael Beasley was honored last season, one year after Kevin Durant of Texas garnered the accolade. Six players in history have earned AP first team honors as freshmen, and three hail from Big 12 schools - Beasley, Durant and Wayman Tisdale (Oklahoma, 1983). Kevin Love (UCLA, 2008), Chris Jackson (LSU, 1990) and Greg Oden (Ohio State, 2007) are the only others to ever be selected in their first year of school.

### BZDELIK TALKS HOOPS IN PERSIAN GULF

In June, Colorado coach Jeff Bzdelik had the opportunity to travel on the USO's "Operation Hoop Talk" initiative in the Persian Gulf.

The CU mentor joined several coaches and shared insider tips, hosted free basketball clinics and



toured multiple military posts. The group also posed for photos, signed autographs and spent quality time talking with military players about the game of basketball. Created to help boost troop morale and bring a touch of home to those in uniform, the initiative allows coaches, professional sports figures and military players the opportunity to establish relationships, and have fun in a competitive environment.



### TEXAS TO HOST COLLEGE GAMEDAY

In what has become an annual occurrence, a Big 12 school will once again host ESPN's College

GameDay as the show makes a trip to Austin for the Oklahoma at Texas contest on February 21. It marks the second visit by the network's traveling road show to UT, as ESPN was previously on campus for the Longhorns matchup with Kansas on Feb. 25, 2006.

### BIG 12 / PAC-10 HARDWOOD SERIES CONTINUES IN 2008-09

The Big 12 and Pacific-10 Conferences will continue games this season in a four-year agreement to play a men's basketball series of 12 annual matchups between the two leagues. The 2008-09 campaign marks the second season of the Hardwood Series.

Last season, the Pac-10 held a 7-5 edge in series contests. The Big 12, however, won the overall season series between conference teams with a 11-8 advantage. The series will continue in 2009, with the games slated for December 3-6 to include new matchups among the schools. The games in 2010 will be played December 2-5.

All 12 contests will be televised nationally by either FSN or the ESPN family of networks. A majority of the games are played the week after Thanksgiving, with a complete schedule below.

### **BIG 12 SETS RECORD IN 2008 NBA DRAFT**

The Big 12 set a conference record this past spring, as 10 players were chosen in the 2008 NBA Draft. The total shattered the old record of six, established on three different occasions (1997, '98, 2004).

For the second straight year, the No.2 pick came from the Big I 2 when Michael Beasley was chosen by the Miami Heat. Beasley and Bill Walker are the first Kansas State teammates since I 982 to be chosen in the same draft.

Kansas tied the NBA record for a two-round draft by having five players selected. Only Florida (2007) and Connecticut (2006) can match the feat.

Texas is the only school in the nation with a top 10 pick in each of the last three NBA Drafts. UT is just the fourth school (Georgia Tech, Duke, Connecticut) since 1985 to produce a lottery pick in three consecutive years.

Texas A&M had players taken in the first round in back-to-back drafts for the first time in school history (DeAndre Jordan, 2008; Acie Law, 2007).

### **BIG 12 FANS KEEP UP THE TURNSTILE COUNT**

Last season, the Big 12 set a league record for combined attendance (regular season plus conference championship). In 216 games/sessions, a total of 2,374,927 fans watched Big 12 competition. The combined number of more than 2.37 million fans was fourth nationally.

The NCAA Champion Kansas Jayhawks led the country in total fans (home, away, neutral) in 2007-08. Eleven of the 12 league squads were in the top 80 in home attendance, with five in the top 26. Colorado recorded the seventh-largest average increase from two years ago (+1,837), while Baylor boasted the 23rd-best improvement (+1,186).

# BIG 12 TO PLAY NCAA HOST IN 2009 & '10 CONFERENCE ONE OF 10 FINALISTS TO HOST FINAL FOUR

The Big 12 will return to its NCAA hosting duties in 2009. The conference has been selected as one of the hosts for the 2009 (Kansas City) and 2010 (Oklahoma City) NCAA Championships.

