Big 12 Conference -- Celebrating It's 10th Season



The Big 12 celebrates its 10th anniversary season of competition in 2005-06. While there have been many proud accomplishments in the first nine years of the conference, the league and its members are also excited and poised for a bright future.

Over the past nine years, 24 different teams and over 200 individuals have won NCAA Championships. This past year marked the most successful in conference history. Baylor won the crown for women's basketball, becoming the first Big 12 squad to win in that sport. Colorado won both the men's and women's cross country trophies, just the fourth school in NCAA annals to win both in the same year. Oklahoma State regained the top spot in wrestling, winning the national title for the 33rd time, while Texas captured the women's outdoor track & field crown along with its sixth national championship in baseball.

Eight football squads have played in BCS bowls in the last six seasons. The Big 12 leads all conferences with four appearances in the National Championship game. In basketball, an unprecedented eight men's and women's basketball teams have advanced to their respective Final Fours in the past four seasons as the Big 12 continues its place among the elite intercollegiate athletic conferences.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

Competitive excellence, scholarships and sportsmanship are all equal

components of the Big 12's philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and All-Big 12 Academic squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons.

At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsperson of the Year awards.

Institutions can also nominate studentathletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships at the end of each academic year. A total of 129 scholars have received more than \$680,000 in postgraduate financial aid through the first eight years of the program.

The Big 12 sponsors 21 sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics,

indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The conference is made up of 12 institutions that have shared many traditional rivalries throughout their histories. Member schools include Baylor University, University of Colorado, Iowa State University, University of Kansas, Kansas State University, University of Missouri, University of Nebraska, University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma State University, University of Texas, Texas A&M University and Texas Tech University.

The institutions created a league that encompasses seven states, over 42 million people and more than 18 million television households within its geographic footprint.

The conference conducts championships for 20 of its 21 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition. The winner of the Big 12 football championship game earns the league's berth into the prestigious Bowl Championship Series.

The Big 12 is under the direction of its second commissioner, Kevin L. Weiberg, who took over the reins in December 1998. Under Weiberg's guidance, the league distributed over \$105 million to its member institutions for the 2004-05 academic year, nearly doubling the first allocation of \$54 million in the conference's inaugural 1996-97 campaign.

Weiberg has also helped lead the Big 12 into additional football bowl agreements and expanded television opportunities for all sports through contracts with ABC/ESPN, FSN, TBS and CSTV.



Baylor captured the Big 12's first National Championship in basketball last season.

The Big 12 has its headquarters in Dallas, Texas, where Weiberg and his staff administer to over 4,600 student-athletes in 21 sports.



Remembering Dr. Prentice Gautt

Gautt's strides reached beyond the football field

He played drums in the Douglass band. Studied hard and played drums and minded his own business.

When football coaches saw him in the hallway, saw the size of his body and the regalness of his character, they tried to entice him into shoulder pads. At first he said no.

But Prentice Gautt could not avoid his destiny. He eventually said yes to football. Yes to history.

Gautt died Thursday at the age of 67. A giant of Oklahoma sport. A giant of Oklahoma.

Not that he ever once acted like it.

"When you said the word 'Prentice,' the next word you said was 'humble,'" said Bill Hancock, who officed next to Gautt for 10 years in the old Big Eight Conference.

Gautt was our Jackie Robinson. He broke a barrier and changed a society. He did so not with fire but with elegance, not with venom but with eloquence. Pure class, that was Prentice Gautt. Pure class and a gentle spirit and a thirst for excellence.

Fifty years ago, a group of Oklahoma City black professionals carefully selected Gautt to integrate the Sooner football team. They believed, like Branch Rickey with Robinson, that the content of character was just as important as athletic ability in breaking OU's color line.

Gautt never stopped proving right those doctors and pharmacists.

"You can't find anyone to say anything bad about Prentice," said Charlie Greene, who had known

back then."

Gautt's contribution to Oklahoma is not small. He has membership in an exclusive club. Gautt changed our culture.

Gautt since summer days in the 1950s. "He was an astute person.

Always polite. Professional, even

He showed white Oklahomans that black players would only enhance, not harm, the Sooners' football tradition. Better yet, Gautt shined a path for young black boys, that the limits placed on their lives were not permanent.

