The Big 12 Conference maintains its web site at big12sports.com. Complete information on the league and the member schools is available.

In men's basketball, scores throughout the league and standings are updated as games are final. Big 12 conference and team statistics are updated the following morning, with weekly award winners posted each Monday. An archive of conference and team-by-team statistics back to the 2000-01 season is included as well.

Media can access Acrobat PDF files of the weekly release, statistics, team-by-team statistics and the conference media guide on the web site.

## Big 12 Release

The Big 12 will update a media release, including team notes, results and more each morning after games are played during the season. Complete league statistics, in addition to team-by-team stats for all 12 league squads will be updated via the conference web site as well.

## Phillips 66 Weekly Awards

A Big 12 Player and Rookie of the Week will be chosen each Monday, beginning November 13. Nominations are submitted by the school media relations offices and the winners are selected by a panel of media voters who cover the league on a regular basis. This year marks the 11th year for Phillips 66 as a sponsor of the Big 12 Conference.

## Big 12 Coaches' Teleconference

## Championship Credentials

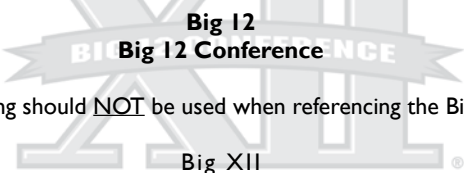

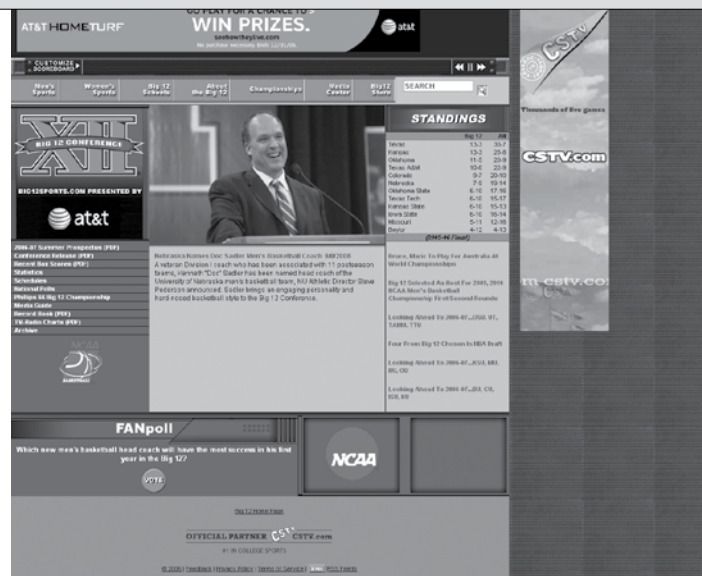

## Postseason Awards

The Big 12 presents the official all-conference awards at the end of the regular season. Major award winners are chosen, along with the All-Big 12 teams. Each Big 12 head coach votes on the squads and is not permitted to vote for his own players. The awards will be announced in March prior to the Phillips 66 Big 12 Men's Basketball Championship.

Academic All-Big 12 teams are also chosen in men's basketball and will be announced prior to the postseason. Further information on academic honors presented by the conference is available on page 6.

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# BIG 12 CONFERENCE

Fresh off its 10th anniversary season, the Big 12 Conference begins its second decade of competition in 2006-07. While there have been many proud accomplishments through the first 10 years, the conference and its members anticipate continued success.

Through its first 10 years, the Big 12 claimed 28 team and 310 individual NCAA titles. During this past season, conference programs captured national championships in football (Texas), women's indoor track & field (Texas), wrestling (Oklahoma State) and men's golf (Oklahoma State). In addition, 22 individual event titles were also won by student-athletes that compete in the Big 12.

The 2004-05 campaign marked the most successful in conference history with six NCAA championships. Baylor won the crown for women's basketball, becoming the first Big 12 squad to win in that sport. Colorado won both the men's and women's cross country trophies, just the fourth school in NCAA annals to win both in the same year. Oklahoma State regained the top spot in wrestling, winning the national title for the 33rd time. Texas captured its fourth women's outdoor track & field crown, along with its sixth national championship in baseball.

The Big 12 leads all conferences with five appearances in the BCS National Championship game. A Big 12 team has played for the football national championship five of the last six years, and each of the last three. In basketball, an unprecedented eight men's and women's basketball teams have advanced to their respective Final Fours in the past five seasons as the Big 12 continues its place among the elite intercollegiate athletic conferences.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

Competitive excellence, scholarships and sportsmanship are all equal components of the Big 12's philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and All-Big 12 Academic squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons.

At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsman of the Year awards.

Institutions can also nominate student-athletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships at the end of each academic year. A total of 153 scholars have received more than \$845,000 in postgraduate financial aid through the first nine years of the program.

