Big 12 Players of the Week

A Big 12 Offensive, Defensive and Special Teams Player of the Week will be chosen each Monday, beginning September 1. Nominations are submitted by the school sports information offices and the winners are selected by a panel of media voters who cover the league on a regular basis.

For the second season, the Big 12 Conference will provide an online video highlight service. Highlights from each Big 12 school will be available for download shortly after each week's games, as well as pre-bowl season highlight packages. This service replaced the weekly satellite feeds provided prior to 2007. Additional information will be distributed prior to football season.

Dr Pepper Big 12 Championship on XM

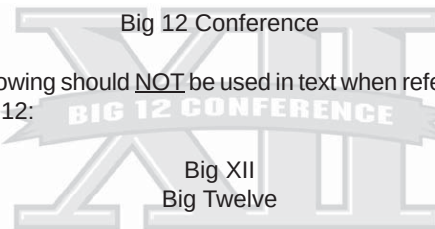

Postseason Awards

The Big 12 presents the official all-conference awards at the end of the regular season. A Player, Newcomer and Freshman of the Year on offense and defense are chosen in addition to a Special Teams Player and Linemen of the Year. The Coach of the Year along with All-Big 12 First, Second and Honorable Mention teams are selected as well. Each Big 12 head coach votes on the squads and are not permitted to vote for their own players. The awards will be announced the week prior to the Dr Pepper Big 12 Championship Game.

Academic All-Big 12 teams are also chosen in football and will be announced prior to the football championship game. Further information on academic honors presented by the conference is available on page 8.

BIG 12 CONFERENCE - OUTSTANDING SUCCESS



The Big 12 Conference has established a consistent level of national success on the field and in the classroom as it enters its 13th season in 2008-09.

Since it began play in 1996-97, the Conference can boast of 31 team crowns and over 385 individual NCAA Championships. The success continued during 2007-08 as Kansas captured the Big 12's first national title in men's basketball, while the league added 31 individual crowns.

Over the past four seasons a total of 12 NCAA trophies have been hoisted by Big 12 institutions, with at least one national crown won in all but one year for the Conference, including each of the past 11 seasons.

The Big 12 leads all conferences with five appearances in Bowl Championship Series title games. League squads have played for the football national championship five times in the last nine years with berths in 14 BCS games overall, including two in 2007. The Big 12 led all conferences with four teams ranked in the Top 10 in the final national polls a season ago. In addition, an all-time high eight league players earned consensus All-America recognition in 2007, more than any other conference.

In basketball, nine men's and women's teams have advanced to their respective Final Fours in the past seven seasons as the Big 12 continues its place among the elite intercollegiate athletic conferences. The six men's Final Four participants since 2002 is more than any conference. Numerous national honors have been won by basketball student-athletes during the league's history, with Michael Beasley (Kansas State), D.J. Augustin (Texas) and Courtney Paris (Oklahoma) the most recent to garner accolades as consensus All-America in 2007-08.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

Big 12 student-athletes also do well in garnering national academic recognition. Sarah Pavan (Nebraska) was named Academic All-America of the Year in volleyball the past two seasons by ESPN The Magazine and College Sports Information Directors of America with a 4.0 grade-point average in Biochemistry. She also won the national academic honor presented for all sports in 2006-07 and was named recipient of the prestigious 2006-07 Honda-Broderick Award as Collegiate Woman Athlete of the Year. She is the first athlete since the Big 12 was formed to earn the accolade. In addition to his athletic accomplishments, Augustin was an Academic All-America First Team choice. In its history, the conference has totaled over 300 academic honorees, averaging more than 25 each season.

The Big 12 is proud of other stories that combine on and off the field success. Patience Knight (Texas Tech) was the recipient of the Honda Inspiration Award in 2008, given to an outstanding female college athlete who overcomes adversity to excel in her sport. She was diagnosed with a cancerous tumor in 2007, but rebounded to win All-America honors at the 2008 NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships.

Competitive excellence, scholarship and sportsmanship are all equal components of the Big 12 philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and Academic All-Big 12 squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons.

At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsman of the Year awards.

Institutions can also nominate student-athletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships at the end of each academic year. A total of 201 scholars have received over \$1.2 million in postgraduate financial aid through the first 12 years of the program.

The Big 12 sponsors 21 sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The conference is made up of 12 institutions that have shared many traditional rivalries throughout their histories. Member schools include - Baylor University, University of Colorado, Iowa State University, University of Kansas, Kansas State University, University of Missouri, University of Nebraska, University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma State University, University of Texas, Texas A&M University and Texas Tech University.

