Phillips 66 Big 12 Women's Basketball Championship

The 2011 Phillips 66 Big 12 Women's Basketball Championship returns to Kansas City's Municipal Auditorium for the 10th time in Conference history. Kansas City hosted the first six women's postseason events from 1997-2002, in addition to the 2005, '08 and '10 championships.

Municipal Auditorium opened in 1936 and has hosted nearly every type of event from U.S. presidential campaigns to NCAA Final Four championships. The arena can seat 10,700 people with 7,300 permanent seats. The auditorium is accessible from the south side of 13th Street where visitors enter through the 3,600-square foot Grand Foyer. It is a short walk to Sprint Center, site of the Phillips 66 Big 12 Men's Championship.

Seven different teams have won the previous 13 women's championships, led by Oklahoma with four crowns - all since 2002. Baylor, Iowa State, Texas A&M and Texas Tech have two titles each while Colorado and Texas have one.

Big 12 Scheduling and Championship Tiebreaker

Scheduling Format

For scheduling purposes, the Big 12 is divided into six-team divisions. All teams will play a schedule which consists of a double round-robin within their division and single games against all teams in the opposite division for a total of 16 conference games. The team(s) with the best winning percentage in the 16 conference games is declared the Big 12 regular season champion(s).

Championship Tiebreaker Procedure

Following is the procedure for breaking ties in seeding for the Big 12 Basketball championships (men's and women's). The first criteria in the breaking of ties in the standings shall be head-to-head competition of tied teams. The following procedure will be used to establish the post-season championship seeds when ties exist. (For tiebreaking procedures teams will be grouped in two divisions based upon established guidelines. Colorado, lowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Missouri and Nebraska are in one division and Baylor, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas, Texas A&M and Texas Tech are in the other division.)


- a. If two teams are tied and they are from different divisions, the winner of the game between the two tied teams shall be the higher seed.
- b. If two teams are tied and they are from the same division, the team with an advantage in head-to-head competition shall be higher seed.
- c. If two teams remain tied, there will be a comparison of overall record against division teams only (10 divisional games).

- d. If two teams remain tied, there will be a *comparison of record against the highest ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the division and proceeding though in order of divisional finish.
- e. If two teams remain tied, there will be a *comparison of record against the highest ranked team(s) (based upon Conference winning percentage) in the opposite division and proceeding though in order of divisional finish.
- f. If two teams remain tied, the higher seed will be chosen by draw.
- g. If three or more teams are tied, ties among divisional opponents will be broken first by using steps (b) through (f) and the head-to-head results will be used to break ties between non-divisional teams. When three or more teams from the same division are tied step (b) will consist of a mini-round robin among the tied teams. At any point during the process of breaking ties among three or more teams that the number of tied teams is reduced to two, head-to-head competition would be used as the primary tiebreaker, followed by steps c through (f). Once a team is eliminated from a multi-team comparison, it is dropped from further comparisons.

(*Note: When comparing against the 'highest-ranked team(s)' in either division, the comparison will be based upon how tied teams did against all teams in a given placement, rather than a team that wins a tiebreaker at another position. For example, if two teams are tied for fifth and two teams are tied for first, the head-to-head comparison would be how the fifth-place teams did against the first-place teams combined, and vice versa.)

Big 12 Captures 11th Consecutive Attendance Crown

Big 12 women's basketball set an NCAA attendance record for the second consecutive year with 1,091,289 fans while leading the nation in attendance in 2009-10 for the 11th straight season.

The Conference reached the one-million mark for the fifth time, bettering last year's record attendance of 1,073,069. The Big 12's 2009-10 average of 5,247 per game fell just short of its own national record of 5,381 set in 2003-04.

The Big 12 remains the only conference to reach the one-million attendance plateau, also accomplishing the feat in 2001-02 (1,002,651), 2006-

07 (1,023,576) and 2007-08 (1,010,528) in addition to 2008-09 and 2009-10.

Ten Big 12 schools were ranked in the Top 50 for average home attendance with five listed in the Top 10 and eight in the Top 25. Iowa State led the Big 12 contingent for the second year in a row in third (9,316) followed by 6. Oklahoma (7,681), 7.Nebraska (7,390), 8. Baylor

(7,209) and 10. Texas Tech (6,837). TTU has been among the Top 10 teams nationally in home attendance since the inception of the league (14 years).

Nebraska led the nation for the largest improvement in attendance average from the previous season with an additional 4,719 fans per game in 2009-10.

Baylor (248,238), Oklahoma (245,432) and Iowa State (233,645) were among six teams nationally to draw more than 200,000 in cumulative attendance for all games - home, road and neutral.

