AT&T Players of the Week

A Big 12 Offensive, Defensive and Special Teams Player of the Week will be chosen each Monday, beginning September 4. Nominations are submitted by the school sports information offices and the winners are selected by a panel of media voters who cover the league on a regular basis. This year marks the seventh season in which AT&T will sponsor the awards.

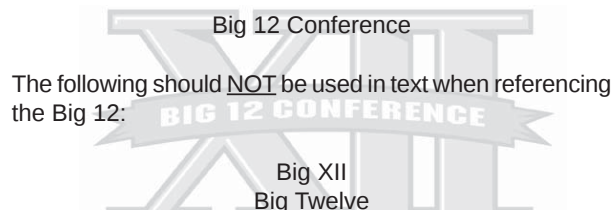
Postseason Awards

The Big 12 presents its all-conference awards at the end of the regular season. A Player, Newcomer and Freshman of the Year on offense and defense is chosen in addition to a Special Teams Player of the Year. A Coach of the Year along with All-Big 12 First, Second and Honorable Mention teams are selected as well. Each Big 12 head coach votes on the squads and are not permitted to vote for their own players. The awards will be announced the first week of December prior to the Dr Pepper Big 12 Championship Game.

Academic All-Big 12 teams are also chosen in football and will be announced prior to the football championship game. Further information on academic honors presented by the conference is available on page 8.

Fresh off its 10th anniversary season, the Big 12 Conference begins its second decade of competition in 2006-07. While there have been many proud accomplishments through the first 10 years, the conference and its members anticipate continued success.

Through its first 10 years the Big 12 claimed 28 team and 319 individual NCAA titles. During this past season, conference programs captured national championships in football (Texas), women's indoor track & field (Texas), wrestling (Oklahoma State) and men's golf (Oklahoma State). In addition, 22 individual event titles were also won by student-athletes that compete in the Big 12.

The 2004-05 campaign marked the most successful in conference history with six NCAA championships. Baylor won the crown for women's basketball, becoming the first Big 12 squad to win in that sport. Colorado won both the men's and women's cross country trophies, just the fourth school in NCAA annals to win both in the same year. Oklahoma State regained the top spot in wrestling, winning the national title for the 33rd time. Texas captured its fourth women's outdoor track & field crown, along with its sixth national championship in baseball.

The Big 12 leads all conferences with five appearances in the BCS National Championship game. A Big 12 team has played for the football national championship five of the last six years, and each of the last three. In basketball, an unprecedented eight men's and women's basketball teams have advanced to their respective Final Fours in the past five seasons as the Big 12 continues its place among the elite intercollegiate athletic conferences.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

Competitive excellence, scholarships and sportsmanship are all equal components of the Big 12's philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and All-Big 12 Academic squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons.

At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsman of the Year awards.

Institutions can also nominate student-athletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships at the end of each academic year. A total of 153 scholars have received more than \$845,000 in postgraduate financial aid through the first nine years of the program.

The Big 12 sponsors 21 sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The conference is made up of 12 institutions that have shared many traditional rivalries throughout their histories. Member schools include - Baylor University, University of Colorado, Iowa State University, University of Kansas, Kansas State University, University of Missouri, University of Nebraska, University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma State University, University of Texas, Texas A&M University and Texas Tech University.

The institutions created a league that encompasses seven states, over 42 million people and more than 18 million television households within its geographic footprint.

The conference conducts championships for 20 of its 21 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition. The winner of the Big 12 football championship game earns the league's berth into the prestigious Bowl Championship Series.

The Big 12 is under the direction of its third commissioner, Kevin L. Weiberg, who took over the reins in December 1998. Weiberg has led the Big 12 into additional football bowl agreements and expanded television opportunities for all sports through contracts with ABC/ESPN, FSN, TBS and CSTV.

In its 10-year history the conference has distributed \$807.2 million to its 12 member institutions.

The Big 12 staff administers to over 4,600 student-athletes in 21 sports. The conference headquarters will move to nearby Irving, Texas, from Dallas in August.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

Performance in the classroom is just as important as accolades on the field when looking at the student-athlete. The Big 12 Conference recognizes student-athletes in four areas for academic achievement. Those areas include the Commissioner's Honor Roll, Academic All-Big 12 teams, the Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, and the Big 12 Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship.

