Big 12 Release

The Big 12 will update a media release, including team notes, results and more each Monday during the season. Complete league statistics will be updated via the conference web site as well.

Phillips 66 Weekly Awards

A Big 12 Player and Pitcher of the Week will be chosen each Tuesday, beginning February 14. Nominations are submitted by the school sports information offices and the winners are selected by a panel of media voters who cover the league on a regular basis. This year marks the 10th year for Phillips 66 as a sponsor of the Big 12 Conference.

The Big 12 Showcase

The Big 12 Showcase is a 30-minute promotion of the league with features on student-athletes, coaches, teams and conference championships. The show is shot on location each week at a different Big 12 campus or conference championship venue. For the 10th year, the show will be hosted by Bill Land and produced by Keith Fletcher of FSN Southwest. Airing of the Big 12 Showcase is syndicated throughout the Big 12 markets.



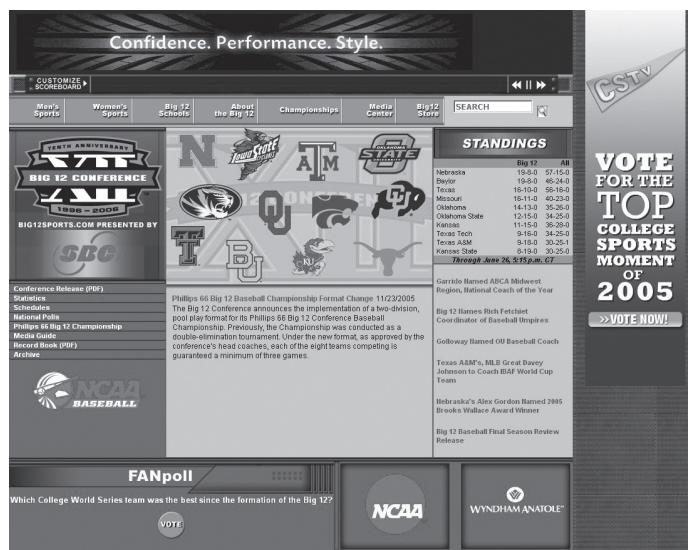

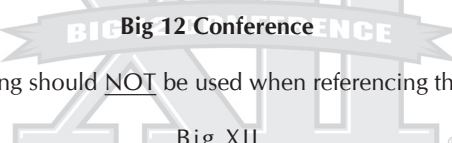

BIG 12 CONFERENCE



The Big 12 celebrates its 10th anniversary season of competition in 2005-06. While there have been many proud accomplishments in the first nine-plus years of the conference, the league and its members are also excited and poised for a bright future.

Over the past 10 years, 25 different teams and over 200 individuals have won NCAA Championships. The 2004-05 season marked the most successful in conference history. Baylor won the crown for women's basketball, becoming the first Big 12 squad to win in that sport. Colorado won both the men's and women's cross country trophies, just the fourth school in NCAA annals to win both in the same year. Oklahoma State regained the top spot in wrestling, winning the national title for the 33rd time. Texas captured its fourth women's outdoor track & field crown, along with its sixth national championship in baseball. A total of 23 individual event titles were also claimed by the Big 12.

The success continued in 2005-06, as the Texas football team captured the National Championship at the Rose Bowl in January. Nine football squads have played in BCS bowls in the last seven seasons. The Big 12 leads all conferences with five appearances in the National Championship game. In basketball, an unprecedented eight men's and women's basketball teams have advanced to their respective Final Fours in the past four seasons as the Big 12 continues its place among the elite intercollegiate athletic conferences.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

Competitive excellence, scholarships and sportsmanship are all equal components of the Big 12's philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and All-Big 12 Academic squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons.

At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsman of the Year awards.

Institutions can also nominate student-athletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships at the end of each academic year. A total of 129 scholars have received more than \$680,000 in postgraduate financial aid through the first eight years of the program.

The Big 12 sponsors 21 sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The conference is made up of 12 institutions that have shared many traditional rivalries throughout their histories. Member schools include - Baylor University, University of Colorado, Iowa State University, University of Kansas, Kansas State University, University of Missouri, University of Nebraska, University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma State University, University of Texas, Texas A&M University and Texas Tech University.

The institutions created a league that encompasses seven states, over 42 million people and more than 18 million television households within its geographic footprint.

The conference conducts championships for 20 of its 21 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition. The winner of the Big 12 football championship game earns the league's berth into the prestigious Bowl Championship Series.