The institutions created a league that encompasses seven states, over 45 million people and television households in 18 of the top 100 markets within its geographic footprint.

The conference conducts championships for 20 of its 21 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition. The winner of the Big 12 football championship game earns the league's berth into the prestigious Bowl Championship Series.

In the last several years the Big 12 has increased its bowl agreements and expanded television opportunities for all sports through contracts with ABC/ESPN, FSN and CBS College Sports. Most recently, the league renewed and expanded its multi-year arrangement with ABC/ESPN, Inc. The new contract begins in 2008-09.

In its first 12 years, the Conference has distributed more than \$1 billion to its 12 member institutions.

The Big 12 staff administers to over 4,600 student-athletes in 21 sports. The conference is headquartered in Irving, Texas.

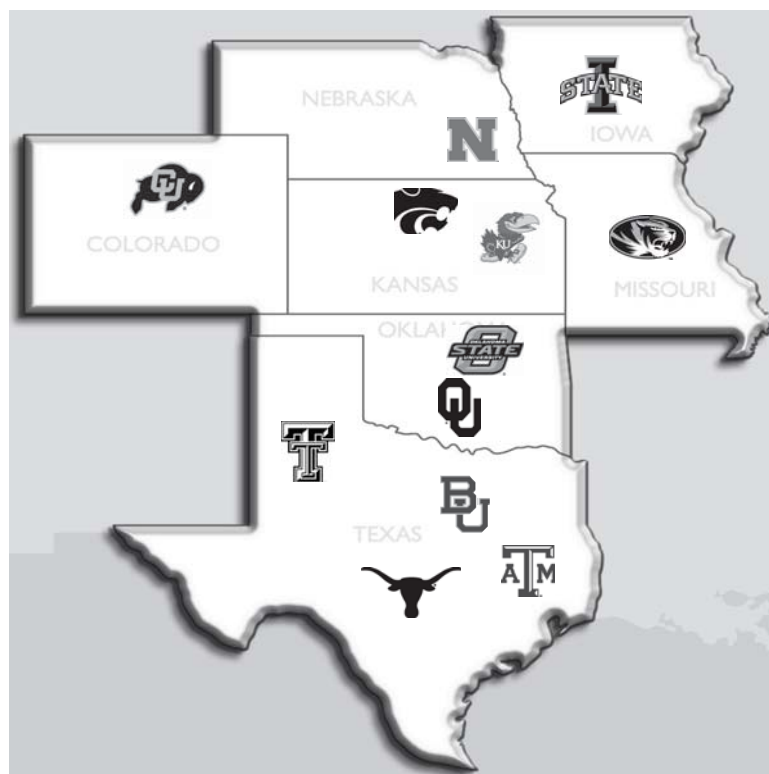

BIG 12 & THE SPECIAL OLYMPICS

The Big 12 recently announced plans to enhance its partnership with the Special Olympics organizations in each of the seven conference member states. The partnership currently includes:

- Sports clinics for Special Olympics athletes and coaches in conjunction with various Big 12 Championships
- Sport demonstrations during Big 12 events
- Public service announcements
- Inclusion in various Big 12 publications and an active interaction with the institutions' Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC)

In the coming years, the conference will focus on providing additional activities, events and exposure opportunities. The league will focus on building a stronger relationship between Special Olympics and the SAAC with internship opportunities for Big 12 student-athletes at the various Special Olympics state offices.

Throughout the seven conference member states, more than 73,000 athletes participate in a total of 28 Special Olympics sports ranging from track and field to power lifting to team handball.

Special Olympics provide year-round sports training and competition for children and adults with intellectual disabilities. Through sports, Special Olympics' athletes have opportunities to develop physical fitness, demonstrate courage, learn new skills, gain self-confidence, set goals and reach expectations.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

Performance in the classroom is just as important as accolades on the field when looking at the student-athlete. The Big 12 Conference recognizes student-athletes in four areas for academic achievement. Those areas include the Commissioner's Honor Roll, Academic All-Big 12 teams, the Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, and the Big 12 Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship.

COMMISSIONER'S HONOR ROLL

Acknowledging all participants, the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll is an inclusive honor for all sports sponsored by the membership of the league. The Honor Roll is recorded and released each semester and recognizes those student-athletes who registered a 3.0 or better grade point average the previous semester.

