The Big 12 will update a media release, including team notes, results and more during the season. Complete league statistics will be updated via the conference web site as well.

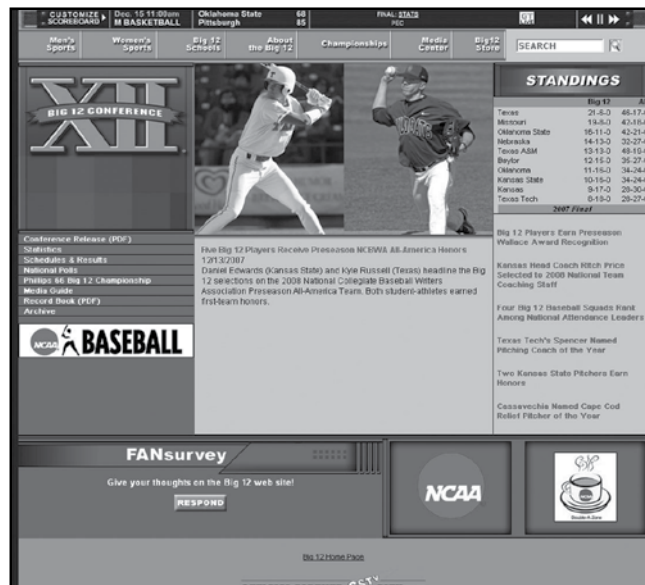
PHILLIPS 66 WEEKLY AWARDS

The Big 12 Conference has been synonymous with success in competitive play and in the classroom as it moves through its 12th season, and league members anticipate continued success during the 2007-08 academic year.

In the first 11 years of the Big 12, the conference can boast of 30 team and over 350 individual NCAA Championships. The success continued during 2006-07, with team titles in men's cross country (Colorado) and women's volleyball (Nebraska) in addition to numerous individual crowns. The league added another individual crown this fall, when Texas Tech's Sally Kipyego repeated to earn the NCAA women's cross country title.

Over the past three seasons alone a total of 11 NCAA trophies have been hoisted by Big 12 institutions, with at least one national crown won in 10 of 11 years for the conference, including each of the past 10 seasons.

Including the 2007 season, the Big 12 leads all conferences with five appearances in the contest. Big 12 squads have played for the football national championship five times in the last nine years, with berths in 14 BCS games overall.

In basketball, eight men's and women's teams have advanced to their respective Final Fours in the past six seasons as the Big 12 continues its place among the elite intercollegiate athletic conferences. Numerous national honors have been won by men's and women's student-athletes during conference history, with Kevin Durant (Texas) the most recent to garner accolades as the consensus 2007 National Player of the Year.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

Big 12 student-athletes also do well in garnering national academic recognition. This past season, two league standouts were named the Academic All-America of the Year in their sport by ESPN The Magazine and the College Sports Information Directors of America. Nebraska's Sarah Pavan (volleyball) boasted a 4.0 grade-point average in Biochemistry, while Aaron Ivey of Oklahoma (baseball) had a 4.0 GPA in Energy Management. Pavan also won the national academic honor presented for all sports. In addition, she was named recipient of the prestigious Honda-Broderick Award as Collegiate Woman Athlete of the Year. She is the first athlete since the Big 12 was formed to earn the accolade.

Competitive excellence, scholarship and sportsmanship are all equal components of the Big 12 philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and Academic All-Big 12 squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons.

At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsman of the Year awards.

Institutions can also nominate student-athletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships at the end of each academic year. A total of 177 scholars have received more than \$1 million in postgraduate financial aid through the first 10 years of the program.

The Big 12 sponsors 21 sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The conference is made up of 12 institutions that have shared many traditional rivalries throughout their histories. Member schools include - Baylor University, University of Colorado, Iowa State University, University of Kansas, Kansas State University, University of Missouri, University of Nebraska, University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma State University, University of Texas, Texas A&M University and Texas Tech University.

The institutions created a league that encompasses seven states, over 45 million people and more than 18 million television households within its geographic footprint.

