NOTABLES

- **SIXTH-SEED HISTORY** ... UT enters the Phillips 66 Big 12 Women's Basketball Championship as the No. 6 seed for the second time in school history. The Longhorns sport a 3-1 record when playing as the sixth seed, and advanced to one of Texas' three championship game appearances as No. 6 in 2000.
- **BETTER BY THE YEAR** ... Texas finished Big 12 play with eight league wins, marking its most since recording 13 in 2004-05. The Longhorns have steadily improved their performance in league play over the past three season, as they recorded six league victories in 2007 and seven in 2008.
- LINDSEY LEADING THE LONGHORNS ... Over the last four games, senior forward Ashley Lindsey has led the Longhorns with an average of 7.5 rpg and 53.8 percent shooting from the field (21-of-39) in 27.5 mpg. She is also second on the team in scoring over that stretch, averaging 12.8 ppg.

SERIES VS. MISSOURI

Thursday's contest marks the 18th meeting between Texas and Missouri. Texas holds a 16-1 advantage in the all-time series that began on Feb. 18, 1980, with a 77-74 UT win in Austin. The Longhorns have won the last nine meetings, including a 66-56 decision earlier this season in Columbia (Feb. 24). UT is 1-0 all-time against Missouri in the Big 12 Championship.

A CHECK OF THE POLLS

Texas is ranked No. 23 in the latest Associated Press poll (March 9) and No. 16 in the latest ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll (Mar. 3). Texas is 5-5 this season against AP Top 25 opponents and 2-5 in Big 12 contests.

FLASHBACK: AT MISSOURI (FEB. 24)

(AP) - Brittainey Raven scored a career-high 31 points and 16th-ranked Texas overcame an early 10-point deficit to beat Missouri 66-56 on Feb. 24. The Longhorns (20-7, 8-5 Big 12) also got 10 points each from Ashley Lindsey and Kathleen Nash as they shook off back-to-back losses to Oklahoma State and Texas A&M. Texas got off to a slow start, hitting 3-of-12 field goals and falling behind 19-9. But a 3-pointer by Nash with 9:32 left in the first half put the Longhorns back in the game. Texas took the lead for good at 24-22 on a putback by Nash and led 30-24 at halftime. The Tigers closed within 34-31 early in the second half but got no closer the rest of the way, as Texas held them to 8-for-33 shooting in the period.

LAST TIME OUT: OKLAHOMA (MARCH 8)

(AP) - Danielle Robinson scored 17 points for No. 3 Oklahoma, and the Big 12 champions ended the regular season with a 74-62 win over No. 15 Texas on March 8. Courtney Paris added 16 points for the Sooners, but had just six rebounds to miss her 124th career double-double in 130 games. Oklahoma (27-3, 15-1) built the lead as high as 27 in the second half, then watched Texas (20-10, 8-8) rally to within 11 in the final minute. Ashley Lindsey scored 16 to lead the Longhorns.

TEXAS-OKLAHOMA NOTES

- Texas finished the regular season with eight Big 12 regularseason wins, marking its most since recording 13 in 2004-05.
- Texas used the starting lineup of Carla Cortijo, Ashleigh Fontenette, Kathleen Nash, Earnesia Williams and Ashley Lindsey for the first time this season.
- Oklahoma shot .566 (30-of-53) from the field, marking the second-highest field-goal percentage by a Texas opponent this season
- Texas used a 24-10 run in the second half that spanned from 12:29-4:02 (eight minutes, 27 seconds) to cut the deficit to 13, 67-54.
- Texas also recorded four steals in the same span ... Texas
 finished the game with eight steals after recording just two in
 the first half.

BETTER IN THE BIG 12 CHAMPIONSHIP

To keep the Horns' hopes of winning a Big 12 Championship alive, seniors Carla Cortijo and Earnesia Williams have proven to step up their game in the league's postseason tournament. Cortijo has posted a total of 69 points in five Big 12 Championship games, which averages out to 13.8 per contest, four points more than her career average of 8.08 in Big 12 games. The guard's lone career 20-point game also came in the postseason tournament, when she went off for 24 points to upset No. 2 seed Baylor in 2008. Williams has provided the team's defensive leadership in championship play as she has averaged 6.2 rebounds in five games (up from 4.2 during conference play), including a 13-board effort against Baylor last season.