The Big 12 is under the direction of its second commissioner, Kevin L. Weiberg, who took over the reins in December 1998. Under Weiberg's guidance, the league distributed over \$105 million to its member institutions for the 2004-05 academic year, nearly doubling the first allocation of \$54 million in the conference's inaugural 1996-97 campaign.

Weiberg has also helped lead the Big 12 into additional football bowl agreements and expanded television opportunities for all sports through contracts with ABC/ESPN, FSN, TBS and CSTV.

The Big 12 has its headquarters in Dallas, Texas, where Weiberg and his staff administer to over 4,600 student-athletes in 21 sports.

- The Big 12 will work in conjunction with its member schools to stage special events and recognition during the first weekend of conference play in baseball, men's & women's basketball, football and softball.

Performance in the classroom is just as important as accolades on the field when looking at the student-athlete. The Big 12 Conference recognizes student-athletes in four areas for academic achievement. Those areas include the Academic All-Big 12 Teams, Commissioner's Honor Roll, Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, and the Big 12 Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship.

Academic All-Big 12 Teams

Recognizing those student-athletes who excel in the classroom and on the field and court, the Big 12 has academic all-conference teams for all sports.

Nominated by the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services and the Athletic Media Relations Directors, members of the all-academic teams have posted at least a 3.00 grade point average either cumulative or the previous two semesters and are regulars (i.e. letterwinners) on his or her respective team. First-team honorees are regulars who have at least a 3.20 GPA.

Last year, a few academic teams in the Big 12 exceeded 100 student-athletes recognized by the conference. In addition, student-athletes have gained recognition by being named to ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America teams.

Commissioner's Honor Roll

Acknowledging all participants, the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll is an inclusive honor for all sports sponsored by the membership of the league. The Honor Roll is recorded and released each semester and recognizes those student-athletes who registered a 3.0 or better grade point average the previous semester.

Submitted through the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services at each institution, those honored are not necessarily the stars on the field and court but those who participate on the team. They include the letterwinners and non-letterwinners and recognize every student-athlete who has excelled in the classroom.

More than 2,000 Big 12 student-athletes are named to the Commissioner's Honor Rolls at the end of each of semester.

Phillips 66 Classroom Champion

As Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, the conference recognizes 30 student-athletes per school who have excelled on the court and in the classroom. Chosen through the Big 12 membership, those honored are recognized throughout the year on the Big 12 telecasts, FSN and ESPN Regional Television.

Dr. Prentice Gautt Scholarship Program

With 72 student-athletes from all Big 12 schools honored over the last three years, the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships' list has grown to 129 recipients since the 1996-97 academic year.

Additional funding prior to the 2002-03 selection process allowed each school to name two outstanding scholars to the annual list of honorees. Conference officers also voted to name the postgraduate scholarship program awards after longtime Big 12 and Big Eight Conference Associate Commissioner and student services' pioneer Dr. Prentice Gautt in 2004. Dr. Gautt passed away on March 17, 2005.

The all-time group has solid representation of scholars throughout the 21 sponsored Big 12 sports and has provided just under \$700,000 through the 2004-05 academic year for much-needed financial aid. Three faculty representatives, one senior woman administrator and one director of athletics form the selection group for the prestigious awards, which help the youngsters to continue their formal education. Since its inception the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship program has produced over a dozen physicians, several attorneys for the underprivileged, college professors, Peace Corps volunteers and positions of national prominence.

Criteria for these awards include a cumulative grade point average of 3.500 on a 4.0 scale, participation in at least two years of intercollegiate athletics at the scholar-athlete's respective institution, and completion of athletics' eligibility. The scholar-athletes also must graduate from their respective member institutions within 15 months of their selection as postgraduate scholarship recipients and are expected to enroll in graduate/professional schools within 15 months after they graduate.

The \$2,500 individual annual grants began in 1996-97, were raised to \$5,000 in 1999 and climbed to \$6,900 after the 2003-04 term. Most honorees in recent years have also been named to Academic All-Big 12 Conference teams as well as the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll.

LIFE SKILLS & SPECIAL OLYMPICS

Two key aspects in the "Total Person" education of Big 12 Conference student-athletes are the life skills programs and key assistance for Special Olympics.

Both areas have been integral parts of the Big 12 Conference mission since its inception and continue to be significant and were augmented in 1996 by Dr. Prentice Gautt, a trendsetter in college athletics, life skills, student services, and community action as well as the first African-American football student-athlete at the University of Oklahoma.

