BIG 12 CONFERENCE



The Big 12 celebrates its 10th anniversary season of competition in 2005-06. While there have been many proud accomplishments in the first nine years of the conference, the league and its members are also excited and poised for a bright future.

Over the past nine years, 24 different teams and over 200 individuals have won NCAA Championships. This past year marked the most successful in conference history. Baylor won the crown for women's basketball, becoming the first Big 12 squad to win in that sport. Colorado won both the men's and women's cross country trophies, just the fourth school in NCAA annals to win both in the same year. Oklahoma State regained the top spot in wrestling, winning the national title for the 33rd time. Texas captured its fourth women's outdoor track & field crown, along with its sixth national championship in baseball. A total of 23 individual event titles were also claimed by the Big 12.

Eight football squads have played in BCS bowls in the last six seasons. The Big 12 leads all conferences with four appearances in the National Championship game. In basketball, an unprecedented eight men's and women's basketball teams have advanced to their respective Final Fours in the past four seasons as the Big 12 continues its place among the elite intercollegiate athletic conferences.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

Competitive excellence, scholarships and sportsmanship are all equal

components of the Big 12's philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and All-Big 12 Academic squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons.

At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsperson of the Year awards.

Institutions can also nominate studentathletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships at the end of each academic year. A total of 129 scholars have received more than \$680,000 in postgraduate financial aid through the first eight years of the program.

The Big 12 sponsors 21 sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving,

tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track& field, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The conference is made up of 12 institutions that have shared many traditional rivalries throughout their histories. Member schools include - Baylor University, University of Colorado, Iowa State University, University of Kansas, Kansas State University, University of Missouri, University of Nebraska, University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma State University, University of Texas, Texas A&M University and Texas Tech University.

The institutions created a league that encompasses seven states, over 42 million people and more than 18 million television households within its geographic footprint.

The conference conducts championships for 20 of its 21 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition. The winner of the Big 12 football championship game earns the league's berth into the prestigious Bowl Championship Series.

The Big 12 is under the direction of its second commissioner, Kevin L. Weiberg, who took over the reins in December 1998. Under Weiberg's guidance, the league distributed over \$105 million to its member institutions for the 2004-05 academic year, nearly doubling the first allocation of \$54 million in the conference's inaugural 1996-97 campaign.

Weiberg has also helped lead the Big 12 into additional football bowl agreements and expanded television opportunities for all sports through contracts with ABC/ESPN, FSN, TBS and CSTV.

The Big 12 has its headquarters in Dallas, Texas, where Weiberg and his staff administer to over 4,600 student-athletes in 21 sports.



REMEMBERING DR. PRENTICE GAUTT

Gautt's strides reached beyond the football field

He played drums in the Douglass band. Studied hard and played drums and minded his own business.

When football coaches saw him in the hallway, saw the size of his body and the regalness of his character, they tried to entice him into shoulder pads. At first he said no.

But Prentice Gautt could not avoid his destiny. He eventually said yes to football. Yes to history.

Gautt died Thursday at the age of 67. A giant of Oklahoma sport. A giant of Oklahoma.

Not that he ever once acted like it.

"When you said the word 'Prentice,' the next word you said was 'humble,'" said Bill Hancock, who officed next to Gautt for 10 years in the old Big Eight Conference.

Gautt was our Jackie Robinson. He broke a barrier and changed a society. He did so not with fire but with elegance, not with venom but with eloquence. Pure class, that was Prentice Gautt. Pure class and a gentle spirit and a thirst for excellence.

Fifty years ago, a group of Oklahoma City black professionals carefully selected Gautt to integrate the Sooner football team. They believed, like Branch Rickey with Robinson, that the content of character was just as important as athletic ability in breaking OU's color line.

Gautt never stopped proving right those doctors and pharmacists.

"You can't find anyone to say anything bad about Prentice," said Charlie Greene, who had known Gautt since summer days in the 1950s. "He was an astute person. Always polite. Professional, even back then."

Gautt's contribution to Oklahoma is not small. He has membership in an exclusive club. Gautt changed our

He showed white Oklahomans that black players would only enhance, not harm, the Sooners' football tradition. Better yet, Gautt shined a path for young black boys, that the limits placed on their lives were not permanent.