The Big 12 sponsors 21 sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The conference is made up of 12 institutions that have shared many traditional rivalries throughout their histories. Member schools include - Baylor University, University of Colorado, Iowa State University, University of Kansas, Kansas State University, University of Missouri, University of Nebraska, University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma State University, University of Texas, Texas A&M University and Texas Tech University.

The institutions created a league that encompasses seven states, over 42 million people and more than 18 million television households within its geographic footprint.

The conference conducts championships for 20 of its 21 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition. The winner of the Big 12 football championship game earns the league's berth into the prestigious Bowl Championship Series.

The Big 12 is under the direction of its third commissioner, Kevin L. Weiberg, who took over the reins in December 1998. Weiberg has led the Big 12 into additional football bowl agreements and expanded television opportunities for all sports through contracts with ABC/ESPN, FSN, TBS and CSTV.

In its 10-year history, the conference has distributed \$807.2 million to its 12 member institutions.

The Big 12 has its headquarters in Irving, Texas, where Weiberg and his staff administer to over 4,600 student-athletes in 21 sports.

# ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

Performance in the classroom is just as important as accolades on the field when looking at the student-athlete. The Big 12 Conference recognizes student-athletes in four areas for academic achievement. Those areas include the Academic All-Big 12 Teams, Commissioner's Honor Roll, Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, and the Big 12 Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship.

## ACADEMIC ALL-BIG 12 TEAMS

Recognizing those student-athletes who excel in the classroom and on the field and court, the Big 12 has academic all-conference teams for all sports.

Nominated by the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services and the Athletic Media Relations Directors, members of the all-academic teams have posted at least a 3.00 grade point average either cumulative or the previous two semesters and are regulars (i.e. letterwinners) on his or her respective team. First-team honorees are regulars who have at least a 3.20 GPA.

Last year, a few academic teams in the Big 12 exceeded 100 student-athletes recognized by the conference. In addition, student-athletes have gained recognition by being named to ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America teams.

## COMMISSIONER'S HONOR ROLL

Acknowledging all participants, the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll is an inclusive honor for all sports sponsored by the membership of the league. The Honor Roll is recorded and released each semester and recognizes those student-athletes who registered a 3.0 or better grade point average the previous semester.

Submitted through the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services at each institution, those honored are not necessarily the stars on the field and court but those who participate on the team. They include the letterwinners and non-letterwinners and recognize every student-athlete who has excelled in the classroom.

More than 2,000 Big 12 student-athletes are named to the Commissioner's Honor Rolls at the end of each of semester.

## PHILLIPS 66 CLASSROOM CHAMPION

As Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, the conference recognizes 30 student-athletes per school who have excelled on the court and in the classroom. Chosen through the Big 12 membership, those honored are recognized throughout the year on the Big 12 telecasts, FSN and ESPN Regional Television.

## DR. PRENTICE GAUTT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

With 96 student-athletes from all Big 12 schools honored over the last four years, the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships' list has grown to 153 recipients since the 1996-97 academic year.

Additional funding prior to the 2002-03 selection process allowed each school to name two outstanding scholars to the annual list of honorees. Conference officers also voted to name the postgraduate scholarship program awards after longtime Big 12 and Big Eight Conference Associate Commissioner and student services' pioneer Dr. Prentice Gautt in 2004. Dr. Gautt passed away on March 17, 2005.

The all-time group has solid representation of scholars throughout the 21 sponsored Big 12 sports and has provided more than \$845,000 through the 2005-06 academic year for much-needed financial aid. Three faculty representatives, one senior woman administrator and one director of athletics form the selection group for the prestigious awards, which help the youngsters to continue their formal education. Since its inception the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship program has produced over a dozen physicians, several attorneys for the underprivileged, college professors, Peace Corps volunteers and positions of national prominence.

Criteria for these awards include a cumulative grade point average of 3.500 on a 4.0 scale, participation in at least two years of intercollegiate athletics at the scholar-athlete's respective institution, and completion of athletics' eligibility. The scholar-athletes also must graduate from their respective member institutions within 15 months of their selection as postgraduate scholarship recipients and are expected to enroll in graduate/professional schools within 15 months after they graduate.

The \$2,500 individual annual grants began in 1996-97, were raised to \$5,000 in 1999 and climbed to \$6,900 prior to the 2003-04 term. Most honorees in recent years have also been named to Academic All-Big 12 Conference teams as well as the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll.

# BIG 12 CONFERENCE AWARDS

The Big 12 annually recognizes its top male and female athlete and sportsperson. The Athlete of the Year Awards are selected based on athletic performance, academic achievement and citizenship within the academic year of nomination. The Sportspersons of the Year Award was started prior to the 2000-01 academic year to recognize student-athletes who displayed an extraordinary degree of sportsmanship and/or community service from within the conference. Honorees are selected by a media panel.

