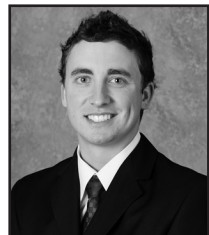

COACHES' TELECONFERENCE

The Big 12 Conference baseball coaches will participate in a media-only preseason teleconference at 10 a.m. Central time on Feb. 15. The conference call can be heard live and will be archived on Big12Sports.com. Please contact the Big 12 communications staff for the call-in and replay phone numbers.

POSTSEASON AWARDS

The Big 12 presents the official all-conference awards at the end of the regular season. Major award winners are chosen, along with the All-Big 12 teams. Each head coach votes on the squads and is not permitted to vote for his own players. The awards will be announced prior to the Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship.

Academic All-Big 12 teams are also chosen in baseball and will be announced prior to the postseason.

BIG 12 WEEKLY SHOWS

The Big 12 Report is a weekly show that is available *exclusively* at Big12Sports.com. Hosted by Correspondent Wendell Barnhouse, the show is broadcast each Thursday and focuses on the schools and student-athletes throughout the Big 12. In addition, it will give fans a unique look into the workings of the Conference itself - including television, bowl games, scheduling and more - along with interviews with the Commissioner and other selected Big 12 staff.

The Big 12 also boasts two over-the-air weekly magazine-style shows. Each program is a 30-minute promotion of the league, with features on student-athletes, coaches, teams and conference championships. **Big 12 Showcase** returns for its 15th season on FSN and has been produced by Keith Fletcher each of those years. Emily Jones handles hosting duties. **Big 12 This Week** is televised by ESPNU, with Melissa Knowles as the primary host. Segments of both programs are available online via the Big 12 website.

CHAMPIONSHIP CREDENTIALS

Media credentials for the 2011 Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship are authorized and issued by the Conference office. An online credential system, provided through an agreement with Sports Systems Services, Inc., is the only method to submit requests. The credential system will be made available during the month of April.

The Big 12 maintains its website at Big12Sports.com. Complete information on the league and its member schools is available.

The site boasts original content from throughout the Conference along with several video broadcasts, including a weekly magazine show - The Big 12 Report. In baseball, full rebroadcasts of ESPN televised contests will be available via the Big 12 Network Online, within 72 hours of a game's completion. Comprehensive coverage from the 2011 Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship will be video streamed for free on Big12Sports.com for the fifth consecutive year.

Scores throughout the league and standings are updated on a daily basis. Conference statistics are available daily, with weekly award winners posted each Monday.

Media can access Acrobat PDF files of the conference release, statistics and the league media guide on the website.

CONFERENCE RELEASE

The Big 12 will update a media release, including team notes, results and more daily during the season. Complete league statistics will be updated via the conference website as well.

PHILLIPS 66 WEEKLY AWARDS

A Big 12 Player, Pitcher and Newcomer of the Week will be chosen beginning in late February. Nominations are submitted by the school media relations offices and the winners are selected by a panel of media voters who cover the league on a regular basis. This year marks the 15th year for Phillips 66 as a sponsor of the Big 12 Conference.

RICH FETCHIET

Coordinator of Baseball Umpires

Rich Fetchiet was named Big 12 Conference Coordinator of Baseball Umpires in August 2005. He has over 35 years of collegiate, national and international umpiring and umpire-related administrative experience.

Fetchiet is also currently the coordinator for the Big East, Big Ten, Conference USA and Mid-American conferences and the Horizon League. He is a member of the NCAA National Umpire Program Advisory Committee in addition to the NCAA Baseball Rules Editorial Committee. Fetchiet has served as the Baseball Secretary-Rules Editor for the NCAA and Chair of the ABCA Rules Committee. He is active in numerous officiating organizations and is a teacher and instructor at umpire camps and clinics across

the country.

Fetchiet retired from active umpiring after the 2000 season. Prior to that he umpired numerous Division I conference tournaments and made three College World Series appearances, including serving as the plate umpire for the 1999 national championship game. Included among Rich's international tournaments are the Pan Am Games, World Cup Qualifier, Intercontinental Cup, World Championships and the Olympic Games. In 1997 he was named Umpire of the Year by the International Baseball Association.

Fetchiet is a higher education administrator at the University of Michigan School of Dentistry. He and his wife, Kay, and two children currently reside in Ann Arbor, Mich.

BIG 12 CONFERENCE

BIG 12 CONFERENCE – A NATIONAL LEADER

The Big 12 Conference, despite being one of the youngest conferences in America, continues its position as a national leader in athletics and academics in the midst of its 15th season in 2010-11.