COMMISSIONER'S HONOR ROLL

Acknowledging all participants, the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll is an inclusive honor for all sports sponsored by the membership of the league. The Honor Roll is recorded and released each semester and recognizes those student-athletes who registered a 3.0 or better grade point average the previous semester.

Submitted through the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services at each institution, those honored are not necessarily the stars on the field and court but those who participate on the team. They include the letterwinners and non-letterwinners and recognize every student-athlete who has excelled in the classroom.

More than 2,000 Big 12 student-athletes are named to the Commissioner's Honor Rolls at the end of each of semester.

ACADEMIC ALL-BIG 12 TEAMS

Recognizing those student-athletes who excel in the classroom and on the field and court, the Big 12 has academic all-conference teams for all sports.

Nominated by the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services and the Athletic Media Relations Directors, members of the all-academic teams have posted at least a 3.00 grade point average either cumulative or the previous two semesters and are regulars (i.e. letterwinners) on his or her respective team. First-team honorees are regulars who have at least a 3.20 GPA.

Last year, a few academic teams in the Big 12 exceeded 100 student-athletes recognized by the conference. In addition, student-athletes have gained recognition by being named to ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America teams.

PHILLIPS 66 CLASSROOM CHAMPION

As Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, the conference recognizes 30 student-athletes per school who have excelled on the court and in the classroom. Chosen through the Big 12 membership, those honored are recognized throughout the year on the Big 12 telecasts, FSN and ESPN Regional Television.

DR. PRENTICE GAUTT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

With 96 student-athletes from all Big 12 schools honored over the last four years, the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships' list has grown to 153 recipients since the 1996-97 academic year.

Additional funding prior to the 2002-03 selection process allowed each school to name two outstanding scholars to the annual list of honorees. Conference officers also voted to name the postgraduate scholarship program awards after longtime Big 12 and Big Eight Conference Associate Commissioner and student services' pioneer Dr. Prentice Gautt in 2004. Dr. Gautt passed away on March 17, 2005.

The all-time group has solid representation of scholars throughout the 21 sponsored Big 12 sports and has provided \$845,600 through the 2005-06 academic year for much-needed financial aid. Three faculty representatives, one senior woman administrator and one director of athletics form the selection group for the prestigious awards, which help the youngsters to continue their formal education. Since its inception the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship program has produced over a dozen physicians, several attorneys for the underprivileged, college professors, Peace Corps volunteers and positions of national prominence.

Criteria for these awards include a cumulative grade point average of 3.500 on a 4.0 scale, participation in at least two years of intercollegiate athletics at the scholar-athlete's respective institution, and completion of athletics' eligibility. The scholar-athletes also must graduate from their respective member institutions within 15 months of their selection as postgraduate scholarship recipients and are expected to enroll in graduate/professional schools within 15 months after they graduate.

The \$2,500 individual annual grants began in 1996-97, were raised to \$5,000 in 1999 and climbed to \$6,900 prior to the 2003-04 term. Most honorees in recent years have also been named to Academic All-Big 12 Conference teams as well as the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll.

SPORTSPERSON OF THE YEAR

The Big 12 annually recognizes its top male and female sportsperson. The Sportspersons of the Year Award was started prior to the 2000-01 academic year to recognize student-athletes who displayed an extraordinary degree of sportsmanship and/or community service during the academic year. The honorees are selected by a media panel.

The 2005-06 honorees were Jodie Heinicka (Missouri gymnastics) and Parker Dalton (Texas A&M baseball).

Heinicka spent her time in Columbia as an active participant in many city and university activities, including the Can Food Drive for Central Missouri Food Bank, the Dance-a-thon for children's diseases, the Domestic Violence Half Marathon Race, and the Adopt-A-Family Christmas project. She also visited local hospitals and schools in addition to getting up at 6 a.m. every morning to help a quadriplegic male with his morning routine.

