Big 12 Showcase regularly airs on FSN's Big 12 footprint regions of Southwest, Midwest and Rocky Mountain, plus the Fox College Sports network. The show is also available on the Big 12 web site. Through a unique Conference partnership, ESPN Regional Television is the co-executive producer of Big 12 Showcase.

5-07 Review

The Big 12 Conference has been synonymous with success in competitive play and in the classroom as it enters its 12th season, and league members anticipate continued success during the 2007-08 academic year.

In the first I I years of the Big I 2, the conference can boast of 30 team and over 350 individual NCAA Championships. The success continued this past season, with team titles in men's cross country (Colorado) and women's volleyball (Nebraska) in addition to numerous individual crowns.

Over the past three seasons alone a total of 11 NCAA trophies have been hoisted by Big 12 institutions, with at least one national crown won in 10 of 11 years for the conference, including each of the past 10 seasons.

Through the first nine Bowl Championship Series title games, the Big 12 leads all conferences with five appearances in the contest. Big 12 squads have played for the football national championship five times in the last eight years, with berths in 12 BCS games overall.

In basketball, eight men's and women's teams have advanced to their respective Final Fours in the past six seasons as the Big 12 continues its place among the elite intercollegiate athletic conferences. Numerous national honors have been won by men's and women's student-athletes during conference history, with Kevin Durant (Texas) the most recent to garner accolades as the consensus 2007 National Player of the Year.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

Big 12 student-athletes also do well in garnering national academic recognition. This past season, two league standouts were named the Academic All-America of the Year in their sport by ESPNThe Magazine and the College Sports Information Directors of America. Nebraska's Sarah Pavan (volleyball) boasted a 4.0 grade-point average in Biochemistry, while

Aaron Ivey of Oklahoma (baseball) has a 4.0 GPA in Energy Management. Pavan also won the national academic honor presented for all sports. In addition, she was named recipient of the prestigious Honda-Broderick Award as Collegiate Woman Athlete of the Year. She is the first athlete since the Big 12 was formed to earn the accolade.

Competitive excellence, scholarship and sportsmanship are all equal components of the Big 12 philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and Academic All-Big 12 squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons.

At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsperson of the Year awards.

Institutions can also nominate student-athletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships at the end of each academic year. A total of 177 scholars have received more than \$1 million in postgraduate financial aid through the first 10 years of the program.

The Big I 2 sponsors 2 I sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The conference is made up of 12 institutions that have shared many traditional rivalries throughout their histories. Member schools include - Baylor University, University of Colorado, Iowa State University, University of Kansas, Kansas State University, University of Missouri, University of Nebraska, University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma State University, University of Texas, Texas A&M University and Texas Tech University.

The institutions created a league that encompasses seven states, over 45 million people and more than 18 million television households within its geographic footprint.

The conference conducts championships for 20 of its 21 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition. The winner of the Big 12 football championship game earns the league's berth into the prestigious Bowl Championship Series.

In the last several years the Big 12 has increased its bowl agreements and expanded television opportunities for all sports through contracts with ABC/ESPN, FSN and CSTV. Most recently, the league renewed and expanded its multi-year arrangement with ABC/ESPN, Inc.

In its 11-year history, the conference has distributed \$913.2 million to its 12 member institutions.

The Big 12 staff administers to over 4,600 student-athletes in 21 sports. The conference is headquartered in Irving, Texas.



Nebraska captured its second NCAA title since 2000 in volleyball when it won the crown last season. It was the 30th national championship by a Big 12 school.

Performance in the classroom is just as important as accolades on the field when looking at the student-athlete. The Big 12 Conference recognizes student-athletes in four areas for academic achievement. Those areas include the Academic All-Big 12 Teams, Commissioner's Honor Roll, Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, and the Big 12 Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship.