The conference conducts championships for 20 of its 21 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition. The winner of the Big 12 football championship game earns the league's berth into the prestigious Bowl Championship Series.

In the last several years the Big 12 has increased its bowl agreements and expanded television opportunities for all sports through contracts with ABC/ESPN, FSN and CSTV. Most recently, the league renewed and expanded its multi-year arrangement with ABC/ESPN, Inc.

In its 11-year history, the conference has distributed \$913.2 million to its 12 member institutions.

The Big 12 staff administers to over 4,600 student-athletes in 21 sports. The conference is headquartered in Irving, Texas.



In December 2006, Nebraska won its second NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship in Big 12 history and third overall (1995, 2000, '06). The Huskers have won the second-most volleyball titles in NCAA history.

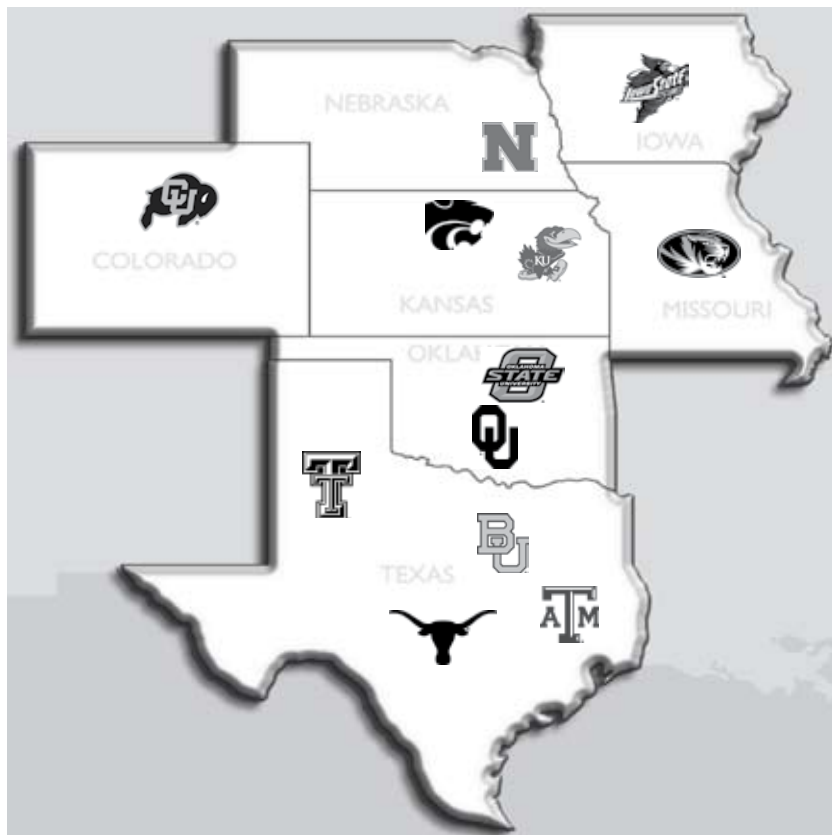

RICH FETCHIET

Coordinator of Baseball Umpires

Rich Fetchiet was named Big 12 Conference Coordinator of Baseball Umpires in August 2005. He has over 25 years of collegiate, national and international umpiring and umpire-related administrative experience.

Fetchiet is also currently Supervisor of Baseball Umpires for the Big East, Big Ten, Mid-American Conference, Conference USA, and the Horizon League. He is a member of the NCAA National Umpire Program Advisory Committee while serving as the Amateur Baseball Umpire Association's liaison to both USA Baseball and the International Baseball Association Federation. Fetchiet has also been the Baseball Secretary-Rules Editor for the NCAA and Chair of the ABCA Rules Committee. He is active in numerous officiating organizations and is a teacher and instructor at umpire camps and clinics across the country.

Fetchiet retired from active umpiring after the 2000 season. Prior to that he umpired various Division I conference tournaments and made three College World Series appearances, including serving as the plate umpire for the 1999 national championship game. Included among his international tournaments are the Pan Am Games, World Cup Qualifier, Intercontinental Cup, World Championships and the Olympic Games. In 1997, the International Baseball Association named him Umpire of the Year.