The success of Gautt — a twotime All-Big Eight running back, 1958-59 — was a watershed moment for Oklahoma. "Really, really important," said Russell Perry, who graduated a year behind Gautt at Douglass High School and now operates an OKC media company that includes the Black Chronicle newspaper.

"It changed so many other young African Americans. They stressed in school, you can do the same things as Prentice."

Just as black fans graced major league stadiums before Jackie Robinson, black Oklahomans watched the Sooners at Owen Field before 1957.

"That was OU's prime," Perry said. "OU was at the apex. We saw them on television. We would even go down to some of their games."



The Big 12 Conference family lost a dear friend and co-worker when Dr. Prentice Gautt passed away on March 17, 2005. Included on this page is a story that appeared in The Daily Oklahoman on his life.

But Oklahoma's black youths knew their place. In 1955, when Gautt was a senior tailback at Douglass and Perry a junior quarterback, both were old enough to remember the Johnny Bright incident.

In a 1951 game at Stillwater, Drake's Bright — the first black to play on Lewis Field — suffered a fractured jaw on a vicious elbow by Oklahoma A&M's Wilbanks Smith. Drake officials claimed the blow was intentional, and a series of Des Moines Register photos, which eventually won a Pulitzer Prize, seemed to support the charge.

"We were products of segregation," Perry said. But when Gautt went to OU and became a star, the stain started to fade.


"It was kind of a reprieve for the state of Oklahoma," Perry said.

The integration of OU football came more than a decade before Texas or Arkansas did likewise. By the time the Longhorns and Razorbacks fully opened their doors, the Sooners had a black captain and a black quarterback.

It is reasonable to think that had Gautt not been such an ambassador, such a delightful pioneer, the racial walls would have crumbled much more slowly. Reasonable to think that Gautt sped up the process that gave every boy in Oklahoma, regardless of color, a reason to dream.

Said Perry, "It changed all our hopes." And to think, the drummer boy wanted no part of football.

But legendary Douglass coach Moses Miller finally convinced Gautt to give the sport a try. Soon enough, Bud Wilkinson was convinced to give Gautt a scholarship after those black professionals paid for Gautt's first semester at OU. Eventually, a state became convinced that segregation was not the way to go.



Academic Programs

Performance in the classroom is just as important as accolades on the field when looking at the student-athlete. The Big 12 Conference recognizes student-athletes in four areas for academic achievement. Those areas include the Commissioner's Honor Roll, Academic All-Big 12 teams, the Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, and the Big 12 Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship.

Commissioner's Honor Roll

Acknowledging all participants, the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll is an inclusive honor for all sports sponsored by the membership of the league. The Honor Roll is recorded and released each semester and recognizes those student-athletes who registered a 3.0 or better grade point average the previous semester.

Submitted through the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services at each institution, those honored are not necessarily the stars on the field and court but those who participate on the team. They include the letterwinners and non-letterwinners and recognize every student-athlete who has excelled in the classroom.

More than 2,000 Big 12 student-athletes are named to the Commissioner's Honor Rolls at the end of each of semester.

Academic All-Big 12 Teams

Recognizing those student-athletes who excel in the classroom and on the field and court, the Big 12 has academic all-conference teams for all sports.

Nominated by the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services and the Athletic Media Relations Directors, members of the all-academic teams have posted at least a 3.00 grade point average either cumulative or the previous two semesters and are regulars (i.e. letterwinners) on his or her respective team. First-team honorees are regulars who have at least a 3.20 GPA.

Last year, a few academic teams in the Big 12 exceeded 100 studentathletes recognized by the conference. In addition, student-athletes have gained recognition by being named to ESPN The Magazine/ CoSIDA Academic All-America teams.

Phillips 66 Classroom Champion

As Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, the conference recognizes 30 student-athletes per school who have excelled on the court and in the classroom. Chosen through the Big 12 membership, those honored are recognized throughout the year on the Big 12 telecasts, FSN and ESPN Regional Television.

Dr. Prentice Gautt Scholarship Program

With 72 student-athletes from all Big 12 schools honored over the last three years, the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships' list has grown to 129 recipients since the 1996-97 academic year.