Dalton played a key role in welcoming six Tulane athletic teams to the A&M campus after they were displaced by Hurricane Katrina. He also volunteered for AggiesCan, a Coat Drive for the local mission and Toys 4 Tots. He is an active member of Breakaway Prayer team, has led a Bible Study each week for the past three years and participated in the Gamma Phi Beta's Crescent King Philanthropy Fundraiser for Camp Fire USA.

DR PEPPER BIG 12 CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The winners of the North and South Divisions of the Big 12 Conference will meet in Kansas City's Arrowhead Stadium to compete for the league championship and right to represent the Big 12 in the prestigious Bowl Championship Series (BCS).

The 11th annual title game is scheduled for Saturday, December 2 and will be nationally-televised by ABC Sports at 7 p.m. (CST). Arrowhead Stadium will host the game for the fourth time (2000, 2003, 2004).

The contest is annually one of the most anticipated in the nation. Previous years have produced some memorable upsets which have affected the college football landscape around the country.

Since the first season of Big 12 play in 1996, the league has sponsored a championship game. Per NCAA guidelines, a conference with 12 members may play a 12th football game to determine a champion, provided the regular season is played in divisions.

The Dr Pepper Big 12 Championship Game has been a huge draw in numerous cities throughout the league. In the 10 previous editions, the contest has been played before a total of more than 670,000 fans in its short history. The 2007 Dr Pepper Big 12 Championship will be played in San Antonio's Alamodome.