Since it began play in 1996-97, the Conference can boast of 39 team crowns and 459 individual NCAA Championships. The success has continued in the fall of 2010 as Oklahoma State captured its second consecutive NCAA men's cross country title. In addition to OSU's crown last year, Texas captured the national championship in men's swimming & diving while Texas A&M maintained its place as the nation's top outdoor track & field program. The Aggies secured the NCAA crowns for both the men and women for the second straight year.

Every single sport the Conference sponsors had at least one school ranked in the top six of the national rankings during the past campaign. In addition, nine different sports had the No. 1 team in the nation at some point during the 2009-10 season.

In addition to the NCAA crowns, several more schools made strong national showings. Nine Big 12 volleyball teams have competed in the regional semifinals of the NCAA Championship over the past two years. In 2009, the Big 12 had a school play for the BCS National Championship (Texas) for the seventh season and placed two women's basketball squads (Baylor, Oklahoma) in the Final Four in the same season for the first time. Oklahoma finished second nationally at the 2010 NCAA women's gymnastics finals - an all-time high for the Big 12 - while Oklahoma State placed second at the men's golf championship. Iowa State was third at the NCAA wrestling championships and the Big 12 also placed a team in the College World Series in both softball (Missouri) and baseball (Oklahoma).

The individual honors also continued, as Jenny Barringer (Colorado) earned The Bowerman Award, presented for the first time to the most outstanding collegiate women's track and field athlete. In fact, all three women's finalists were from the Big 12. Caroline Hedwall (Oklahoma State) was named the recipient of the Honda Sports Award as the nation's top female golfer after capturing the NCAA individual title. Lisa Koll (Iowa State) earned the Honda Award as the top collegiate female athlete in track & field, Connie Yori (Nebraska) was the consensus Division I women's basketball coach of the year and K.J. Kindler (Oklahoma) earned national women's gymnastics coaching accolades.

The Big 12 has had four Heisman Trophy winners in its 15-year history. In 2008, the Big 12 established a high-water mark, as for the first time in the 74-year history of the Heisman four of the top five vote-getters hailed from the same conference, including award-winner Sam Bradford (Oklahoma). The league followed that recognition with two of the top five finalists in 2009.

During the past six-plus seasons a total of 17 NCAA trophies have been hoisted by Big 12 institutions, with at least one national crown won in all but one year for the Conference, including 14 consecutive seasons.

The Big 12's seven all-time appearances in the BCS title game ties for the national lead. Seven league squads have played for the football national championship in the last 11 years with berths in 18 BCS games overall, including two each in 2007 and 2008. Since '08, the Big 12 has had a combined 24 players earn consensus All-America accolades, including a nation-leading eight in 2010.

In basketball, nine men's and six women's teams have advanced to their respective Final Fours in the past eight seasons as the Big 12 continues its place among the elite intercollegiate athletic conferences. On the men's side six different teams have reached the regional finals in the past three seasons – the first time since 1985 that any conference can boast of six different teams doing so over a three-year period. The Big 12 has led the nation in women's basketball attendance the past 11 seasons and surpassed its own NCAA record attendance mark in 2009-10.

Numerous national honors have been won by basketball student-athletes during the league's history. Sherron Collins (Kansas) was awarded the 2010 Frances Pomeroy Naismith Award in men's basketball as the top player six-foot or under. Kelsey Griffin (Nebraska) gave the Conference a consensus All-America selection in women's basketball for the 10th straight season.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community, the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

Big 12 student-athletes have shown commitment to their studies by earning numerous academic recognitions. Cole Aldrich (Kansas) was the latest after being named Academic All-America of the Year in men's basketball in 2009-10. It marked the seventh time in the past five years that a league athlete has garnered the top academic honor for their respective sport. The Big 12 had plenty of success overall in the classroom a year ago, as the Conference led the nation with 38 student-athletes earning ESPN/CoSIDA Academic All-America recognition.

Sarah Pavan (Nebraska) earned countless accolades for her work away from competition, being named the Academic All-America of the Year for all sports in both 2006-07 and '07-08. She was also named recipient of the prestigious 2006-07 Honda-Broderick Award as Collegiate Woman Athlete of the Year, the first athlete since the Big 12 was formed to earn the accolade. In its history, the conference has nearly 400 academic honorees, averaging more than 25 each season.

