



## **2010 Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship**

### **AT&T Bricktown Ballpark**

### **May 29, 2010**

#### **Game Notes: No. 8 Missouri 7, No. 5 Texas Tech 3**

##### **Missouri (29-26, 2-1 in Pool One)**

- Missouri improves to 18-21 all-time in Big 12 Championship play, and 3-2 against the Red Raiders in Big 12 postseason play.
- Second baseman Conner Mach extended his current hitting streak to 8 games, tying a career high, while first baseman Aaron Senne saw his 5 game streak end going 0 for 4 at the plate.
- Left fielder Ryan Gebhart shined in the Tigers win going 2-for-3 at the plate with a home run, the first of his career, and 3 RBIs, a career best for Gebhart.
- Relief pitcher Zach Hardoin struck out a career-high seven batters en route to his second win of the season as he finished the day only allowing two earned runs on three hits in four innings of work.

##### **Texas Tech (28-29, 1-2 in Pool One)**

- Texas Tech is now 14-22 in Big 12 Conference play.
- For the seventh straight appearance at the Big 12 Championships, Texas Tech has not won more than one game. The last time Tech recorded more than one win in championship play was in 1998 when Tech went on to defeat Texas A&M, 14-7, for their only Big 12 Championship title in school history.
- Sophomore designated hitter Scott LeJeune, the conference's leader in doubles, recorded his 28<sup>th</sup> of the season to lead off the sixth inning. LeJeune ends the season one double shy of tying Jason Landreth for the Red Raider single-season record of 29. He finished the game today going 1-for-4 with one run scored.
- Junior Bobby Doran worked his longest relief appearance in today's game as he went 5 1/3 innings. He was tagged with the loss after surrendering five runs, one earned, on six hits while tying his career high for walks with three.
- Junior third baseman Nick Popescu stole a career-high two bases as he also led the Tech offense as the only Red Raider to record multiple hits. He finished the game 2-for-4 with one run scored.
- In his seven starts this season, junior Jay Johnson saw his shortest outing of the season as he only went 1 1/3 innings before being replaced by right-hander Bobby Doran. Johnson gave up two earned runs and walked four batters while tying his career-high for hit batters with two.