Fetchiet is a higher education administrator at the University of Michigan School of Dentistry. He and his wife, Kay, have two children and currently reside in Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Performance in the classroom is just as important as accolades on the field when looking at the student-athlete. The Big 12 Conference recognizes student-athletes in four areas for academic achievement. Those areas include the Academic All-Big 12 Teams, Commissioner's Honor Roll, Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, and the Big 12 Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship.

ACADEMIC ALL-BIG 12 TEAMS

Recognizing those student-athletes who excel in the classroom and on the field and court, the Big 12 has academic all-conference teams for all sports.

Nominated by the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services and the Athletic Media Relations Directors, members of the all-academic teams have posted at least a 3.00 grade point average either cumulative or the previous two semesters and are regulars (i.e. letterwinners) on his or her respective team. First-team honorees are regulars who have at least a 3.20 GPA.

Last year, a few academic teams in the Big 12 exceeded 100 student-athletes recognized by the conference. In addition, student-athletes have gained recognition by being named to ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America teams.

COMMISSIONER'S HONOR ROLL

Acknowledging all participants, the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll is an inclusive honor for all sports sponsored by the membership of the league. The Honor Roll is recorded and released each semester and recognizes those student-athletes who registered a 3.0 or better grade point average the previous semester.

Submitted through the Directors of Student-Athlete Support Services at each institution, those honored are not necessarily the stars on the field and court but those who participate on the team. They include the letterwinners and non-letterwinners and recognize every student-athlete who has excelled in the classroom.

More than 2,000 Big 12 student-athletes are named to the Commissioner's Honor Rolls at the end of each semester.

PHILLIPS 66 CLASSROOM CHAMPION

As Phillips 66 Big 12 Classroom Champions, the conference recognizes 30 student-athletes per school who have excelled on the court or field and in the classroom. Chosen through the Big 12 membership, those honored are recognized throughout the year on the Big 12 telecasts, FSN and ESPN Regional Television.

DR. PRENTICE GAUTT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

With 120 student-athletes from all Big 12 schools honored over the last five years, the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships' list has grown to 177 recipients since the 1996-97 academic year.

Additional funding prior to the 2002-03 selection process allowed each school to name two outstanding scholars to the annual list of honorees. Conference officers also voted to name the postgraduate scholarship program awards after longtime Big 12 and Big Eight Conference Associate Commissioner and student services' pioneer Dr. Prentice Gautt in 2004. Dr. Gautt passed away on March 17, 2005.

The all-time group has solid representation of scholars throughout the 21 sponsored Big 12 sports and has provided more than \$1,025,600 through the 2006-07 academic year for much-needed financial aid. Three faculty representatives, one senior woman administrator and one director of athletics form the selection group for the prestigious awards, which help the students to continue their formal education. Since its inception the Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarship program has produced over a dozen physicians, several attorneys for the underprivileged, college professors, Peace Corps volunteers and positions of national prominence.

Criteria for these awards include a cumulative grade point average of 3.50 on a 4.0 scale, participation in at least two years of intercollegiate athletics at the scholar-athlete's respective institution, and completion of athletics' eligibility. The scholar-athletes must also graduate from their respective member institutions within 15 months of their selection as postgraduate scholarship recipients and are expected to enroll in graduate/professional schools within 15 months after they graduate.

The \$2,500 individual annual grants began in 1996-97, were raised to \$5,000 in 1999 and climbed to \$6,900 prior to the 2003-04 term. In 2006-07, the awards climbed to \$7,500. Most honorees in recent years have also been named to Academic All-Big 12 Conference teams as well as the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll.

big 12 Conference Awards

The Big 12 annually recognizes its top male and female athlete and sportsperson. The Athlete of the Year Awards are selected based on athletic performance, academic achievement and citizenship within the academic year of nomination. The Sportspersons of the Year Award was started prior to the 2000-01 academic year to recognize student-athletes who displayed an extraordinary degree of sportsmanship and/or community service from within the conference. Honorees are selected by a media panel.