ACADEMIC ALL-BIG 12 TEAMS

Recognizing those student-athletes who excel in the classroom and on the field and court, the Big 12 has academic all-conference teams for all sports.

Nominated by the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services and the Athletic Media Relations Directors, members of the all-academic teams have posted at least a 3.00 grade point average either cumulative or the previous two semesters and are regulars (i.e. letterwinners) on his or her respective team. First-team honorees are regulars who have at least a 3.20 GPA.

Last year, a few academic teams in the Big I2 exceeded I00 student-athletes recognized by the conference. In addition, student-athletes have gained recognition by being named to ESPNThe Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America teams.

COMMISSIONER'S HONOR ROLL

Acknowledging all participants, the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll is an inclusive honor for all sports sponsored by the membership of the league. The Honor Roll is recorded and released each semester and recognizes those student-athletes who registered a 3.0 or better grade point average the previous semester.

Submitted through the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services at each institution, those honored are not necessarily the stars on the field and court but those who participate on the team. They include the letterwinners and non-letterwinners and recognize every student-athlete who has excelled in the classroom.

More than 2,000 Big 12 student-athletes are named to the Commissioner's Honor Rolls at the end of each semester.

PHILLIPS 66 CLASSROOM CHAMPION

As Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, the conference recognizes 30 student-athletes per school who have excelled on the court or field and in the classroom. Chosen through the Big 12 membership, those honored are recognized throughout the year on the Big 12 telecasts, FSN and ESPN Regional Television.

DR. PRENTICE GAUTT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

With 120 student-athletes from all Big 12 schools honored over the last five years, the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships' list has grown to 177 recipients since the 1996-97 academic year.

Additional funding prior to the 2002-03 selection process allowed each school to name two outstanding scholars to the annual list of honorees. Conference officers also voted to name the postgraduate scholarship program awards after longtime Big 12 and Big Eight Conference Associate Commissioner and student services' pioneer Dr. Prentice Gautt in 2004. Dr. Gautt passed away on March 17, 2005.

The all-time group has solid representation of scholars throughout the 21 sponsored Big 12 sports and has provided more than \$1,025,600 through the 2006-07 academic year for much-needed financial aid. Three faculty representatives, one senior woman administrator and one director of athletics form the selection group for the prestigious awards, which help the students to continue their formal education. Since its inception the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship program has produced over a dozen physicians, several attorneys for the underprivileged, college professors, Peace Corps volunteers and positions of national prominence.

Criteria for these awards include a cumulative grade point average of 3.50 on a 4.0 scale, participation in at least two years of intercollegiate athletics at the scholar-athlete's respective institution, and completion of athletics' eligibility. The scholar-athletes must also graduate from their respective member institutions within 15 months of their selection as postgraduate scholarship recipients and are expected to enroll in graduate/ professional schools within 15 months after they graduate.

The \$2,500 individual annual grants began in 1996-97, were raised to \$5,000 in 1999 and climbed to \$6,900 prior to the 2003-04 term. In 2006-07, the awards climbed to \$7,500. Most honorees in recent years have also been named to Academic All-Big 12 Conference teams as well as the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll.

The Big 12 annually recognizes its top male and female athlete and sportsperson. The Athlete of the Year Awards are selected based on athletic performance, academic achievement and citizenship within the academic year of nomination. The Sportspersons of the Year Award was started prior to the 2000-01 academic year to recognize student-athletes who displayed an extraordinary degree of sportsmanship and/or community service from within the conference. Honorees are selected by a media

In 2006-07, the Big 12 Athletes of the Year were Ben Askren (Missouri) and Sarah Pavan (Nebraska). The Sportsperson of the Year winners were Carl Pendleton (Oklahoma) and Amanda Costner (Kansas).

Askren was a 2006 and '07 NCAA Champion and a four-time All-America wrestler. He won the Big 12 Championship in his weight class three times in addition to being named a two-time Dan Hodge Award winner - wrestling's equivalent to the Heisman.