With the assistance of conference staff, directors of student services and other key agencies, this group of talented youngsters has provided feedback for Big 12 administrators. The Student-Athletes Advisory Committee has been proactive in promoting NCAA legislation, providing feedback to the Conference Office, and conference representatives in guidelines for Big 12 academic honor teams, the Commissioner's Honor Roll and other areas of recognition for classroom accomplishments.

Recent SAAC meetings also have included visits to children at area medical facilities as well as input for service projects for student-athletes throughout the league.

Besides such life skills' and athletics' areas as eligibility concerns, time spent between studies, events and practice sessions, placement in the business world, or graduate school opportunities, the program emphasizes "Stay in School" motivational speeches, anti-violence messages, anti-drug/addictive behavior, "YES," and other community-designed programs.

Both life skills and Special Olympics

receive ample coverage in the Big 12 through such areas as the Community Champions Awards often featured on the Big 12 Showcase telecasts. They also are given pregame and halftime scoreboard recognition slots at all conference schools, scholarship programs, and a series of free clinics in such sports as youth football, soccer, volleyball, men's and women's basketball, softball and baseball, among others. A conference-wide printed and electronically-distributed newsletter for life skills also has been produced, and several schools promote similar publications or on-line information.

Special Olympics, the Big 12's charity of choice since May 1996, has held a special place in the hearts of many in the conference for years before the current association.

The Big 12 works closely with the statewide Special Olympics' organizations in Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas to coordinate projects, provide information, and invite Olympians to attend events such as media or fan appreciation days for various Big 12 sports.

For five decades current Big 12 members have provided facilities with a combined capacity of just over one million fans for Special Olympics' competition in the always-popular sports of track and field, softball, swimming and diving, weightlifting and wrestling. The national program, which was founded by members of the extended family of late President John F. Kennedy and which receives financial support from worldwide charitable sources, has earned the title "Most Credible Charity in America" in a survey by Chronicle of Philanthropy and "Top Charity" among Time Magazine subscribers.

Specifically, some cooperative highlights of the Big 12 and Special Olympics have been public service announcements appearing on most league telecasts, donations to the charity by Big 12 student-athletes and fans, clinics with league coaches, student-athletes and interaction with the Olympians, and special seasonal camps in several sports. Both regionally and nationally, there has been Big 12 involvement in Special Olympics' meetings. Conference schools and the league office also have helped to arrange for Big 12 head coaches, student-athletes, and administrators to meet with their Special Olympics' counterparts. Many Big 12 school dignitaries also have devoted their talents to opening ceremonies and awards' events.

The chances to create dialogue, friendship and hugs among the Special Olympians and interested groups from Big 12 schools have brought both groups ample satisfaction.

BIG 12 CONFERENCE AWARDS

The Big 12 annually recognizes its top male and female athlete and sportsperson. The Athlete of the Year Awards are selected based on athletic performance, academic achievement and citizenship within the academic year of nomination. The Sportspersons of the Year Award was started prior to the 2000-01 academic year to recognize student-athletes who displayed an extraordinary degree of sportsmanship and/or community service from within the conference. Honorees are selected by a media panel.

In 2004-05, the Big 12 Athletes of the Year were Cat Osterman and Derrick Johnson. Both compete for the University of Texas. The Sportsperson of the Year winners were Richelle Simpson from Nebraska and Ahmard Hall from Texas.

Osterman, who will be a senior on the Texas softball squad this season, was named the USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year in 2005 for the second time (2003). Johnson completed his collegiate football career at UT in 2004. He was honored with the Nagurski Trophy as the nation's top defensive player and the Butkus Award as college football's top linebacker.

Simpson recently completed a stellar career at NU, winning honors as the nation's top gymnast in 2005. A nine-time All-America selection, she responded strongly to adversity after multiple knee injuries, including one that ended her career. She was very active in the community, with extensive leadership activities. Hall is a veteran who served four years of active duty in the Marines, including tours in Kosovo and Operation Enduring Freedom. He has participated in many community projects and has been known for his unselfishness. After joining the Texas football team as a walk-on in 2003, the senior enters this fall as UT's starting fullback.