In 2005-06, the Big 12 Athletes of the Year were Cat Osterman and Vince Young. Both competed for the University of Texas. The Sportsperson of the Year winners were Jodie Heinicka from Missouri and Parker Dalton from Texas A&M.

Osterman, a four-year softball letterwinner, won the Honda Award as National Softball Player of the Year for the second consecutive season. She also earned the 2006 USA Softball Collegiate National Player of the Year honor for the third time. Young led Texas to the 2005 Big 12 and National championships with a 13-0 record and win over USC in the Rose Bowl. He was the 2005 Davey O'Brien Award winner as the nation's top quarterback and was also awarded the Maxwell Award as national player of the year.

Heinicka spent her time in Columbia as an active participant in many city and university activities, including the Can Food Drive for Central Missouri Food Bank, the Dance-a-thon for children's diseases, the Domestic Violence Half Marathon Race, and the Adopt-A-Family Christmas project. She also visited local hospitals and schools in addition to getting up at 6 a.m. every morning to help a quadriplegic male with his morning routine. Dalton played a key role in welcoming six Tulane athletic teams to the A&M campus after they were displaced by Hurricane Katrina. He also volunteered for AggiesCan, a Coat Drive for the local mission and Toys 4 Tots. He is an active member of Breakaway Prayer team, has led a Bible Study each week for the past three years and participated in the Gamma Phi Beta's Crescent King Philanthropy Fundraiser for Camp Fire USA.

## IS THAT A NEW FACE ON THE BENCH?

The Big 12 will welcome six new head coaches to its sidelines this season, the most in conference history in one year. The changes are among the most in one season in recent college basketball memory, preceded recently by seven changes in the Atlantic 10 in 2001 and five by the Southeastern Conference in 1989.

The new coaches include Greg McDermott (Iowa State), Bob Huggins (Kansas State), Mike Anderson (Missouri), Doc Sadler (Nebraska), Jeff Capel (Oklahoma) and Sean Sutton (Oklahoma State). As a group, the six boast more than 1,100 career victories.

## BIG 12 COACHES RANK HIGH NATIONALLY

Five of the coaches in the Big 12 rank high nationally among active coaches in winning percentage. Leading the group is new Kansas State coach Bob Huggins, who is eighth with a .740 winning percentage. A list of where all five coaches rank is included below.

## COACH KNIGHT NEARS ALL-TIME WINS MARK

Texas Tech head coach Bob Knight needs just 10 wins to match North Carolina's Dean Smith for the all-time NCAA basketball victory record. Knight is also seven wins away from matching Adolph Rupp of Kentucky for second on the list.

Coach Knight leads all active coaches in victories (869), games coached (1,219), and seasons (40) and is tied with Jim Boeheim of Syracuse for most seasons with 20 wins over more (28).

## PLAYERS LEAVE EARLY, BUT PLENTY RETURN

The Big 12 had eight players declare as early-entries for the 2006 NBA Draft, more than any conference in the country. However, several top stars return. Two of the early entries will be back in school - Richard Roby (Colorado) and Aleks Maric (Nebraska). Three of the five All-Big 12 First Team members are back, with a total of 14 players who were named to the All-Big 12 First, Second, Third or Honorable Mention squads returning in 2006-07.

## ELITE COMPANY

Over the last four seasons, only six schools have reached the Elite Eight (regional final) of the NCAA Tournament in two different years. Kansas, Texas, Arizona, Connecticut, Kentucky and Michigan State can boast of the feat. *The Big 12 is the only conference with multiple schools in that group.*

## BAYLOR IS BIG 12 ENTRY IN NIT SEASON TIPOFF

Baylor will be the Big 12 squad competing in the annual NIT Season Tipoff. The Bears will take part in the NIT's new format this year, facing Colorado State in West Region games in Spokane, Wash. BU will then face either Gonzaga or Rice in a second game, which will be played regardless of the result of the Bears' outing versus CSU. The teams with the best record in each region (East, Midwest, South, West) will advance to the semifinals at Madison Square Garden in New York.

## MAN ON A MISSION

Oklahoma junior guard Kellen Sampson had a unique summer job this year, as he spent two weeks in May and June working with 11 others at an orphanage in the war-torn West African nation of Liberia.

Sampson was part of a construction group scheduled to erect a school building in Rainbow Town. He also spent much time with groups of local children - entertaining, playing games and trying to make the lives of the local youth more enjoyable.

"I had no concept of anything except trying to make 85 orphans' days a little better," Sampson said. "To be so completely un-self-centered really puts all the things that we do here in focus."

## A UNIQUE PLACE IN THE TOP FIVE

Kansas mentor Bill Self and Texas head coach Rick Barnes are in a unique group of active coaches nationally. The duo are two of only six in the country who have led two different schools to top five rankings in the Associated Press top 25 poll. All-time, only 13 coaches have accomplished the feat.