Additional funding prior to the 2002-03 selection process allowed each school to name two outstanding scholars to the annual list of honorees. Conference officers also voted to name the postgraduate scholar-ship program awards after longtime Big 12 and Big Eight Conference Associate Commissioner and student services' pioneer Dr. Prentice Gautt in 2004. Dr. Gautt passed away on March 17, 2005.

The all-time group has solid representation of scholars throughout the 21 sponsored Big 12 sports and has provided just under \$700,000 through the 2004-05 academic year for much-needed financial aid. Three faculty representatives, one senior woman administrator and one director of athletics form the selection group for the prestigious awards, which help the youngsters to continue their formal education. Since its inception the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship program has produced over a dozen physicians, several attorneys for the underprivileged, college professors, Peace Corps volunteers and positions of national prominence.

Criteria for these awards include a cumulative grade point average of 3.500 on a 4.0 scale, participation in at least two years of intercollegiate athletics at the scholar-athlete's respective institution, and completion of athletics' eligibility. The scholar-athletes also must graduate from their respective member institutions within 15 months of their selection as postgraduate scholarship recipients and are expected to enroll in graduate/professional schools within 15 months after they graduate.

The \$2,500 individual annual grants began in 1996-97, were raised to \$5,000 in 1999 and climbed to \$6,900 after the 2003-04 term. Most honorees in recent years have also been named to Academic All-Big 12 Conference teams as well as the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor

Big 12 Life Skills & Special Olympics Programs

Two key aspects in the "Total Person" education of Big 12 Conference student-athletes are the life skills programs and key assistance for Special Olympics.

Both areas have been integral parts of the Big 12 Conference mission since its inception and continue to be significant. They were augmented in 1996 by Dr. Prentice Gautt, a trendsetter in college athletics, life skills, student services, and community action as well as the first African-American football student-athlete at the University of Oklahoma.

With the assistance of conference staff, directors of student services and other key agencies, this group of talented youngsters has provided feedback for Big 12 administrators. The Student-Athletes Advisory Committee has been proactive in promoting NCAA legislation, providing feedback to the Conference Office, and conference representatives in guidelines for Big 12 academic honor teams, the Commissioner's Honor Roll and other areas of recognition for classroom accomplishments.

Recent SAAC meetings also have included visits to children at area medical facilities as well as input for service projects for student-athletes throughout the league.

Besides such life skills' and athletics' areas as eligibility concerns, time spent between studies, events and practice sessions, placement in the business world, or graduate school opportunities, the program emphasizes "Stay in School" motivational speeches, anti-violence messages, anti-drug/addictive behavior, "YES," and other community-designed programs.

Both life skills and Special Olympics receive ample coverage in the Big 12 through such areas as the Community Champions Awards often featured on the Big 12 Showcase telecasts. They also are given pregame and halftime scoreboard recognition slots at all conference schools, scholarship programs, and a series of free clinics in such sports as youth football, soccer, volleyball, men's and women's basketball, softball and baseball, among others. A conference-wide printed and electronically-distributed newsletter for life skills also has been produced, and several schools promote similar publications or on-line information.

Special Olympics, the Big 12's charity of choice since May 1996, has held a special place in the hearts of many in the conference for years before the current association.

The Big 12 works closely with the statewide Special Olympics' organizations in Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas to coordinate projects, provide information, and invite Olympians to attend events such as media or fan appreciation days for various Big 12 sports.

For five decades current Big 12 members have provided facilities with a combined capacity of just over one million fans for Special Olympics' competition in the always-popular sports of track and field, softball, swimming and diving, weightlifting and wrestling. The national program, which was founded by members of the extended family of late President John F. Kennedy and which receives financial support from worldwide charitable sources, has earned the title "Most Credible Charity in America" in a

survey by Chronicle of Philanthropy and "Top Charity" among Time Magazine subscribers.

Specifically, some cooperative highlights of the Big 12 and Special Olympics have been public service announcements appearing on most league telecasts, donations to the charity by Big 12 student-athletes and fans, clinics with league coaches, student-athletes and interaction with the Olympians, and special seasonal camps in several sports. Both regionally and nationally, there has been Big 12 involvement in Special Olympics' meetings. Conference schools and the league office also have helped to arrange for Big 12 head coaches, student-athletes, and administrators to meet with their Special Olympics' counterparts. Many Big 12 school dignitaries also have devoted their talents to opening ceremonies and awards' events.