Pavan was the 2006-07 Honda-Broderick Cup winner as the top female student-athlete in the nation and was also named ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America of the Year. She returns this year after leading the Husker volleyball squad to the 2006 NCAA title.



MORE NEW COACHES GRACE SIDELINES

Big 12 followers will need to identify more new head coaches this season, as three league schools hired new mentors in the offseason. The changes mean the Big 12 has welcomed nine new head coaches over the past two seasons.

Colorado welcomes Jeff Bzdelik from Air Force, where he posted 50 wins over the last two seasons. Kansas State's new coach is Frank Martin, who will be the head man on the collegiate level for the first time. Mark Turgeon is at Texas A&M after a seven-year stint at Wichita State.

The longest tenured coaches in the Big 12 are Rick

Barnes (UT) at nine seasons, Bob Knight (TTU) with six seasons, followed by Bill Self (KU) and Scott Drew (BU) with four each.

TOP GUARDS TAKE THE COURT IN THE BIG 12

Four standout guards will look to keep the Bob Cousy Award in the Big 12 after being named preseason candidates for the honor, given annually to the nation's top collegiate point guard. Texas A&M's Acie Law was the recipient of the award last season.

The Big 12 athletes recognized on this year's preseason list are Curtis Jerrells (Baylor), Russell Robinson (Kansas), Stefhon Hannah (Missouri) and D.J. Augustin (Texas).

The Bob Cousy Award recognizes the top collegiate point guard in the nation. Candidates for the Cousy Award distinguish themselves on and off the court. Law was the first conference player to win the honor since the Big 12 began play in 1996-97.

TEXAS A&M IS THE BIG 12 ENTRY IN NIT SEASON TIPOFF

Texas A&M will be the Big 12 squad competing in the annual NIT Season Tipoff and will be one of four regional round hosts, with two games guaranteed for College Station. The Aggies will

face Oral Roberts in the first game. A&M will then play either UTEP or Texas A&M-Corpus Christi in a second contest, which will be played regardless of the result of the Aggies' outing versus ORU. It marks Texas A&M's first appearance in the event since 1985. The team with the best record in each NIT region (East, Midwest, South, West) will advance to the semifinals at Madison Square Garden in New York.

SUCCESS ACROSS SEVERAL SPORTS

The Big I2 is the only conference in the country to have multiple schools that participated in the NCAA men's basketball and baseball tournaments as well as a bowl game in 2006-07. Texas and Texas A&M were joined by Arkansas, Louisville, Ohio State and UCLA as the only schools in the United States to accomplish the feat.

BIG 12, ESPN REACH AGREEMENT, INCREASE EXPOSURE INTO THE FUTURE

The Big 12 Conference announced in April the continuation of its ABC/ESPN television relationship with an eight-year multimedia and sponsorship agreement. The contract will begin with the 2008-09 academic year and run through 2015-16.

In men's basketball, the Big 12 will become the first conference to be guaranteed three weekly telecast windows on ESPN or ESPN2. In addition, 95 games will air annually with more than 60 contests broadcast by ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU, ESPN Classic ESPN360.com, ABC or another national over-the-air network. The Phillips 66 Big 12 Men's Basketball Championship will continue to be televised on a variety of ESPN platforms including ESPN, ESPN2 and regional syndication on a re-branded Big 12 Network.



TELEVISIONS ARE TUNING IN

The Big I2 continued to show that it is one of the nation's most-watched conferences last season. The Big I2 Championship

game between Kansas and Texas was the highest-rated postseason game on ESPN during the entire 2007 campaign. It was also the second-highest rated game overall (regular season or postseason). In addition, the Big 12 was the highest-rated college basketball conference on ESPN2 during 2006-07.

BIG 12 LEADS NATION IN RECENT FINAL FOURS

During the last six years, the Big 12 has had five teams compete in the Final Four. The total is more than any conference in the country. The five squads also ranked among the leaders in the last 10 seasons.