In 2006-07, the Big 12 Athletes of the Year were Ben Askren (Missouri) and Sarah Pavan (Nebraska). The Sportsperson of the Year winners were Carl Pendleton (Oklahoma) and Amanda Costner (Kansas).

Askren was a 2006 and '07 NCAA Champion and a four-time All-America wrestler. He won the Big 12 Championship in his weight class three times in addition to being named a two-time Dan Hodge Award winner - wrestling's equivalent to the Heisman.

Pavan was the 2006-07 Honda-Broderick Cup winner as the top female student-athlete in the nation and was also named ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America of the Year. She returns this year after leading the Husker volleyball squad to the 2006 NCAA title.

Costner spent nine hours a week with the Douglas County, Kansas Truancy Diversion Program to work with local children who have not shown a commitment to attending school. She has volunteered to serve breakfast for the Jubilee Cafe, a non-profit organization that provides food to those in need and was an active volunteer in the Kansas athletics community service programs, including *Hawks, Cops and Kids*; *Fun and Fitness with the Jayhawks* and *Adopt-An-Angel* project.

Pendleton opted to bypass his senior year of eligibility at Oklahoma, in part, to care for his 11-year-old stepbrother, whom he has legally adopted as a single parent. He has been active on OU's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and Bridge Builders, as well as serving as president of the school's Fellowship of Christian Athletes chapter for three years. He has taught a boys' Sunday School class the past three years, served as a volunteer at the Junior Sooner Sports Camp, in addition to working with Children's Hospital, local elementary schools and Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Oklahoma.