The games in 2009 and '10 will mark the seventh and eighth times in the last 10 years that the Big 12 will host NCAA men's basketball competition. The conference hosted six straight seasons from 2001-06 in Kansas City, Oklahoma City and Dallas.

In Kansas City, the Big 12 will host first/second rounds for the third time since the league began play in 1996-97. The NCAA first/second rounds will return Oklahoma City's Ford Center for the third occasion since 1997.

The Big 12 has also been named one of 10 host finalists for the NCAA Men's Final Four for the years 2012-16. The league has submitted a bid to host the event at the Dallas Cowboys' new stadium in Arlington, Texas. The other host cities include: Atlanta, Detroit, Houston, Indianapolis, Minneapolis, New Orleans, Phoenix, San Antonio and St. Louis.

### **BY THE NUMBERS**

- 2 Teams from the Big 12 that recorded 30 or more victories last season. Kansas (37) and Texas (31) were two of nine teams nationally to reach the plateau, making the Big 12 the only conference in the country with two teams at the 30-win mark.
- 2 Number of years the Big 12 has had all of its teams reach the double-digit victory mark. Last season marked the second time in league history it has happened, in addition to the 2002-03 campaign.

- 57 Minutes played by Texas A&M's Josh Carter and Donald Sloan in the five-overtime game with Baylor last season. The total set a Big 12 record.
- **60.7** Points per game allowed by Nebraska in 2007-08, the fewest in the conference. It marked the first time in Big 12 history the Huskers have led the league in that category.
- 100 Years of Oklahoma State basketball. The 2008-09 season will mark the 100th for OSU, the 10th Big 12 school to reach the plateau.

### .583/.573 -

Overall and conference only shooting percentages for Leo Lyons of Missouri last year. It marked the first time a MU player had led the Big 12 in either category.

### 4.6 million -

Fans attending Big 12 games over the last two seasons. The conference has established its top two all-time season attendance totals over the last two years.

Since the first season of conference competition, the Big I 2 has always guaranteed its teams extensive national television coverage. This year, the Big I 2 Conference continues its long-standing relationship with the ESPN family of networks, including ESPN, ESPNU, and ABC.

In addition, Conference games are provided to CBS through the partnership with ESPN. The Big 12 and ESPN, Inc. are entering the second year of a long-term contract that runs through the 2015-16 season. The Big 12 is the first conference to be guaranteed three weekly telecast windows on ESPN or ESPN2. In addition, 95 games will air annually with more than 60 contests broadcast by ABC, ESPN, ESPN2 or ESPNU. Selected games will also be available on ESPN360.com and ESPN Full Court, the network's outer-market pay subscription service. The telecasts listed below were known at press time.

Several Big 12 schools have their games broadcast on far-reaching radio networks. The networks include (affiliates): Baylor-ISP Sports Network (2), Cyclone Radio Network (35), Jayhawk Radio Network (31), K-State Sports Network (31), Tiger Radio Network (51), Husker Sports Network (26), Sooner Sports Radio Network (35), Cowboy Sports Network (30), Longhorn Sports Network (24), Texas A&M Sports Network (22), Texas Tech Sports Network (11).

### **BIG 12 TELEVISION DISTRIBUTION**

The Big I2 Conference maintains long-term television agreements to ensure the greatest exposure for its men's basketball programs. Included below is a breakdown of these rights and how they affect which games are televised, and when they are shown.