Submitted through the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services at each institution, those honored are not necessarily the stars on the field and court but those who participate on the team. They include the letterwinners and non-letterwinners and recognize every student-athlete who has excelled in the classroom.

More than 2,000 Big 12 student-athletes are named to the Commissioner's Honor Rolls at the end of each of semester.

ACADEMIC ALL-BIG 12 TEAMS

Recognizing those student-athletes who excel in the classroom and on the field and court, the Big 12 has academic all-conference teams for all sports.

Nominated by the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services and the Athletic Media Relations Directors, members of the all-academic teams have posted at least a 3.00 grade point average either cumulative or the previous two semesters and are regulars (i.e. letterwinners) on his or her respective team. First-team honorees are regulars who have at least a 3.20 GPA.

Last year, a few academic teams in the Big 12 exceeded 100 student-athletes recognized by the conference. In addition, student-athletes have gained recognition by being named to ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America teams.

PHILLIPS 66 CLASSROOM CHAMPIONS

As Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, the conference recognizes 30 student-athletes per school who have excelled in competition and in the classroom. Chosen through the Big 12 membership, those honored are recognized throughout the year on the Big 12 telecasts, FSN and ESPN Regional Television.

DR. PRENTICE GAUTT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

With 120 student-athletes from all Big 12 schools honored over the last five years, the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships' list has grown to 201 recipients since the 1996-97 academic year.

Additional funding prior to the 2002-03 selection process allowed each school to name two outstanding scholars to the annual list of honorees. Conference officers also voted to name the postgraduate scholarship program awards after longtime Big 12 and Big Eight Conference Associate Commissioner and student services' pioneer Dr. Prentice Gautt in 2004. Dr. Gautt passed away on March 17, 2005.

The all-time group has solid representation of scholars throughout the 21 sponsored Big 12 sports and has provided \$1,205,600 through the 2007-08 academic year for much-needed financial aid. Three faculty representatives, one senior woman administrator and one director of athletics form the selection group for the prestigious awards, which help the students to continue their formal education. Since its inception the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship program has produced over a dozen physicians, several attorneys for the underprivileged, college professors, Peace Corps volunteers and positions of national prominence.

Criteria for these awards include a cumulative grade point average of 3.500 on a 4.0 scale, participation in at least two years of intercollegiate athletics at the scholar-athlete's respective institution, and completion of athletics' eligibility. The scholar-athletes also must graduate from their respective member institutions within 15 months of their selection as postgraduate scholarship recipients and are expected to enroll in graduate/professional schools within 15 months after they graduate.

The \$2,500 individual annual grants began in 1996-97, were raised to \$5,000 in 1999 and increased to \$6,900 prior to the 2003-04 term. In 2006-07, the awards climbed to \$7,500. Most honorees in recent years have also been named to Academic All-Big 12 Conference teams as well as the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll.

ATHLETES OF THE YEAR

The Big 12 has annually recognized its top male and female athletes of the year since the inception of the conference. The Athlete of the Year Awards are selected by a media panel based on athletic performance, academic achievement and citizenship within the academic year of nomination. In 2007-08, the winners were Sarah Pavan (Nebraska volleyball) and Chase Daniel (Missouri football).

Pavan, honored for the second consecutive year, is the most decorated volleyball student-athlete in Big 12 history. For the 2007 season she was named Volleyball Magazine National Player of the Year, AVCA First Team All-America and Big 12 Player of the Year. The senior right side

hitter led Nebraska to its fourth-straight Big 12 title with a 19-1 league record and a 30-2 overall mark with a trip to the NCAA Regional final, where she was named to the all-tournament team. Pavan holds Nebraska school records for most career kills (2,008) and kills per game (4.56). Her other career honors include the 2006-07 Honda-Broderick Cup winner and AVCA National Player of the Year. She is among only four volleyball players in NCAA history who were named to the AVCA All-America First Team four times. The three-time Big 12 Player of the Year guided the Huskers to a 126-7 record over her career with two NCAA finals appearances and the 2006 national title.

In addition to her athletic accomplishments, the Kitchener, Ontario, Canada, native graduated in May with a 4.00 grade point average in biochemistry. She was selected a 2008 NCAA Today's Top VIII Recipient and was awarded a 2008 NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship. Pavan was named *ESPN The Magazine's* Volleyball Academic All-American of the Year in 2006 and 2007 and was the winner across all University division sports for the 2006-07 season. She was a three-time Academic All-Big 12 First Team selection (freshmen not eligible for the award).