SHARPSHOOTERS WILL BE AIMING AGAIN

The Big 12 had three athletes who ranked among the top 35 players in the nation in 3-point field goal percentage and all three will return in 2007-08. Texas A&M's Josh Carter was the top 3-point shooter in the country, hitting at a 50.0 percent clip. Matt Lawrence (MU) was at No. 14 with a .443 mark while A.J.Abrams (UT) placed 33rd by hitting 42.3 percent of his shots from beyond the arc. Seven Big 12 squads bring back their top 3-point shooter from a year ago.

NATIONAL TITLE EXPERIENCE IN MORE WAY THAN ONE

The Big 12 has the unique distinction of having two of the three college basketball coaches (men's <u>and</u> women's) in the nation who have won an NCAA Championship as both a player and a coach. Texas Tech's Bob Knight and Baylor's Kim Mulkey are joined by North Carolina's Dean Smith as those that have accomplished the feat.

FIRST TEAM ALL-AMERICA AS A FRESHMAN?

Being named to the Associated Press All-America First Team is a prestigious honor. It is even more notable to do so as a freshman, something Kevin Durant of Texas did last year. Two of the four players who have accomplished the feat all-time hail from Big 12 schools, as Wayman Tisdale (Oklahoma) was also chosen in 1983. Chris Jackson (LSU, 1990) and Greg Oden (Ohio State, 2007) are the only others to ever be selected in their first year of school.

BIG 12 / PAC-10 HARDWOOD SERIES BEGINS IN 2007-08

The Big I2 and Pacific-I0 Conferences have announced an agreement to play a four-year men's basketball series of I2 annual games between the two leagues, starting with the 2007-08 season.

The series will continue in 2008, with games slated for December 4-7. The contests scheduled will be return games of the matchups from 2007, but may not be scheduled for the same day of the week. The games in the series in 2009 will be played December 3-6, 2009, while matchups in 2010 will be played December 2-5, 2010.



All 12 contests will be televised nationally by either FSN or the ESPN family of networks.

A majority of the games will be played the week after Thanksgiving, with the complete schedule included below.

THE DEFENDERS ARE BACK

Offensive players might find it tough in the Big 12 this season, as four of the five members of the Big 12 All-Defensive Team can put on their uniforms again this year. Mario Chalmers and Russell Robinson of Kansas, Marcus Dove of Oklahoma State and Texas A&M's Dominique Kirk all have eligibility left for 2007-08. The lone departure was Kevin Durant of Texas, who was selected No. 2 overall in the NBA Draft.

Statistically, the top three steals leaders (Chalmers, Stefhon Hannah of Missouri and Robinson) are back for another season, with 10 of the top 15 in the category slated to play again.



BIG 12 NEWCOMERS AMONG LEADERS AT WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

Two Big 12 newcomers were among the key contributors for the United States at the FIBA U19 World Championships in Serbia. Texas A&M's DeAndre Jordan led the entire event in field goal percentage, hitting at 70.0 percent (21-of-30) from the field. Michael Beasley of Kansas State averaged 12.3 points in nine outings, second on his team and in the top 30 among players from all countries. The United States earned a silver medal, falling to host Serbia in the finals.

TOP RECRUITS CONTINUE TO COME TO THE BIG 12

The Big I2 boasted not only the nation's top player last year, but also had some of the other top newcomers in NCAA basketball. This year, the conference will welcome even more highly-touted players. Six of the league schools had recruiting classes that were ranked by ESPN/Scouts, Inc. in the top 25 nationally. The group follows a year in which five McDonald's All-America game participants were welcomed to the Big I2.

BIG 12 TO HOST NCAA PLAY AGAIN IN 2009, '10

The Big 12 will continue its respite from NCAA hosting duties for the second straight season, before returning to the rotation in 2009. The conference has been selected as one of the hosts for the 2009 (Kansas City) and 2010 (Oklahoma City) NCAA Championships.