ESPN has purchased the rights to 95 games, plus all games of the Phillips 66 Big 12 Men's Basketball Championship and home games in the Big 12/Pac-10 Hardwood Series. Of those 95 contests:

- Forty-three will be televised on either ESPN or ESPN2, with a maximum of 20 of those games sublicensed to a national over-the-air network (ABC/CBS)
- In addition to the 43 games above, a maximum of 20 games may be televised on ESPNU and 32 games may be televised in syndication on the newly-branded Big 12 Network
- ESPNU may move up to six games per season for telecast exclusively on ESPN360.com (Internet)

### **Appearance Requirements**

There are no appearance requirements (minimums or maximums) for games on ESPN, ESPN2, syndication or the sublicense to a national overthe-air network. However, ESPNU and ESPN360 shall be subject to the following restrictions:

- No same single match-up game in consecutive seasons
- No more than four appearances on ESPNU or ESPN360 in a season, except two schools may have five appearances
- No more than one appearance per season on ESPN360
- Only one game from each schools intra-division schedule may appear on ESPNU or ESPN360 in a season; and such may not appear from the same venue in consecutive seasons

### **Game Times/Exclusive Windows**

The times for selected games will be (Central Time):

- The late window (generally 8 p.m.) for Big Monday telecasts
- No earlier than II a.m., for weekend games distributed on ESPN, ESPN2 or an over-the-air network
- No earlier than Noon, for all other weekend games
- No earlier than 6 p.m., nor later than 8:30 p.m., for all Wednesday games
- No earlier than 6 p.m., nor later than 8 p.m., for all other games

Member institutions which carry local or third-tier packages are precluded from televising games in exclusive windows as established by the contract. These windows generally allow for a slight overlap of games of up to 30 minutes, except as noted below:

- Monday evening games, two-hour protected window
- Wednesday evening games, 90-minute protected window
- Syndication games on Saturday afternoons, two-hour protected window
- Syndicated games in primetime (weekend and weekday) and Sundays, 90-minute protected window
- Tuesday, Wednesday and/or Friday games (except syndication), no protected window

### **Distribution of Institutional (Local) Package Games**

ESPN controls the national/regional distribution of games and the contract limits the geographical reach of institutional (third-tier or local) package games to the state(s) of the participating team(s). The guidelines for the distribution of these games include:

- Telecasts may be distributed only within the states (and overlapping DMAs) of the two participating teams
- At its option, institutions may present the telecasts to ESPN for placement on ESPN Full Court
- Unselected games produced as part of the local package may be distributed by Big 12 web sites within the state(s) of the participating teams
- If an unselected game is offered to ESPN for outer-market distribution (ESPN Full Court) and ESPN declines, Big 12 web sites may distribute such games on a free, sponsored, pay-perview or other basis

### **Revenue Distribution Process**

Basketball television revenue is divided equally among all member institutions. However, each institution is awarded a flat amount annually for non-conference home games on ESPN, ESPN2 or ESPNU and for non-conference road games on an over-the-air network (e.g. CBS, ABC).

Better TV for all.

The Phillips 66 Big 12 Men's Basketball Championship returns to Oklahoma City in 2009. The Ford Center will host the league championship for the second time in the last three seasons.

For the first time in Big 12 history, games will take place from Wednesday - Saturday. All 12 member institutions will participate with seeding based on regular season finish. The top four squads in the conference standings earn first-round byes. The Big 12 Champion earns the league's automatic bid to the 65-team NCAA Championship field. The entire Big 12 Championship will be televised on ESPN, ESPN2 and the regional Big 12 Network.




















#### **BAYLOR — Ferrell Center**

**From the North:** Drive south on I-35, take the University Parks Drive exit and turn east (left) to the intersection of University Parks Drive and LaSalle Avenue.

**From the South:** Drive north on I-35, take the University Parks Drive exit and turn east (right) to the intersection of University Parks Drive and LaSalle Avenue.

From the West: Drive east on Hwy. 84 to Hwy. 6/Loop 340. Turn east (right) and take Hwy. 6/Loop 340 to I-35. Turn north (left) on I-35, take the University Parks Drive exit and turn east (right) to the intersection of University Parks Drive and LaSalle Avenue.

**From the East:** Drive west on Hwy. 84 to I-35. Turn south on I-35 (left), take the University Parks Drive exit and turn east (left) to the intersection of University Parks Drive and LaSalle Avenue.

**From the Northwest:** Take Hwy. 6 to I-35. Turn north (left), take the University Parks Drive exit and turn east (right) to the intersection of University Parks Drive and LaSalle Avenue.

