The Big 12 Conference: Building the Tradition

As the Big 12 Conference approaches the end of its first decade of intercollegiate activity, dedication to several tenets of the finer points of athletics helps in the continued establishment of a strong tradition.

The Big 12 reached the 10-year mark of its founding—Feb. 25, 1994—in 2004 and celebrates student-athletes, top-flight competition, academic reform measures, scholarship, sportsmanship, and competitive success with equity as it comes closer to the 10th anniversary of intraconference activity on Aug. 31, 2006.

Baylor, Colorado, Iowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas, Texas A&M, and Texas Tech combined forces in '94 and formed the Big 12 Conference—a league covering seven states and encompassing over 40 million people (2000 U.S. census).

The conference pays particular attention to sportsmanship and a level field of play for the 4,500-plus student-athletes in 21 sports. Those competing and coaching in the Big 12 seek maximum training on the fields and courts as well as in the classroom and community.

Along with this competitive excellence, scholarship has been and continues to be a point of emphasis with the Big 12. There are 19 academic honor teams (first and second units), and the semiannual Commissioner's Honor Roll salutes student-athletes who have achieved 3.0 averages (4.0 grading scale) in the semester previous to the announcement. Annually, as many as 50-60 student-athletes from the league make these teams with perfect 4.0 grade point averages.

Each member institution also nominates a male or female student-athlete for one of the prestigious Big 12 Conference postgraduate scholarships at the end of the academic year. A total of 100-plus (105 in the first eight years of the program) aspiring scholars have received more than \$500,000 in postgraduate financial aid during the first eight years of the program.

Sportsmanship has been an item high on the Big 12 agenda since Commissioner Kevin L. Weiberg became the league's third chief executive in Dec., 1998. The Conference developed and has maintained a Sportsmanship Statement which applies

to all student-athletes, coaches and administrators throughout the league. The Big 12 also honors one male and female student-athlete each year as Big 12 Sportspersons of the Year.

The level playing field for participants in all Big 12 sports also figures into competitive equity. This does not deny the potential for national team or individual champions in any sport but seeks to provide an avenue in which up-and-coming student-athletes can display their top individual talents within the framework of Conference and NCAA sports' guidelines.

Big 12 schools and the Conference office seek to provide national-class facilities for all levels of league championships, postseason tournaments and NCAA venues. They utilize Big 12 campus sites as well as buildings such as Kansas City's Kemper Arena, Arrowhead Stadium and Municipal Auditorium, Houston's Reliant Stadium, San Antonio's Alamodome, St. Louis' Edward Jones Dome, Irving's Texas Stadium, Oklahoma City's SBC Bricktown Ballpark, The Ballpark in Arlington, Dallas' American Airlines Center, and Reunion Arena,



among others. The Conference also has agreements with eight bowl entities for 2004-05—the Bowl Championship Series, SBC Cotton, Pacific Life Holiday, MasterCard Alamo, Independence, EV1.net Houston, PlainsCapital Fort Worth, and Tangerine Bowls.

Not only has the Big 12 fostered a spirit of conviviality and excitement with newfound rivalries, but the Conference organization has given rise to several related, cooperative ventures—Big 12 cities, libraries, campus security organizations, Chambers of Commerce, tourism/visitors' bureaus, information exchanges, sports medicine associations, and campus public information offices, among others.

The solid athletics' traditions at the 12 schools are evident as student-athletes/alumni have claimed more than 900 NCAA crowns and over 170 national

team championships through September, 2004. Commissioner Weiberg, acting in accord with the Big 12 Board of Directors, first contracted most major championship sites and dates through the 2004-05 academic year in 1999. The Big 12 also completed the process of determining future championships' dates and sites through the 2006-07 term during the 2003-04 academic year.

The league office has negotiated critical media (television/radio/print) contracts and ongoing bowl agreements in recent months. Added in 2002-03 were agreements with TBS Superstation to carry Big 12 football games in prime time slots, with College Sports Television (CSTV) for more regional and national telecasts, and expanded video streaming opportunities for several Olympic sports within the league with FSN and FoxSports.com.