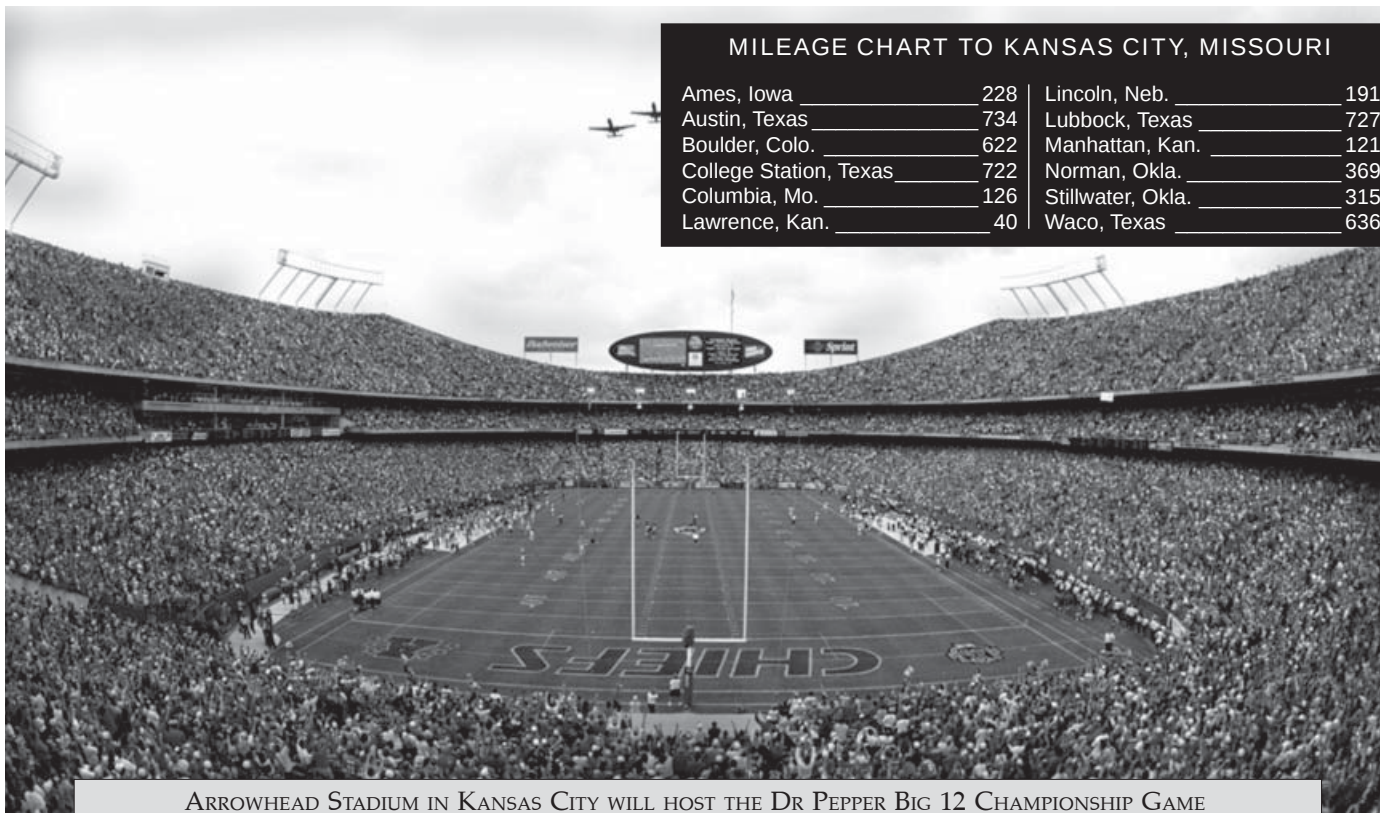

THE BIG 12 & THE BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

Entering its ninth season, the Bowl Championship Series was established to determine a champion for college football while maintaining and enhancing the bowl system which has provided significant support to college football for nearly a century. The BCS is a showcase for the sport, matching the premier teams in top bowl games. The Big 12 Conference is a key component in the championship agreement.

Last season, Texas defeated USC 41-38 in the Rose Bowl to win the national title. It marked the fourth time in the last five years a Big 12 team has competed in the title game.

The BCS consists of the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, FedEx Orange Bowl, Allstate Sugar Bowl and the Rose Bowl. In addition to the Big 12, the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Pacific-10 and Southeastern Conferences also have automatic berths for their champions into one of the four contests. Beginning this season, each bowl will host two games once every four years - its traditional game plus a National Championship contest approximately one week after the New Year.

BIG 12 BOWL LINEUP

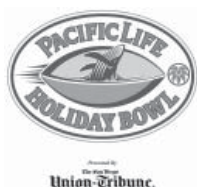
The Big 12 has always assured its teams are able to participate in some of the top bowl games at the conclusion of each regular season. There will be no change in that situation for the league's 11th season.

BIG 12 FOOTBALL A YEAR AROUND SPORT

Big 12 fans enjoy football year around as shown by the numbers that attended Big 12 spring football games. The conference had five of the top 10 attendances for spring games -- Nebraska (2nd - 57,415), Texas (5th - 41,200), Kansas State (7th - 31,875), Texas A&M (8th - 31,000) and Oklahoma (9th - 25,000).

ATHLON RANKS SOONERS NO. 1

Athlon Sports picked Oklahoma as the preseason No. 1 team in the nation in its series of 2006 college football annuals. Athlon also had Texas seventh, Texas Tech 22nd and Nebraska 25th in its preseason ratings.

BUILD THEM AND THEY WILL COME

Four Big 12 stadiums hold at least 80,000 fans and rank among the largest in the country. Texas A&M's Kyle Field is 12th nationally for Division I-A seating capacity (82,600), Oklahoma's Gaylord Family Oklahoma Memorial Stadium is 14th (82,112), Texas' Royal-Memorial Stadium is 19th (80,082) while Nebraska's Memorial Stadium is 20th (80,000).

FINAL RANKINGS

Texas finished the 2005 campaign as the nation's top-ranked team after winning the national championship. Texas Tech (19/20), Oklahoma (22) and Nebraska (24) also ended the year in the Top 25. Texas and Texas Tech were rated every week of the season, with UT in the top two each week.

NON-CONFERENCE

The non-conference portion of the Big 12 schedule in 2006 features seven tilts against teams that finished 2005 ranked in the Top 25: Baylor vs. TCU (9/11), Colorado at Georgia (10), Kansas State vs. Louisville (20/19), Nebraska at USC (2), Oklahoma at Oregon (12), Texas vs. Ohio State (4) and Texas Tech at TCU (9/11). Sixteen of the 48 non-conference games played by the Big 12 will be against teams that played in bowl games last season.