**From the Southwest:** Take Hwy. 6 to Bus. 77 exit. Bus 77 become LaSalle Avenue and leads directly to the Ferrell Center.



### COLORADO — Coors Events Center

From Denver International Airport (DIA): Driving time between DIA and Boulder is approximately 60 to 90 minutes. Follow Peña Boulevard (10 miles) south to I-70, and exit onto I-70 west. Follow I-70 west to I-270 west. I-270 merges into U.S. 36 west and takes you west into Boulder

(about 23 miles). Once you're in Boulder, take a left (west) on Colorado Avenue. Heading west on Colorado Avenue, take a left on Regent Drive (it is the first stop light west of U.S. 36 (28th Street). The Events Center will appear ahead to your left and there is meter parking along the street or in lot 436, (the metered parking lot is your second left after turning onto Regent Drive). Parking for basketball games is free in lot 436.

From the Denver Area and South: To get to Boulder from the Denver area, go west on U.S. 36 (from I-25 or I-270). Once you're in Boulder from U.S. 36, take a left (west) on Colorado Avenue (first stop light). Heading west on Colorado Avenue, take a left on Regent Drive (it is the first stop light west of U.S. 36 (28th Street). The Events Center will appear ahead to your left.

From the North: From the north, take U.S. 287 south to Highway 119 (Diagonal Highway). Highway 119 becomes Highway 157 (Foothills Parkway) just north of Boulder. Turn right (west) from Foothills Parkway onto Colorado Avenue. Once on Colorado Avenue, just past 28th Street (U.S. 36) campus is both to the left and straight ahead. Heading west on Colorado Avenue, take a left on Regent Drive (it is the first stop light west of U.S. 36 (28th Street). The Events Center will appear ahead to your left.

From the West: Take I-70 east to U.S. 6. Go east on U.S. 6 to CO. 58. Turn right (east) on CO.58 to CO. 93. Make a left (north) onto CO. 93 towards Boulder. CO. 93 will turn into Broadway once in Boulder. Continue on Broadway west until you see the campus on your right. To get to Colorado Avenue from the west, turn right on Regent Drive off of Broadway. Follow Regent Drive until it dead ends, turn left (west) on Colorado Avenue. Heading west on Colorado Avenue, take a left on Regent Drive (it is the first stop light west of U.S. 36 (28th Street). The Events Center will appear ahead to your left.



#### **IOWA STATE — Hilton Coliseum**

From I-35 South: Once you get to Ames, turn off on the Highway 30 West exit (#111B). Follow Highway 30 West until the Elwood Drive/ISU Exit. Take the Exit and drive north (right) on Elwood Drive. To get to Hilton

Coliseum, simply continue driving north on Elwood Drive and the coliseum will be on the West side of the road. Parking for Hilton Coliseum is in lots on the south end of the arena.

**From I-35 North:** Once you get to Ames, turn off on the Highway 30 West exit (#IIIB). Follow Highway 30 West until the Elwood Drive/ISU Exit. Take the Exit and drive north (right) on Elwood Drive. To get to Hilton Coliseum, simply continue driving north on Elwood Drive, the coliseum will be on the West side of the road. Public parking for Hilton Coliseum is located in specified lots on the south end of the arena.

From Highway 30 West: Follow Highway 30 West until the Elwood Drive/ISU Exit. Take the Exit and drive north (left) on Elwood Drive. To get to Hilton Coliseum, simply continue driving north on Elwood Drive and the coliseum will be on the West side of the road. Public parking for Hilton Coliseum is located in specified lots on the south end of the arena.

From Highway 30 East: Follow Highway 30 East until the Elwood Drive/ISU Exit. Take the Exit and drive north (right) on Elwood Drive. To get to Hilton Coliseum, simply continue driving north on Elwood Drive and the coliseum will be on the West side of the road. Public parking for Hilton Coliseum is located in specified lots on the south end of the arena.