## CLOSE CONTESTS THROUGHOUT THE BIG 12

Last season marked one of the most competitive, top-to-bottom, of any in Big 12 annals. Of the 96 conference games contested, nearly half (47) were decided by 10 points or less.

In addition, Oklahoma became the first team in Big 12 history to play four consecutive one-point games (conference or non-conference). The Sooners had seven one-point contests overall, a league record.

## BEATING THE NATION'S BEST

The Big 12 posted the second-best winning percentage and second-most wins of any conference in the nation against Associated Press top 25 opponents in 2005-06. Conference squads won six of the last eight meetings, including a 5-2 mark during the 2006 calendar year. Big 12 teams have 16 wins over nationally-ranked squads during the past two years.

## NEARLY EVERYONE HAS BEEN DANCING

Big 12 teams are regulars during March Madness, with 75.0 percent of the conference teams having competed in NCAA play over the last five seasons. Nine of the 12 league squads have taken part - the second-most (Big East, 14) of any conference in the country.

## BIG 12 MADNESS IN OKC FOR THE FIRST TIME...

For the first time in conference history this season, the Phillips 66 Big 12 Basketball Championships will be played somewhere besides Kansas City or Dallas. In March, Oklahoma City will host the events for the first time. The men's championship will take place at the Ford Center from March 8-11. Most recently, the Big 12 hosted NCAA First/Second Round games at the arena in 2005.

## ...AND THEN WE GO BACK TO KANSAS CITY IN 2008

After playing this year's postseason games in Oklahoma, the Big 12 will return to Kansas City for the 2008 Phillips 66 Big 12 Basketball Championships. This time, however, the men's event will take place in a new arena - The Sprint Center - which will open in October 2007. It will mark the eighth time that Kansas City will host the basketball championships.

## BIG 12 TO HOST NCAA PLAY AGAIN IN 2009, '10

For the first time in recent memory, the Big 12 will *not* be hosting NCAA games this season. The conference will, however, be back to handling hosting duties again in the near future after being selected as one of the hosts for the 2009 and 2010 NCAA Championships.

The games in 2009 and '10 will mark the seventh and eighth times in 10 years that the Big 12 will host NCAA men's basketball competition. The conference hosted six straight seasons from 2001-06 in Kansas City, Oklahoma City and Dallas.

In Kansas City, the Big 12 will host first/second rounds for the third time since the league began competition in 1996-97. The upcoming event will be played in the new Sprint Center - scheduled to open in October 2007. Previously, the Big 12 has hosted NCAA action in Kansas City in 2001 and 2004.

The NCAA first/second rounds will return Oklahoma City's Ford Center for the third occasion since 1997. The venue last hosted NCAA contests in 2005 and also in 2003. The building is also the current home to the Hornets of the National Basketball Association.

## BY THE NUMBERS

- 1 - Teams other than Kansas, Oklahoma or Oklahoma State who have won the Phillips 66 Big 12 Men's Basketball Championship in the last 10 seasons. Iowa State is the lone other school to accomplish the feat, winning in 2000.
- 2 - Big 12 teams that led the NCAA in a statistical category last season. Kansas ranked first in field goal percentage defense, holding its opponents to 37.0 percent shooting. Texas was first nationally in rebound margin, holding a +10.6 advantage.

- 31 - Consecutive games lost by Kansas State to in-state rival Kansas before the Wildcats posted a 59-55 victory at Allen Fieldhouse on January 14, 2006. It marked the first KSU win over KU since Big 12 play began in 1996-97.
- 37 - Points scored by Nebraska's Aleks Maric at Iowa State on February 15, 2006. The total matched (Daniel Gibson, UT) the Big 12 record for points in a game by a sophomore.
- 39.5 - Average minutes played by Texas Tech's Jarrius Jackson in conference regular season games last year, a Big 12 record. The guard played 632 of 645 possible minutes (one overtime game) in league contests.
- 49.5 - Michael Neal's 3-point field goal percentage in conference games a year ago. The mark led the Big 12 and ranks first on the conference career record list for league regular-season contests.
- 53 - Steals by Mario Chalmers of Kansas in conference play last season, a Big 12 record. The guard had 89 thefts overall, the top total in the league record books by a freshman.
- 58.1 - The career field goal percentage for Oklahoma State's Mario Boggan. The mark is first among active Big 12 players and ranks eighth on the career league list entering the 2006-07 season.
- 62 - Points per game allowed by Texas A&M over the last two seasons. The mark is the best in the Big 12 during that time.
- 64 - Colorado's margin of victory over Savannah State on January 3 last season. The game tied for the fifth-highest margin for all games in Big 12 history.
- 422 - Consecutive games in which Baylor has connected on a 3-pointer. The Bears finished third in the Big 12 in 3-point percentage last year in conference games, connecting on 38.4 percent of their shots from beyond the arc.



