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COACHES' TELECONFERENCE

The Big 12 Conference baseball coaches will participate in a media-only preseason teleconference at 10 a.m. Central time on Feb. 16. The conference call can be heard live and will be archived on Big12Sports.com. Please contact the Big 12 communications staff for the call-in and replay phone numbers.

POSTSEASON AWARDS

The Big 12 presents the official all-conference awards at the end of the regular season. Major award winners are chosen, along with the All-Big 12 teams. Each head coach votes on the squads and is not permitted to vote for his own players. The awards will be announced prior to the Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship.

Academic All-Big 12 teams are also chosen in baseball and will be announced prior to the postseason.

BIG 12 WEEKLY SHOWS

The Big 12 Report is a weekly show that is available *exclusively* at Big12Sports.com. Hosted by Correspondent Wendell Barnhouse, the show is broadcast each Thursday and focuses on the schools and student-athletes throughout the Big 12. In addition, it will give fans a unique look into the workings of the Conference itself - including television, bowl games, scheduling and more - along with interviews with the Commissioner and other selected Big 12 staff.

The Big 12 also boasts two over-the-air weekly magazine-style shows. Each program is a 30-minute promotion of the league, with features on student-athletes, coaches, teams and conference championships. **Big 12 Showcase** returns for its 14th season on FSN and has been produced by Keith Fletcher each of those years. Emily Jones handles hosting duties. **Big 12 This Week** is televised by ESPNU, with Melissa Knowles as the primary host. Segments of both programs are available online via the Big 12 Web site.

CHAMPIONSHIP CREDENTIALS

Media credentials for the 2010 Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship are authorized and issued by the Conference office. An online credential system, provided through an agreement with Sports Systems Services, Inc., is the only method to submit requests. The credential system will be made available during the month of April.

The Big 12 maintains its web site at Big12Sports.com. Complete information on the league and its member schools is available.

The site boasts original content from throughout the Conference along with several video broadcasts, including a weekly magazine show - The Big 12 Report. In baseball, full rebroadcasts of ESPN televised contests will be available via the Big 12 Network Online, within 72 hours of a game's completion. Comprehensive coverage from the 2010 Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship will be video streamed for free on Big12Sports.com for the fourth consecutive year.

Scores throughout the league and standings are updated on a daily basis. Conference statistics are available daily, with weekly award winners posted each Monday.

Media can access Acrobat PDF files of the conference release, statistics and the league media guide on the web site.

CONFERENCE RELEASE

The Big 12 will update a media release, including team notes, results and more daily during the season. Complete league statistics will be updated via the conference web site as well.

PHILLIPS 66 WEEKLY AWARDS

A Big 12 Player and Pitcher of the Week will be chosen beginning in late February. Nominations are submitted by the school media relations offices and the winners are selected by a panel of media voters who cover the league on a regular basis. This year marks the 14th year for Phillips 66 as a sponsor of the Big 12 Conference.

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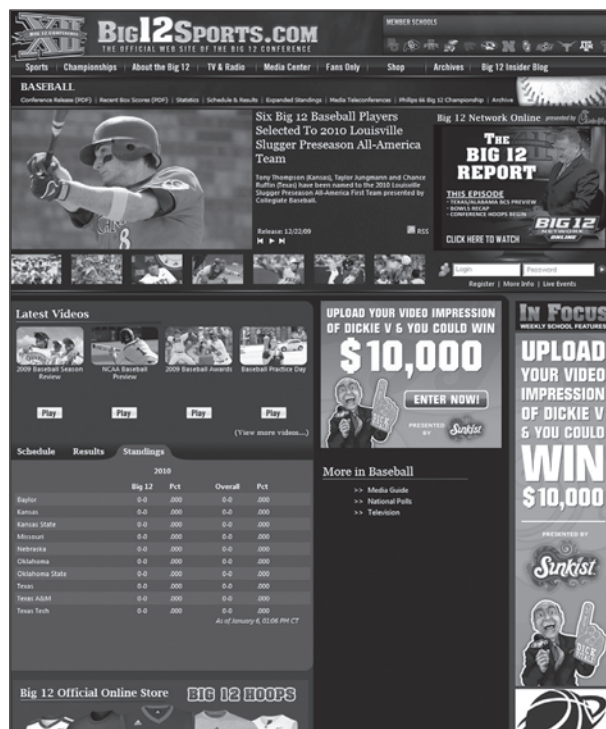

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RICH FETCHIET

Coordinator of Baseball Umpires

Rich Fetchiet was named Big 12 Conference Coordinator of Baseball Umpires in August 2005. He has over 30 years of collegiate, national and international umpiring and umpire-related administrative experience.