#### KANSAS — Allen Fieldhouse

From the East (Kansas City International Airport): Kansas City International Airport is 60 miles to the northeast and is served by most national airline carriers. As you exit the airport, turn left onto I-29 North. Continue on I-29 for several miles to I-435 South. Continue on I-435 South to the

junction of I-70 West. Take I-70 West to Lawrence. Exit I-70 at exit #202 (West Lawrence). Follow Iowa Street to 19th Street, turn left on 19th Street, to Naismith Drive, turn left on Naismith Drive, leading to Fieldhouse Drive, South of Allen Fieldhouse. Allow one and a half hours driving time from KCI to Lawrence.

From the West (Forbes Field): Forbes Field is located in Topeka, Kansas, approximately 30 miles west of Lawrence. Travel on Highway 75 North to I-70 East to the West Lawrence Kansas Turnpike exit #202, which will lead to Iowa Street. Follow Iowa Street to 19th Street, turn left on 19th Street, to Naismith Drive, turn left on Naismith Drive, leading to Fieldhouse Drive, South of Allen Fieldhouse. Allow one and a half hours driving time from KCI to Lawrence.



### KANSAS STATE — Bramlage Coliseum

From the West (Manhattan Airport): Take Kansas Highway 18 East into Manhattan. Exit at Kansas 113 (Seth Childs Road, heading North. Stay on Seth Childs Road until reaching the Kimball Ave., exit. Turn right onto Kimball and

follow it one mile to College Ave., and turn right. Go one block and turn left into the Bramlage Coliseum parking lot.

From the East (Kansas City): Exit I-70 at Highway 177 (exit 313) and head North on 177 until reaching Manhattan. Turn left on 3rd street, proceed to the first light and turn left again on Tuttle Creek Blvd. Head North on Tuttle Creek until reaching Kimball Ave. Turn left on Kimball and go two miles to College Avenue. Bramlage Coliseum will be on your left-hand side.

### NEBRASKA — Bob Devaney Sports Center

### Phillips 66 Big 12 Championship Tiebreaking Procedures

Seeding for the Championship will be based upon regular-season competition. The winner of the postseason basketball championship shall be declared the Big 12 automatic qualifier to the NCAA Championship. A team ineligible under NCAA or Big 12 rules for postseason competition shall not compete in the championship.

The four teams with the best records (based upon winning percentage) in 16 Conference games shall earn first-round byes. After the four teams have been awarded first-round byes and ranked as the No. 1 through No. 4 seeds, all remaining teams will be ranked in order No. 5 through No. 12 for seeding in the championship.

**Tiebreakers** - The first criteria in the breaking of ties in the standings shall be head-to-head competition of tied teams. The following procedure will be used to establish the championship seeds if ties exist. (For tiebreaking procedures teams will be grouped in two "divisions" based upon established guidelines. Colorado, lowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Missouri and Nebraska are in one division and Baylor, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas, Texas A&M and Texas Tech are in the other division.)

- (a) If two teams are tied and they are from different divisons, the winner of the game between the two tied teams shall be the higher seed.
- (b) If two teams are tied and they are from the same division, the team with an advantage in head-to-head competition shall be the higher seed
- (c) If two teams remain tied, there will be a comparison of overall record against division teams only (10 divisional games).
- (d) If two teams remain tied, there will be a comparison of record against the highest ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the division and proceeding through in order of divisional record.
- (e) If two teams remain tied, there will be a comparison of record against the highest ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the opposite division and proceeding through in order of divisional record.
- (f) If two teams remain tied, the higher seed will be chosen by draw.
- (g) If three or more teams are tied, ties among divisional opponents will be broken first by using steps (b) through (f) and the head-to-head results will be used to break ties between non-divisional teams. When three or more teams from the same division are tied step (b) will consist of a mini-round robin among the tied teams. At any point during the process of breaking ties among three or more teams that the number tied teams are reduced to two, head-to-head competition would be used as the primary tie-breaker, followed-by steps (c) through (f).