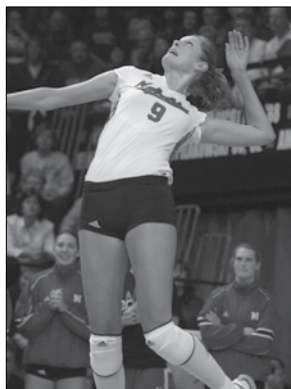

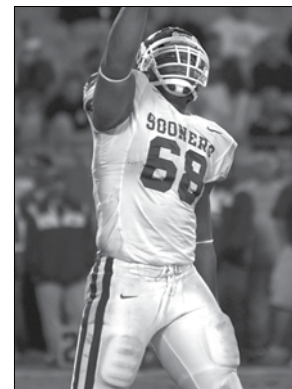

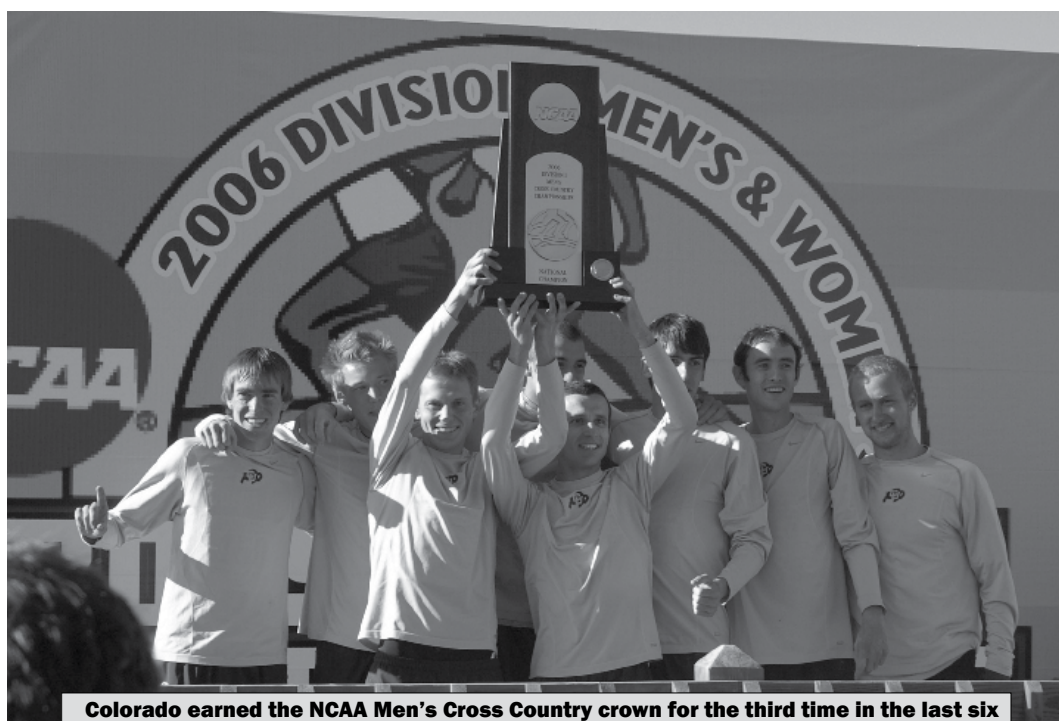

BIG 12 HAS THE WINNINGEST ACTIVE COACH

Augie Garrido (Texas) is the all-time winningest active Division I coach with 1,629 career wins in 39 years. He claimed his 1,428th victory on June 9, 2003 against No. 1 Florida State to move into first place. Garrido is also the first coach to record 1,500 wins.

Larry Hays (Texas Tech) also is ranked among the top five, checking in at No. 4 all-time for NCAA career victories. They are among five coaches to surpass 1,400 wins in the history of Division I baseball.

In addition, Garrido (9th) and Hays (25th) are joined by Nebraska's Mike Anderson (10th), Oklahoma's Sunny Golloway (16th) and Baylor's Steve Smith (46th) in the Top 50 active coaches in winning percentage with a minimum of five seasons at the Division I level.

BIG 12 PLAYERS EARN PRESEASON WALLACE AWARD RECOGNITION

Thirteen student-athletes from the Big 12 Conference were named to the 2008 Preseason Brooks Wallace Award Watch List, the College Baseball Foundation announced in early December. Each team in the conference had at least one nominee selected.

The award, which is dedicated to the memory of late Texas Tech shortstop and assistant coach Brooks Wallace, is given annually to the nation's top collegiate baseball player. 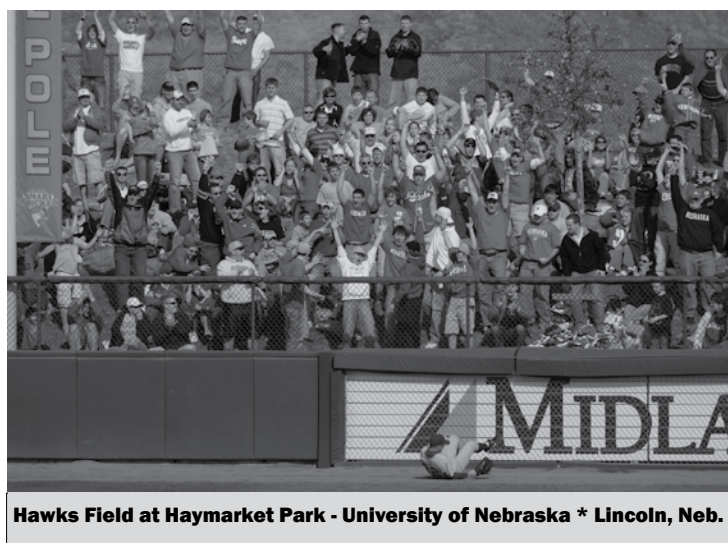

FOUR BIG 12 SQUADS RANK AMONG NATIONAL ATTENDANCE LEADERS

Texas, Texas A&M, Baylor and Nebraska placed in the top 20 of the NCAA national attendance leaders in 2007. UT leads the league in both total attendance (4th) and average attendance (7th). The Big 12 has had four or more teams place in the national top 20 every season since 1999.

UT recorded 203,449 fans during the '07 campaign, averaging 4,731 spectators. The Aggies placed eighth on the list in total attendance with 163,841 and drew an average of 3,901 for their 42 home games.

Baylor came in at No. 17 as it welcomed 101,791 fans last season, breaking the school record for the largest regular-season attendance mark. The Bears per-game average (3,180) also set a school record, eclipsing the previous mark set in 2001. The Huskers were ranked No. 18 drawing 99,320 throughout the season and averaging 4,138 per outing.