Pavan was also active in community service projects during her career including spokesperson for the Lincoln Downs Syndrome Buddy Walk, SafeQuarters to Benefit Friendship Home volunteer and motivational speaker for the "School is Cool" Celebration program.

Daniel finished fourth in the Heisman Trophy balloting in 2007 while leading Missouri to a share of its first Big 12 North division title and its first appearance in the Dr Pepper Big 12 Football Championship Game. The junior quarterback was a finalist for the O'Brien, Walter Camp and Manning awards. He was named Second Team All-America by the Associated Press, Walter Camp and *Sporting News*. Daniel was an All-Big 12 First Team selection and named the Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year as

Mizzou won a school-record 12 games and was ranked No. 4 in the final Associated Press poll. He threw for a MU-record 4,306 yards and 33 touchdowns while finishing the season seventh in the nation in total offense (325.6 ypg) and 15th in pass efficiency (147.89).

The Southlake, Texas, native also excelled in the classroom and in the community. He was named 2007 Academic All-District First Team, Academic All-Big 12 First Team and to the Dean's List. Daniel directed a spring youth football camp for the Boys/Girls Club of Columbia and volunteers for the Lunch-In-The Park program, which is an after-school program that provides kids with a safe place to play and allows them to interact with positive role models. He also assists with the Central Missouri Food Bank & Big Brothers/Big Sisters.

SPORTSPERSON OF THE YEAR

The Sportspersons of the Year Award was started prior to 2000-01 to annually recognize student-athletes who displayed an extraordinary degree of sportsmanship and/or community service during the academic year. The awards are selected by a media panel. The 2007-08 honorees were Katie Martincich (Kansas volleyball) and Mamadou Diene (Baylor men's basketball).

Martincich has been involved in KU student-athletes' community outreach projects in her three years on campus including Habitat for Humanity, the Susan G. Komen Foundation and National Girls and Women in Sports Field Day celebration. She also assisted with providing and wrapping gifts for underprivileged children at Christmas.

The Shawnee, Kan., native was elected by her peers to be a member of the Jayhawk Executive Board. After learning of the Big 12's initiative to grow its relationship with Special Olympics, Martincich organized a meeting with fellow student-athletes and Chris Hahn, the CEO of Special Olympics Kansas. This resulted in the inaugural Jayhawk SAAC sponsored Special Olympics Bowling Challenge, held on May 4 in Lawrence. Martincich met with the owners of a local bowling alley and convinced them to donate use of the entire facility and game room for the event. More than 100 Special Olympians and 100 KU student-athletes participated.

Since his arrival from the Senegal, Mamadou has been active in the Baylor community participating in service projects such as the Waco Independent School District's Raise Your Game, South Bosque Elementary School and the Hillcrest Professional School Health Fair. He is a member of BU's Student-Athlete Advisory Council, has been selected as the 2008 Wilma Rudolph Award winner and participated in the 2006 NCAA Leadership Conference in Orlando, Fla.

To help minimize his expenses, the 7-0 center does not own a car or cell phone so that he can send money back to the Senegal to help support his family. Both of his parents died prior to his 14th birthday, leaving his older sisters to raise him. He is the first member of his family to attend a university and is on track to graduate in August, just 3.5 years after arriving at Baylor.

DR PEPPER BIG 12 CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The winners of the North and South Divisions of the Big 12 Conference will meet in Kansas City's Arrowhead Stadium to compete for the league championship and right to represent the Big 12 in the prestigious Bowl Championship Series (BCS).

The 13th annual title game is scheduled for Saturday, December 6 and will be nationally-televised by ABC Sports at 7 p.m. (CST). It will also be broadcast by XM Satellite Radio. Arrowhead Stadium will host the game for the fifth time (2000, 2003, 2004, 2006). The South representative will be the home team this year and utilize the sideline on the press box side of the field.

Previous years have produced some memorable upsets which have affected the college football landscape around the country. In four of the previous 12 championships, a team that would have qualified for the national championship game has been knocked out by a loss in the Big 12 Championship (1996 - unranked Texas def. #3 Nebraska; 1998 - #10 Texas A&M def. #1 Kansas State; 2001 - #10 Colorado def. #3 Texas; 2007 - #9 Oklahoma def. #1 Missouri).