# BIG 12 TELEVISION & RADIO

Since the first season of the league, the Big 12 has always assured its teams of extensive national television coverage. This season, the Big 12 Conference continues its long-standing relationship with the ESPN family of networks, including ESPN, ESPN2, ESPN Regional and ABC.

In addition, Conference games are provided to CBS through the partnership with ESPN. The current Big 12 agreement runs through the 2007-08 academic year.

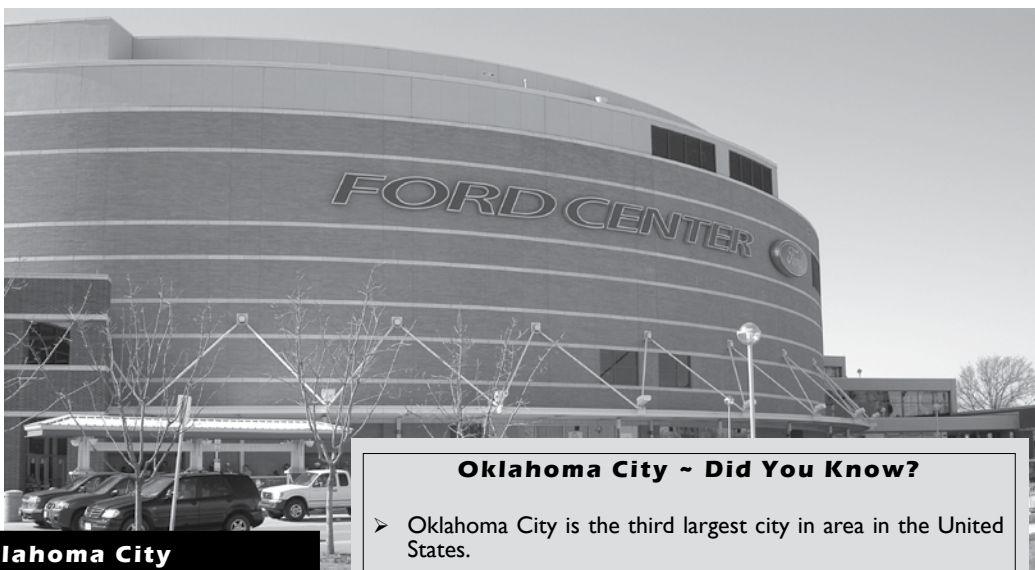

# ARENA DRIVING DIRECTIONS



## **BAYLOR — Ferrell Center**

**From the North:** Drive south on I-35, take the University Parks Drive exit and turn east (left) to the intersection of University Parks Drive and LaSalle Avenue.

**From the South:** Drive north on I-35, take the University Parks Drive exit and turn east (right) to the intersection of University Parks Drive and LaSalle Avenue.

**From the West:** Drive east on Hwy. 84 to Hwy. 6/Loop 340. Turn east (right) and take Hwy. 6/Loop 340 to I-35. Turn north (left) on I-35, take the University Parks Drive exit and turn east (right) to the intersection of University Parks Drive and LaSalle Avenue.

**From the East:** Drive west on Hwy. 84 to I-35. Turn south on I-35 (left), take the University Parks Drive exit and turn east (left) to the intersection of University Parks Drive and LaSalle Avenue.

**From the Northwest:** Take Hwy. 6 to I-35. Turn north (left), take the University Parks Drive exit and turn east (right) to the intersection of University Parks Drive and LaSalle Avenue.

**From the Southwest:** Take Hwy. 6 to Bus. 77 exit. Bus 77 become LaSalle Avenue and leads directly to the Ferrell Center.



## **COLORADO — Coors Events Center**

**From Denver International Airport (DIA):** Driving time between DIA and Boulder is approximately 60 to 90 minutes. Follow Peña Boulevard (10 miles) south to I-70, and exit onto

I-70 west. Follow I-70 west to I-270 west. I-270 merges into U.S. 36 west and takes you west into Boulder (about 23 miles). Once you're in Boulder, take a left (west) on Colorado Avenue. Heading west on Colorado Avenue, take a left on Regent Drive (it is the first stop light west of U.S. 36 (28th Street)). The Events Center will appear ahead to your left and there is meter parking along the street or in lot 436, (the metered parking lot is your second left after turning onto Regent Drive). Parking for basketball games is free in lot 436.

**From the Denver Area and South:** To get to Boulder from the Denver area, go west on U.S. 36 (from I-25 or I-270). Once you're in Boulder from U.S. 36, take a left (west) on Colorado Avenue (first stop light). Heading west on Colorado Avenue, take a left on Regent Drive (it is the first stop light west of U.S. 36 (28th Street)). The Events Center will appear ahead to your left.