Almost six million fans who attended championships or tournaments in Big 12 postseason activity since 1996 can attest that they are viewing some of the nation's finest student-athletes, coaches and officials. Through television financial agreements, high levels of competition, postseason play, football bowl, and NCAA invitations, the Big 12 has distributed over \$550 million to its members since the 1996-97 fiscal year.

Commissioners of the conference have included Steve Hatchell from Mar., 1995-May, 1998, Dave Martin (interim) from May-Dec., 1998, and Kevin L. Weiberg from Dec., 1998-present.

Player & Rookie of the Week

Every Monday during the men's basketball season a panel of media will assist the Big 12 in the selection of the Phillips 66 Big 12 Player and Rookie of the Week. A rookie is a player that is in his first season in the Big 12 conference which includes true and redshirt freshmen and first-year transfers. The panel is selected by the men's basketball media relations directors of the Big 12. Phillips 66 is in its ninth year of sponsorship for the Big 12. It is also the title sponsor of the women's and men's Phillips 66 Big 12 Basketball Tournaments and the Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Tournament.

The Tournament Seeding Tiebreaker

The following is the procedure for breaking ties in seeding for the Phillips 66 Big 12 Basketball Tournaments (men's and women's). Tournament seeds are ranked 1-12 based on conference winning percentage.

The first criteria in the breaking of ties shall be head-to-head competition of tied teams. The following procedure will be used to establish the tournament seed if ties exist.

- (a) If two teams are tied and they are from different scheduling divisions, the winner of the game between the two tied teams shall be the higher seed.
- (b) If two tied teams are tied and they are from the same division, the team with an advantage in head-to-head competition shall be the higher seed.
- (c) If two teams remain tied, there will be a comparison of overall record against division teams only (10 divisional games).
- (d) If two teams remain tied, there will be a *comparison of record against the highest ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the division and proceeding through in order of divisional finish.
- (e) If two teams remain tied, there will be a *comparison of record against the highest ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the opposite division and proceeding through in order of divisional finish.
- (f) If two teams remain tied, the higher seed will be chosen by draw.
- (g) If three or more teams are tied, ties among divisional opponents will be broken by using steps (b) through (f) and the head-to-head results will be used to break ties between nondivisional teams. When three or more teams from the same division are tied step (b) will consist of a mini-round robin among those tied teams. At any point during the process of breaking ties among three or more teams that the number of tied teams are reduced to two, head-to-head competition would be used as the primary tiebreaker, followed by steps (c) through (f).

*Note: When comparing against the 'highest' ranked team(s)' in either division, the comparison will be based upon how tied teams did against all teams in a given placement, rather than a team that wins a tiebreaker at another position. For example, if two teams are tied for fifth and two teams are tied for first, the head-to-head comparison would be how the fifth place teams did against the first place teams combined, and vice versa.

Big 12 Looks to Continue Final Four Streak in 2004-05

Big 12 men's basketball enters its ninth season in 2004-05 on a high note after having teams in the past three consecutive Final Fours. Oklahoma State was the latest participant having reached the national semifinals in 2004. The Cowboys are the fifth Big 12 team to play in the Final Four and return four starters from last year's Big 12 regular season and tournament championship team.

The Final Four streak began in 2002 when Kansas and Oklahoma became the first Big 12 representatives in the Final Four. In 2003 Kansas made a repeat appearance along with Texas as the Big 12 had half the Final Four field two consecutive years. KU finished as runner-up in 2003.

The Big 12 sent a conference-record nine teams into 2004 postseason play with Iowa State making the NIT semifinals. The Cyclones are the second straight league team to make the NIT semifinals following Texas Tech in 2003.

All-Conference Selections Returning in 2004-05

Two first teamers and seven overall selections on the 2004 All-Big 12 first through third teams return in 2004-05. OSU's John Lucas, the Associated Press Big 12 Player of the Year and a first team all-conference selection, returns for his senior season along with Kansas senior Wayne Simien who was also an All-Big 12 first team honoree.

KU senior Keith Langford is the only All-Big 12 second team selection that's back. Four members of the third team return to the conference in KU senior Aaron Miles, Kansas State senior Jeremiah Massy, Oklahoma State senior Joey Graham and Iowa State freshman Curtis Stinson.

Simien, Lucas, Langford and Miles were selected All-Big 12 by both the coaches and AP. Massey and Graham were coaches' selections and Stinson was an AP honoree.