Since the first season of Big 12 play in 1996, the league has sponsored a championship game. Per NCAA guidelines, a conference with 12 members may play a 13th football game to determine a champion, provided the regular season is played in divisions.

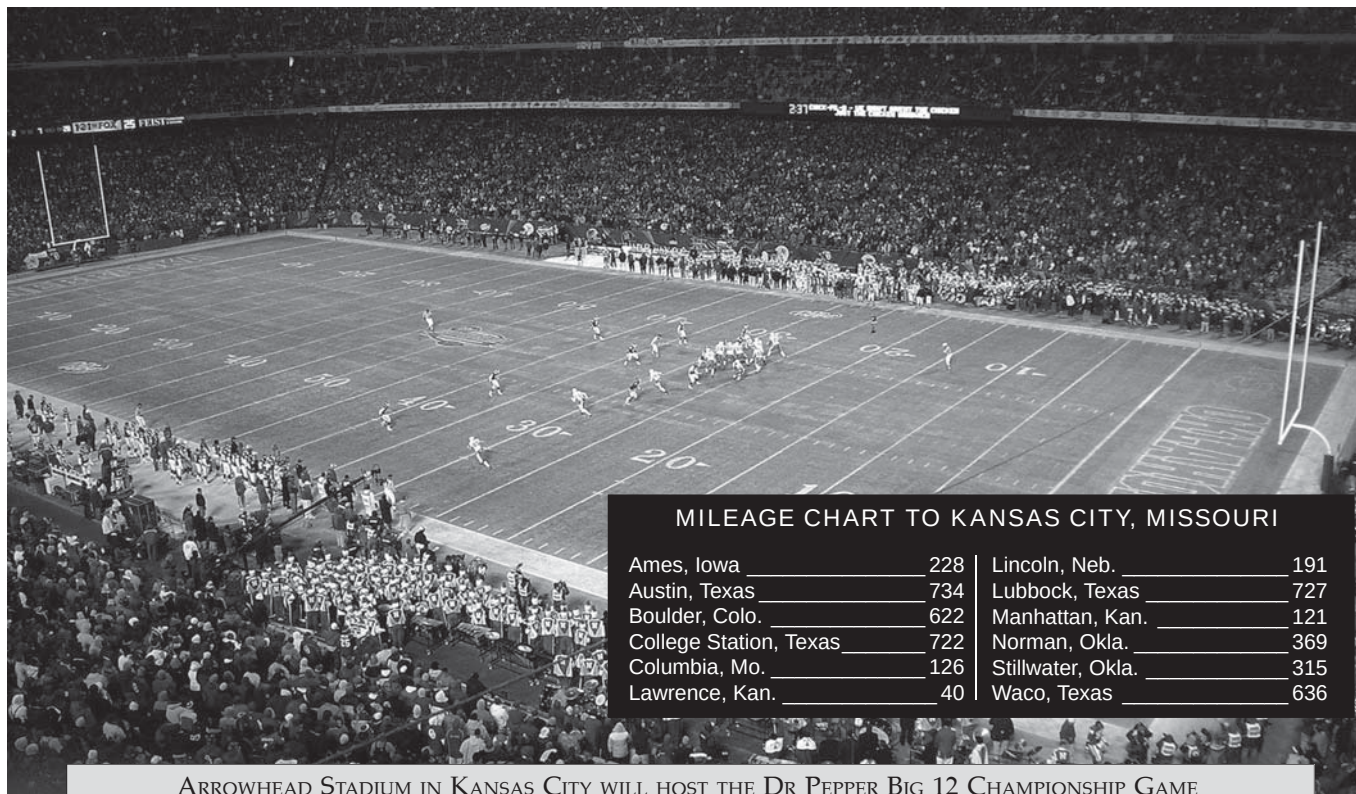
The Dr Pepper Big 12 Championship Game has been a huge draw in numerous cities throughout the league. BIG 12 & THE BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

Entering its 11th season, the Bowl Championship Series was established to determine a champion for college football while maintaining and enhancing the bowl system which has provided significant support to college football for nearly a century. The BCS is a showcase for the sport, matching the premier teams in top bowl games. The Big 12 Conference is a key component in the championship agreement.

Texas defeated USC, 41-38, in the 2006 Rose Bowl to win the 2005 national title. It marked the fourth time in the previous five years a Big 12 team had competed in the title game.