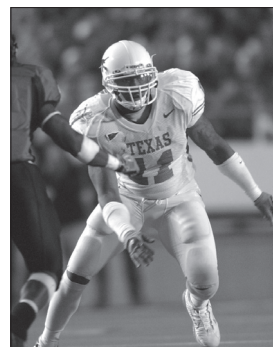

Big 12 Coaches Among Nations Leaders

Big 12 coaches Augie Garrido (Texas) and Larry Hays (Texas Tech) rank Nos. 1 and 3, respectively, in all-time career victories. Garrido became the first coach ever to register 1,500 wins. They are among five coaches to surpass 1,400 wins in the history of Division I athletics. In addition, Garrido (10th) and Hays (23rd) are joined by, Oklahoma's Sunny Golloway (11th), and Baylor's Steve Smith (41st) in the Top 50 active coaches in winning percentage with a minimum of five seasons at the Division I level.

Rating the Teams (And More)

Since 1957 when Collegiate Baseball started the first college baseball poll, teams from the Big 12 Conference have appeared in every Collegiate Baseball, Baseball America and USA Baseball Weekly poll. Last season saw nine Big 12 teams ranked or receiving votes in the Top 25 polls. Texas spent most of the 2003, 04 and 05 seasons holding the top spot in the polls. Nebraska sat atop the Baseball America poll twice in 2001, its first No. 1 ranking in school history. In May of 1997, the first year of Big 12 competition, Texas Tech became the first team from the league to gain the No. 1 position. Texas A&M was the second Big 12 team to hold the top-spot, when in 1999 two polls had it ranked first over the same two week period.

National Attendance Leaders: Big 12 Featured Five in Top 20

The following Big 12 schools ranked among the national leaders in average home attendance last season: Texas A&M (fourth), Texas (fifth), Nebraska (sixth), Baylor (17th), and Texas Tech (24th). Nebraska set a school record with an average of 4,984 fans attending Cornhusker home games. For 2005, an all-time high 844,972 fans attended Big 12 Conference stadiums, an average of 2,762 over 306 home dates.

Big 12 Solid in Interconference Contests Since 1997 All-Time Wins' Marks Set in 2005 and '04

Big 12 teams combined to win a record 256 games against non-conference foes in 2005, posting a 256-82 mark (.757). The previous high-water mark was set in 2004, when the league went 229-98 out of conference.

Did You Know? Big 12 Baseball Quick Hits

- The 2005 season marked the first time that three Big 12 teams advanced to the College World Series.
- Last season, five of the conference's 10 teams participated in NCAA post-season play.
- The Big 12 was one of only two conferences to have all teams rated among the Faux-RPI Top 100 in BoydsWorld.com in '05.
- 2005 Big 12 teams reached the 200-win mark against non-conference opponents at the earliest date in history (May 2) and broke the all-time mark of 229 wins (327 games) from 2004.
- Big 12 teams in 2005 combined for a record .757 winning percentage in non-conference games, going 256-82 in 338 contests.
- Fifty teams from the Big 12 have appeared in NCAA Regionals since the league began competition in 1997.
- Teams from the Big 12 appeared in a record 59 regional/national network telecasts in 2005. A total of 17 championship, semifinal and "if necessary" games of the Phillips 66 Big 12 Championship have been televised nationally by FSN since 1997, including the championship game which has aired nine consecutive years.
- Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championships have averaged over 107,000 fans annually with a total 967,601 tickets purchased in its nine-year history. The 2002 event at Amerquest Field in Arlington drew an NCAA-record 150,196 fans over 14 games.
- The largest crowd ever to attend a Division I baseball tournament game (13,961) were on-hand for Game 4 of the 2002 Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship in Arlington.
- In its nine-year history, 22 games of the Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship have drawn crowds in excess of 10,000.
- Eleven Big 12 teams—Baylor (2005), Nebraska (2001, 02, 05), Oklahoma State (1999), Texas (2000, 02, 03, 04, 05) and Texas A&M (1999)—have advanced from the Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship to the College World Series since 1999. Fifteen teams have participated in NCAA Super Regionals during that time.
- Eight Big 12 stadiums have seating capacities of over 5,000-plus (two can add bleachers to their permanent seating arrangements, and three have capacities of 6,000-plus).
- Big 12 teams have ranked among the top three in NCAA Regional/Super Regional attendance for the last 14 years.
- Five Big 12 teams have averaged over 2,000 fans per home date since 2001.
- In 2002, the Big 12 became the first conference to hold its entire Championship in a Major League Baseball facility—Amerquest Field in Arlington. The stadium also hosted the event in 2004.
- Several Big 12 recruiting classes were highly regarded in Collegiate Baseball's 2005 ranking. Texas was No. 3, Oklahoma State No. 4, Oklahoma No. 10, Texas A&M No. 14, and Nebraska No. 16, while Baylor and Texas Tech received "Other Top Classes" recognition.
- Big 12 schools have gone 17-16 in 33 College World Series contests since 1999. All three '05 participants—Baylor, Nebraska, Texas—won at least one contest at the CWS.
- Texas has gone 14-6 (.700) at the College World Series since 2000 and is the only school to make the field in each of the last four seasons. In 2005 the Longhorns surpassed Southern California for most all-time CWS wins with 78.
- Half of the Big 12 baseball-playing institutions (5) have appeared in the College World Series since 1999—Baylor, Nebraska, Oklahoma State, Texas, and Texas A&M. The conference had an all-time high three teams in the 2005 field (Baylor, Nebraska, Texas), while sending two squads in 1999 (Oklahoma State, Texas A&M) and 2002 (Nebraska and Texas in 2002).