The success of Gautt — a two-time All-Big Eight running back, 1958-59 — was a watershed moment for Oklahoma.

"Really, really important," said Russell Perry, who graduated a year behind Gautt at Douglass High School and now operates an OKC media company that includes the Black Chronicle newspaper.

"It changed so many other young African Americans. They stressed in school, you can do the same things as Prentice."

Just as black fans graced major league stadiums before Jackie Robinson, black Oklahomans watched the Sooners at Owen Field before 1957.



The Big 12 Conference family lost a dear friend and co-worker when Dr. Prentice Gautt passed away on March 17, 2005. Included on this page is a story that appeared in The Daily Oklahoman on his life.

"That was OU's prime,"
Perry said. "OU was at the apex. We saw them on television. We would even go down to some of their games."

But Oklahoma's black youths knew their place. In 1955, when Gautt was a senior tailback at Douglass and Perry a junior quarterback, both were old enough to remember the Johnny Bright incident.

In a 1951 game at Stillwater, Drake's Bright — the first black to play on Lewis Field — suffered a fractured jaw on a vicious elbow by Oklahoma A&M's Wilbanks Smith. Drake officials claimed the blow was intentional, and a series of Des Moines Register photos, which eventually won a Pulitzer Prize, seemed to support the charge.

"We were products of segregation," Perry said. But when Gautt went to OU and became a star, the stain started to fade.

"It was kind of a reprieve for the state of Oklahoma," Perry said.

The integration of OU football came more than a decade before Texas or Arkansas did likewise. By the time the Longhorns and Razorbacks fully opened their doors, the Sooners had a black captain and a black quarterback.

It is reasonable to think that had Gautt not been such an ambassador, such a delightful pioneer, the racial walls would have crumbled much more slowly. Reasonable to think that Gautt sped up the process that gave every boy in Oklahoma, regardless of color, a reason to dream.

Said Perry, "It changed all our hopes." And to think, the drummer boy wanted no part of football.

But legendary Douglass coach Moses Miller finally convinced Gautt to give the sport a try. Soon enough, Bud Wilkinson was convinced to give Gautt a scholarship after those black professionals paid for Gautt's first semester at OU. Eventually, a state became convinced that segregation was not the way to go.



ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

Performance in the classroom is just as important as accolades on the field when looking at the student-athlete. The Big 12 Conference recognizes student-athletes in four areas for academic achievement. Those areas include the Academic All-Big 12 Teams, Commissioner's Honor Roll, Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, and the Big 12 Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship.

ACADEMIC ALL-BIG 12 TEAMS

Recognizing those student-athletes who excel in the classroom and on the field and court, the Big 12 has academic all-conference teams for all sports.

Nominated by the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services and the Athletic Media Relations Directors, members of the all-academic teams have posted at least a 3.00 grade point average either cumulative or the previous two semesters and are regulars (i.e. letterwinners) on his or her respective team. First-team honorees are regulars who have at least a 3.20 GPA.

Last year, a few academic teams in the Big 12 exceeded 100 student-athletes recognized by the conference. In addition, student-athletes have gained recognition by being named to ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America teams.

COMMISSIONER'S HONOR ROLL

Acknowledging all participants, the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll is an inclusive honor for all sports sponsored by the membership of the league. The Honor Roll is recorded and released each semester and recognizes those student-athletes who registered a 3.0 or better grade point average the previous semester.

Submitted through the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services at each institution, those honored are not necessarily the stars on the field and court but those who participate on the team. They include the letterwinners and non-letterwinners and recognize every student-athlete who has excelled in the classroom.

More than 2,000 Big I2 student-athletes are named to the Commissioner's Honor Rolls at the end of each of semester.

PHILLIPS 66 CLASSROOM CHAMPION

As Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, the conference recognizes 30 student-athletes per school who have excelled on the court and in the classroom. Chosen through the Big 12 membership, those honored are recognized throughout the year on the Big 12 telecasts, FSN and ESPN Regional Television.

DR. PRENTICE GAUTT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

With 72 student-athletes from all Big 12 schools honored over the last three years, the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships' list has grown to 129 recipients since the 1996-97 academic year.