**From the North:** From the north, take U.S. 287 south to Highway 119 (Diagonal Highway). Highway 119 becomes Highway 157 (Foothills Parkway) just north of Boulder. Turn right (west) from Foothills Parkway onto Colorado Avenue. Once on Colorado Avenue, just past 28th Street (U.S. 36) campus is both to the left and straight ahead. Heading west on Colorado Avenue, take a left on Regent Drive (it is the first stop light west of U.S. 36 (28th Street)). The Events Center will appear ahead to your left.

**From the West:** Take I-70 east to U.S. 6. Go east on U.S. 6 to CO. 58. Turn right (east) on CO. 58 to CO. 93. Make a left (north) onto CO. 93 towards Boulder. CO. 93 will turn into Broadway once in Boulder. Continue on Broadway west until you see the campus on your right. To get to Colorado Avenue from the west, turn right on Regent Drive off of Broadway. Follow Regent Drive until it dead ends, turn left (west) on Colorado Avenue. Heading west on Colorado Avenue, take a left on Regent Drive (it is the first stop light west of U.S. 36 (28th Street)). The Events Center will appear ahead to your left.



## **IOWA STATE — Hilton Coliseum**

**From I-35 South:** Once you get to Ames, turn off on the Highway 30 West exit (#111B). Follow Highway 30 West until the Elwood Drive/ISU Exit. Take the Exit and drive north (right) on Elwood Drive. To get to Hilton Coliseum, simply continue driving north on Elwood Drive and the coliseum will be on the West side of the road. Public parking for Hilton Coliseum is in lots on the south end of the arena.

**From I-35 North:** Once you get to Ames, turn off on the Highway 30 West exit (#111B). Follow Highway 30 West until the Elwood Drive/ISU Exit. Take the Exit and drive north (right) on Elwood Drive. To get to Hilton Coliseum, simply continue driving north on Elwood Drive, the coliseum will be on the West side of the road. Public parking for Hilton Coliseum is located in specified lots on the south end of the arena.

**From Highway 30 West:** Follow Highway 30 West until the Elwood Drive/ISU Exit. Take the Exit and drive north (left) on Elwood Drive. To get to Hilton Coliseum, simply continue driving north on Elwood Drive and the coliseum will be on the West side of the road. Public parking for Hilton Coliseum is located in specified lots on the south end of the arena.

**From Highway 30 East:** Follow Highway 30 East until the Elwood Drive/ISU Exit. Take the Exit and drive north (right) on Elwood Drive. To get to Hilton Coliseum, simply continue driving north on Elwood Drive and the coliseum will be on the West side of the road. Public parking for Hilton Coliseum is located in specified lots on the south end of the arena.



## **KANSAS — Allen Fieldhouse**

**From the East (Kansas City International Airport):** Kansas City International Airport is 60 miles to the northeast and is served by most national airline carriers. As you exit the airport, turn left onto I-29 North. Continue on I-29 for several miles to I-435 South. Continue on I-435 South to the junction of I-70

West. Take I-70 West to Lawrence. Exit I-70 at exit #202 (West Lawrence). Follow Iowa Street to 19th Street, turn left on 19th Street, to Naismith Drive, turn left on Naismith Drive, leading to Fieldhouse Drive, South of Allen Fieldhouse. Allow one and a half hours driving time from KCI to Lawrence.

**From the West (Forbes Field):** Forbes Field is located in Topeka, Kansas, approximately 30 miles west of Lawrence. Travel on Highway 75 North to I-70 East to the West Lawrence Kansas Turnpike exit #202, which will lead to Iowa Street. Follow Iowa Street to 19th Street, turn left on 19th Street, to Naismith Drive, turn left on Naismith Drive, leading to Fieldhouse Drive, South of Allen Fieldhouse. Allow one and a half hours driving time from KCI to Lawrence.



## **KANSAS STATE — Bramlage Coliseum**

**From the West (Manhattan Airport):** Take Kansas Highway 18 East into Manhattan. Exit at Kansas 113 (Seth Childs Road, heading North. Stay on Seth Childs Road until reaching the Kimball Ave., exit. Turn right onto Kimball and follow it one mile to College Ave., and turn right. Go one block and turn left into the Bramlage Coliseum parking lot.

**From the East (Kansas City):** Exit I-70 at Highway 177 (exit 313) and head North on 177 until reaching Manhattan. # OFFICIATING & TIEBREAKERS

## Phillips 66 Big 12 Championship Tiebreaking Procedures

Seeding for the Championship will be based upon regular-season competition. The winner of the postseason basketball championship shall be declared the Big 12 automatic qualifier to the NCAA Championship. A team ineligible under NCAA or Big 12 rules for postseason competition shall not compete in the championship.

The four teams with the best records (based upon winning percentage) in 16 Conference games shall earn first-round byes. After the four teams have been awarded first-round byes and ranked as the No. 1 through No. 4 seeds, all remaining teams will be ranked in order No. 5 through No. 12 for seeding in the championship.