Baylor, Texas A&M and Texas are three of eight schools who have averaged at least 2,700 fans each season since 2000.

THE BIG 12 IN NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP ACTION

For the third time in conference history, six teams – Baylor, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma State, Texas, and Texas A&M – were selected to the 2007 NCAA Championship field. The Cowboys and Aggies advanced to Super Regional action.

Five different Big 12 teams have earned College World Series bids in 11 seasons, including Texas' 2002 and '05 national title runs. Baylor (2005), Nebraska (2001-'02, '05), Oklahoma State (1999), Texas (2000, 02-'05) and Texas A&M (1999) have represented the league a total of 11 times at the event. The Big 12 had an all-time high three teams in the '05 CWS field, while sending two squads in 1999 and 2002.

PHILLIPS 66 BIG 12 BASEBALL CHAMPIONSHIP FORMAT

The eight teams with the best conference records (percentage-wise) in regular season competition will qualify for the Phillips Big 12 Baseball Championship. The event is in a two-division, pool play format, in which each of the squads competing is guaranteed a minimum of three games.

Results from the league's 27-game round-robin conference schedule will determine the eight seeds for the Championship. Seeds 1, 4, 5 and 8 will compete in pool play on one side of the bracket, while teams seeded No. 2, 3, 6 and 7 will play in the other. The two teams with the best record within their bracket will advance to the Championship game, with the winner earning the Big 12's automatic berth into the NCAA Championship. Head-to-head competition will break ties within each bracket. In the event of more than two teams being tied for the top spot within a bracket, the highest seeded team will advance to Sunday's winner-take-all Championship game.

Tiebreaking Procedures:

- ♦ If teams are tied, head-to-head competition will be used to break the tie.
- ♦ If the teams are still tied, the highest seeded team amongst the tied squads advances to the championship.

Rainout Policy - In the event divisional play cannot be completed to determine a divisional champion (due to weather-related or other circumstances) the following tiebreaking procedures will take place to determine which two teams shall play in the championship:

- 1) Team with the best record in each division by winning percentage.
- 2) If two or more teams are still tied, the highest seeded team amongst the tied moves on as the Division Champion.