Fetchiet is also currently the coordinator for Conference USA, the Big East, Big Ten and Mid-American conferences, and the Horizon League. He is a member of the NCAA National Umpire Program Advisory Committee in addition to the NCAA Baseball Rules Editorial Committee. Fetchiet has served as the Baseball Secretary-Rules Editor for the NCAA and Chair of the ABCA Rules Committee. He is active in numerous officiating organizations and is a teacher and instructor at umpire camps and clinics across the country.

Fetchiet retired from active umpiring after the 2000 season. Prior to that he umpired numerous Division I conference tournaments and made three College World Series appearances, including serving as the plate umpire for the 1999 national championship game. Included among Rich's international tournaments are the Pan Am Games, World Cup Qualifier, Intercontinental Cup, World Championships and the Olympic Games. In 1997 he was named Umpire of the Year by the International Baseball Association.

Fetchiet is a higher education administrator at the University of Michigan School of Dentistry. He and his wife, Kay, and two children currently reside in Ann Arbor, Mich.





The Big 12 Conference has established a consistent level of national success on the field and in the classroom as it continues its 14th season in 2009-10.

Since it began play in 1996-97, the Conference can boast of 35 team crowns and over 420 individual NCAA Championships. The success continued this fall, as Oklahoma State won the NCAA men's cross country title. Five Big 12 volleyball teams competed in the regional semifinals of the NCAA Championship in the same year for the first time and the league had a squad in the national championship match for the third time. The Big 12 also had a school play for the BCS National Championship for the seventh season. A year earlier, the Big 12 added three more national titles to its ledger as Texas A&M captured crowns in men's golf as well as men's and women's outdoor track & field.

The individual honors also continued in December, as Jenny Barringer of Colorado earned The Bowerman Award, presented for the first time to the most outstanding collegiate women's track and field athlete. She beat out two other Big 12 athletes (Destinee Hooker, UT; Porscha Lucas, TAMU) as the Conference had all three finalists for the honor. In fact, four of six finalists came from the Big 12 as German Fernandez of Oklahoma State was among the last three choices on the men's side.

The Big 12 has had four Heisman Trophy winners in its 13-year history. In 2008, the Big 12 established a high-water mark, as for the first time in the 74-year history of the Heisman Trophy four of the top five vote-getters hailed from the same conference, including award-winner Sam Bradford (Oklahoma). The league followed that recognition with two of the top five finalists in 2009.

During the past six seasons a total of 14 NCAA trophies have been hoisted by Big 12 institutions, with at least one national crown won in all but one year for the Conference, including each of the past 13 seasons.

The Big 12 leads all conferences with its seven appearances in BCS title games. Seven league squads have played for the football national championship in the last 10 years with berths in 17 BCS games overall, including two each in 2007 and 2008. In the past two seasons, the Big 12 has had 16 players earn Consensus All-America accolades.

In basketball, 10 women's and nine men's teams have advanced to their respective Final Fours in the past eight seasons as the Big 12 continues its place among the elite intercollegiate athletic conferences. The six men's Final Four participants since 2002 are tied for the most of any conference. Numerous national honors have been won by basketball student-athletes during the league's history. The Big 12 had a national player of the year honoree for the third straight year when Blake Griffin (Oklahoma) was the consensus winner in 2008-09. Courtney Paris (Oklahoma) gave the conference a consensus All-America selection in women's basketball for the ninth straight season.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

Big 12 student-athletes also do well in garnering national academic recognition. Sarah Pavan (Nebraska) was named Academic All-America of the Year in volleyball in 2006 and 2007 by ESPN The Magazine and College Sports Information Directors of America with a 4.0 grade-point average in Biochemistry. She also won the national academic honor presented for all sports in 2006-07 and was named recipient of the prestigious 2006-07 Honda-Broderick Award as Collegiate Woman Athlete of the Year. She is the first athlete since the Big 12 was formed to earn the accolade. In its history, the conference has over 330 academic honorees, averaging more than 25 each season.