Additional funding prior to the 2002-03 selection process allowed each school to name two outstanding scholars to the annual list of honorees. Conference officers also voted to name the postgraduate scholarship program awards after longtime Big I 2 and Big Eight Conference Associate Commissioner and student services' pioneer Dr. Prentice Gautt in 2004. Dr. Gautt passed away on March 17, 2005.

The all-time group has solid representation of scholars throughout the 21 sponsored Big 12 sports and has provided just under \$700,000 through the 2004-05 academic year for much-needed financial aid. Three faculty representatives, one senior woman administrator and one director of athletics form the selection group for the prestigious awards, which help the youngsters to continue their formal education. Since its inception the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship program has produced over a dozen physicians, several attorneys for the underprivileged, college professors, Peace Corps volunteers and positions of national prominence.

Criteria for these awards include a cumulative grade point average of 3.500 on a 4.0 scale, participation in at least two years of intercollegiate athletics at the scholar-athlete's respective institution, and completion of athletics' eligibility. The scholar-athletes also must graduate from their respective member institutions within 15 months of their selection as postgraduate scholarship recipients and are expected to enroll in graduate/ professional schools within 15 months after they graduate.

The \$2,500 individual annual grants began in 1996-97, were raised to \$5,000 in 1999 and climbed to \$6,900 after the 2003-04 term. Most honorees in recent years have also been named to Academic All-Big 12 Conference teams as well as the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll.

LIFE SKILLS & SPECIAL OLYMPICS

BIG 12 CONFERENCE

Two key aspects in the "Total Person" education of Big 12 Conference studentathletes are the life skills programs and key assistance for Special Olympics.

Both areas have been integral parts of the Big 12 Conference mission since its inception and continue to be significant and were augmented in 1996 by Dr. Prentice Gautt, a trendsetter in college athletics, life skills, student services, and community action as well as the first African-American football student-athlete at the University of Oklahoma.

With the assistance of conference staff, directors of student services and other key agencies, this group of talented youngsters has provided feedback for Big 12 administrators. The Student-Athletes Advisory Committee has been proactive in promoting NCAA legislation, providing feedback to the Conference Office, and conference representatives in guidelines for Big 12 academic honor teams, the Commissioner's Honor Roll and other areas of recognition for classroom accomplishments.

Recent SAAC meetings also have included visits to children at area medical facilities as well as input for service projects for student-athletes throughout the league.

Besides such life skills' and athletics' areas as eligibility concerns, time spent between studies, events and practice sessions, placement in the business world, or graduate school opportunities, the program emphasizes "Stay in School" motivational speeches, anti-violence messages, anti-drug/addictive behavior, "YES," and other community-designed programs.

Both life skills and Special Olympics receive ample coverage in the Big 12 through such areas as the Community Champions Awards often featured on the Big 12 Showcase telecasts. They also are given pregame and halftime scoreboard recognition slots at all conference schools, scholarship programs, and a series of free clinics in such sports as youth football, soccer, volleyball, men's and women's basketball, softball and baseball, among others. A conference-wide printed and electronically-distributed newsletter for life skills also has been produced, and several schools promote similar publications or on-line information.

Special Olympics, the Big 12's charity of choice since May 1996, has held a special place in the hearts of many in the conference for years before the current association.

The Big 12 works closely with the statewide Special Olympics' organizations in Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas to coordinate projects, provide information, and invite Olympians to attend events such as media or fan appreciation days for various Big 12 sports.

For five decades current Big 12 members have provided facilities with a combined capacity of just over one million fans for Special Olympics' competition in the always-popular sports of track and field, softball, swimming and diving, weightlifting and wrestling. The national program, which was founded by members of the extended family of late President John F. Kennedy and which receives financial support from worldwide charitable sources, has earned the title "Most Credible Charity in America"

in a survey by Chronicle of Philanthropy and "Top Charity" among Time Magazine subscribers.