The games in 2009 and '10 will mark the seventh and eighth times in 10 years that the Big 12 will host NCAA men's basketball competition. The conference hosted six straight seasons from 2001-06 in Kansas City, Oklahoma City and Dallas.

In Kansas City, the Big 12 will host first/second rounds for the third time since the league began competition in 1996-97. The upcoming event will be played in the new Sprint Center - scheduled to open in October 2007. Previously, the Big 12 has hosted NCAA action in Kansas City in 2001 and 2004.

The NCAA first/second rounds will return Oklahoma City's Ford Center for the third occasion since 1997. The venue last hosted NCAA contests in 2005 and also in 2003. The building was also the home of the Hornets of the National Basketball Association the past two seasons.

Since the first season of the league, the Big 12 has always assured its teams of extensive national television coverage. This season, the Big 12 Conference continues its long-standing relationship with the ESPN family of networks, including ESPN, ESPNU, ESPNU, ESPN Regional and ABC.

In addition, Conference games are provided to CBS through the partnership with ESPN. In April 2007, the Big 12 and ESPN, Inc. agreed to a long-term extension that runs through the 2015-16 season. **The Big 12 is the first conference to be guaranteed three weekly telecast windows on ESPN or ESPN2.** In addition, 95 games will air annually with more than 60 contests broadcast by ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU, ESPN Classic, ESPN360.com, ABC or another national over-the-air network. The Phillips 66 Big 12 Men's Basketball Championship will return to Kansas City in 2008, but in a sparkling, brand-new venue. Scheduled to open in October 2007, the Sprint Center will be the home of the league championship for three of the next four seasons.

Games will be played from Thursday - Sunday for the last time before a Wednesday - Saturday format begins in 2009. All 12 member institutions will participate with seeding based on regular season finish. The top four squads in the conference standings earn first-round byes. The Big 12 Champion earns the league's automatic bid to the 65-team NCAA Championship field. The entire Big 12 Championship will be televised on ESPN, ESPN2, ESPN Plus and ESPNU.





Heading west on Colorado Avenue, take a left on Regent Drive (it is the first stop light west of U.S. 36 (28th Street). The Events Center will appear ahead to your left.

From the West: Take I-70 east to U.S. 6. Go east on U.S. 6 to CO. 58. Turn right (east) on CO.58 to CO. 93. Make a left (north) onto CO. 93 towards Boulder. CO. 93 will turn into Broadway once in Boulder. Continue on Broadway west until you see the campus on your right. To get to Colorado Avenue from the west, turn right on Regent Drive off of Broadway. Follow Regent Drive until it dead ends, turn left (west) on Colorado Avenue. Heading west on Colorado Avenue, take a left on Regent Drive (it is the first stop light west of U.S. 36 (28th Street). The Events Center will appear ahead to your left.



IOWA STATE — Hilton Coliseum

From I-35 South: Once you get to Ames, turn off on the Highway 30 West exit (#111B). Follow Highway 30 West until the Elwood Drive/ISU Exit. Take the Exit and drive north (right) on Elwood Drive. To get to Hilton Coliseum, simply continue driving north on Elwood Drive and the coliseum

will be on the West side of the road. Parking for Hilton Coliseum is in lots on the south end of the arena.

From the East (Kansas City): Exit I-70 at Highway 177 (exit 313) and head North on 177 until reaching Manhattan. Turn left on 3rd street, proceed to the first light and turn left again on Tuttle Creek Blvd. Head North on Tuttle Creek until reaching Kimball Ave. Turn left on Kimball and go two miles to College Avenue. Phillips 66 Big 12 Championship Tiebreaking Procedures

Seeding for the Championship will be based upon regular-season competition. The winner of the postseason basketball championship shall be declared the Big 12 automatic qualifier to the NCAA Championship. A team ineligible under NCAA or Big 12 rules for postseason competition shall not compete in the championship.