The Big 12 posted a conference-high .818 winning percentage in 2005 non-conference games with a 36-8 record. The eight losses are the fewest in the Big 12's 10-year history. The league has compiled a 330-136 (.708) non-conference record since 1996.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The 2005 season marked the third straight and fifth time in the last six years that a Big 12 team played in the BCS National Championship game. Since the inception of the the BCS, the Big 12 is 2-3 in the National Championship game and leads all conferences with its five appearances. Texas (2005) and Oklahoma (2000) have won titles, while Nebraska (2001) and Oklahoma (2003, '04) were denied crowns.

BCS COORDINATION MOVES TO SEC

The completion of the bowl season marked the end of the Big 12's term as the coordinating conference of the Bowl Championship Series. The SEC now begins a two-year term as the coordinating conference with its commissioner, Mike Slive, serving as the BCS coordinator.

ATTENDANCE FIGURES

Average attendance at member institutions in 2005 was 58,396 over 72 games, an increase of 1.9 percent from 2004 (57,312 over 72 games). The Big 12 ranked third among conferences in average attendance.

FOUR SCHOOLS EARN AFCA ACADEMIC RECOGNITION

Baylor, Iowa State, Nebraska and Texas Tech were recognized by the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) last year for graduating at least 70 percent of their 2000-01 freshmen class.

INSTANT REPLAY

The Big 12 Conference will employ instant replay again this season. In an experimental year in 2005, the Big 12 used its model of replay in 75 regular season games, with 93 plays reviewed, 32 overturned (34 percent), and a 1:32 average length of review.

CHICK-FIL-A COMMUNITY OF CHAMPIONS

The Big 12 Conference, ESPN Regional Television, Big 12 Showcase and Chick-fil-A recognize student-athletes for their good works in the community. Each institution nominates three student-athletes who are recognized as Chick-fil-A Community Champions.

In addition, Chick-fil-A gives each Big 12 institution \$3,000 for its general athletics scholarship funds in recognition of the service each provides to its community. One institution will receive an additional \$2,000 for outstanding work in its community, as determined by Chick-fil-A.

Television Selection Dates

ABC selects games played on special dates, in prime time, the first three Saturdays of September and the dates it intends to do early afternoon games by June 15 of each contract year. ABC will select the additional games to be televised no later than 11 a.m. (Central) on the 12th day (i.e. the second Monday preceding a Saturday telecast date) prior to the dates such games are to be televised. ABC retains the rights to exercise a six-day option (i.e. the Sunday prior to a Saturday telecast date) three times during each season. ABC will provide the Conference a "ready list" on the 12th day prior to exercising this option. Overall, there will be 21 Big 12 appearances on ABC in 2006.

FSN shall provide the Big 12 with a list of games for special dates and the first three Saturdays of September by June 15 each year. The selection of games for syndication and prime time telecast will occur following the decisions made by ABC. TBS will carry five or six Big 12 games.

The Big 12 On The Dial

In addition to its extensive television coverage, Big 12 football games are broadcast by major commercial stations, wide-ranging radio networks and satellite radio.

2006 INSTANT REPLAY POLICIES

After successful experimentation in the past two football seasons, all Division I-A conferences have requested a uniform system of replay to be included in the rules book. As this is permissive, not mandated, the rule would allow for growth without forcing all institutions and conferences to use video review. The committee notes that overall game times increased by two minutes in Division I-A, with several conferences that used replay reporting shorter game times.

Section 1. Definition

Definition

Article 1. Instant Reply is a system utilizing electronic means to review and assist game officials with certain on-field decisions as listed in Section 3.

Section 2. Eligibility for Instant Replay

Participation

Article 1. a. Any member institution may use instant replay. This rule is permissive, not a requirement. If instant replay is used, it must be used in full compliance with this rule.
b. For any non-conference game, if the home team is using instant replay, the visiting team does not have the option of declining its use for that game. If the home team is not using instant replay, the visiting team does not have the option of requesting that it be used in that game.