Big 12 On The Television

Big 12 baseball will be aired on FSN Southwest, FSN Midwest, FSN Rocky Mountain, and other FSN regional outlets (please check local listings for live airings and replays).

In addition, College Sports Television (CSTV), ESPNU, ESPN, ESPN2, and Fox Sports University will air selected games (check times and local listings) on various cable, dish, and DirecTV affiliates. ESPN and its affiliates will carry most NCAA Regional contests as well as all NCAA Super Regional and College World Series games live from Omaha, Neb.

The FSN-Big 12 baseball television package is in its 10th year, and the network has aired 41 Big 12 games since May 1997 in the finals of the Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship. FSN Southwest is scheduled to air at least three contests in the 2006 postseason championship rounds from Oklahoma City for the third consecutive year.

Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship Format Change

The Big 12 Conference announces the implementation of a two-division, pool play format for its Phillips 66 Big 12 Conference Baseball Championship. Previously, the Championship was conducted as a double-elimination event. Under the new format, as approved by the conference's head coaches, each of the eight teams competing is guaranteed a minimum of three games.

Results from the league's 27-game round-robin conference schedule will determine the eight seeds for the Championship. Seeds 2, 3, 6 and 7 will compete in pool play on one side of the bracket, while seeds 1, 4, 5 and 8 play in the other. The two teams with the best record within their bracket will advance to the Championship game, with the winner earning the Big 12's automatic berth into the NCAA Championship. Head-to-head competition will break ties within each bracket. In the event of more than two teams being tied for the top spot within a bracket, the highest seeded team will advance to Sunday's winner-take-all

Tiebreaking Procedures - If teams are tied, head-to-head competition will be used to break the tie.

If the teams are still tied, the highest seeded team amongst the tied advances to the championship.

Rainout Policy - In the event divisional play cannot be completed to determine a divisional champion (due to weather related or other circumstances) the following tiebreaking procedures will take place to determine which two teams shall play in the championship:

- 1) Team with the best record in each division by winning percentage.
- 2) If two or more teams are still tied, the highest seeded team amongst the tied moves on as the Division Champion.

PHILLIPS 66 BIG 12 CHAMPIONSHIP

The Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship returns to Oklahoma City's AT&T Bricktown Ballpark for a May 24-28, eight-team tournament.

The Brick, which was opened on April 2, 1998 and seats 13,066, serves as the home facility for the Class AAA Oklahoma Redhawks. The facility has hosted seven baseball championships in the league's 10-year tenure, including last season's edition.

Previous tournaments have been played at All-Sports Stadium (capacity: 12,000, 1997) in Oklahoma City, SBC Bricktown Ballpark (13,066, 1998-2001, 03, 05-06), and Ameritrust Field in Arlington (49,115, 2002, 04).