QUARTET EARNS ALL-BIG 12 HONORS

Four Texas players earned spots on the 2008-09 Phillips 66 All-Big 12 Women's Basketball teams. Junior guard Brittainey Raven was named to the All-Big 12 Second Team for the second-consecutive year, and freshman guard Ashleigh Fontenette earned a spot on the Big 12 All-Freshman Team. Senior guard Carla Cortijo picked up her second All-Big 12 Honorable Mention accolade in as many seasons, while sophomore guard Kathleen Nash earned her first.

GOESTENKORS IN THE BIG 12 CHAMPIONSHIP

In 2008, then-first year Texas head coach Gail Goestenkors led UT to a semifinal appearance in the Big 12 Women's Basketball Championship as a seven seed. The Longhorns upset the second-seeded Baylor Lady Bears in last year's quarterfinals after overcoming a 16-point halftime deficit - the largest deficit ever overcome in the history of Phillips 66 Big 12 Championship action. Goestenkors holds a 2-1 record in the conference tournament.

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

The big statistical difference in Texas' 20 wins and 10 losses this season can be traced to the defensive end of the court. In its 20 wins, Texas has held opponents to an average of 53.0 points per contest and a combined .328 percent FG shooting, including an 82-of-325 (.252) mark from three-point range.

20 WINS...AGAIN

With a 66-56 victory at Missouri on Feb. 24, the Longhorns reached their second-consecutive 20-win season under second-year head coach Gail Goestenkors. The 2008-09 squad is the 28th team in Texas' 35 years of women's basketball to eclipse the 20-win mark, and Goestenkors' 12th-consecutive team to record 20 or more wins.

HOT FROM THE FIELD

Eight Texas players are shooting 40 percent or better from the field. Junior **Kristen Nash** (.512) leads the Longhorns, while seniors Ashley Lindsey (.495) and Earnesia Williams (.485) rank second and third, respectively. Three Longhorns have also made 33 or more three-pointers this season (**Kathleen Nash** - 44; **Erika Arriaran** - 38; **Brittainey Raven** - 33).

THREE-POINT SUCCESS

Texas has converted 36.8 percent (159-of-432) from beyond the arc. UT is 11-2 on the season when shooting 40 percent or better from three-point range. The Horns recorded a season-high 13-of-23 performance (.565) at Oklahoma State (Feb. 5), and their 13 three pointers in that game stand as the second-best single-game record in Texas history.

AMONG THE LEAGUE'S BEST

Through the Big 12 regular season, the Longhorns found themselves among the top three in seven statistical categories. Texas ranked among the league's best in the following categories:

STRENGTH OF SCHEDULE

Texas has faced 10 opponents ranked in the AP Top 25 during its 30 games this season. The Horns are 5-5 this year against the AP Top 25. During its non-conference schedule, Texas faced ranked opponents from the Southeastern Conference (Tennessee), Pac-10 Conference (Arizona State) and Colonial Athletic Association (Old Dominion). In its five wins against the AP Top 25, Texas is defeating its opponent by an average of 12.8 points. Here's a look at this season's results (ranking at time of game).

FRESHMEN FAIRING WELL

Texas' freshmen class has responded well to the pressures of Big 12 play, as Ashleigh Fontenette and Ashley Gayle rank among the top-three league freshmen in scoring, three-point field goals, steals, rebounding, assists and blocked shots. Fontenette ranks second among her peers in scoring (8.3 ppg), three-point field goals (10-of-23, .435) and steals (1.50 spg), and is third in rebounding (3.4 rpg) and assists (1.63 apg), while Gayle is second in her class with 1.31 bpg.

NO LACK OF EXPERIENCE HERE

The Texas women's basketball coaching staff has a combined total of 87 years of experience. Mickie DeMoss leads the way with 31 years, including eight as a head coach (Kentucky, 2003-07; Florida, 1979-83). Gale Valley has 26, 15 of which were spent at Duke with head coach Gail Goestenkors, who has 22 years under her belt (one at Texas, 15 at Duke, six as an assistant at Purdue). LaKale Malone has been coaching for eight years, five of which have been in the Big 12. The Longhorns' 87 years are tied for the most in the Big 12 with lowa State.