The four teams with the best records (based upon winning percentage) in 16 Conference games shall earn first-round byes. After the four teams have been awarded first-round byes and ranked as the No. 1 through No. 4 seeds, all remaining teams will be ranked in order No. 5 through No. 12 for seeding in the championship.

Tiebreakers - The first criteria in the breaking of ties in the standings shall be head-to-head competition of tied teams. The following procedure will be used to establish the championship seeds if ties exist. (For tiebreaking procedures teams will be grouped in two divisions based upon established guidelines. Colorado, lowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Missouri and Nebraska are in one division and Baylor, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas, Texas A&M and Texas Tech are in the other division.)

- (a) If two teams are tied and they are from different divisons, the winner of the game between the two tied teams shall be the higher seed.
- (b) If two teams are tied and they are from the same division, the team with an advantage in head-to-head competition shall be the higher seed.
- (c) If two teams remain tied, there will be a comparison of overall record against division teams only (10 divisional games).
- (d) If two teams remain tied, there will be a comparison of record against the highest ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the opposite division and proceeding through in order of divisional record.
- (e) If two teams remain tied, there will be a *comparison of record against the highest ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the opposite division and proceeding through in order of divisional record.
- (f) If two teams remain tied, the higher seed will be chosen by draw.
- (g) If three or more teams are tied, ties among divisional opponents will be broken first by using steps (b) through (f) and the head-to-head results will be used to break ties between non-divisional teams. When three or more teams from the same division are tied step (b) will consist of a mini-round robin among the tied teams. At any point during the process of breaking ties among three or more teams that the number tied teams are reduced to two, head-to-head competition would be used as the primary tie-breaker, followed-by steps (c) through (f).

Note: When comparing against the "highest ranked team(s)" in either division, the comparison will be based upon how tied teams did against all teams in a given placement, rather than a team that wins a tiebreaker at another position. For example, if two teams are tied for fifth and two teams are tied for first, the head-to-head comparison would be how the fifth place teams did against the first place teams combined, and vice-versa.

Draw - In the event tiebreaking procedures are unsuccessful and a draw is necessary in determining seeding, the following procedure will be used:

- (a) The drawing will be conducted in public or with media attendance
- (b) Institutions involved in the drawing have the right to have a local representative in attendance at the drawing
- (c) A single slip of paper with names representing each of the tied institutions will be placed into a container and will be drawn in order of seeding from highest (#1) to lowest (#12)

DALE KELLEY Men's Basketball Coordinator of Officials

Dale Kelley serves the Big 12 Conference as Coordinator of Men's Basketball Officials with more than 22 years of experience as a coordinator of officials. He oversees the officials coalition formed by the Big 12 Conference, Conference USA, Ohio Valley, Sun Belt and Southland Conferences. He administers the selection and assignment of officials, while observing and evaluating referees.



As an on-court official, Kelley worked 14 years in the Southeastern Conference, including nine consecutive NCAA Tournaments and three Final Fours.

Outside his athletic involvement, he is owner of Kelley Enterprises Rental and Real Estate Firm in his hometown of Huntingdon, Tenn. He is also in his fourth consecutive four-year term as Mayor of Huntingdon.

Kelley attended Bethel College in McKenzie, Tenn. and was inducted into the Bethel College Hall of Fame in 1981. In 1985, he received Bethel College's outstanding Alumni Achievement Award.

2007-08 Men's Basketball Major Rules Changes

(Rule and page references are from the 2006-07 NCAA Rules Book.)

Courtside Monitor. Rule 2-5.1.a (page 42). The officials shall use the monitor to assess the situation when a fight is declared.

Back Panel of Uniform. Rule 3-5.1 (page 69). When a back shoulder panel is used, it shall extend no more than 3 inches from the shoulder seam, may be arched or horizontal.