Graham (Coaches) and Massey (AP) were named 2004 Big 12 Newcomer of the Year and Stinson was the choice by both teams for 2004 Freshman of the Year.

Statistically Speaking

Eleven of the top 30 scorers and eight of the top 20 rebounders in Big 12 statistics return to the league this year.

Kansas' Wayne Simien is the conference's top returning scorer after finishing second in last year's scoring with 17.8 ppg. Iowa State's Curtis Stinson finished fifth in scoring as a rookie in 2004 with 16.2 ppg. Simien also leads the returning rebounders after placing second a year ago with 9.3 per outing. Statistics categories that return the most are assists (9), steals (8) and field goal percentage (6).

Gillispie Joins Big 12 Coaching Ranks

Billy Gillispie joins the Big 12 family as the new coach at Texas A&M. Gillispie compiled a 30-32 record in two seasons at UTEP, including going 24-8 in 2003-04 with an NCAA Tournament appearance.

Who's Back

Baylor brings back one returning starter and three lettermen to its 2004-05 squad in addition to welcoming seven newcomers. Junior center Tommy Swanson is the lone returning starter after averaging 6.4 ppg and 4.1 rpg. The Bears lost their top five scorers.

Colorado also returns one starter in junior guard Jayson Obazuaye who put up 5.3 ppg and 2.4 rpg last season. The Buffs lost their top four scorers but return five other lettermen in addition to Obazuaye and bring in seven newcomers.

Iowa State returns three starters, including Big 12 Freshman of the Year guard Curtis Stinson who led the squad in scoring with 16.2 ppg, good for fifth in the league. The Cyclones also welcome back senior center Jared Homan who led the team with 6.3 rpg in addition to 11.1 ppg and sophomore guard Will Blalock who averaged 7.5 ppg and 2.8 rpg along with six other lettermen.

Kansas has its top four scorers and top two rebounders back led by senior forward Wayne Simien who led the team in both categories with 17.8 ppg and 9.3 rpg. Other returning starters are senior guards Keith Langford and Aaron Miles and sophomore forward J.R. Giddens. Langford was second on the team in both scoring and rebounding with 15.5 ppg and 5.0 rpg. Giddens averaged 11.3 ppg and 3.6 rpg while Miles numbered 9.1 ppg and 3.8 rpg.

Kansas State returns it leading scorer and rebounder in senior forward Jeremiah Massey who contributed 14.7 ppg and 7.8 rpg. The Wildcats return one other starter in junior forward Marques Hayden with 8.0 ppg and 6.5 rpg in addition to eight additional lettermen.

Missouri brings back two starting guards in junior Jimmy McKinney and sophomore Thomas Gardner. McKinney averaged 9.4 ppg and 3.3 rpg and Gardner 6.1 ppg and 2.1 rpg. The Tigers also return sophomore forward/center Linas Kleiza who averaged a team-leading 8.4 rpg in addition to 11.1 ppg before suffering a season-ending injury.

Nebraska has three starters returning, including last year's leading rebounder senior forward John Turek with 5.9 per game in addition to finishing third on the team in scoring with 9.8 ppg. The other two returning starters are senior guards Jake Muhleisen who averaged 7.7 ppg and 3.3 rpg and Marcus Neal, Jr., with 5.3 ppg and 1.8 rpg.

Oklahoma welcomes back three starters, including junior forward Kevin Bookout who missed the last half of the season after undergoing shoulder surgery. He averaged 7.6 ppg and a team-high 5.5 rpg prior to the surgery. Sophomore starting guards Drew Lavender and Lawrence McKenzie are also back. Lavender was second on the team in scoring with 11.3 ppg while McKenzie put in 8.2 ppg.

Oklahoma State returns four starters from its

Final Four squad. Senior guard John Lucas was second on the team in scoring with 15.1 ppg and averaged a team-high 4.5 apg. Senior forwards Joey Graham and Ivan McFarlin were third and fourth on the team in scoring with 12.4 ppg and 12.2 ppg, respectively. McFarlin also averaged a team-high 6.7 rpg. Senior guard Daniel Bobik was fifth on the squad in scoring with 7.2 ppg and pulled down 3.1 rpg.