GOESTENKORS VS. IN-STATE OPPONENTS

Second-year head coach Gail Goestenkors boasts a 14-8 record against in-state opponents. She collected her first win against a fellow Texas opponent with a 94-35 win over Lamar on Nov. 15, 2007. In Big 12 contests, Goestenkors is 6-8 against in-state rivals.

ARRIARAN CHASING 3-POINT RECORD

Junior guard **Erika Arriaran** entered the season with 72 three-pointers under her belt, a mark that stood as the 10th-best career record in Texas history. Since the season began, Arriaran has totalled 38 baskets from long distance, and her 110 career shots from beyond the arc now ranks seventh in Texas' annals.

REBOUNDING RUNDOWN

Texas has outrebounded its opponents in 17 of its 30 games. The Longhorns sport a +5.3 rebound margin (40.2-34.9) and have recorded at least a +10 advantage in 10 contests. UT posted a season-high 52 rebounds in its 73-59 win over Tennessee on Dec. 14, and most recently outrebounded then-No. 3/3 Oklahoma, 38-32, at home on March 8.

WILLIAMS ON POINT

Senior forward **Earnesia Williams** has been efficient this season, to say the least. **Williams ranks third on the team in field goal percentage (63-of-130, .485) and has been perfect from the field in four contests this year** (4-of-4 FG -- Dayton, Nov. 15; 5-of-5 FG -- No. 21 Arizona State, Dec. 18; 4-of-4 FG -- Lamar, Jan. 3; 1-of-1 FG -- Oklahoma State, Feb. 18). Williams has connected on 50 percent or more of her shots in 16 of 29 contests, while improving her shooting percentage more than eight percent from last season (97-of-241, .402).

BEST START SINCE 1985-86

With their 11-0 start to the season, the Longhorns recorded their best start since the 1985-86 season when they went 34-0 and won Texas' first NCAA Championship. Only two of Texas' 32 teams started the season with an 11-0 start prior to this year's squad the 1985-86 and 1979-80 teams.

DOMINANT DEFENSE

Texas has held its opponents to an average of 58.2 points per contest and a combined 36.6 percent FG shooting, including a 127-of-448 (.283) mark from 3-point range. UT has held 20 of its 30 opponents to under 40 percent FG shooting and eight to under 30 percent FG shooting.

TEXAS DEPTH

Through 30 games, the Longhorns have showcased the team's depth with seven different leading or co-leading scorers and 10 different leading rebounders. Junior Brittainey Raven has been the team's leading or co-leading scorer in 14 games, while sophomore Kathleen Nash has held the title in six games, junior Erika Arriaran and senior Ashley Lindsey in four each and senior Carla Cortijo in three. Senior Earnesia Williams was Texas' top scorer against Dayton (Nov. 15) and Texas Tech (Feb. 8). Freshman Ashleigh Fontenette was the youngest Longhorn to lead the squad after posting a career-high 21 points against Nebraska (Jan. 14). On the rebounding side, Ka. Nash has led or co-led in 13 games followed by Lindsey, who has led seven times this season.

HORNS AT HOME

Texas finished its 32nd year of play in the Frank Erwin Center with a 12-4 record and improved to **405-72** (.**849**) all-time in the **building.** Texas has an all-time 77-51 (.602) mark against AP Top 25 teams at home, and boasts a 5-5 record under second-year head coach Gail Goestenkors.

PASSING IT AROUND

The Longhorns have dominated their opponents in assists through 30 games this season. Texas has recorded 399 assists to its opponents' 313, with senior guard Carla Cortijo dishing out 142. Cortijo has recorded double-digit assists in two games this season (12 vs. Saint Mary's, Nov. 16; 10 vs. Nebraska, Jan. 14).

NASH SEEING DOUBLE

Sophomore guard **Kathleen Nash** posted her third double-double effort of the season on Feb. 1 at then-No. 4/3 Baylor. She had 11 points and 10 rebounds in Texas' 58-55 victory. Her first double-double of the season came against Texas A&M-Corpus Christi (Nov. 20) when she posted 12 boards and 11 points, and her second came at Texas' Big 12 opener at Texas Tech on Jan. 10 (20 points, 14 rebounds). **Nash leads the Longhorns with three double-doubles, while senior Ashley Lindsey has two.**

21 FOR FONTENETTE

With her career-high 21 points against Nebraska (Jan. 14), Ashleigh Fontenette became the first Longhorn freshman to score 20+ points in a game since 2004 when current WNBA standout and UT legend Tiffany Jackson connected for 22 points during her debut season at Nebraska (Jan. 28, 2004). Fontenette is the fourth Longhorn this season to eclipse the 20+ point mark, joining junior Brittainey Raven (seven times), sophomore Kathleen Nash (five times) and junior Erika Arriaran (once) in accomplishing the feat.