Returning All-Big 12 Performers

Only three players from last year's senior-laden All-Big 12 Teams return to the Conference in 2010-11. All-America Danielle Robinson (Oklahoma) and USBWA National Freshman of the Year Brittney Griner (Baylor) were first team selections last season. All-America honorable mention Danielle Adams (Texas A&M) is back from the second team.

Big 12 Stat Leaders

The Conference has 13-of-30 leading scorers and 12-of-20 top rebounders back in the fold for 2010-11. Brittney Griner (Baylor) is the league's top returner in both categories after averaging 18.4 points and 8.5 boards as a true freshman.

The Big 12 will host the 2011 Dallas Regional in the American Airlines Center, after hosting the 2008 and 2009 Oklahoma City, and 2010 Kansas City regionals. Both Oklahoma City Regionals recorded the highest attendance of the four regional sites. Baylor will host first and second rounds in 2011.

20-Plus Wins in 2009-10

The Big 12 had seven 20-win teams (NU, ISU, OU, BU, TAMU, OSU and UT) in 2009-10 for the third consecutive season and fourth time overall. The Conference record is eight teams in 2007-08. The Big 12 had a 30-win team (NU) for the seventh year in Conference history.

TEAM NOTES

Baylor Lady Bears

The Lady Bears have made nine trips to the NCAA Tournament, including seven straight. They have also advanced to the Final Four twice over the past five seasons.

Brittney Griner was named the national freshman of the year by the USBWA after leading the nation in blocks per game (6.4), while the Lady Bears led the nation as a team in blocks per contest (7.5) and total blocks (277).

Big 12 Notebook

Griner paced BU in scoring and rebounding with 18.4 points and 8.5 rebounds per game. Her 223 blocks as a freshman rank sixth on the Big 12 career list while it eclipsed the NCAA Division I record for blocks in a season.

The Lady Bears lost just one starter (senior Morghan Medlock) from the 2009-10 squad. Baylor returns 86.2 percent of its scoring and 81.0 percent of individual rebounds from last season.

Colorado Buffaloes

Senior Brittany Spears is coming off a year in which she ranked fourth in the Conference in scoring with 17.7 points per game and fifth with 7.8 rebounds an outing.

The Buffaloes checked in at second in the league with 7.6 3-point field goals per game, draining 229 during the 2009-10 campaign -- the second-most in one season in team history.

Colorado topped the Conference in free throw percentage with a .761 mark last season. The Buffaloes also ranked third in steals per game at 8.5.

CU will need to replace outgoing senior Bianca Smith, who collected the first individual Big 12 postseason honor for Colorado, as the Conference's Sixth Man Award for last season. Smith, CU's all-time leader in 3-pointers, led the league in free throw percentage and 3-pointers made.

Iowa State Cyclones

The Cyclones have recorded 11 seasons with 20 or more wins, seven of which they accumulated 25 or more victories.

lowa State's second-place Big 12 finish in 2009-10 marked its best since winning the title during the 1999-00 campaign.

ISU is one of 20 teams to make the NCAA Championship field in each of the last four seasons

The Cyclones have ranked in the NCAA top 13 in 3-point FGs made per game over the past 11 seasons.

Kansas Jayhawks

Carolyn Davis was named to the 2010 All-Big 12 Freshman Team and is one of eight letterwinners returning for the Jayhawks.

Davis is one of three KU returners to rank in the top five in the Conference in field goal percentage last season. Davis topped the list with a .719 mark, while Krysten Boogaard checked in second with a .612 clip and Aishah Sutherland ranked fifth at .523.

Kansas advanced to postseason play for the third consecutive season and has played in the WNIT in four of the past five seasons, appearing in the final round in 2009 and making it to the third round in 2010.

Sophomore Angel Goodrich, who was ranked fourth in the NCAA with 7.1 assists per game, will return after suffering a season-ending injury last January – her second in consecutive seasons.

Kansas State Wildcats

Rookie guard Brittany Chambers was the only freshman in the Big 12 to register 350+ points, 170+ rebounds and 80+ assists in 2009-10.

The Wildcats have posted 20 or more wins in seven of the past nine seasons and have participated in NCAA postseason play in six of those nine seasons.

KSU posted a .733 free throw percentage mark in 2009-10, the third-highest in school history.

The Wildcats return everyone but top scorer Ashley Sweat and top perimeter defender Kari Kincaid from last season's squad.