The chances to create dialogue, friendship and hugs among the Special Olympians and interested groups from Big 12 schools have brought both groups ample satisfaction.

Athlete of the Year

The Big 12 has annually recognized its top male and female athletes of the year since the inception of the conference. The Athlete of the Year Awards are selected by a media panel based on athletic performance, academic achievement and citizenship within the

Osterman, who will be a senior on the Texas softball squad this season, was named the USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year in 2005 for the second time (2003). She won a gold medal as a member of the U.S. Olympic Softball Team in the 2004 Athens Olympic Games. She was the recipient of the 2005 Honda Award for softball and earned her third All-America and All-Midwest Region honors while leading the Longhorns to a third-place finish in the College World Series.

Johnson completed his collegiate football career at Texas in 2004. He was honored with the 2004 Nagurski Trophy as the nation's top defensive player and the 2004 Butkus Award as college football's top linebacker. He was a unanimous consensus first team All-American and Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year.

Sportsperson of the Year

The Big 12 also recognizes its top male and female sportsperson. The Sportspersons of the Year Award was started prior to the 2000-01 academic year to recognize student-athletes who displayed an extraordinary degree of sportsmanship and/or community service from within the conference. The honorees are selected by a media panel.

In 2004-05, the winners were Richelle Simpson from Nebraska and Ahmard Hall from Texas.

Simpson recently completed a stellar career at NU, winning honors as the nation's top gymnast in 2005. A nine-time All-America selection, she responded strongly to adversity after multiple knee injuries, including one that ended her career. She was very active in the community, with extensive leadership activities.

Hall is a veteran who served four years of active duty in the Marines, including tours in Kosovo and Opera-



Big 12 Scheduling and Championship Tiebreaker

Scheduling Format

For scheduling purposes, the Big 12 is divided into six-team divisions. All teams will play a schedule which consists of a double round-robin within their division and single games against all teams in the opposite division for a total of 16 conference games. The team(s) with the best winning percentage in the 16 conference games is declared the Big 12 regular season champion(s).

Championship Tiebreaker Procedure

Following is the procedure for breaking ties in seeding for the Big 12 Basketball championships (men's and women's). Championship seeds are ranked 1-12 based on conference winning percentage. Ties are only broken for seeding purposes. If two or more teams tie for first in the final regular season rankings, multiple champions are crowned.

- (a) If two teams are tied and they are from different divisions, the winner of the game between the two tied teams shall be the higher seed.
- (b) If two teams are tied and they are from the same division, the team with an advantage in head-to-head competition shall be the higher seed.
- (c) If two teams remain tied, there will be a comparison of overall record against division teams only (10 divisional games).
- (d) If two teams remain tied, there will be a *comparison of record against the highest ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the division and proceeding through in order of divisional finish.

- (e) If two teams remain tied, there will be a *comparison of record against the highest ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the opposite division and proceeding through in order of divisional finish.
- (f) If two teams remain tied, the higher seed will be chosen by draw.
- (g) If three or more teams are tied, ties among divisional opponents will be broken by using steps (b) through (f) and the head-to-head results will be used to break ties between non-divisional teams. When three or more teams from the same division are tied step (b) will consist of a mini-round robin among those tied teams. At any point during the process of breaking ties among three or more teams that the number of tied teams are reduced to two, head-to-head competition would be used as the primary tiebreaker, followed by steps (c) through (f).

*Note: When comparing against the 'highest' ranked team(s) in either division, the comparison will be based upon how tied teams did against all teams in a given placement, rather than a team that wins a tiebreaker at another position. For example, if two teams are tied for fifth and two teams are tied for first, the head-to-head comparison would be how the fifth place teams did against the first place teams combined, and vice versa

He supported the academic reform effort that introduced Academic Progress Reports for NCAA member institutions and the approval of 12-game regular seasons in I-A football. He has also previously served a three-year term on the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee and completed a two-year tenure as chair of the Division I-A Collegiate Commissioners' Association.