Specifically, some cooperative highlights of the Big 12 and Special Olympics have been public service announcements appearing on most league telecasts, donations to the charity by Big 12 student-athletes and fans, clinics with league coaches, student-athletes and interaction with the Olympians, and special seasonal camps in several sports. Both regionally and nationally, there has been Big 12 involvement in Special Olympics' meetings. Conference schools and the league office also have helped to arrange for Big 12 head coaches, student-athletes, and administrators to meet with their Special Olympics' counterparts. Many Big 12 school dignitaries also have devoted their talents to opening ceremonies and awards' events.

The chances to create dialogue, friendship and hugs among the Special Olympians and interested groups from Big 12 schools have brought both groups ample satisfaction.

BIG 12 CONFERENCE AWARDS

The Big 12 annually recognizes its top male and female athlete and sportsperson. The Athlete of the Year Awards are selected based on athletic performance, academic achievement and citizenship within the academic year of nomination. The Sportspersons of the Year Award was started prior to the 2000-01 academic year to recognize student-athletes who displayed an extraordinary degree of sportsmanship and/or community service from within the conference. Honorees are selected by a media panel.

In 2004-05, the Big 12 Athletes of the Year were Cat Osterman and Derrick Johnson. Both compete for the University of Texas. The Sportsperson of the Year winners were Richelle Simpson from Nebraska and Ahmard Hall from Texas.

Osterman, who will be a senior on the Texas softball squad this season, was named the USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year in 2005 for the second time (2003). Johnson completed his collegiate football career at UT in 2004. He was honored with the Nagurski Trophy as the nation's top defensive player and the Butkus Award as college football's top linebacker.





BIG 12 HAS MULTIPLE REPRESENTATIVES IN REGIONAL SEMIFINALS (AGAIN)

For the fourth straight season, the Big 12 had at least two teams in NCAA Regional Semifinals. Oklahoma State played Arizona in the Chicago Regional in 2005, while Texas Tech faced West Virginia in the Albuquerque Regional. The league is one of only three (Big East, ACC) that can boast the feat over the last four seasons.

BIG 12 LED NATION WITH SIX IN '05 DANCE

The Big I2 had six teams earn bids to the NCAA Championship in 2005, tied with the Big East for the most entries of any conference in the country. It is the fifth time in Big I2 history (2000, '01, '02, '03) that the league has placed six squads in the "Big Dance."

BIG 12 IS SWEET OVER THE PAST FOUR YEARS

Since the 2002 season, the Big 12 leads the nation in the number of regional semifinalists. The conference has had 12 squads qualify for the "Sweet 16" during that time.

SIXTEEN BIG 12 TEAMS EARN POSTSEASON BIDS

The success of the Big 12 wasn't limited to the men's side, as the conference also placed eight women's teams in postseason play. Six teams qualified for the NCAAs (including National Champion Baylor), while Nebraska and Texas A&M were chosen for the WNIT. The 16 total bids was second among all conferences in the country. In the first nine years of the Big 12, league men's and women's teams have combined to earn 134 postseason invitations (101 NCAA, 33 NIT).

KU RADIO LEGEND TAKES FAREWELL TOUR

Kansas Hall-of-Fame radio broadcaster Max Falkenstein has announced he will retire as color commentator on the Jayhawk radio networks after the last game of the 2005-06

season - his 60th covering KU athletics.

Falkenstein broadcast his first basketball game - an NCAA Tournament contest between Kansas and Oklahoma A&M - on March 18, 1946. He was play-by-play voice for KU for 39 years, before switching to color commentary in 1984. In addition to being honored by the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame, Falkenstein has also been recognized by the College Football Hall of Fame.



TAKE ME OUT TO THE BALL GAME!

Big 12 head coaches have made appearances in other places besides the hardwood - namely Wrigley Field in Chicago, home of the Cubs. This past season, Oklahoma State head coach Eddie Sutton sang "Take Me Out to the Ballgame" on


September 12 during the seventh-inning stretch of the Cubs' game against Cincinnati. He becomes the third active Big 12 head coach to lead the singing since broadcaster Harry Caray passed away. In addition to Sutton, KU's Bill Self and OU's Kelvin Sampson have tried their hand at the well-known baseball tradition.

PRESEASON MAGAZINES LIKE BIG 12

The preseason national magazines have begun to hit the newsstands and as usual, the Big 12 is receiving plenty of publicity.