The Big 12 can boast of other stories that combine on and off the field success. Patience Knight (Texas Tech) was the recipient of the Honda Inspiration Award in 2008, given to an outstanding female college athlete who overcomes adversity to excel in her sport. She was diagnosed with a cancerous tumor in 2007, but rebounded to win All-America honors at the 2008 NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships.

Competitive excellence, scholarship and sportsmanship are all equal components of the Big 12 philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and Academic All-Big 12 squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons.

At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsman of the Year awards.

Institutions can also nominate student-athletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships at the end of each academic year. A total of 225 scholars have received over 1.3 million in postgraduate financial aid through the first 13 years of the program.

The Big 12 sponsors 21 sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The Conference is made up of 12 institutions that have shared many traditional rivalries throughout their histories. Member schools include - Baylor University, University of Colorado, Iowa State University, University of Kansas, Kansas State University, University of Missouri, University of Nebraska, University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma State University, University of Texas, Texas A&M University and Texas Tech University.

The institutions created a league that encompasses seven states, over 46 million people and television households in 18 of the top 100 markets within its geographic footprint.

The Conference conducts championships for 20 of its 21 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition. The winner of the Big 12 football championship game earns the league's berth into the prestigious Bowl Championship Series.

In the last several years the Big 12 has increased its bowl agreements and expanded television opportunities for all sports through contracts with ABC/ESPN and FSN. Most recently, the league renewed and expanded its multi-year arrangement with ABC/ESPN, Inc. The new contract began in 2008-09.

In its first 13 years, the Conference has distributed more than \$1.1 billion to its 12 member institutions.

The Big 12 staff administers to over 4,600 student-athletes in its 21 sports. The conference office is headquartered in Irving, Texas.

PRESEASON HYPE

Defending Big 12 champion Texas was tabbed No. 1 in the four major preseason polls (Baseball America, Collegiate Baseball, National Collegiate Baseball Writers and USA Today/ESPN Coaches). Texas A&M was the last league team to be acknowledged as a preseason No. 1 when the Aggies were recognized by Baseball America a year ago.

The Longhorns concluded the 2009 season with a 50-16-1 overall record after making their NCAA-record 33rd College World Series appearance and finishing as national runner-up. Along the way, Texas claimed the Big 12 regular season and postseason titles.

Oklahoma, last year's Big 12 regular season runner-up, also was ranked. The Sooners received their highest rating (No. 22) in the USA Today/ESPN Coaches poll. OU was 25th in the Collegiate Baseball and NCBWA preseason rankings.

Texas A&M followed the Sooners at No. 28 in the NCBWA poll, while Kansas and Kansas State checked in at 33rd and 34th, respectively.

POSTSEASON PROPS

The Big 12 earned a league-record eight bids to the 2009 NCAA Division I Baseball Championship. It was tied with the Southeastern Conference for the most teams in the field.

UT was awarded the top overall seed of the Championship after the Longhorns won the Big 12's regular season and postseason crowns. The league's automatic qualifier and Oklahoma hosted regional action. The Sooners were the No. 7 national seed and finished second in the league race.

Kansas State played in its first NCAA Championship after posting a school record 43 victories in '09. Baylor, Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma State and Texas A&M also were selected to participate in the national tournament.

Texas advanced to the College World Series, accounting for the Conference's 12th appearance. Overall, five different league squads have qualified for the CWS in 13 seasons, including the Longhorns' 2002 and '05 national championship runs. Baylor (2005), Nebraska (2001-'02, '05), Oklahoma State (1999), Texas (2000, '02-'05, '09) and Texas A&M (1999) also have represented the Conference at the event. The Big 12 had an all-time high three teams in the '05 CWS field, while sending two squads in 1999 and 2002.