ARRIARAN IMPRESSIVE OFF THE BENCH

Junior guard Erika Arriaran put together a string of four-straight contests with double-figure scoring in Big 12 contests dating from Feb. 8-18. Arriaran scored 51 points and averaged 12.8 ppg during that span and is currently third on the team in scoring, averaging 7.9 ppg.

THE ASHLEYS DOMINATE

At 6-4, freshman Ashley Gayle shares the title of Tallest Longhorn with senior Ashley Lindsey. The pair share duties in Texas' frontcourt defense and have proved to be serious threats to offensive attacks. Lindsey is closing in on Texas' all-time blocks record while Gayle plays above the rim with a flat-footed, non-step vertical reach of 10-2. Lindsey's vertical jump reaches an even 10 feet. Through 30 games, the Ashleys have combined for 121 of Texas' 163 blocks (74.2 percent).

HORNS' BENCH MAKING AN IMPACT

Texas has displayed its depth throughout the 2008-09 season, as its bench has outscored the opponents' bench 803-407. The Longhorns have held their opponents' subs to single digits in 12 games this season: vs. Dayton (37-8; Nov. 15), vs. #25/20 Old Dominion (33-9; Nov. 17), vs. Texas A&M-Corpus Christi (34-9; Nov. 20), vs. Furman (33-9; Nov. 23), vs. Lamar (26-9; Jan. 3), vs. #11/7 Texas A&M (22-9; Jan. 28), at #4/3 Baylor (17-8; Feb. 1), vs. Texas Tech (38-5, Feb. 8), at #16/20 lowa State (39-4, Feb. 15), vs. Oklahoma State (34-9, Feb. 18), at Missouri (15-6, Feb. 24) and vs. #3/3 Oklahoma (16-6, March 8). Additionally, UT held the San Diego State, Colorado and Kansas State benches scoreless. The Longhorn bench is outscoring its opponents' by an average of 27-13.

COACH'S KID

To say freshman **Yvonne Anderson** knows a little bit about basketball would be an understatement. She is the daughter of Missouri men's basketball coach Mike Anderson (2006-present). Not only did she grow up surrounded by college basketball, Anderson was even born during March Madness 1990, the same year her father was an assistant head coach at Arkansas and on a run to the Final Four. Yvonne was born on March 8, 1990.

CORTIJO CRACKS TOP 10

Senior guard **Carla Cortijo** cracked Texas' all-time Top 10 list for career assists when she collected the 400th of her career against San Diego State on Dec. 30. **Cortijo has 475 assists in 101 games and currently ranks fifth in Texas' annals.** Additionally, her 172 assists last season ranks second all-time by Texas juniors. Kamie Etheridge holds the all-time junior class assists record with 226 in 1984-85.

SOPHOMORE STRIDE

Sophomore guard **Kathleen Nash** netted a career-high 27 points in Texas' 81-71 win over then-No. 21 Arizona State (Dec. 18) and also tied the school record with a 12-of-12 performance from the charity stripe in the same game. **Nash is second on the team in scoring with 11.6 points per game**. Additionally, Nash registered a career-high 14 rebounds at Texas Tech (Jan. 10).

RAVEN CROSSES CAREER MILESTONE

Junior guard Brittainey Raven became the newest member of Texas' 1,000 Point Club during the Jan. 10 contest at Texas Tech. Raven scored a game-high 21 points in Texas' 62-65 loss, where she crossed the 1K mark with 5:27 remaining in the first half with a three-point basket. She became the 33rd player in Texas history to accomplish the feat. Prior to Raven, the last player to eclipse the 1K mark was current WNBA standout Tiffany Jackson who accomplished the feat over the course of her sophomore year (2004-05).

Texas finished the month of November with a perfect 7-0 record.