Street & Smith's has three Big I2 teams in its top I2 nationally. Texas checks in at No. 5, followed by Oklahoma at No. 6. Iowa State earned a No. I2 preseason ranking. The three teams in the top I2 ties for the most of any conference in the country (Big East).

Athlon Magazine does not select a top 25 poll, but does have two conference teams in the final 16 of the NCAAs. Texas and Oklahoma were predicted to reach the regional semifinal round. In fact, Athlon has UT advancing all the way to the NCAA Championship game.





BY THE NUMBERS

- I Opponents that shot more than 48 percent from the field against Texas A&M last season. The Aggies finished tied for second in the Big 12 in field goal percentage defense, holding foes to 39.4 percent - a mark that was 17th nationally.
- 4 Consecutive 20-win seasons for Texas Tech under head coach Bob Knight. Prior to the current streak, the Red Raiders had posted eight 20-win campaigns in 76 years.
- 5 Categories in which Aaron Bruce of Baylor placed among the top 11 league statistical leaders. He was second in the Big 12 in scoring (18.2 ppg), third in free throw percentage (82.8) and field goals made (2.46), seventh in field goal percentage (47.1) and 11th in assists (3.75).
- **5** Wins by Iowa State over nationally-ranked opponents last season. The total was more than any other Big 12 squad.
- 5 Nebraska players who were named to the Academic All-Big 12 First Team a year ago, more than any team in the conference. Three of those players Jason Dourisseau, Bronsen Schliep and Tony Wilbrand are on the roster again in 2005-06.
- 6 The number of 20 win teams in the Big 12 last season, the sixth time in nine seasons the conference has had at least six 20-win squads. The most in one year is seven, posted during the 2002-03 season.
- 6 Games won by Oklahoma State at the Phillips 66 Big 12 Championship over the past two seasons. Prior to the current winning streak, the Cowboys had won six total games in the event over the first seven years of the conference.
- 9 Years in which Kansas has led the Big 12 in home attendance. The Jayhawks have ranked first in the league in the category every season since the conference was formed in 1996-97.
- 12 Double-doubles by Oklahoma's Taj Gray last season. The total was tied for second in the conference and is the most among returning players.
- 21 Rebounds by Brad Buckman of Texas at Colorado last season. The total was the most in the Big 12 in 2004-05. He also had 27 points, the seventh player in league history to post 20 or more points and rebounds in the same contest.
- 60 Number of games it took lowa State's Curtis Stinson to reach 1,000 career points. The junior guard was the third-fastest player in Cyclone history to reach the mark when he did so last season.
- 100 Percent of scoring that Colorado returns from last season. The Buffaloes are the only team in the Big 12 that returns all five starters.
- 116 Assists by Kansas State's Clent Stewart last season, a KSU freshman record. He finished with 4.00 per game, the best average by a Big 12 freshman and a mark that ranked eighth in the league overall.



BIG I2 ON THE AIRWAVES

Since the first year of the league, the Big 12 has always assured its teams of extensive national television coverage. This season, the Big 12 Conference continues its long-standing relationship with the ESPN family of networks, including ESPN, ESPN2, ESPN Regional and ABC.

In addition, Conference games are provided to CBS through the partnership with ESPN. The current Big 12 agreement runs through the 2007-08 academic year.

Several Big 12 contests will be shown on each network during the 2005-06 season. The following telecasts were known at press time.


PHILLIPS 66 BIG 12 CHAMPIONSHIP


















ARENA DRIVING DIRECTIONS



BAYLOR — Ferrell Center

From the North: Drive south on I-35, take the University Parks Drive exit and turn east (left) to the intersection of University Parks Drive and LaSalle Avenue.

From the South: Drive north on I-35, take the University Parks Drive exit and turn east (right) to the intersection of University Parks Drive and LaSalle Avenue.

From the West: Drive east on Hwy. 84 to Hwy. 6/Loop 340. Turn east (right) and take Hwy. 6/Loop 340 to I-35. Turn north (left) on I-35, take the University Parks Drive exit and turn east (right) to the intersection of University Parks Drive and LaSalle Avenue.