This season marks his second and final as coordinator of the Bowl Championship Series. As BCS coor-

dinator Weiberg led the negotiation of a new four-year television contract with Fox Sports for the rights to Bowl Championship Series games, exclusive of the Rose Bowl, through the 2009 season. His term as coordinator has also seen the implementation of qualification standards for conferences, greater access for conferences and teams previously outside the system, renewed contracts with the BCS bowls, the realization of a simplified standings formula, the advent of a college football Top 25 poll, and introduction of transparency into the voting process.

This past spring he announced enhancements in regulatory spending by the Conference, introducing an expanded drug testing program to include a wider array of performance enhancing drugs; a three-year cycle of compliance audits by an outside firm of member institution's athletic departments; and a gambling awareness initiative.

Weiberg is working with the Conference's Board of Directors in establishing an economic development consortium to provide benefits to member institutions beyond intercollegiate athletics. He will also be focused on arranging the next round of bowl agreements for the league, future hosting sites for the Big 12 football, basketball and baseball championships, and television negotiations.

Since being named the second commissioner in Big 12 history on October 8, 1998, and officially assuming the post December 4, 1998, a total of 21 NCAA championships have been won by conference teams with nearly 200 individual national titles to the league's credit. The conference has had an unprecedented eight men's and women's basketball teams advance to their respective Final Fours in the past four seasons, highlighted by Baylor's women's basketball National Championship in 2004-05. The Big 12 also has sent 10 teams to BCS bowls in the seven-year history of the system, with four appearances in the National Championship game since 2000. The league's success continued in 2004-05, with NCAA team championships in women's cross country, men's cross country, wrestling, women's basketball,

women's outdoor track & field and baseball. In fact, Weiberg has seen



at least one team win a national title every season since being named Commissioner.

During his tenure, the Big 12 has also implemented a firm fiscal policy and continues to explore avenues to expand revenues. For the 2004-05 fiscal year, the Big 12 distributed a record \$105.6 million to its member institutions. Since beginning operations nine years ago, the Conference has nearly doubled its first allocation of \$54 million established during its inaugural year.

In January, 2005, the Board of Directors announced the four-year extension of Weiberg's contract through 2010, with a four-year option to 2014.

Prior to joining the Big 12 Conference, Weiberg worked in conference operations for almost 10 years at the Big Ten Conference, beginning as Associate Commissioner/Chief Operations Officer before being promoted

to Deputy Commissioner.

His professional career began with a 1979-80 post as Sports Information Director at Wayne State (Neb.) College. Weiberg moved to Wichita State University from 1980-87. He was Sports Information Director at WSU from 1980-83, Assistant Athletics Director for Marketing/Fund Raising from 1983-86, and became Associate Director of Athletics in 1986-87. Weiberg then served as Associate Director of Athletics at the University of Maryland from 1987-89.

The Anthony, Kan., native earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Education from Kansas State University in 1978 and Master of Science degree in Athletics Administration from Western Illinois University in 1979.



Big 12 Captures Sixth Consecutive Attendance Crown

Big 12 women's basketball captured the conference attendance crown for the sixth consecutive year by totaling 937,611 fans for a 5,180 average in 2004-05.

A conference has surpassed the 5,000-average plateau only six times in NCAA history and the Big 12 has five of those in consecutive years from 2001-05.

The Big 12 set all-time national highs in 2001-02 while achieving its goal of becoming the first conference to draw one million fans to its games. The 1,002,251 cumulative attendance is still an NCAA record as is the 5,381 average set in 2003-04.

Baylor was seventh with 221,311 spectators at 36 contests while Texas was 10th with 200,536 at 31 outings.

Baylor and Nebraska were among the Top 10 schools for largest increase in average home attendance from 2003-04 to 2004-05. Baylor ranked second after improving its average by 2,169 per game while Nebraska was 10th with a 948 average increase.

The "Million Fan March" campaign was established prior to the 2000-01 season with the goal of the Big 12 becoming the first conference in the NCAA to draw 1,000,000 during the season. The Big 12 fell short of the mark in 2000-01, its first major promotional attempt, but continued the project and was successful in 2001-02 as "Million Fan March 2."

Big 12 Women's Basketball Superlatives

DID YOU KNOW...