PACESETTER

Augie Garrido (Texas) logged his 1,700th victory against Baylor on May 2, 2009, becoming the first NCAA Division I coach to reach the plateau. The No. 8 Longhorns defeated the 17th-ranked Bears, 19-11.

Garrido is the all-time winningest active D-I mentor (by victories) with 1,718 career wins in 41 years. He claimed his 1,428th victory on June 9, 2003 against No. 1 Florida State to move into first place. Garrido currently sits No. 2 among all coaches, trailing only Gordie Gillespie of Division III St. Francis (Ill.), who earned his 1,800th win in '09 (1,816 overall).

In addition, Garrido (11th) is joined by Kansas State's Brad Hill (6th) Oklahoma's Sunny Golloway (16th), Nebraska's Mike Anderson (24th), Oklahoma State's Frank Anderson (33rd) and Baylor's Steve Smith (50th) in the top 50 active coaches by winning percentage.

WHO'S BACK?

Returning All-Big 12 First Team performers Tony Thompson (Kansas) and Chance Ruffin (Texas) both earned preseason All-America accolades from Baseball America, Collegiate Baseball and the NCBWA.

Thompson, a junior infielder, received first-team recognition from Collegiate Baseball and was placed on the second team by BA and the NCBWA. Last season, Thompson won the conference's triple crown as he led the league in batting average (.389), home runs (21) and RBI (82). He ranked third nationally in doubles (27), fourth in total bases (186) and seventh in RBI.

Ruffin (CB: first team, NCBWA: second team) went 10-2 with one save and a 3.32 ERA in the 2009 campaign. The junior starter fanned 115 while walking 25 in 124.2 innings.

Fellow Longhorn hurler Taylor Jungmann was honored as well -- he was a first-team selection by CB and the NCBWA and second-team pick by BA. Jungmann capped off his freshman campaign with a 5-0 postseason mark, including a 3-0 record with a 0.59 ERA at the College World Series to earn All-Tournament honors. Overall, Jungmann went 11-3 in 2009 while posting a 2.00 ERA. The 2009 Baseball America Freshman All-American fanned 101 batters and walked just 35 in 94.2 innings.

Ryan Duke (Oklahoma), the All-Big 12 Second Team reliever, made CB's and NCBWA's second-team roster. He paced the Big 12 with 16 saves, which ranked sixth in the nation. Duke received All-America distinction (third team) from the NCBWA last season and is the first Sooner to appear on a preseason list since 2003.

UT catcher Cameron Rupp and pitcher Cole Green were CB Louisville Slugger Preseason All-America second- and third-team honorees, respectively. Rupp also garnered a third-team nod from BA along with Longhorn righty Brandon Workman.

The 2009 Big 12 Freshman of the Year Garrett Buechele (Oklahoma) is the only postseason individual award winner to return in 2010. Buechele started all 56 games at third base for OU, while leading all hitters in Big 12 action in batting average (.396), hits (40) and on-base percentage (.479) during his rookie campaign.

SEAT FILLERS

Texas and Texas A&M headlined the Big 12's eight teams listed in the top 50 of the NCAA attendance rankings. UT and TAMU are ranked sixth and ninth, respectively, in average home attendance. The Longhorns also pace the league in total home attendance at No. 5, in addition to the Aggies holding the No. 9 spot. The Big 12 has had four or more teams place in the national top 25 every season since 1999.

UT recorded 217,637 fans during the 2009 campaign, averaging 6,218 spectators. The Aggies had 142,660 enter the turnstiles last season while drawing an average of 4,076 for their 35 home games.

Baylor, Texas and Texas A&M are three of eight schools who have averaged at least 2,700 fans each season since 2000.