From the East: Drive west on Hwy. 84 to I-35. Turn south on I-35 (left), take the University Parks Drive exit and turn east (left) to the intersection of University Parks Drive and LaSalle Avenue.

From the Northwest: Take Hwy. 6 to I-35. Turn north (left), take the University Parks Drive exit and turn east (right) to the intersection of University Parks Drive and LaSalle Avenue.

From the Southwest: Take Hwy. 6 to Bus. 77 exit. Bus 77 become LaSalle Avenue and leads directly to the Ferrell Center.



COLORADO — Coors Events Center

Directions from Denver International Airport (DIA): Driving time between DIA and Boulder is approximately 60 to 90 minutes. Follow Peña Boulevard (10 miles) south to I-70, and exit onto I-70 west. Follow I-70 west to I-270

west. I-270 merges into U.S. 36 west and takes you west into Boulder (about 23 miles). Once you're in Boulder, take a left (west) on Colorado Avenue. Heading west on Colorado Avenue, take a left on Regent Drive (it is the first stop light west of U.S. 36 (28th Street). The Events Center will appear ahead to your left and there is meter parking along the street or in lot 436, (the metered parking lot is your second left after turning onto Regent Drive). Parking for basketball games is free in lot 436.

Directions from the Denver Area and South: To get to Boulder from the Denver area, go west on U.S. 36 (from I-25 or I-270). Once you're in Boulder from U.S. 36, take a left (west) on Colorado Avenue (first stop light). Heading west on Colorado Avenue, take a left on Regent Drive (it is the first stop light west of U.S. 36 (28th Street). The Events Center will appear ahead to your left.

Directions from the North: From the north, take U.S. 287 south to Highway I19 (Diagonal Highway). Highway I19 becomes Highway I57 (Foothills Parkway) just north of Boulder. Turn right (west) from Foothills Parkway onto Colorado Avenue. Once on Colorado Avenue, just past 28th Street (U.S. 36) campus is both to the left and straight ahead. Heading west on Colorado Avenue, take a left on Regent Drive (it is the first stop light west of U.S. 36 (28th Street). The Events Center will appear ahead to your left.

Directions from the West: Take I-70 east to U.S. 6. Go east on U.S. 6 to CO. 58. Turn right (east) on CO.58 to CO. 93. Make a left (north) onto CO. 93 towards Boulder. CO. 93 will turn into Broadway once in Boulder. Continue on Broadway west until you see the campus on your right. To get to Colorado Avenue from the west, turn right on Regent Drive off of Broadway. Follow Regent Drive until it dead ends, turn left (west) on Colorado Avenue. Heading west on Colorado Avenue, take a left on Regent Drive (it is the first stop light west of U.S. 36 (28th Street). The Events Center will appear ahead to your left.

IOWA STATE — Hilton Coliseum



From I-35 South: Once you get to Ames, turn off on the Highway 30 West exit (#111B). Follow Highway 30 West until the Elwood Drive/ISU Exit. Take the Exit and drive north (right) on Elwood Drive. To get to Hilton Coliseum, simply continue

OFFICIATING & TIEBREAKERS

Phillips 66 Big 12 Championship Tiebreaking Procedures

Seeding for the Championship will be based upon regular-season competition. The winner of the postseason basketball championship shall be declared the Big I2 automatic qualifier to the NCAA Championship. A team ineligible under NCAA or Big I2 rules for postseason competition shall not compete in the championship.

The four teams with the best records (based upon winning percentage) in 16 Conference games shall earn first-round byes. After the four teams have been awarded first-round byes and ranked as the No. I through No. 4 seeds, all remaining teams will be ranked in order No. 5 through No. 12 for seeding in the championship.

Tiebreakers - The first criteria in the breaking of ties in the standings shall be head-to-head competition of tied teams. The following procedure will be used to establish the championship seeds if ties exist. (For tiebreaking procedures teams will be grouped in two divisions based upon established guidelines. Colorado, lowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Missouri and Nebraska are in one division and Baylor, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas, Texas A&M and Texas Tech are in the other division.)