Texas returns three starters including leading rebounder sophomore forward P.J. Tucker with 6.8 per game to go along with 10.4 ppg, good for second on the team. Junior forward Brad Buckman averaged 5.7 ppg and 4.5 rpg while junior guard Kenton Paulino totaled 4.8 ppg and 1.8 apg.

New Texas A&M mentor Billy Gillispie has two starters returning from last year's squad, including leading scorer junior Antoine Wright. He averaged 13.5 ppg and contributed 4.1 rpg. Sophomore Acie Law is the other returning starter and averaged 7.5 ppg and 2.1 rpg.

Texas Tech welcomes back three starters, its second- third- and fourth-leading scorers from last season. Sophomore guard Jarrius Jackson was the second-leading scorer last year with 11.3 ppg, followed by senior guard Ronald Ross with 10.1 ppg and senior forward Devonne Giles with 8.9 ppg. Giles was the second-leading rebounder on the squad with 5.0 per contest.

Six Big 12 Players on Wooden Award Preseason All-America Team

Six Big 12 players are among the Top 50 candidates for the John R. Wooden Award All-American Team. Big 12 representatives are Kansas' Keith Langford and Wayne Simien, Oklahoma's Kevin Bookout, Oklahoma State's Joey Graham and John Lucas, and Texas' P.J. Tucker. The 10-

Recent Success Unmatched by Big 12 Teams in NCAA History

Two Big 12 teams represented half of the 2002 and 2003 Final Fours with Kansas and Oklahoma in 2002 and Kansas and Texas in 2003. The conference is a combined 37-16 (69.8 percent) in the past three NCAA tourneys, including 2004.

Seed Information Among Big 12 Teams

Though only four Big 12 teams were in the 2004 NCAA Tournament field, the average seed of league teams was the lowest in the eight-year history of the league. With Oklahoma State No. 2, Texas No. 3, Kansas No. 4, and Texas Tech No. 8, the average seed for the conference was 4.25 which is lower than the 4.33 set by 2002-03's six teams in the field. This marked the second straight year the league's average is in the 4.0 range with the previous low being 5.0 in 2000.

The Big 12 Conference was represented by 18 of its 24 men's and women's basketball teams in 2003-04 postseason tournaments. Four men's teams and seven women's teams competed in the NCAA Tournaments while five men's teams were in the NIT and two women's teams in the WNIT.

Big 12 Sent All-Time High Nine Teams Into Postseason

Four NCAA Tournament and five NIT participants gave the 2003-04 Big 12 men's basketball

season its all-time high for teams to qualify for postseason play. This season surpasses the 1999 and the 2003 seasons, which had eight participants each. On one end the four NCAA Tournament teams tie for the fewest of Big 12 teams in the field with 1998 while the five in the NIT are the most for the league, surpassing the three in 1999.

Hosting NCAA Tournament Play

The Big 12 Conference will play host to the 2005 NCAA Tournament First/Second Rounds at the

Ford Center in Oklahoma City. The event is already sold-out. Since the league began, either the conference office or a league institution has played host to the NCAA Tournament every year except 1999. That continues through the 2006 event when the league office and Texas host two sites.

11 Different Big 12 Teams Advance to Postseason Play

In eight seasons of men's basketball, there have been 11 different Big 12 teams advancing to postseason play. The conference has averaged 5.3 teams in the NCAA Tournament and 2.0 in the NIT. In 2002 Kansas and Oklahoma became the first Big 12 teams to reach the NCAA Tournament Final Four since the conference started in 1996-97. Kansas and Texas accomplished the same feat in 2002-03 with Kansas losing in the championship game. Kansas is the only team in the Big 12 to have participated in all eight NCAA tourneys during the league's tenure. Colorado, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma, and Oklahoma State have participated in both the NCAA Tournament and the NIT. Texas and Oklahoma have been in seven of eight NCAA tourneys and Iowa State in three since 1997. Baylor became the 10th league school by advancing to the NIT in 2001 and Texas Tech the 11th in the NCAA Tournament in 2002. The six Big 12 teams in the 2003 NCAA Tournament carried the highest seed average (4.3) until

2004 with a 4.2 average. The 2000 advancing NCAA teams is next with a combined 5.0 seed average.