Section 3. Reviewable Plays

Side Line, Goal Line, End Line

Article 1. Reviewable plays governed by a sideline, goal line or an end line include:

- Scoring plays, including a runner in possession of a live ball breaking the plane of a goal line.
- A pass ruled complete, incomplete or intercepted at a side line, goal line or an end line.
- A runner or pass receiver ruled in or out of bounds.
- Recovery of a loose ball in or out of bounds in the field of play or an end zone.

Passes

Article 2. Reviewable plays involving passes include:

- A pass ruled complete, incomplete or intercepted anywhere in the field of play or an end zone.
- A legal forward pass touched by an ineligible receiver.
- A legal forward pass touched by a defensive player.
- A fumble ruled on the part of a potential passer. (Note: If the on-field ruling is forward pass and the pass is incomplete, the play is not reviewable).
- A forward pass or forward handing ruled when a runner is beyond the line of scrimmage.
- A forward pass or forward handing ruled after a change of possession.
- A pass ruled forward or backward when thrown from behind the line of scrimmage. (Exception: If the pass is ruled forward and is incomplete, the play is not reviewable).

Miscellaneous

Article 3. Miscellaneous reviewable plays include:

- A runner judged to have been not down by rule. (Note: If a runner is ruled down, the play is not reviewable).
- A runner's forward progress with respect to a first down.
- Touching of any type kick by any player.
- The number of players participating by either team during a live ball.
- A scrimmage kicker beyond the line of scrimmage when the ball is kicked.
- Clock adjustment when a ruling on the field is reversed.
- A fumble recovery by a Team A player during fourth down or a try and before any change of possession.

Plays Not Reviewable

Article 4. No other plays or officiating decisions are reviewable.

Section 4. Instant Replay Personnel, Equipment and Location

Personnel

Article 1. Instant replay personnel shall consist of the number of persons needed to operate the replay equipment within the necessary time constraints. A minimum of three persons shall be utilized to insure that all plays are reviewed in an efficient and a timely manner. Such persons are normally referred to as replay official, communicator and technician. Additional persons may be used as needed.

Equipment

Article 2. The type of equipment used to carry out necessary instant replay duties shall be determined by each conference or member institution utilizing instant replay.

Location

Article 3. a. All equipment used in making a decision during the replay process and the personnel using that equipment shall be located in a separate, secure location in the press box. This room shall not be available or accessible to any person not directly involved in instant replay.
b. Additional telephonic equipment needed to allow instant replay personnel to communicate with the game referee when a game has been stopped for a play review shall be located on a side line

near the field of play and preferably outside a team area. Such equipment shall provide the game referee and the replay official a secure and private means of communication.

Section 5. Initiating the Replay Process

Game Stop

Article 1. There are two methods to stop a game to review a ruling on the field.

- The replay official and the crew shall review every play of a game. The replay official may stop a game at any time before the ball is next put in play whenever:
 - There is reasonable evidence to believe an error was made in the initial on-field ruling.
 - The play is reviewable.
 - Any reversal of an on-field ruling, which would result from indisputable video evidence, would have a direct, competitive impact on the game.
- The head coach of either team may request that the game be stopped and a play be reviews by challenging the on-field ruling one time during a game.
 - A coach initiates this challenge by taking a team time out before the ball is next put in play and informing the referee that the coach is challenging the ruling of the previous play.
 - After a review has been completed, if the on-field ruling is reversed, that team's time out will not be charged.
 - After a review has been completed and the on-field ruling is not reversed, the charged team time out counts as one of the three permitted that team for that half.
 - A head coach may not challenge a ruling in which the game was stopped and a decision has already been made by the replay official.
 - If a head coach requests a team time out to challenge an on-field ruling and the play being challenged is not reviewable, the time out shall count as one of the three permitted the team during that half of the game.
 - A head coach may not challenge an on-field ruling if all the team's timeouts have been used for that half. If all team timeouts have been used and a head coach signals for, and is granted, a time out, a delay penalty will be assessed.
 - Each head coach shall be permitted one challenge per game.

When to Stop a Game

- A game may be stopped, either by the instant replay official or by a head coach's challenge at any time before the ball is next put in play.
- No game official may request that a game be stopped and a play be reviewed.