- (a) If two teams are tied and they are from different divisions, the winner of the game between the two tied teams shall be the higher seed.
- (b) If two teams are tied and they are from the same division, the team with an advantage in head-to-head competition shall be the higher seed.
- (c) If two teams remain tied, there will be a comparison of overall record against division teams only (10 divisional games).
- (d) If two teams remain tied, there will be a comparison of record against the highest ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the division and proceeding through in order of divisional record.
- (e) If two teams remain tied, there will be a *comparison of record against the highest ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the opposite division and proceeding through in order of divisional record.
- (f) If two teams remain tied, the higher seed will be chosen by draw.
- (g) If three or more teams are tied, ties among divisional opponents will be broken first by using steps (b) through (f) and the head-to-head results will be used to break ties between non-divisional teams. When three or more teams from the same division are tied step (b) will consist of a miniround robin among the tied teams. At any point during the process of breaking ties among three or more teams that the number of tied teams are reduced to two, head-to-head competition would be used as the primary tie-breaker, followed-by steps (c) through (f).

Note: When comparing against the "highest ranked team(s)" in either division, the comparison will be based upon how tied teams did against all teams in a given placement, rather than a team that wins a tiebreaker at another position. For example, if two teams are tied for fifth and two teams are tied for first, the head-to-head comparison would be how the fifth place teams did against the first place teams combined, and vice-versa.

Draw - In the event tiebreaking procedures are unsuccessful and a draw is necessary in determining seeding, the following procedure will be used:

- (a) The drawing will be conducted in public or with media attendance
- (b) Institutions involved in the drawing have the right to have a local representative in attendance at the drawing
- (c) A single slip of paper with names representing each of the tied institutions will be placed into a container and will be drawn in order of seeding from highest (#1) to lowest (#12)

DALE KELLEY Men's Basketball Coordinator of Officials

Dale Kelley serves the Big 12 Conference as Coordinator of Men's Basketball Officials with more than 22 years of officiating experience. He oversees the officials coalition formed by the Big 12 Conference, Conference USA, Sun Belt and Southland Conferences. He administers the selection and assignment of officials, while observing and evaluating referees.



As an on-court official, Kelley worked 14 years in the Southeastern Conference, including nine consecutive NCAA Tournaments and three Final Fours.

Outside his athletic involvement, he is owner of Kelley Enterprises Rental and Real Estate Firm in his hometown of Huntingdon, Tenn. He is also in his third four-year term as Mayor of Huntingdon.

Kelley attended Bethel College in McKenzie, Tenn. and was inducted into the Bethel College Hall of Fame in 1981. In 1985, he received Bethel College's outstanding Alumni Achievement Award.

Kelley and his wife Carlene have three children - Amanada, Meredith and Cliff - and four grandchildren.

2005-06 Men's Basketball Major Rules Changes

(Rule and page references are from the 2005 NCAA Rules Book.)

Rule 2-5 (Page 40) - Officials will be allowed to use the courtside television monitor to determine whether a foul committed near the expiration of time in the first half or second half (when it affects the outcome) occurred before the reading of 0:00 on the game clock.

Rule 2-5 (Page 40) - After using the official courtside television monitor to determine if a foul or try for goal occurred before the reading of 0.00 on the game clock, the official shall be permitted to put the exact time back on the clock when it is determined that time remained when the foul was committed or the ball passed through the net.

Rule 2-12.8, 4-17.5 (Pages 51,72) - Twenty seconds will be allowed to replace a disqualified player. The warning signal will be sounded five seconds before the expiration the time limit.

Rule 2-12.15, 2-5.3 (Pages 41, 52) - A courtside television monitor may be used when in the judgment of the official a timer's mistake has occurred. Such a mistake may be corrected only during the first dead ball and before the ball is touched inbounds after the game clock should have been started or stopped or once the ball is in play before the second live ball, is touched inbounds when the game clock should have been running.

Rule 2-13.6 and 7, 4-43, 9-6 (Pages 53, 84, 129) - Violations when the ball has been intentionally kicked will no longer result in the reset of the shot clock to either 30 seconds (women) or 35 seconds (men). When the violation occurs with 15 or fewer seconds remaining, the shot clock will be reset to 15 seconds. Otherwise, when the violation occurs with more than 15 seconds remaining, there shall be no reset of the shot clock.