**Tiebreakers** - The first criteria in the breaking of ties in the standings shall be head-to-head competition of tied teams. The following procedure will be used to establish the championship seeds if ties exist. (For tiebreaking procedures teams will be grouped in two divisions based upon established guidelines. Colorado, Iowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Missouri and Nebraska are in one division and Baylor, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas, Texas A&M and Texas Tech are in the other division.)

- (a) If two teams are tied and they are from different divisions, the winner of the game between the two tied teams shall be the higher seed.
- (b) If two teams are tied and they are from the same division, the team with an advantage in head-to-head competition shall be the higher seed.
- (c) If two teams remain tied, there will be a comparison of overall record against division teams only (10 divisional games).
- (d) If two teams remain tied, there will be a comparison of record against the highest ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the division and proceeding through in order of divisional record.
- (e) If two teams remain tied, there will be a \*comparison of record against the highest ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the opposite division and proceeding through in order of divisional record.
- (f) If two teams remain tied, the higher seed will be chosen by draw.
- (g) If three or more teams are tied, ties among divisional opponents will be broken first by using steps (b) through (f) and the head-to-head results will be used to break ties between non-divisional teams. When three or more teams from the same division are tied step (b) will consist of a mini-round robin among the tied teams. At any point during the process of breaking ties among three or more teams that the number of tied teams are reduced to two, head-to-head competition would be used as the primary tie-breaker, followed by steps (c) through (f).

**Note:** When comparing against the "highest ranked team(s)" in either division, the comparison will be based upon how tied teams did against all teams in a given placement, rather than a team that wins a tiebreaker at another position. For example, if two teams are tied for fifth and two teams are tied for first, the head-to-head comparison would be how the fifth place teams did against the first place teams combined, and vice-versa.

**Draw** - In the event tiebreaking procedures are unsuccessful and a draw is necessary in determining seeding, the following procedure will be used:

- (a) The drawing will be conducted in public or with media attendance
- (b) Institutions involved in the drawing have the right to have a local representative in attendance at the drawing
- (c) A single slip of paper with names representing each of the tied institutions will be placed into a container and will be drawn in order of seeding from highest (#1) to lowest (#12)

## DALE KELLEY Men's Basketball Coordinator of Officials



Dale Kelley serves the Big 12 Conference as Coordinator of Men's Basketball Officials with more than 22 years of officiating experience. He oversees the officials coalition formed by the Big 12 Conference, Conference USA, Sun Belt and Southland Conferences. He administers the selection and assignment of officials, while observing and evaluating referees.

As an on-court official, Kelley worked 14 years in the Southeastern Conference, including nine consecutive NCAA Tournaments and three Final Fours.

Outside his athletic involvement, he is owner of Kelley Enterprises Rental and Real Estate Firm in his hometown of Huntingdon, Tenn. He is also in his third four-year term as Mayor of Huntingdon.

Kelley attended Bethel College in McKenzie, Tenn. and was inducted into the Bethel College Hall of Fame in 1981. In 1985, he received Bethel College's outstanding Alumni Achievement Award.

Kelley and his wife Carlene have three children - Amanada, Meredith and Cliff - and four grandchildren.

## 2006-07 Men's Basketball Major Rules Changes

*(Rule and page references are from the 2005-06 NCAA Rules Book.)*

**LED Lights. (Rule 1-18, page 35)** - LED lights may be used on the shot clock, but the lights shall only be activated for a shot-clock violation.

**Intentionally Kicked Ball. (Rule 2-14.6.f, 2-14.7.b, page 53)** - When an intentionally kicked ball occurs with 14 seconds or less, set the shot clock to 15 seconds. When an intentionally kicked ball occurs with 15 seconds or more the clock shall remain as is.

**Undergarments. (Rule 3-4.14, page 63)** - Compression pants may not extend below the game pants. Shirt sleeves may not extend below the elbow.

**Arm Sleeves. (Rule 3-5.7, page 65)** - Arm sleeves are illegal unless worn for medical purposes.

**Wristbands and Headbands (Rule 3-5.15, 3-5.16, page 64)** - Wristbands and headbands must be either the dominant color of the game jersey or white. The color shall be uniform for the entire team.

**Point of Interruption. (Rule 4-51.1.a, page 85)** - The ball will be returned to play at the point of interruption after double fouls and simultaneous personal fouls.

**Use of Timeouts. (Rule 5-10.22, page 104)** - During games that do not have media present, a 75-second timeout is charged when an appeal for a correctable error is not correctable. When a 75-second timeout is not available, a 30-second timeout shall be used.

**Timeout Request (Rule 5-10.1.a, page 99)** - A timeout shall not be recognized when an airborne player's momentum carries him/her either out-of-bounds or into the backcourt.