Oklahoma State Wins Its First Big 12 Regular Season Title

Preseason No. 5 by the coaches and the media, Oklahoma State proved the critics wrong in posting a 14-2 record to win its first Big 12 regular season title. The regular season championship was the first league title for OSU since it tied Kansas for the 1991 Big Eight crown. The Cowboys finished two games ahead of runner-up Texas (12-4) and Kansas (12-4) to win their first outright conference season title since the 1965 Big Eight championship. This season marked the 17th overall conference crown for Oklahoma State. Cowboy senior Tony Allen garnered Big 12 Player of the Year honors by the conference coaches while junior teammate John Lucas was the Associated Press league player of the year.

Oklahoma State Wins First Phillips 66 Big 12 Tournament Title

Oklahoma State swept Iowa State (83-75), Texas Tech (82-77), and No. 11 Texas (65-49) to win its first Phillips 66 Big 12 Men's Basketball Tournament at the American Airlines Center in Dallas. For OSU it was its second tournament championship game appearance with the other in 1999 when it lost to Kansas. The 2004 crown also marked the fourth time in the eight-year history of the conference the No. 1 seed won the title -Kansas in 1997, Kansas in 1998, Iowa State in 2000, and Oklahoma State in 2004. Higher seeds prevailed in the event as there was only one lower seed to claim a win - No. 5 Texas Tech over No. 4 Colorado 79-69. Oklahoma State senior Tony Allen was named most outstanding player of the event. Joining him on the all-tournament team were Kansas junior Wayne Simien, Texas senior Brandon Mouton, and the Oklahoma State duo of juniors Joey Graham and John Lucas.

Big 12 Men's Basketball Notes

- Big 12 Conference teams have the most wins in NCAA tournament activity of any conference nationally with 37 (37-16) since the 2002 postseason.
- Big 12 seedings in the NCAA tourney have grown "better" as the league has matured. In 1999, for example, the highest seed was No. 6 Kansas, and the Big 12 average seed was 8.6. That standard has continued to improve annually since 2001 with average seedings of 6.0 in 2001, 5.7 in 2002, 4.33 in 2003, and 4.25 in 2004.
- The conference has featured eight teams with Nos. 1 or 2 seeds in the first eight years of its NCAA participation.
- Big 12 No. 1 men's seeds have included Kansas in 1997, 1998 and 2002, Oklahoma in 2003, and Texas in '03. No. 2 NCAA seeds have been Iowa State in 2000 and 2001, Oklahoma in 2002, and Oklahoma State (a Final Four participant) in 2004.
- In 2004 the Big 12 sent a record nine teams (four NCAA, five NIT) to postseason play. The previous highs were eight in both 1999 and 2003. The five NIT teams surpassed the circuit record of three NIT invitees in '99.
- Schools from the Big 12 have made 34 Final Four appearances, and 15 of those teams advanced to the national title contest. Since 1988 there have been nine appearances by Big 12 teams, including Kansas' 83-79 victory over Oklahoma in the '88 finals at Kansas City.
- Since 1992 an average of almost eight schools from the Big 12 has advanced on an annual basis to postseason activity. The highs have been nine in 1992 and '95 in combinations of the Big Eight and Southwest Conferences and the Big 12-most nine entries in 2004 tournaments.
- Eleven different Big 12 teams have advanced to post-scheduled play tournaments since 1997. Colorado, Iowa State, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma, and Oklahoma State all have participated in both NCAA and NIT action during the eight-year span.
- Nebraska became the third Big 12 member to win the NIT in 1996. Previously, Colorado in 1940 and Texas in 1978 captured the trophy at Madison Square Garden in New York.
- Nine of the Big 12 members have been represented in the last nine final Associated Press national polls. They include Colorado, Iowa State,

- Kansas has made 10 appearances in the Top 10 of the AP polls over the last 13 seasons (1991-2004).
- Big 12 schools have finished among the Top 10 in 13 of the last 14 AP surveys. Oklahoma State, the 2004 Big 12 champ, was No. 4 in the final AP poll last March.
- Six Big 12 teams made it into at least five AP or USA TODAY/ESPN national polls in 2003-04. Kansas (highest ranking of No. 1), Missouri (best rating of No. 3), Oklahoma (top placement of No. 6), Oklahoma State (ranked as high as No. 4), Texas (as high as No. 6), and Texas Tech (best rating of No. 13) helped give the conference a total of 42 national Top 10 rankings over 18 composite weeks in both surveys.
- Since 1996-97 there have seven consensus All-America basketball standouts from the Big 12.
- There have been four Associated Press Coaches of the Year from Big 12 schools since 1992—Iowa State's Larry Eustachy in 2000, Kelvin

Sampson of Oklahoma in 1995, Norm Stewart of Missouri in 1994, and Roy Williams of Kansas in 1992.