Over the years, the Longhorns have recorded 15 spotless records in November months with their last coming in the 2003-04 season (6-0). UT is 121-27 (.818) all-time in the month of November.

LINDSEY CLOSING IN ON BLOCKS RECORDS

Senior post **Ashley Lindsey** has amassed 247 blocks in 119 games, placing her second all-time in the UT annals. Lindsey surpassed former runner-up Angela Jackson (1994-97, 221 blocks) on Jan. 28, 2009, with three blocks against Texas A&M. In addition, Lindsey's 94 single-season rejections during her junior year rank No. 2 in the UT season record books.

NASH'S CAREER NIGHT

Sophomore guard Kathleen Nash recorded a handful of career-bests against No. 21/21 Arizona State on Dec. 18. Nash posted a career-high 27 points for her eighth double-digit scoring effort of the season, and her 20+ points was both her third of the season and of her career. The lone sophomore on the roster also led the Horns in points for the second time this season and fifth time in her career. Nash's biggest feat of the night was her perfect 12-of-12 performance from the charity stripe, which was not just a career high, but also tied Texas' record for best FT percentage in a game (12-of-12, 1.000 percent). She became the third person in Longhorn history to accomplish the feat.

ARRIARAN RETURNS TO ACTION

Junior guard **Erika Arriaran** is back in action for the Longhorns after a nearly two-year absence from the court. **Through 30 games, Arriaran ranks fourth on the team in scoring with 230 points (7.7 ppg) and is 89-of-230 (.387) from the field.** Arriaran suffered a left knee ACL tear with 31 second left in UT's Jan. 7, 2007 upset win over then-No. 10 Purdue, only to re-injure the same knee before the 2007-08 season began. Arriaran underwent arthroscopic surgeries in February and November of 2007.

THREE PLAYERS COMBINE FOR 61 POINTS

Erika Arriaran (21 points), Brittainey Raven (20) and Kathleen Nash (20) combined for 61 points in Texas' 110-76 win over Saint Mary's. The win marked the first time three or more players each scored 20+ points for Texas since Jan. 21, 1984, when Texas defeated Baylor, 96-51, in Austin. In that game, Andrea Lloyd (23), Annette Smith (29) and Cara Pridy (20) combined for 72 points.

ANDERSON AND FONTENETTE EARN BIG 12 WEEKLY HONORS Yvonne Anderson and Ashleigh Fontenette have each earned Phillips 66 Big 12 Conference Freshman of the Week honors. Anderson picked up her first career honor and the first weekly conference award for the Longhorns this season on Dec. 22 after tallying eight points (2-of-3 FG, 4-of-4 FT), three rebounds, an assist and a steal in Texas' 81-71 win over No. 21 Arizona State (Dec. 18). Fontenette picked up honors on Jan. 19 and Feb. 2. Her most recent honor was received after recording her first career start as a Longhorn and playing a career-high 34 minutes in Texas' 58-55 win at No. 4/3 Baylor on Feb. 1. She pulled down a career-high eight rebounds, including six in the first half. Fontenette averaged 9.0 ppg and 6.5 rpg and shot .533 from the field (8-of-15) in games contested Jan. 26-Feb. 1. It was Fontenette's second weekly honor in a three-week span.

RAVEN NAMED PRESEASON BIG 12 HONORABLE MENTION

Junior guard **Brittainey Raven** is one of four returning starters for the 2008-09 Texas women's basketball team. Raven was the Longhorns' top scorer in conference play last season with an average of 14.6 points per game (11th in the league). In addition, the 6-0 Raven ranked 10th in Big 12 field goal percentage (.412), 13th in assists (2.50 apg) and 11th in free throw percentage (.702, 73-104). Raven notched double-figure scoring in 15 of the 16 league contests.

DIFFERENTIATING BETWEEN THE ASHLEYS

With three student-athletes on the roster named Ashley, it was only a matter of time before the Longhorns bestowed various nicknames among the three young women that shared the same moniker. Ashley Lindsey is known to her teammates simply by 'Ashley,' as she had the most seniority of the three. Freshman Ashley Gayle was dubbed 'A.G.,' while fellow freshman Ashleigh Fontenette was tabbed 'A.T.' because of the many 'T's' that are present in her surname.