**Screener Position. (Rule 10-22, page 150)** - The normal stance of a screener shall be approximately shoulder width.

**Substitution. (Rule 3-4.11, page 59)** - When a player is required to be replaced for disqualification, injury or blood, all substitutes who have legally reported into the game shall be allowed to enter.

**Experimental Rules** - The men will experiment with eliminating the first lane space nearest the basket on each side of the lane and using the present, second, third and fourth lane spaces on each side of the lane.

**Points of Emphasis** - Rough play and palming will remain as points of emphasis for the 2006-07 season. The committee will also emphasize proper adjudication of the loose-ball pile-ups that occur during the game, including calling personal fouls and ensuring the possession of the ball before granting a timeout.



For the ninth time in its 11-year history in 2006-07, the Big 12 Conference will be led by Commissioner Kevin Weiberg. Under his direction, the Big 12 has continued to be regarded as one of the nation's premier conferences.

Weiberg continues to play a prominent role nationally in collegiate athletics. He has previously served terms as coordinator of the Bowl Championship Series, as a member of the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee as well as a two-year stint as chair of the Division I-A Collegiate Commissioners' Association. Weiberg currently serves on the following NCAA special committees and task force groups: men's college basketball partnership, women's basketball discussion group, and the baseball academic enhancement working group. He also played a key role in the formation of the Group of Six conferences; a forum that brings together some of the nation's top conferences to advance policy initiatives in intercollegiate athletics.

During his tenure, a total of 25 NCAA championships have been won by conference teams with nearly 200 individual national titles to the league's credit. The conference has had five appearances in the BCS National Championship game in eight years, with five showings in the title contest since 2000 - more than any other league. The Big 12 has had eight men's and women's basketball teams advance to their respective Final Fours in the past five seasons, highlighted by Baylor's women's basketball National Championship two years ago.

The league's success continued in 2005-06, with NCAA team championships in football, women's indoor track & field, wrestling and men's golf. Big 12 squads have accounted for 10 NCAA Championships in the last two seasons. In fact, Weiberg has seen at least one team win a national title every season since being named Commissioner.

During the past athletic season, Weiberg continued to advance the Big 12 by negotiating a new lineup of football bowl agreements to run through the 2009 season that increases exposure and revenue, and allows Big 12 teams to play in some of America's best destination cities. He also helped the league enter into long-term relationships with Oklahoma City to continue as hosts of the Big 12's successful baseball and softball championships, in addition to securing sites for the 2007 Dr Pepper Big 12 Football Championship and the '08 Phillips 66 Big 12 Men's and Women's Basketball Championships.

In 2005, he announced enhancements in regulatory spending by the Conference, introducing an expanded drug testing program to include a wider array of performance enhancing drugs; a three-year cycle of compliance audits by an outside firm of member institution's athletic departments; and a gambling awareness initiative.

Weiberg enters this year focused on securing prominent long-term television deals in football, men's basketball and other sports. He has also been working with the Conference's Board of Directors in establishing greater cooperation between member institutions in areas beyond intercollegiate athletics.

During his recently completed tenure as coordinator of the BCS, Weiberg led the negotiation of a new four-year television contract with Fox Sports for the rights to Bowl Championship Series games, exclusive of the Rose Bowl, through 2009. His term as coordinator also saw the implementation of qualification standards



for conferences, greater access for conferences and teams previously outside the system, renewed contracts with the BCS bowls, the realization of a simplified standings formula, the advent of a college football Top 25 poll, and introduction of transparency into the voting process.

Since being named the second commissioner in Big 12 history on October 8, 1998, and officially assuming the post December 4, 1998, the Big 12 has implemented a firm fiscal policy and continues to explore avenues to expand revenues. For the 2005-06 fiscal year, the Big 12 distributed \$102.5 million to its member institutions. Since beginning operations 10 years ago, the Conference has nearly doubled its first allocation of \$54 million established during its inaugural year and has distributed \$807.2 million to its member schools.

In January, 2005, the Board of Directors announced the four-year extension of Weiberg's contract through 2010, with a four-year option to 2014.

Prior to joining the Big 12 Conference, Weiberg worked in conference operations for almost 10 years at the Big Ten Conference, beginning as Associate Commissioner/Chief Operations Officer before being promoted to Deputy Commissioner.

His professional career began with a 1979-80 post as Sports Information Director at Wayne State (Neb.) College. Weiberg moved to Wichita State University from 1980-87. He was Sports Information Director at WSU from 1980-83, Assistant Athletics Director for Marketing/Fund Raising from 1983-86, and became Associate Director of Athletics in 1986-87. Weiberg then served as Associate Director of Athletics at the University of Maryland from 1987-89.

The Anthony, Kan., native earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Education from Kansas State University in 1978 and Master of Science degree in Athletics Administration from Western Illinois University in 1979.

Born July 7, 1956, Weiberg is married to the former Susan K. Latta. The couple has three children - Erika (20), Jenna (17) and Garrett (15).