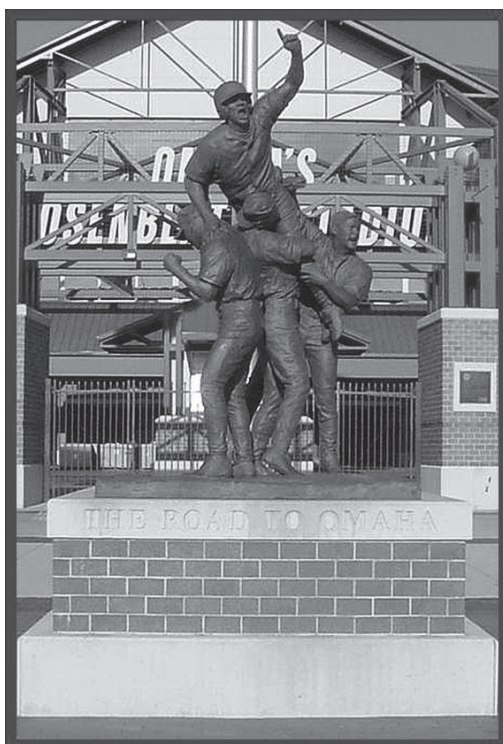

COMMISSIONER KEVIN WEIBERG

The 2005-06 athletic season marks the eighth year the Big 12 Conference has been led by Commissioner Kevin Weiberg. Under his direction the Big 12 has continued to be regarded as one of the nation's premier conferences, with an unwavering dedication to success both on and off the field.

Weiberg continues to play a prominent role nationally in collegiate athletics. He supported the academic reform effort that introduced Academic Progress Reports for NCAA member institutions and the approval of 12-game regular seasons in I-A football. He has also previously served a three-year term on the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee and completed a two-year tenure as chair of the Division I-A Collegiate Commissioners' Association.

This season marks his second and final as coordinator of the Bowl Championship Series. As BCS coordinator Weiberg led the negotiation of a new four-year television contract with Fox Sports for the rights to Bowl Championship Series games, exclusive of the Rose Bowl, through the 2009 season. His term as coordinator has also seen the implementation of qualification standards for conferences, greater access for conferences and teams previously outside the system, renewed contracts with the BCS bowls, the realization of a simplified standings formula, the advent of a college football Top 25 poll, and introduction of transparency into the voting process.

This past spring he announced enhancements in regulatory spending by the Conference, introducing an expanded drug testing program to include a wider array of performance enhancing drugs; a three-year cycle of compliance audits by an outside firm of member institution's athletic departments; and a gambling awareness initiative.

Weiberg is working with the Conference's Board of Directors in establishing an economic development consortium to provide benefits to member institutions beyond intercollegiate athletics. He will also be focused on arranging the next round of bowl agreements for the league, future hosting sites for the Big 12 football, basketball and baseball championships, and television negotiations.

Since being named the second commissioner in Big 12 history on October 8, 1998, and officially assuming the post December 4, 1998, a total of 22 NCAA championships have been won by conference teams with nearly 200 individual national titles to the league's credit. The conference has had an unprecedented eight men's and women's basketball teams advance to their respective Final Fours in the past four seasons, highlighted by Baylor's women's basketball National Championship in 2004-05. The Big 12 also has sent 11 teams to BCS bowls in the eight-year history of the system, with five appearances in the National Championship game since 2000, highlighted by Texas' national crown in 2005. The league's success continued in 2004-05, with NCAA team championships in women's cross country, men's cross country, wrestling, women's basketball, women's outdoor track & field and baseball. In fact, Weiberg has seen at least one team win a national title every season since being named Commissioner.



During his tenure, the Big 12 has also implemented a firm fiscal policy and continues to explore avenues to expand revenues. For the 2004-05 fiscal year, the Big 12 distributed a record \$105.6 million to its member institutions. Since beginning operations nine years ago, the Conference has nearly doubled its first allocation of \$54 million established during its inaugural year.

In January, 2005, the Board of Directors announced the four-year extension of Weiberg's contract through 2010, with a four-year option to 2014.

Prior to joining the Big 12 Conference, Weiberg worked in conference operations for almost 10 years at the Big Ten Conference, beginning as Associate Commissioner/Chief Operations Officer before being promoted to Deputy Commissioner.

His professional career began with a 1979-80 post as Sports Information Director at Wayne State (Neb.) College. Weiberg moved to Wichita State University from 1980-87. He was Sports Information Director at WSU from 1980-83, Assistant Athletics Director for Marketing/Fund Raising from 1983-86, and became Associate Director of Athletics in 1986-87. Weiberg then served as Associate Director of Athletics at the University of Maryland from 1987-89.

The Anthony, Kan., native earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Education from Kansas State University in 1978 and Master of Science degree in Athletics Administration from Western Illinois University in 1979.

Born July 7, 1956, Weiberg is married to the former Susan K. Latta. The couple has three children - Erika (19), Jenna (16) and Garrett (14).

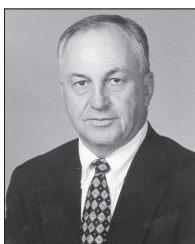