- → The Big 12 Conference captured its first national championship in women's basketball in 2005 with Baylor winning the title.
- → The Big 12 has placed teams in the NCAA Women's Basketball Final Four in three of the last four years. Oklahoma made the league's first appearance in 2002 and advanced to the championship game. Texas made the 2003 field. Baylor won the championship in 2005.
- ◆ The Big 12 Conference has made 68 postseason appearances (53 NCAA, 15 WNIT) in its nine years of existence.
- → Big 12 men's and women's basketball combined earned 12 NCAA Tournament bids in 2005. In nine years, 134 Big 12 men's and women's teams have advanced to postseason play, 101 in NCAA Tournaments and 33 in the NIT/WNIT.
- ■◆ Big 12 Conference schools have hosted NCAA first and second rounds seven times in the last three years of predetermined sites. Texas and Texas Tech co-hosted in Dallas in 2005, the first year of the eight-team pod system. Iowa State and Texas were subregional hosts in 2004 while joining Colorado, Kansas State, Oklahoma, and Texas Tech in 2003. In addition four Big 12 schools have hosted the Midwest Regional in the past six years. Colorado will host 2006 first and second rounds in Denver.
- ◆ Every Big 12 Conference team has participated in the NCAA Tournament, and the league accounts for 113 total appearances second among all Division I conferences.
- → Big 12 Conference teams have compiled 137 NCAA Tournament wins to tie for third among all leagues.
- ➡ Eleven Big 12 Conference teams have advanced to an NCAA Regional for a total of 46 appearances, including 23 in the last nine years. In 2002, the Big 12 had a conference-record five teams (Colorado, Kansas State, Oklahoma, Texas, and Texas Tech) compete in Regionals and followed that with three (Colorado, Texas, and Texas Tech) in 2003. Baylor made its first Sweet 16 appearance in 2004 and was joined by Texas. Baylor and Texas Tech advanced to 2005 Regionals. Big 12 teams have made 19 trips to a Regional Final.
- Three Big 12 Conference teams Baylor, Texas and Texas Tech have won national championships. Texas won the 1986 title with a perfect 34-0 record and is one of only four teams to record a perfect season in NCAA history. Texas Tech captured the 1993 championship with a 31-3 mark. Baylor won the 2005 title with a 33-3 record, a Big 12-high for wins in a season. Texas also competed in the 1987 and 2003 Final Fours while Oklahoma was in the 2002 title game.
- → The Big 12 Conference has had a team ranked in every Associated Press (166) and USA Today/EPSN (171) Top 25 Poll the past nine seasons. In 2004 the Big 12 earned its first No. 1 rankings with Texas Tech ranked in the top spot in the

- Jan. 6 and 13 coaches' polls and Texas rated first in the Feb. 9 and 16 AP polls. Baylor was the top rated team in the 2005 final USA Today/ESPN poll after winning the national championship.
- ► In the Associated Press Poll, Big 12 schools have been ranked 703 times, including 221 appearances in the Top 10 in the past nine years.
- The league has had a conference-high seven teams ranked in 11 AP and USA Today/ESPN polls in Big 12 history. Seven teams were ranked in the Jan. 26, 2004, AP edition and in the final 10 AP polls and the final 11 USA Today/ESPN polls of the 2001-02 season. January 7, 2002, rankings marked the first time in the history of the Big 12 that it had seven rated teams. The Big 12 led all conferences with seven ranked teams in the final 2001-02 polls, all among the top 17. The conference has had at least six teams ranked on 27 occasions overall. The Big 12 ended the 2004-05 season with a nation-high five ranked teams.
- The Big 12 captured the NCAA attendance crown for the sixth consecutive year in 2005 with 937,611 total fans. The 5,180 average marked the sixth time in history a league has surpassed the 5,000 mark. The Big 12 has had five of those after also accomplishing this feat from 2001-04 and holds the NCAA record with a 5,381 average in 2004. In 2002, the Big 12 reached its goal of one million fans in women's basketball attendance with an NCAA record 1,002,651 total spectators.
- → The Big 12 Conference has a 988-384 (.720) record against non-conference competition in the last nine seasons.
- ◆ Current Big 12 Conference coaches have notched three NCAA titles, 3,385 wins and a .700 winning percentage.
- Texas head coach Jody Conradt was the second woman in history to be inducted into the Naismith National Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame. Former Kansas player and assistant coach Lynette Woodard was inducted in 2004. Conradt was a member of the first class (1999) inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame. Other Big 12 representatives in the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame include Baylor head coach Kim Mulkey-Robertson (2000), Kansas State associate head coach and former Texas All-American Kamie Ethridge (2002), Texas Tech head coach Marsha Sharp (2003), former Kansas head coach Marian Washington (2004) and former Kansas standout Lynette Woodard (2005). Mulkey-Robertson was also a 2003 inductee in the CoSIDA Academic Hall of Fame.
- ► Student-athletes from Big 12 Conference schools have been named Kodak All-America first team 26 times, won three Boost-Naismith trophies, five Wade trophies, two Rawlings/WBCA Player of the Year awards, and earned one spot (Clarissa Davis) on the NCAA Team of the Decade for the 1980s. Add to this eight student-athletes on Olympic Teams, numerous invitations to compete on USA national teams and 18 spots on Academic All-America first teams.