CHAMPIONSHIP INFORMATION/HISTORY

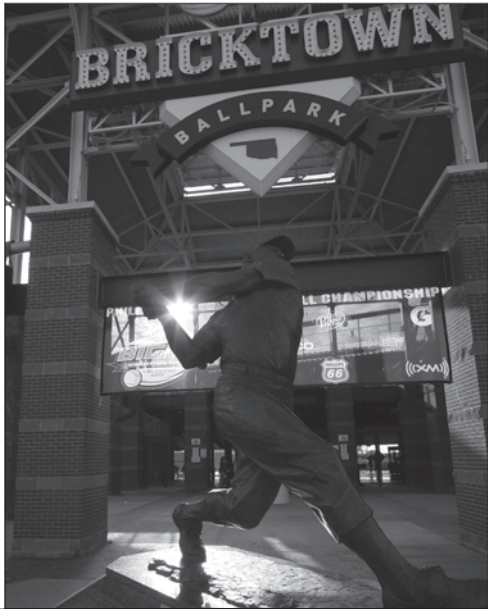
The Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship returns to Oklahoma City's AT&T Bricktown Ballpark on May 26-30.

The Brick, which was opened on April 2, 1998 and seats 13,066 fans, serves as the home facility for the Class AAA Oklahoma Redhawks. It has hosted 11 baseball championships in the league's 14-year tenure, including this season's event. Overall, three venues have sponsored the tournament: All-Sports Stadium, Oklahoma City (1997); AT&T Bricktown Ballpark (1998-2001, '03, '05-10) and The Ballpark in Arlington (2002, '04).

Past postseason championship winners include Kansas (2006), Nebraska (1999-2001, '05), Oklahoma (1997), Oklahoma State (2004), Texas (2002, '03, '08-09), Texas A&M (2007) and Texas Tech (1998).

Live pre-game, game and post-game action from the 2010 tournament will be video streamed on Big12Sports.com for the fourth straight year. Audio from the webcast will also be broadcast on Sirius XM Radio, a Big 12 corporate partner.

CHAMPIONSHIP FORMAT

The eight teams with the best conference records (based on winning percentage) in regular season competition will qualify for the Phillips Big 12 Championship. The event is in a two-division, pool play format, in which each of the squads competing is guaranteed a minimum of three games.

Results from the league's 27-game round-robin conference schedule will determine the eight seeds for the Championship. Seeds 1, 4, 5 and 8 will compete in pool play on one side of the bracket, while teams seeded No. 2, 3, 6 and 7 will play in the other. The two teams with the best record within their bracket will advance to the Championship game, with the winner earning the Big 12's automatic berth into the NCAA Championship. Head-to-head competition will break ties within each bracket. In the event of more than two teams being tied for the top spot within a bracket, the highest-seeded team will advance to Sunday's winner-take-all Championship game.

Rainout Policy:

In the event divisional play cannot be completed to determine a divisional champion (due to weather-related or other circumstances) the following tiebreaking procedures will take place to determine which two teams shall play in the championship:

- 1) Team with the best record in each division by winning percentage.
- 2) If two or more teams are still tied, the highest seeded team amongst the tied moves on as the Division Champion.

THE ROAD TO OMAHA

The 64-team bracket provides for 16 four-team double elimination Regionals; and eight two-team, best-of-three Super Regionals, with the eight winners advancing to Omaha for the NCAA Men's College World Series.

In 1999, the NCAA Division I Baseball Championship expanded from a field of 48 teams to 64. The champions of all 29 NCAA Division I conferences automatically qualify for the championship. The remaining 35 teams will be selected at-large. The Division I Baseball Committee will also consider regular season conference standings and/or conference postseason competition.



Since coming to Omaha, 876 games have been played in Rosenblatt Stadium, with total overall attendance of 7,211,767. Annual attendance for the Series has grown from 17,805 during its first year in Omaha, to a record 336,076 fans scanned through the gates in 2009.

The FSN/Big 12 baseball television package is in its 14th year. FSN Southwest is scheduled to air 2010 Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship game from Oklahoma City for the seventh consecutive season. Additional telecasts from the championship may be announced at a later date.

In addition, ESPNU, ESPN, ESPN2, Fox College Sports and CBS College Sports may also televise games. ESPN and its affiliates will carry most NCAA Regional contests as well as all NCAA Super Regional and College World Series games live from Omaha, Neb.

Dan Beebe was named the third commissioner of the Big 12 Conference on September 5, 2007, after serving as senior associate commissioner and chief operating officer for the league since February 2003.