The BCS consists of the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, FedEx Orange Bowl, Allstate Sugar Bowl and the Rose Bowl. In addition to the Big 12, the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Pacific-10 and Southeastern Conferences also have automatic berths

for their champions into one of the four contests. Beginning with the 2006 season, each bowl hosts two games once every four years - its traditional game plus a National Championship contest approximately one week after the New Year.

This season the national championship game will be played in Miami on January 6. The current BCS television contract runs through the 2009 season.

2008 FOOTBALL NOTEBOOK

BIG 12 RETURNS 10 STARTING QUARTERBACKS

Ten Big 12 teams return their starting signal caller from 2007, led by Chase Daniel (Missouri), an All-Big 12 First Team selection who was fourth in the Heisman Trophy balloting. Other starting quarterbacks returning are: Blake Szymanski (Baylor), Cody Hawkins (Colorado), Todd Reesing (Kansas), Josh Freeman (Kansas State), Sam Bradford (Oklahoma), Zac Robinson (Oklahoma State), Colt McCoy (Texas), Stephen McGee (Texas A&M) and Graham Harrell (Texas Tech).

Bradford led the nation in pass efficiency as a freshman in 2007 while Harrell was the country's leader in total offense. In addition, wideout Michael Crabtree (Texas Tech) topped the national charts in receiving yards and receptions per game as a freshman.

FINAL RANKINGS

The Big 12 led all conferences with four teams ranked in the Top 10 of the final 2007 Associated Press and coaches' polls with Missouri (4/5), Kansas (7/7), Oklahoma (8/8) and Texas (10/10). Texas Tech (22/23) also ended the season in the rankings. The only other season in conference history in which the Big 12 finished with four teams in the Top 10 was 2001.

GETTING OFFENSIVE

A nation's best four Big 12 teams finished in the Top 8 in the country in scoring offense last season (Kansas-2, Oklahoma-5, Texas Tech-7, Missouri-8), with six in the Top 20 (Texas-14, Kansas State-18).

The Big 12 also led all conferences with seven teams ranked in the NCAA Top 20 for total offense (Texas Tech-2, Missouri-5, Oklahoma State-7, Kansas-8, Nebraska-9, Texas-13, Oklahoma-19).

BIG 12 BCS SUCCESS

From 2000-05, teams from the Big 12 played in the BCS National Championship Game five times during the six-year span. Since the inception of the BCS, the Big 12 is 2-3 in the National Championship Game. Texas (2005) and Oklahoma (2000) have won titles, while Nebraska (2001) and Oklahoma (2003, '04) were denied crowns. The Big 12 leads all conferences with five appearances in the BCS National Championship Game.

BCS SIGHTINGS

Last year marked the fourth time the Big 12 advanced two teams to BCS games in the same season (2001, '03, '04, '07). Including 2007, Big 12 teams have played in 14 BCS games in the 10-year history of the structure, posting a 6-8 mark.

HOME WINNING STREAKS

Oklahoma has the nation's longest active home winning streak at 18 games. Kansas is fifth with nine consecutive wins at home while Missouri is tied for seventh at seven.

ATTENDANCE FIGURES

Attendance in the Big 12 has surpassed 4.6 million fans the past two seasons, including 4,652,267 in 2007. In the last two years an all-time high 9,333,306 have passed through the turnstiles of Big 12 stadiums, the highest two-year mark in league history.

Stadiums in the Big 12 were filled to 96.6 percent of capacity last year, the ninth straight year over 90 percent. Average attendance in 2007 was 60,419, the highest in league history and first time to average over 60,000.

NON-CONFERENCE SCHEDULE

The non-conference portion of the Big 12 schedule in 2008 features four tilts against teams that finished 2007 ranked in the top 25 of the coaches and AP polls: Missouri vs. Illinois (18/20), Cincinnati (20/17) at Oklahoma, West Virginia (6/6) at Colorado and Virginia Tech (9/9) at Nebraska. Fourteen of the 48 non-conference games will be against teams that played in bowl games last season. The Big 12 has compiled a 407-170 (.705) non-conference record since 1996.

THREE-TIME ALL-BIG 12 PERFORMERS

Only nine players have been named three-time All-Big 12 First Team selections in league history, three of those within the last four years. All nine were honored in consecutive years. Ian Campbell (Kansas State) is the only returning two-time selection for the 2008 season.

An all-time high eight Big 12 players earned Consensus All-America recognition - Crabtree, Dizon, Lofton, Maclin, Nelson, Rucker, Robinson and Talib. The previous high-water mark was 2003 when six Conference players were tabbed Consensus All-America.