Uniform Patches. Rule 3-5.7 (page 70). Any commemorative/memorial patches worn on the uniform shall be a maximum of 2 ½ square inches.

Uniform Patch Placement. Rule 3-5.7 (page 70). A single commemorative/ memorial patch, flag, institutional or conference logo or mascot may be worn at the center of the neckline or apex on the back of the game jersey.

Hair Control Devices. Rule 3-5.15 (page 72). Any item that goes around the head, including headbands or hair control devices, shall be of a single solid color, no more than 2 inches wide with only one institutional or manufacturer's logo and the dominant color of the game jersey or white, black or beige (women only). Hard items including but not limited to barrettes, beads and bobby pins are prohibited.

Throw-In Ends. Rule 4-65.5 (page 102). A throw-in shall end when a passed ball is touched inbounds or out-of-bounds by another player on the playing court, before going out-of-bounds.

Three-Point Line. Rule 1-7 (page 29). Effective for the 2008-09 season, the three-point line distance be changed to 20 feet, 9 inches.

Free-Throw Alignment. Rule 8-1.4 (page 138). To eliminate the first lane space nearest the basket on each side of the lane and using the present second, third and fourth lane space on each side of the lane as an alignment for free throws.

Courtside Monitor. Rule 2-5.1 (page 42). The officials may use the courtside television monitor, when available, to determine whether or not a flagrant foul occurred.

Play-By-Play. Rule 2-14 (page 59). Allow the use of the play-by-play to correct a scoring or book-keeping mistake.

Digital Stopwatch. Rule 2-13.7 (page 58). A digital stopwatch shall be available at the scorer's table.

Double Technical Foul. Rule7-4.1.i (page 131). Add a double technical foul to the list of situations after which the ball shall be awarded out of bounds.

Indirect Technical Foul. Rule 10-2.16 (page 160). An indirect technical foul will be assessed for placing a hand(s) on the backboard or ring to gain an advantage.

Men's Points of Emphasis: Charge/block – particularly near the goal; Coaches behavior and enforcement of the box; Rough post play; Palming.

BIG 12 CON

Dan Beebe was named the third commissioner of the Big 12 Conference on September 5, 2007, after serving as senior associate commissioner and chief operating officer of the league since February 2003.

While in that role, Beebe handled issues related to governance, national policy and legal affairs in addition to coordinating the day-to-day activities of the conference office. He also served as the conference liaison to the Big 12 board of directors. Beebe has been involved in the league's site selection for future championships, extending television contracts and enhancing football bowl opportunities. In addition, he has been active in establishing the conference's sportsmanship policies and procedures.

Prior to joining the Big 12, Beebe was commissioner of the Ohio Valley Conference from 1989-2003. During his 14-year tenure at the OVC he served on the NCAA Division I Management Council, chaired the I-AA Governance Committee, and was on several Collegiate Commissioners Association committees, in addition to various NCAA assignments, including the Athletics Certification Committee.

Under his direction the OVC added five new members. He also placed an emphasis on ethics and sportsmanship within the league, producing a nationally recognized Sportsmanship Statement and participating in regional and national seminars on the topic.

Among his other highlights at the OVC, Beebe implemented a conference-wide marketing plan that resulted in new revenue streams through corporate sponsorships and other initiatives, and saw television exposure for the league nearly triple.

The 50-year old Washington state native began his career in college athletics in 1982 as an NCAA enforcement representative. Following a one-year stint as assistant director of athletics at Wichita State, he returned to the NCAA in 1987 as director of enforcement.

A 1982 University of California Hastings College of the Law graduate, Beebe lettered in football and was a team captain at Cal Poly Pomona where he earned a degree in social science in 1979. He is a member of the Washington State Bar Association.

Born on February 27, 1957, Beebe is married to the former Molly Scanlon. Together, they have four children: daughters Jessie and Elaine and sons Matthew and Paddy.