In his two years as commissioner, Beebe has enjoyed four national championships and four teams in the Bowl Championship Series in addition to numerous individual NCAA crowns. Off the field, he guided league institutions to a continuation of their revenue sharing model which returned a record \$130-million back to its membership in 2008-09.

In addition, Beebe was part of the BCS television negotiating team that reached a new agreement with ESPN resulting in a significant increase in revenue for the Big 12. He also has spearheaded a continued and expanded Big 12 relationship with Special Olympics in each of the league's seven states.

The Walla Walla, Washington, native will represent the Big 12 on two national boards. Beebe has been named to the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee – one of the organization's most prestigious groups. His tenure will begin in September 2009 and run for five years. He also will serve on the Executive Committee of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA). That four-year term will expire in June 2013. Currently, Beebe is a board member of the Collegiate Women Sports Awards, sponsored by Honda.

While in his previous role at the Big 12, Beebe handled issues related to governance, national policy and legal affairs, in addition to coordinating the day-to-day activities of the conference office. He also served as the conference liaison to the Big 12 Board of Directors. Beebe has been involved in site selection for future league championships, extending television contracts and enhancing football bowl opportunities. In addition, he has been active in establishing the conference's sportsmanship policies and procedures.

Prior to joining the Big 12, Beebe was commissioner of the Ohio Valley Conference from 1989-2003. Upon his appointment, he became the youngest leader of a Division I football-playing conference.

During his tenure, Beebe made the OVC more attractive in areas of television appearances as exposure nearly tripled. He also enhanced championships and revenue generation, ensured sportsmanship and fair play, promoted gender equity, and gained national recognition for the league. He was a strong proponent of providing opportunities for female student-athletes, as the league added three women's championships during his time.

Under Beebe's direction, the OVC added five new members. He also placed an emphasis on ethics and sportsmanship within the league, producing a nationally recognized sportsmanship statement and participating in regional and national seminars on the topic.

Over the course of his career, Beebe has built a strong reputation nationally in college athletics and has been selected to some of the NCAA's most significant committees. In addition to his recent appointments, he was a member of the prestigious NCAA Management Council, serving as chair of the Council's I-AA Governance Committee. He also chaired the Council's Committee on Fines and Forfeitures and was part of its Subcommittee for Student-Athlete Issues. Beebe was picked to fill the required commissioner's position on the initial NCAA Athletics Certification Committee that formalized and implemented the program adopted by the NCAA membership. He also previously served on the NCAA Nominating, Professional Sports Liaison, Football Issues, I-AA Football and Federal Arbitration Act committees.

Prior to his conference work, Beebe was a Director of Enforcement at the NCAA. He started at the NCAA in 1982 as an enforcement representative and was involved with numerous high-profile cases. That tenure was interrupted by a one-year stint as an Assistant Director of Athletics at Wichita State University in 1986 before he returned to the NCAA office where he earned his Director of Enforcement promotion in 1988.

Beebe attended Walla Walla Community College from 1975 to 1977, and then transferred on to California State Polytechnic University (Cal Poly-Pomona) where he earned his Bachelor of Science degree, cum laude, in social sciences in June 1979. Beebe received his law degree from the University of California Hastings College of the Law in 1982 and is a member of the Washington State Bar Association.

Besides his life's work, Beebe's ability to relate to student-athletes and others directly involved in college sports results from his own experience as a recruited football player. As an offensive lineman, Beebe was a four-year starter and served as captain of the varsity football teams at Walla Walla Community College and Cal Poly-Pomona. He continued his participation in athletics well after his college days, playing rugby, basketball, tennis, golf and other sports.

He was selected as one of the Outstanding Young Men of America in 1989 in recognition of his outstanding professional achievement, superior leadership ability and exceptional service to the community. In 1995, he was named an Institute for International Sport Ethics Fellow. Beebe has also served on various community boards, including the YMCA and Nashville Sports Council.

Born on February 27, 1957, Beebe is married to the former Molly Scanlon and has four children: daughters Jessie and Elaine, and sons Matthew and Patrick.