BIG 12 LAUNCHES NEW WEB SITE

The Big 12 Conference will debut a new web presence on August 1, 2008. In conjunction with JumpTV Sports, the league's new internet provider, the conference will develop and host a completely redesigned web platform to support the Big 12's online destination at www.big12sports.com

The updated site will feature numerous enhancements, including a broadband video channel along with new interactive and e-commerce opportunities. Video highlights from many Big 12 contests will be featured, with various games and championships streamed live via the site each season.



BIG 12 FOOTBALL ON THE AIR

The conference begins its 13th season with ABC as its national network television partner. In addition to the games on ABC, the conference continues its long-standing relationship with FSN for its cable rights. The current ABC contract has been renewed through 2015-16, while the FSN agreement is through the 2011-12 academic year.

Television Selection Dates

ABC selects games played on special dates, in prime time, the first three Saturdays of September and the dates it intends to do early afternoon games by June 15 of each contract year. ABC will select the additional games to be televised no later than 11 a.m. (Central) on the 12th day (i.e. the second Monday preceding a Saturday telecast date) prior to the dates such games are to be televised. ABC retains the rights to exercise a six-day option (i.e. the Sunday prior to a Saturday telecast date) three times during each season. ABC will provide the Conference a "ready list" on the 12th day prior to exercising this option. Overall, there will be 19 Big 12 appearances on ABC in 2008.

FSN shall provide the Big 12 with a list of games for special dates and the first three Saturdays of September by June 15 each year. The selection of games for syndication and prime time telecast will occur following the decisions made by ABC. FSN has also sub-licensed games to the ESPN family of networks, as well as Versus for the 2008 season.

FOOTBALL SCHEDULING & CHAMPIONSHIP GAME INFORMATION

Scheduling: The Big 12 Conference is divided into two, six-team divisions in the sport of football. Each division will determine a champion based upon established criteria. All teams will play eight games as part of the Conference schedule — five games within the division and three games against teams in the other division. All games scheduled as part of conference competition count in determining the Conference record of each team. Rankings within the division will be determined on a winning percentage basis.

Divisional Champion: The (eligible) team with the best winning-percentage of all divisional members in its eight conference games is declared the divisional champion and representative to the Dr Pepper Big 12 Conference Football Championship Game. A team ineligible under NCAA or Big 12 rules for postseason (bowl) competition shall not compete in the Championship Game.

Divisional Tiebreakers: The following procedure will determine the representative from each division in the event of a tie:

- (a) If two teams are tied, the winner of the game between the two tied teams shall be the representative
- (b) If three or more teams are tied, steps 1 through 7 will be followed until a determination is made. If only two teams remain tied after any step, the winner of the game between the two tied teams shall be the representative.
 1. The records of the three teams will be compared against each other
 2. The records of the three teams will be compared within their division
 3. The records of the three teams will be compared against the next highest placed teams in their division in order of finish (4, 5 and 6)
 4. The records of the three teams will be compared against all common conference opponents;
 5. The highest ranked team in the first Bowl Championship Series Poll following the completion of Big 12 regular season conference play shall be the representative
 6. The team with the best overall winning percentage [excluding exempted games] shall be the representative
 7. The representative will be chosen by draw.

COMMISSIONER DAN BEEBE

Dan Beebe was named the third commissioner of the Big 12 Conference on September 5, 2007, after serving as senior associate commissioner and chief operating officer for the league since February 2003.

In his first year, Beebe was able to enjoy the Big 12's first national championship in men's basketball, two teams in the Bowl Championship Series and numerous individual NCAA titles. Off the field, he guided the conference schools to a continuation of their revenue sharing model, with a record \$113.5-million going back to the membership. In the area of special projects, he oversaw a continued and expanded Big 12 relationship with Special Olympics in each of the league's seven states.

While in his previous role at the Big 12, Beebe handled issues related to governance, national policy and legal affairs, in addition to coordinating the day-to-day activities of the conference office. He also served as the conference liaison to the Big 12 Board of Directors. Beebe has been involved in site selection for future league championships, extending television contracts and enhancing football bowl opportunities. In addition, he has been active in establishing the conference's sportsmanship policies and procedures.

Prior to joining the Big 12, Beebe was commissioner of the Ohio Valley Conference from 1989-2003. Upon his appointment, he became the youngest leader of a Division I football-playing conference.