Section 6. Reviewing an On-field Ruling

Procedures

- When a game is to be stopped either by the replay official or by a head coach's challenge, the designated officials on the field will be notified by a buzzer system or other appropriate means.
- The referee shall announce that the ruling on the field is being reviewed. If the game has been stopped due to a head coach's challenge, the referee will so indicate in the announcement.
- All reviews shall be based upon video evidence provided by and coming directly from the televised production of the game. If there is no television available, all video pictures shall come from the in-stadium video board production.
- After the referee has conferred with the replay official and the review process has been completed, the referee shall make one of the following announcements:
 - If the video evidence confirms the on-field ruling: "After review, the ruling on the field is confirmed."
 - If there is no indisputable (conclusive) evidence to reverse the on-field ruling: "After review, there is no conclusive video evidence to change the ruling on the field. Therefore, the ruling stands."
 - If the on-field ruling is reversed: "After review, there is indisputable (conclusive) video evidence that . . . [followed by a brief description of the video evidence]. Therefore, . . . [followed by a brief description of what the reversal means]."
- If a ruling is reversed, the replay official shall supply the referee with all pertinent data as needed (next down, distance, yard line, position of the ball, clock status/adjustment) in order to resume play under the correct game conditions.

Time Restrictions

- Although each head coach is limited to one challenge per game, there is no restriction on the number of times the replay official may stop a game to review an on-field ruling.
- If the game is stopped to review a play, there is no time limit for the review process.

Section 7. Reversing an On-Field Ruling

Criterion for Reversal

Article 1. In order to reverse an on-field ruling, the replay official must see indisputable video evidence through one or more video replays provided to the monitor.

Anderson has been a football official for 32 years, including a National Football League official for 10 seasons. While in the NFL, he has worked playoff games in every year of eligibility, with four Wild Card, two Divisional and three Championship games, along with Super Bowl XXXV. In 11 years of college experience, he had previously worked games in the Lone Star, Southland and Southwest Conferences. He has also officiated in NFL Europe.

The retired dentist is the son of a football coach and also participated in football at the collegiate level at Sam Houston State University, where he was a two-time Academic All-America selection.

Anderson received his Doctorate of Dentistry from the University of Texas Dental Branch in 1978. He earned his undergraduate degree from Sam Houston State University in 1974. He and his wife, Afshan, reside in Sugar Land, Texas, and have five children.

FOOTBALL SCHEDULING & CHAMPIONSHIP GAME INFORMATION

Scheduling: The Big 12 Conference is divided into two, six-team divisions in the sport of football. Each division will determine a champion based upon established criteria. All teams will play eight games as part of the Conference schedule — five games within the division and three games against teams in the other division. All games scheduled as part of conference competition count in determining the Conference record of each team. Rankings within the division will be determined on a winning percentage basis.

Divisional Champion: The (eligible) team with the best winning-percentage of all divisional members in its eight conference games is declared the divisional champion and representative to the Dr Pepper Big 12 Conference Football Championship Game. A team ineligible under NCAA or Big 12 rules for postseason (bowl) competition shall not compete in the Championship Game.

Divisional Tiebreakers: The following procedure will determine the representative from each division in the event of a tie:

- (a) If two teams are tied, the winner of the game between the two tied teams shall be the representative
- (b) If three or more teams are tied, steps 1 through 7 will be followed until a determination is made. If only two teams remain tied after any step, the winner of the game between the two tied teams shall be the representative.
 1. The records of the three teams will be compared against each other
 2. The records of the three teams will be compared within their division
 3. The records of the three teams will be compared against the next highest placed teams in their division in order of finish (4, 5 and 6)
 4. The records of the three teams will be compared against all common conference opponents;
 5. The highest ranked team in the first Bowl Championship Series Poll following the completion of Big 12 regular season conference play shall be the representative
 6. The team with the best overall winning percentage [excluding exempted games] shall be the representative
 7. The representative will be chosen by draw.

COMMISSIONER KEVIN WEIBERG

For the ninth time in its 11-year history in 2006-07, the Big 12 Conference will be led by Commissioner Kevin Weiberg. Under his direction, the Big 12 has continued to be regarded as one of the nation's premier conferences.