Missouri Tigers

RaeShara Brown is 57 steals away from topping the Tigers' all-time list. She enters the season with 191 steals in her career. If she can duplicate her Conference-best 88 grabs in 2009-10, she would enter the top six in the Big 12 career record books.

Brown, along with Shakara Jones and Christine Flores headline Missouri's key returners for 2010-11.

The Tigers have defeated a ranked opponent in five consecutive seasons after downing No. 10 Baylor in January 2010. It was the first win for MU over an opponent ranked in the top 10 in four years.

Missouri ranked second in the Conference with 14.5 offensive rebounds per game, while also checking in at fourth in blocked shots per game (4.0) and steals per game (8.5).

Nebraska Cornhuskers

Nebraska finished the 2010 regular season with a 29-0 record, the first undefeated regular season in Big 12 men's or women's history.

The Huskers earned their first No. 1 seed in the 2010 NCAA Championship, where they also made their first NCAA Sweet 16 appearance in school history.

Head coach Connie Yori was named the 2010 Big 12 Conference Coach of the Year and the unanimous National Coach of the Year.

The Huskers return two starters – Dominique Kelley and Lindsey Moore. Kelley, a 2010 All-Big 12 Honorable Mention selection, has started every game since joining the team in 2008. Moore, a member of the Big 12 All-Freshman Team, was fourth in the Conference with an average of 4.5 assists in the 2009-10 season.

Oklahoma Sooners

Oklahoma reached the Final Four in 2010 for the third time in program history and second straight season. The Sooners finished third in the final USA Today/ESPN Coaches' Poll.

OU returns three players who started at least 15 games last year – Danielle Robinson, Carlee Roethlisberger and Jasmine Hartman. Whitney Hand is still recovering from a knee injury and will miss at least the first portion of the season.

The Sooners topped the 2010 Conference-only games stats in defensive rebound percentage (.712) and free throw percentage (.782).

Robinson, a 2010 All-Big 12 First Team selection, finished the season fifth in the league in scoring with 16.8 points per game. She was a WBCA All-America selection as well as named to the Women's Final Four All-Tournament Team.

Oklahoma State Cowgirls

Oklahoma State recorded its third 20-win season in the last four years in 2009-10. OSU's 24 victories were the third-best total in school history.

The Cowgirls won six games against Top 25 teams in 2009-10, the highest total in school annals.

OSU led the league in offensive rebounds with 14.7 per game and 515 total in 2009-10.

Oklahoma State returns three starters, including Precious Robinson, Toni Young and Lakyn Garrison. The trio combined for 64 total starts last season season, but OSU must replace Andrea Riley – the Big 12's all-time leading scorer.

Big 12 Notebook

Texas Longhorns

UT's 2010 NCAA Championship appearance marked its 24th overall and third consecutive under third-year head coach Gail Goestenkors. Texas' 24 appearances tie for the fourth-most NCAA showings.

With 10 conference wins in the 2009-10 season, Texas produced its best record since 2005. The Longhorns have continued to improve their performance in the Big 12 over the past three season as they went 7-9 in 2008 and 8-8 in 2009.

Texas returns three starters, including senior Kathleen Nash and juniors Ashleigh Fontenette and Ashley Gayle. Gayle was second in the Big 12 with an average of 3.2 blocked shots during the 2009-10 season, while Nash and Fontenette were All-Big 12 Honorable Mention selections.

In conference games, Texas averaged a league-best .368 3-point FG percentage and ranked second in scoring offense (71.0), blocked shots (5.8), rebounding offense (40.6) and defensive rebounds (27.5).

Texas A&M Aggies

The Aggies made their fifth-consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance and earned a No. 2 seed for the third consecutive season in 2010. Texas A&M is one of 17 schools to make the NCAA Tournament field five years in a row.

Texas A&M won its second Big 12 Conference postseason championship title in 2010. The Aggies played the second-toughest schedule in the nation and went a Conference-best 11-6 against nationally ranked opponents last year.

The Aggies have finished in the Top 4 in the Big 12 standings five consecutive seasons.

Texas A&M welcomes back Danielle Adams, the 2010 Big 12 Newcomer of the Year, and starters Tyra White, Adaora Elonu and Sydney Colson.

Texas Tech Lady Raiders

Texas Tech returns starters Jordan Barncastle, Monique Smalls and Kierra Mallard to the 2010-11 lineup. The trio combined for 67 starts last season.

Monique Smalls ended the 2009-10 season with 135 assists, which ranks second on the freshman class single-season list.

The Lady Raiders were second in the league in steals with 9.5 per game.

Junior Kierra Mallard averaged over seven rebounds a game in both her freshman and sophomore seasons.