During his time, he made the OVC more attractive in areas of television appearances as exposure nearly tripled. He also enhanced championships and revenue generation, ensured sportsmanship and fair play, promoted gender equity, and gained national recognition for the league. He was a strong proponent of providing opportunities for female student-athletes, as the league added three women's championships during his time.

Under his direction, the OVC added five new members. He also placed an emphasis on ethics and sportsmanship within the league, producing a



nationally recognized sportsmanship statement and participating in regional and national seminars on the topic.

Over the course of his career, Beebe has built a strong reputation nationally in college athletics and has been selected to some of the NCAA's most significant committees. He was a member of the prestigious NCAA Management Council, serving as chair of the Council's I-AA Governance Committee. He also chaired the Council's Committee on Fines and Forfeitures and was part of its Subcommittee for Student-Athlete Issues. Beebe was picked to fill the required commissioner's position on the initial NCAA Athletics Certification Committee that formalized and implemented the program adopted by the NCAA membership. He also previously served on the NCAA Nominating, Professional Sports Liaison, Football Issues, I-AA Football and Federal Arbitration Act committees.

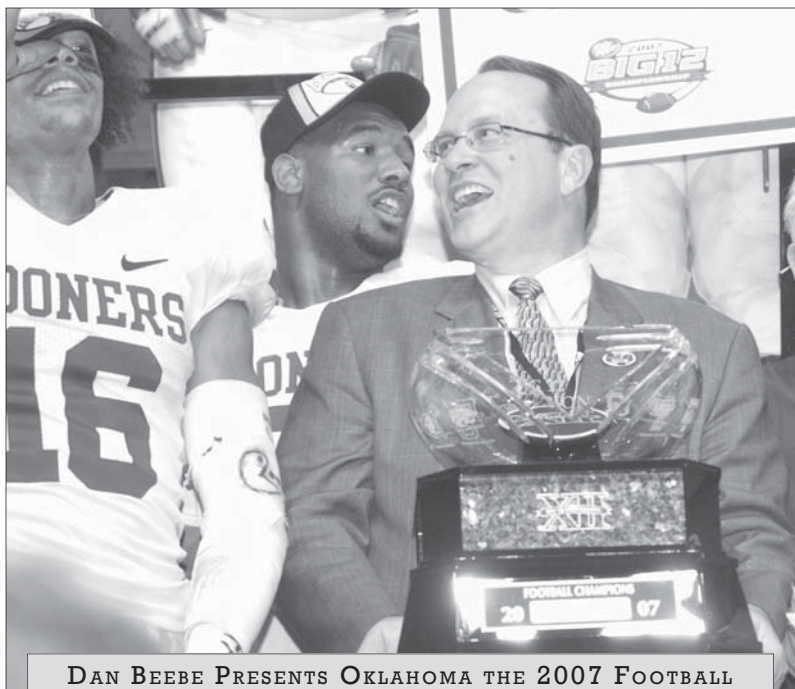
Prior to his conference work, Beebe was a Director of Enforcement at the NCAA. He started at the NCAA in 1982 as an enforcement representative and was involved with numerous high-profile cases, including those at Houston, Mississippi and SMU. That tenure was interrupted by a one-year stint as an Assistant Director of Athletics at Wichita State University in 1986 before he returned to the NCAA office where he earned his Director of Enforcement promotion in 1988.

The 51-year old native of Walla Walla, Wash., received a degree from Walla Walla Community College in 1977. From there he moved on to California State Polytechnic University (Cal Poly-Pomona) where he earned his Bachelor of Science degree, cum laude, in social sciences in June 1979. Beebe received his law degree from the University of California Hastings College of the Law in 1982 and is a member of the Washington State Bar Association.

Besides his life's work, Beebe's ability to relate to student-athletes and others directly involved in college sports results from his own experience as a recruited football player. As an offensive lineman, Beebe was a four-year starter and served as captain of the varsity football teams at Walla Walla Community College and Cal Poly-Pomona. He continued his participation in athletics well after his college days, playing rugby, basketball, tennis, golf and other sports.

He was selected as one of the Outstanding Young Men of America in 1989 in recognition of his outstanding professional achievement, superior leadership ability and exceptional service to the community. In 1995, he was named an Institute for International Sport Ethics Fellow. Beebe has also served on various community boards, including the YMCA and Nashville Sports Council.

Born on February 27, 1957, Beebe is married to the former Molly Scanlon and has four children: daughters Jessie and Elaine and sons Matthew and Patrick.