Weiberg continues to play a prominent role nationally in collegiate athletics. He has previously served terms as coordinator of the Bowl Championship Series, as a member of the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee as well as a two-year stint as chair of the Division I-A Collegiate Commissioners' Association. Weiberg currently serves on the following NCAA special committees and task force groups: men's college basketball partnership, women's basketball discussion group, and the baseball academic enhancement working group. He also played a key role in the formation of the Group of Six conferences; a forum that brings together some of the nation's top conferences to advance policy initiatives in intercollegiate athletics.

During his tenure, a total of 25 NCAA championships have been won by conference teams with nearly 200 individual national titles to the league's credit. The conference has had five appearances in the BCS National Championship game in eight years, with five showings in the title contest since 2000 - more than any other league. The Big 12 has had eight men's and women's basketball teams advance to their respective Final Fours in the past five seasons, highlighted by Baylor's women's basketball National Championship two years ago.

The league's success continued in 2005-06, with NCAA team championships in football, women's indoor track & field, wrestling and men's golf. Big 12 squads have accounted for 10 NCAA Championships in the last two seasons. In fact, Weiberg has seen at least one team win a national title every season since being named Commissioner.

During the past athletic season, Weiberg continued to advance the Big 12 by negotiating a new lineup of football bowl agreements to run through the 2009 season that increases exposure and revenue, and allows Big 12 teams to play in some of America's best destination cities. He also helped the league enter into long-term relationships with Oklahoma City to continue as hosts



of the Big 12's successful baseball and softball championships, in addition to securing sites for the 2007 Dr Pepper Big 12 Football Championship and the '08 Phillips 66 Big 12 Men's and Women's Basketball Championships.

In 2005, he announced enhancements in regulatory spending by the Conference, introducing an expanded drug testing program to include a wider array of performance enhancing drugs; a three-year cycle of compliance audits by an outside firm of member institution's athletic departments; and a gambling awareness initiative.

Weiberg enters this year focused on securing prominent long-term television deals in football, men's basketball and other sports. He has also been working with the Conference's Board of Directors in establishing greater cooperation between member institutions in areas beyond

intercollegiate athletics.

During his recently completed tenure as coordinator of the BCS, Weiberg led the negotiation of a new four-year television contract with Fox Sports for the rights to Bowl Championship Series games, exclusive of the Rose Bowl, through 2009. His term as coordinator also saw the implementation of qualification standards for conferences, greater access for conferences and teams previously outside the system, renewed contracts with the BCS bowls, the realization of a simplified standings formula, the advent of a college football Top 25 poll, and introduction of transparency into the voting process.

Since being named the second commissioner in Big 12 history on October 8, 1998, and officially assuming the post December 4, 1998, the Big 12 has implemented a firm fiscal policy and continues to explore avenues to expand revenues. For the 2005-06 fiscal year, the Big 12 distributed \$102.5 million to its member institutions. Since beginning operations 10 years ago, the Conference has nearly doubled its first allocation of \$54 million established during its inaugural year and has distributed \$807.2 million to its member schools.

In January, 2005, the Board of Directors announced the four-year extension of Weiberg's contract through 2010, with a four-year option to 2014.

Prior to joining the Big 12 Conference, Weiberg worked in conference operations for almost 10 years at the Big Ten Conference, beginning as Associate Commissioner/Chief Operations Officer before being promoted to Deputy Commissioner.

His professional career began with a 1979-80 post as Sports Information Director at Wayne State (Neb.) College. Weiberg moved to Wichita State University from 1980-87. He was Sports Information Director at WSU from 1980-83, Assistant Athletics Director for Marketing/Fund Raising from 1983-86, and became Associate Director of Athletics in 1986-87. Weiberg then served as Associate Director of Athletics at the University of Maryland from 1987-89.

The Anthony, Kan., native earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Education from Kansas State University in 1978 and Master of Science degree in Athletics Administration from Western Illinois University in 1979.

Born July 7, 1956, Weiberg is married to the former Susan K. Latta. The couple has three children - Erika (20), Jenna (17) and Garrett (15).