KRISTEN NASH FOR MOST IMPROVED

Junior post Kristen Nash is making her case for the title of Most Improved Longhorn. Nash has grabbed 79 rebounds (3.0 rpg) and tallied 68 points (2.6 ppg), while recording best field-goal percentage (21-of-41, .512) for the Longhorns. She also holds the third-best free-throw percentage on the team (26-of-31; .839). Nash has set or tied career-high marks in six categories this season.

GAYLE CLIMBING THE CHARTS

Freshman post Ashley Gayle is quickly making an impact for UT defensively, as she ranks second on the team to senior Ashley Lindsey (2.3 bpg) with 1.79 blocks per game. Known as 'A.G.' to her teammates, Gayle broke into Texas' all-time Top 10 freshmen blocks record with the 23rd block of her career against UTEP on Dec. 28, and currently has 52 blocks on the season.

HORNS PICKED SECOND IN BIG 12 PRESEASON POLL

Texas was picked to finish second in the Big 12 Conference in a preseason vote of the league coaches. The second-place billing was the highest preseason rank for the Longhorns since they were predicted to finish second in 2005-06.

TEXAS NUMBERS UNDER GOESTENKORS

In Gail Goestenkors' first year at the helm, Texas went 22-13, winning its most games since the 2004-05 season when UT finished 22-9 and also advanced to the NCAA Second Round. The Longhorns held the opposition to 37.7% field goal shooting, the third lowest FG percentage defense in Texas history, while also setting the single-season free throw percentage mark (.740). The Longhorns also finished Big 12 regular season play first in league steals for the first time in school history with 156 steals for a 9.75 pg average.

GOESTENKORS INKS TWO FOR 2009-10

Two high school hoops standouts have signed National Letters of Intent to play basketball next season at The University of Texas, head coach Gail Goestenkors announced prior to the start of the 2008-09 season. Lauren Flores (Houston, Texas) and Cokie Reed (Waco, Texas) will join the Longhorns for the 2009-10 season.

Flores (5-7), a guard from North Shore HS (Houston, Texas), has led the Lady Mustangs to an 88-17 record that includes two district titles and one appearance in the regional quarterfinals during her three-year career. She was named All-Greater Houston MVP of District 22-5A, all-region and all-state by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches. Flores also earned all-state honors from the Texas Girls Coaches Association as a junior and was named to the second-team Houston Chronicle All-Greater Houston Team. In her junior season, Flores averaged 22.1 points, 7.1 rebounds and 6.1 assists per game.

Reed (6-5), a post from Midway HS (Waco, Texas), is ranked as the No. 5 high school prospect in the nation by ESPN HoopGurlz. com. Reed averaged 16.6 points, 10.7 rebounds and 4.6 blocks per game last year for Midway en route to reaching the Class 4A Region II final. She also was named the District 14-A MVP and a first-team Super CenTex honoree. This summer, Reed participated in the USA Basketball junior tryouts in Colorado Springs, Colo.

Reed, a 2009 McDonald's All-American and Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) High School All-American, was named a Naismith High School Player of the Year finalist on Feb. 23. Reed and the Pantherettes won the Texas Class 4A State Championship at the Frank Erwin Center in Austin on Saturday, March 7. The future Longhorn was named MVP.

BUDDING DESIGNER

Head coach Gail Goestenkors unveiled the Gail Goestenkors Signature Collection clothing line in October at the University Co-op in Austin. The line is believed to be the first-ever women's apparel collection with design assistance from a Division I head coach. The Gail Goestenkors Signature Collection includes both casual and career-wear for women.

2007-08 IN REVIEW

Under the direction of first-year head coach Gail Goestenkors, **Texas reached the Big Dance for the first time since 2005.** For the first time in UT history, the Longhorns entered NCAA tourney play without a single player having prior postseason playing experience. Despite the challenges, the '07-08 squad claimed a 72-55 victory over Minnesota in the opening round before falling 89-55 to No. 1 Connecticut two days later.

YEAR TWO AT TEXAS FOR COACH G

The fourth all-time winningest coach in NCAA Division I women's basketball history, Gail Goestenkors is in her 2nd season at Texas and sports a 42-23 (.646) mark with the Horns. She has compiled a 438-122 (.782) record in 17 years as a head coach at Texas and Duke. Along the way, she has guided her teams to a total of 14 NCAA (current streak of 14 consecutive) trips.