Rule 3-5 (Page 62) - Head bands and wrist bands shall be uniform in color (similar to the dominant color of the game jersey) and logo on each player and for entire team. Only one logo, the team logo or the manufacturers' logo may be on the head bands and wrist bands.

Men's Experimental Rules - During certified games, exhibition games and scrimmages, the three-point line will be extended to 20 feet, 9 inches, the lane will be widened to 14 feet, and a 3 foot restricted-area arc.

COMMISSIONER KEVIN Weiberg



The 2005-06 athletic season marks the eighth year the Big 12 Conference has been led by Commissioner Kevin Weiberg. Under his direction the Big 12 has continued to be regarded as one of the nation's premier conferences, with an unwavering dedication to success both on and off the field.

Weiberg continues to play a prominent role nationally in collegiate athletics. He supported the academic reform effort that introduced Academic Progress Reports for NCAA member institutions and the approval of 12-game regular seasons in I-A football. He has also previously served a three-year term on the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee and completed a two-year tenure as chair of the Division I-A Collegiate Commissioners' Association.

This season marks his second and final as coordinator of the Bowl Championship Series. As BCS coordinator Weiberg

led the negotiation of a new four-year television contract with Fox Sports for the rights to Bowl Championship Series games, exclusive of the Rose Bowl, through the 2009 season. His term as coordinator has also seen the implementation of qualification standards for conferences, greater access for conferences and teams previously outside the system, renewed contracts with the BCS bowls, the realization of a simplified standings formula, the advent of a college football Top 25 poll, and introduction of transparency into the voting process.

This past spring he announced enhancements in regulatory spending by the Conference, introducing an expanded drug testing program to include a wider array of performance enhancing drugs; a three-year cycle of compliance audits by an outside firm of member institution's athletic departments; and a gambling awareness initiative.

Weiberg is working with the Conference's Board of Directors in establishing an economic development consortium to provide benefits to member institutions beyond intercollegiate athletics. He will also be focused on arranging the next round of bowl agreements for the league, future hosting sites for the Big 12 football, basketball and baseball championships, and television negotiations.

Since being named the second commissioner

in Big 12 history on October 8, 1998, and officially assuming the post December 4, 1998, a total of 21 NCAA championships have been won by conference teams with nearly 200 individual national titles to the league's credit. The conference has had an unprecedented eight men's and women's basketball teams advance to their respective Final Fours in the past four seasons, highlighted by Baylor's women's basketball National Championship in 2004-05. The Big 12 also has sent 10 teams to BCS bowls in the seven-year history of the system, with four appearances in the National Championship game since 2000. The league's success continued in 2004-05, with NCAA team championships in women's cross country, men's cross country, wrestling, women's basketball, women's outdoor track & field and baseball. In fact, Weiberg has seen at least one team win a national title every season since being named Commissioner.

During his tenure, the Big 12 has also implemented a firm fiscal policy and continues to explore avenues to expand revenues. For the 2004-05 fiscal year, the Big 12 distributed a record \$105.6 million to its member institutions. Since beginning operations nine years ago, the Conference has nearly doubled its first allocation of \$54 million established during its inaugural year.

In January, 2005, the Board of Directors announced the fouryear extension of Weiberg's contract through 2010, with a fouryear option to 2014.

Prior to joining the Big 12 Conference, Weiberg worked in conference operations for almost 10 years at the Big Ten Conference, beginning as Associate Commissioner/Chief Operations Officer before being promoted to Deputy Commissioner.

His professional career began with a 1979-80 post as Sports Information Director at Wayne State (Neb.) College. Weiberg moved to Wichita State University from 1980-87. He was Sports Information Director at WSU from 1980-83, Assistant Athletics Director for Marketing/Fund Raising from 1983-86, and became Associate Director of Athletics in 1986-87. Weiberg then served as Associate Director of Athletics at the University of Maryland from 1987-89.

The Anthony, Kan., native earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Education from Kansas State University in 1978 and Master of Science degree in Athletics Administration from Western Illinois University in 1979.

Born July 7, 1956, Weiberg is married to the former Susan K. Latta. The couple has three children - Erika (19), Jenna (16) and Garrett (14).