- Former Kansas head coaches Larry Brown (head coach) and Roy Williams (assistant) both were on the staff of the 2004 United States men's Olympic basketball team.
- Big 12 teams have competed five times in the three most recent Final Fours. That included Kansas and Oklahoma in 2002, Kansas and Texas in '03, and Oklahoma State last year.
- Teams from the Big 12 posted the highest conference win percentage of the 2004 tournament (.714) with a 10-4 record among the four entries. The Big East was next at .706 and a 12-5 mark.
- Big 12 squads started 2004 postseason action with seven wins in their first nine NIT and NCAA encounters.
- The Big 12 had five teams ranked in the same Associated Press poll during seven different weeks in 2003-04.
- Oklahoma State became the fourth different Big 12 school to capture the men's basketball title in 2003-04. Previous winners were Kansas (1997,
 - '98, '02, '03), Iowa State (2000 and '01), and Texas (1999).
 - Big 12 head coaches have combined for 3,514 victories over a total of 178 seasons.

2004-05 NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Rules Changes/ Points of Emphasis/Experimental Rules

Note: Rule sections and articles references apply to last year's rules book:

Old Rule 2-5.2

Rules change recommended: For games with a courtside television monitor and a 10th-of-a-second game clock, when officials are required by Rule 2-5.2 to view the monitor before making a final ruling, the determining factor as to whether the ball was released before time expired shall be when the game clock shows 0.00, provided that the game clock is visible on the monitor. When the game clock shows 0.00 before the shot leaves the shooter's hand, the period has ended and the shot shall not count. When the clock is not visible, the red or LED light shall be the determining factor, then the sounding of the horn. If definitive information is not available from the monitor, the original ruling that was based on a call using the red or LED lights and then the sounding of the horn shall stand.

Rationale: This clarifies game-ending situations. Using the reading of 0.00, which indicates that the game has ended, factors out the time lag that occurs when this reading sends an impulse that triggers the mechanisms in the light and the horn.

Old Rules 2-12.12, 5.7

For game- or period-ending last-second shots, the red light or LED lights (one of which is required for Division I), when present, shall be used as the indicator for the expiration of playing time. This signal shall terminate player activity. The sounding of the horn shall be used as a backup or when the red or LED lights are not available in Division II or III. Rationale: Using the red light provides a consistent measure that terminates player activity.

Old Rule 2-5.1

Officials will be permitted to use a courtside television monitor when there is uncertainty as to who should shoot an awarded free throw.

Rationale: To get the call correct in these rare situations. Since the ball is already dead, minimal time will be added to the game.

Old Rule 10-3.15

A player who steps out of bounds of his own volition and then becomes the first person to touch the ball after returning to the court shall be charged with a violation rather than an indirect technical foul.

Rationale: This places a more consistent penalty of the offended team being awarded a throw-in rather than free throws for this rules infraction.

New definition for Rule 4-42

The following definition shall be added: A jump stop is executed when a player catches the ball while moving or dribbling with ...

- 1. One foot on the playing court, jumps off that foot and lands simultaneously on both feet (no pivot foot).
- 2. Two feet off the playing court, lands on one foot, jumps off that foot and lands simultaneously on both feet (no pivot foot).

A jump stop may also be executed when the dribbler has one foot on the playing court, initiates a jump off that foot, ends the dribble with both feet off the playing court and lands simultaneously on both feet (either foot can be established as the pivot foot).

Rationale: Adds clarity to a commonly misunderstood term.

New definition for Rule 4-33

The following definition for guarding shall be added: Guarding shall be the act of legally placing the body in the path of an offensive opponent. The guarding position shall be initially established and then maintained in bounds on the playing court.

To maintain a legal guarding position after the initial position has been attained, the guard ...