Note: When comparing against the "highest ranked team(s)" in either division, the comparison will be based upon how tied teams did against all teams in a given placement, rather than a team that wins a tiebreaker at another position. For example, if two teams are tied for fifth and two teams are tied for first, the head-to-head comparison would be how the fifth place teams did against the first place teams combined, and vice-versa.

**Draw** - In the event tiebreaking procedures are unsuccessful and a draw is necessary in determining seeding, the following procedure will be used:

- (a) The drawing will be conducted in public or with media attendance
- (b) Institutions involved in the drawing have the right to have a local representative in attendance at the drawing
- (c) A single slip of paper with names representing each of the tied institutions will be placed into a container and will be drawn in order of seeding from highest (#1) to lowest (#12)

# DALE KELLEY Men's Basketball Coordinator of Officials

Dale Kelley serves the Big I 2 Conference as Coordinator of Men's Basketball Officials with more than 23 years of experience as a coordinator of officials. He oversees the officials coalition formed by the Big I 2 Conference, Conference USA, Ohio Valley, Sun Belt and Southland Conferences. He administers the selection and assignment of officials, while observing and evaluating referees.



As an on-court official, Kelley worked 14 years in the Southeastern Conference, including nine consecutive NCAA Tournaments and three Final Fours.

Outside his athletic involvement, he is owner of Kelley Enterprises Rental and Real Estate Firm in his hometown of Huntingdon, Tenn. He is also in his fourth consecutive four-year term as Mayor of Huntingdon.

Kelley attended Bethel College in McKenzie, Tenn. and was inducted into the Bethel College Hall of Fame in 1981. In 1985, he received Bethel College's outstanding Alumni Achievement Award.

Kelley and his wife Carlene have three children - Amanada, Meredith and Cliff - and seven grandchildren.

### 2008-09 Men's Basketball Major Rules Changes

(Rule and page references are from the 2007-08 NCAA Rules Book.)

**Court and Equipment 1-3.3.** The restraining line shall be a color that is different from that of the end lines. When space is not available for a six foot restraining line, the line should be marked using the maximum available distance. Non-playing personnel shall not be permitted in this area.

**Court and Equipment 1-14.3.** Effective 2009-10 movable rings shall be required and the rings may flex both to the front and the sides.

**Logos I-16.4.** There are no restrictions on NCAA, team or conference logos, names or abbreviations on the playing court, provided they do not obscure any of the required lines.

**Officials Jurisdiction 2-4.4.** When all three officials leave the confines of the playing area at the end of the game, the officials' jurisdiction has ended and the score has been approved.

**Duties of Timer 2-10.9.** Sound a warning horn fifteen seconds before the expiration of the 20-second time limit to replace a disqualified player. The signal also shall be sounded at the end of the 20 seconds to replace a disqualified player.

**Uniforms 3-5.10.** Opposing team uniforms shall be of contrasting colors. The home team shall wear light game jerseys and the away team shall wear dark game jerseys. Note: This rule may be altered by mutual consent of the competing institutions.

**Uniforms 3-5.13 (new).** The use of an arm sleeve, knee sleeve, and lower leg sleeve is permissible for medical reasons but its utilization shall be verified by either the individual's coach or trainer.

**Uniforms 3-6.1.** A single manufacturer's or distributor's normal logo, label or trademark may be worn on the game pants, and all other items of apparel excluding the game jersey (e.g., Warm-ups, socks, headbands, and wristbands) may bear a single manufacturer's or distributor's normal logo, label or trademark or an institutional logo or mascot but not both may be worn.

**Goaltending 4-34.3.** When the entire ball is above the level of the ring during a field-goal try and contacts the backboard, it is considered to be on its downward flight. In such a case, it is goaltending when that ball is touched by a player.

**Timeouts 5-13.4.k.** For all NCAA tournament games, the format described in Rule 5-13.4 may be used without the presence of paid advertising.

Foul and Penalties 10-3 & 10-4. Reorganization of Rule 10-3 and 10-4 in reference to infraction and penalty.