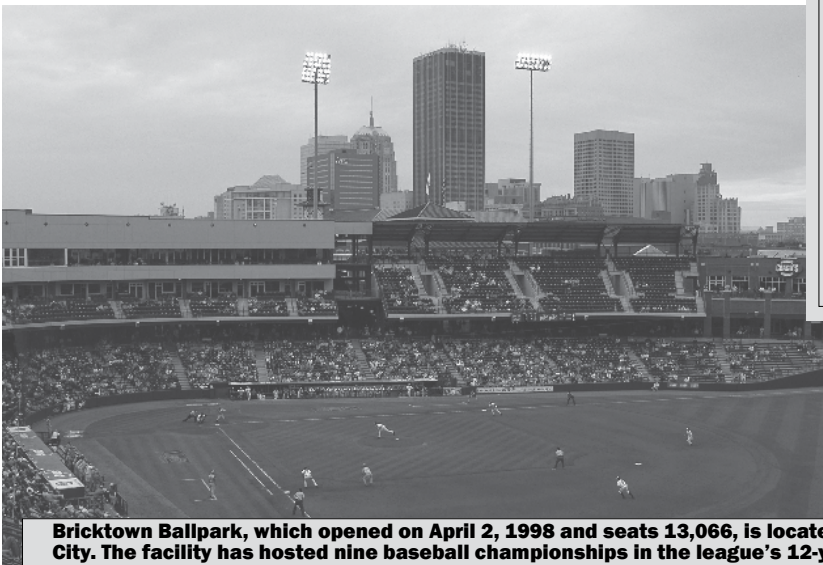

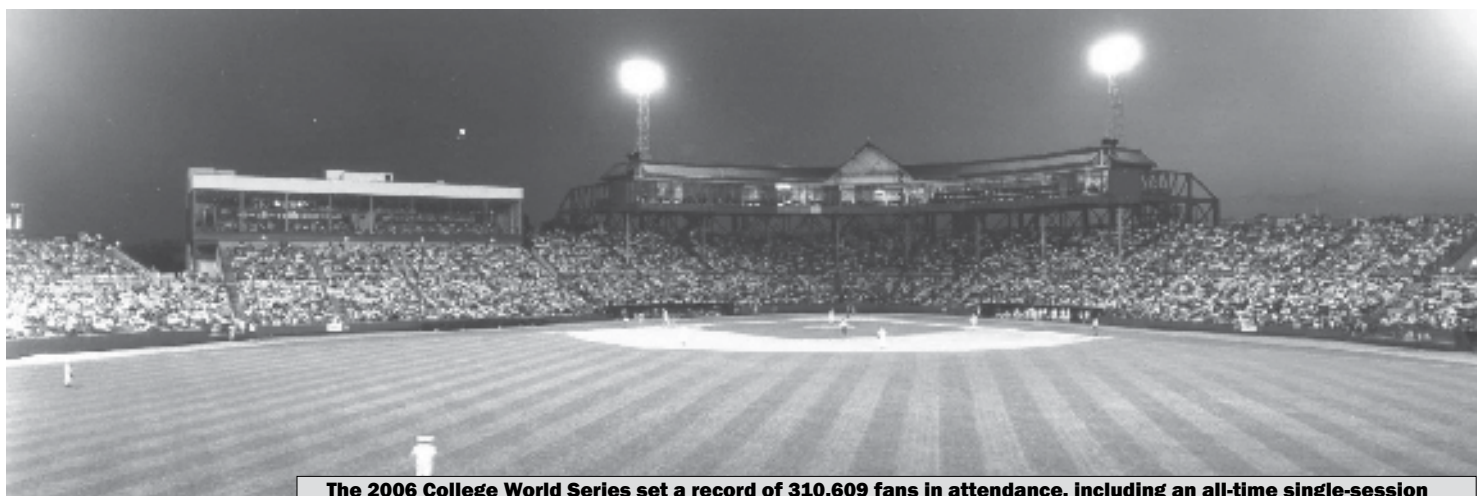

COMMISSIONER DAN BEEBE

Dan Beebe was named the third commissioner of the Big 12 Conference on September 5, 2007, after serving as senior associate commissioner and chief operating officer of the league since February 2003.

While in that role, Beebe handled issues related to governance, national policy and legal affairs in addition to coordinating the day-to-day activities of the conference office. He also served as the conference liaison to the Big 12 board of directors. Beebe has been involved in the league's site selection for future championships, extending television contracts and enhancing football bowl opportunities. In addition, he has been active in establishing the conference's sportsmanship policies and procedures.

Prior to joining the Big 12, Beebe was commissioner of the Ohio Valley Conference from 1989-2003. During his 14-year tenure at the OVC he served on the NCAA Division I Management Council, chaired the I-AA Governance Committee, and was on several Collegiate Commissioners Association committees, in addition to various NCAA assignments, including the Athletics Certification Committee.

Under his direction the OVC added five new members. He also placed an emphasis on ethics and sportsmanship within the league, producing a nationally recognized Sportsmanship Statement and participating in regional and national seminars on the topic.

Among his other highlights at the OVC, Beebe implemented a conference-wide marketing plan that resulted in new revenue streams through corporate sponsorships and other initiatives, and saw television exposure for the league nearly triple.

The 50-year old Washington state native began his career in college athletics in 1982 as an NCAA enforcement representative. Following a one-year stint as assistant director of athletics at Wichita State, he returned to the NCAA in 1987 as director of enforcement.

A 1982 University of California Hastings College of the Law graduate, Beebe lettered in football and was a team captain at Cal Poly Pomona where he earned a degree in social science in 1979. He is a member of the Washington State Bar Association.

Born on February 27, 1957, Beebe is married to the former Molly Scanlon. Together, they have four children: daughters Jessie and Elaine and sons Matthew and Paddy.