- 1. is not required to continue having the torso face the opponent.
- 2. is required to have either one foot or both feet on the playing court.
- 3. may shift to maintain guarding position in the path of the dribbler, provided that the guard does not charge into the dribbler or otherwise cause contact as in Rules 2-21.2 and 10-21.3.
- 4. may move laterally or obliquely to maintain position provided such a move is not toward the opponent when contact occurs.
- 5. may raise the hands or may jump within his or her own vertical plane.
- 6. may turn or duck to absorb shock when contact by the dribbler is imminent. In such a case, the dribbler shall not be absolved from the responsibility of the contact. Rationale: The current rule does not describe how a player may maintain guarding position. The definition provides clarity.

Equipment Rules Supplement

Change the dates for compliance with Division I men's ring-testing requirement from "once before the season and once before the postseason" to "once after July 1 and, if postseason games are being held at a site, once after March 1 but before any initial postseason game." Division I coaches would be required to sign off that this has happened on the form that tracks viewing of the required video clinic and game management would be required to certify with conference offices that testing has occurred. Rationale: To better track compliance with the Division I men's ring-testing requirement, which was approved last year and becomes effective in 2004-05.

Old Rule 2-13.7.e

For all double fouls, return ball to the team that had control at the time of the fouls at a designated spot without a reset of the shot clock. Rationale: This administers all double personal fouls in a consistent manner because of the inclusion of double flagrant personal fouls and double intentional personal fouls.

Old Rule 5-6.1

For men's NCAA championship tournament games, halftimes may be extended to 20 minutes in length for first- and second-round games and for all regional games. Rationale: Previous rule permitted this only for regional finals and Final Four games. The change would allow consistency for the participants.

Old Rule 5-7

Free-throw lane space marks and blocks and coaching box lines do not have to be a contrasting color of any other lines on the court as required previously. Rationale: Allows schools more flexibility when painting courts.

Old Rule 5-10.6

In games involving electronic media, when a foul is committed that causes the ball to become dead at one of the specified times marks on the game clock for an electronic-media timeout, that electronic-media timeout shall be taken, then the free throw(s) shall be taken after

that electronic-media timeout. Rationale: Allows for better flow by requiring electronic media to use their timeouts at the specified marks and preventing timeouts from being used in close proximity of each other

MEN'S EXPERIMENTAL RULES

Court Diagram

Move the three-point line back 9 inches to 20'6" and employ an "experimental lane," which would be $1\frac{1}{2}$ feet wider on either side, but angled after the end space to preserve the current 12-foot width at the free-throw line (elbow) and not allow players in the first two lane spaces on each side of the lane to stand on the 12-inch neutral zone or block. This rule must be used in all certified games occurring before January 1 and could be used in any exhibition games occurring before January 1 for Division I, II and III.

Rationale: Rules questionnaire results show a trend of growing support for widening the lane in some fashion and extending the three-point line. This experiment allows for game experience using dimensions that may be best suited for the collegiate men's game.

Court Diagram

Employ an arc on the court underneath the basket a length of 2 feet from the center of the ring. An offensive player should not be charged with an offensive foul when a defensive player has established position with one foot inside the restraining arc near the basket unless the defensive player is making a legitimate attempt to play defense and not attempting to draw a charge. This rule must be used in all certified games occurring before January 1 in Divisions I, II and III.

Rationale: The arc may give the officials a clear point of reference to assist with such calls. This experimental rule would have to be used in all certified games occurring before January 1 and could be used in any exhibition games occurring before January 1.

MEN'S POINTS OF EMPHASIS

Bench decorum. Acceptable forms of behavior for coaches and other bench personnel is again a point of emphasis with particular attention to the use of profanity.

Old Rule 10-3.11

Hanging on Ring. Players should not be permitted to hang on the basket ring in an excessive or emphatic manner during dunks when there is no possibility of a resulting injury occurring.

Old Rule 4-64

Palming or Carrying the Ball. This places the defender at a distinct disadvantage and gives the dribbler a sizable advantage, which is not within the spirit and intent of the rules and shall be enforced.

Old Rule 4-26

Rough Play. Enforcement of rough play and illegal contact in offensive and defensive low-post play with an without the ball, hand- and body checking