Big 12 Welcomes Two New Head Coaches

Two new head coaches have joined the Big 12 family. Kathy McConnell-Miller has taken over the reins at Colorado from Ceal Barry who retired to become Associate Athletics Director/Academics and Student Services. McConnell-Miller spent the last six years at Tulsa where she compiled a 91-88 (.508) record and took her teams to the last two WNITs. Budke is the new mentor at Oklahoma State. He was the head coach at Louisiana Tech the past three seasons and recorded an 80-16 (.833) mark with three NCAA Championship appearances.

Big 12 teams return 96 letterwinners, including 43 starters to 2005-06 rosters. Missouri returns its entire starting lineup while Nebraska returns five players with starting experience. Big 12 Schools Chosen to Host Future NCAA Championship Rounds

Four Big 12 schools have been chosen host sites for upcoming NCAA Championship rounds. Colorado will host first and second rounds March 18 and 20, 2006, at Denver's Pepsi Center. Texas' Frank Erwin Center will be one of the eight sites for 2007 first and second rounds. Iowa State will host 2008 first and second rounds in the Wells Fargo Arena at the Iowa Events Center in Des Moines while Oklahoma was awarded a 2008 regional in Oklahoma City's Ford Center.

In 2005 Texas and Texas Tech hosted first and second rounds in Dallas' Reunion Arena in the NCAA's first year of using a pod system. The NCAA used 16 predetermined sites in 2003 and 2004. Six Big 12 schools hosted over those two years - Colorado, Kansas State, Oklahoma and Texas Tech in 2003, and Iowa State and Texas in 2004. Prior to 2003 the top 16 seeds hosted first and second rounds at their home sites.

All 12 Teams Have Been to the Big Dance

Every Big 12 Conference team has made an appearance in the NCAA Championship. Texas leads the pack as the Longhorns made their 21st appearance in 2005 out of the 24 NCAA tournaments. Only four schools (Louisiana Tech, Tennessee, Georgia, Old Dominion) have made more NCAA Champi-

onship appearances than Texas. Also in 2005, Texas Tech made its 18th appearance and 16th straight. Kansas State made the tourney field for the ninth time and Oklahoma the eighth. Iowa State appeared in its seventh NCAA Championship and Baylor its fourth, all since 2001.

The Big 12 in Final Fours

The Big 12 was represented in the Final Four for the third time in four years in 2005 with Baylor's march to the national championship. Oklahoma made the league's first appearance in 2002 and played in the national championship game, falling to Connecticut. Texas advanced to the Final Four in 2003 and dropped a two-point decision to UConn in the semifinals. The Big 12 is 2-1 in national semifinal games and 1-1 in championship games.

Baylor's appearance was the sixth for Big 12 teams. Texas made two trips and Texas Tech one while members of the Southwest Conference. Texas won the 1986 national championship with a perfect 34-0 record and is one of only four teams to record a perfect season in NCAA history (Connecticut in 2002 and 1995; Tennessee in 1998). Texas Tech captured the 1993 championship with a 31-3 record. Teams from the state of Texas are 3-0 in national championship games.