Rough play and illegal contact – emphasis on screening situations. Charge/block – particularly near the goal. Coaches' behavior and enforcement of the box. Palming.

### **COMMISSIONER DAN BEEBE**

Dan Beebe was named the third commissioner of the Big 12 Conference on September 5, 2007, after serving as senior associate commissioner and chief operating officer for the league since February 2003.


In his first year, Beebe was able to enjoy the Big 12's first national championship in men's basketball, two teams in the Bowl Championship Series and numerous individual NCAA titles. Off the field, he guided the conference schools to a continuation of their revenue sharing model, with a record \$113.5-million going back to the membership. In the area of special projects, he oversaw a continued and expanded Big 12 relationship with Special Olympics in each of the league's seven states.

While in his previous role at the Big 12, Beebe handled issues related to governance, national policy and legal affairs, in addition to coordinating the day-to-day activities of the conference office. He also served as the conference liaison to the Big 12 Board of Directors. Beebe has been involved in site selection for future league championships, extending television contracts and enhancing football bowl opportunities. In addition, he has been active in establishing the conference's sportsmanship policies and procedures.

Prior to joining the Big 12, Beebe was commissioner of the Ohio Valley Conference from 1989-2003. Upon his appointment, he became the youngest leader of a Division I football-playing conference.

During his time, he made the OVC more attractive in areas of television appearances as exposure nearly tripled. He also enhanced championships and revenue generation, ensured sportsmanship and fair play, promoted gender equity, and gained national recognition for the league. He was a strong proponent of providing opportunities for female student-athletes, as the league added three women's championships during his time.

Under his direction, the OVC added five new members. He also placed an emphasis on ethics and sportsmanship within the league, producing a nationally recognized sportsmanship statement and participating in regional and national seminars on the topic.

Over the course of his career, Beebe has built a strong reputation nationally in college athletics and has been selected to some of the NCAA's most significant committees. He was a member of the prestigious NCAA Management Council, serving as chair of the Council's I-AA Governance Committee. He also chaired the Council's Committee on Fines and Forfeitures and was part of its Subcommittee for Student-Athlete Issues. Beebe was picked to fill the required commissioner's position on the initial NCAA Athletics Certification Committee that formalized and implemented the program adopted by the NCAA membership. He also previously served on the NCAA Nominating, Professional Sports Liaison, Football Issues, I-AA Football and Federal Arbitration Act committees.

Prior to his conference work, Beebe was a Director of Enforcement at the NCAA. He started at the NCAA in 1982 as an enforcement representative and was involved with numerous high-profile cases, including those at Houston, Mississippi and SMU. That tenure was interrupted by a one-year stint as an Assistant Director of Athletics at Wichita State University in 1986 before he returned to the NCAA office where he earned his Director of Enforcement promotion in 1988.

The 51-year old native of Walla Walla, Wash., received a degree from Walla Walla Community College in 1977. From there he moved on to California State Polytechnic University (Cal Poly-Pomona) where he earned his Bachelor of Science degree, cum laude, in social sciences in June 1979. Beebe received his law degree from the University of California Hastings College of the Law in 1982 and is a member of the Washington State Bar Association.

Besides his life's work, Beebe's ability to relate to student-athletes and others directly involved in college sports results from his own experience as a recruited football player. As an offensive lineman, Beebe was a four-year starter and served as captain of the varsity football teams at Walla Walla Community College and Cal Poly-Pomona. He continued his participation in athletics well after his college days, playing rugby, basketball, tennis, golf and other sports.

He was selected as one of the Outstanding Young Men of America in 1989 in recognition of his outstanding professional achievement, superior leadership ability and exceptional service to the community. In 1995, he was named an Institute for International Sport Ethics Fellow. Beebe has also served on various community boards, including the YMCA and Nashville Sports Council.

Born on February 27, 1957, Beebe is married to the former Molly Scanlon and has four children: daughters Jessie and Elaine and sons Matthew and Patrick.