The Big 12 can boast of other stories that combine on and off the field success. Patience Knight (Texas Tech) was the recipient of the Honda Inspiration Award in 2008, given to an outstanding female college athlete who overcomes adversity to excel in her sport. She was diagnosed with a cancerous tumor in 2007, but rebounded to win All-America honors at the 2008 NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships.

Competitive excellence, scholarship and sportsmanship are all equal components of the Big 12 philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and Academic All-Big 12 squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons. At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsman of the Year awards.

Institutions can also nominate student-athletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships at the end of each academic year. A total of 249 scholars have received over 1.6 million in postgraduate financial aid through the first 14 years of the program.

The Big 12 sponsors 21 sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, soccer, softball, swimming & diving, tennis and volleyball.

The Conference is made up of 12 institutions that have shared many traditional rivalries throughout their histories. Member schools include - Baylor University, University of Colorado, Iowa State University, University of Kansas, Kansas State University, University of Missouri, University of Nebraska, University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma State University, University of Texas, Texas A&M University and Texas Tech University.

The institutions created a league that encompasses seven states, over 46 million people and television households in 18 of the top 100 markets within its geographic footprint.

The Conference conducts championships for 19 of its 21 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition. The winner of the Big 12 football championship game earns the league's berth into the Bowl Championship Series.

In the last several years the Big 12 has increased its bowl agreements and expanded television opportunities for all sports through contracts with ABC/ESPN and FSN. Most recently, the league renewed and expanded its multi-year arrangement with ABC/ESPN, Inc. The new contract began in 2008-09.

In its first 14 years, the Conference has distributed more than \$1.2 billion to its 12 member institutions. The Big 12 staff administers to over 4,600 student-athletes in its 21 sports. The conference office is headquartered in Irving, Texas.

GREAT EXPECTATIONS

Big 12 squads are a mainstay in the national rankings each year, and in 2011 expect to see much of the same. Three Big 12 teams were ranked in the top 10 of Collegiate Baseball's preseason poll released in mid-December. Oklahoma led the way in sixth-place, after making its first appearance since 1995 at the 2010 Men's College World Series and 10th trip to Omaha overall. Texas and Texas A&M followed closely behind at No. 7 and 8 respectively. The remaining preseason rankings were not available at press time.

Individually, Garrett Buechele (Oklahoma), Cole Green, Taylor Jungmann (Texas) and John Stilson (Texas A&M) earned preseason recognition from Collegiate Baseball and the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association. Stilson, the 2010 Big 12 Newcomer of the Year, was a first-team honoree on both squads. The Longhorn pitching duo of Jungmann and Green were tabbed for first and second team accolades. Last season's conference pitcher of the year Green joined Stilson on the NCBWA's first team, while Jungmann was on the second team. CB's Louisville Slugger selected Jungmann to its first team and Green to the second team. Buechele made the second team for NCBWA and was named to the third team by CB. Kansas State's James Allen and Nick Martini were members of the NCBWA's preseason third team.

All but one of last season's All-Big 12 individual award winners return. In addition to Green, Stilson and Martini (Co-Player of the Year), Texas Tech's Barrett Barnes, who was the Freshman of the Year, will suit up for the Red Raiders again in 2011. Buechele, Green, Martini and Stilson also landed on the All-Big 12 First Team a year ago. Barnes and Jungmann were selected to the second team.

LEADER OF THE PACK

Including the Longhorns' 50 victories in 2010, Texas' Augie Garrido has compiled 1,768 career wins in 42 years of coaching. He is the all-time winningest active mentor (by victories) in Division I. The Vallejo, California-native moved into first-place when he claimed his 1,428th victory on June 9, 2003, against No. 1 Florida State. He currently sits at No. 2 among all coaches, trailing only Gordie Gillespie of Division III St. Francis [Ill.], who has 1,852 victories. Garrido is one of only two Division I coaches to ever win 500 or more games at two different schools and the only coach to ever win 600 or more contests at two different institutions. Garrido has amassed a 617-282-2 (.686) mark at UT over the last 14 seasons.

In addition, Garrido (10th) is joined by Kansas State's Brad Hill (6th) Oklahoma's Sunny Golloway (15th), Nebraska's Mike Anderson (25th), Texas A&M's Rob Childress (29th), Oklahoma State's Frank Anderson (38th) and Baylor's Steve Smith (49th) in the top 50 active coaches by winning percentage.

2010 SEASON REVIEW

Texas won its sixth Big 12 regular season title (2002, '04, '06-07 and '09) in 2010. The Longhorns posted a 24-3 mark (.889), setting a Big 12 record for most conference victories in a season. Texas also established the mark for consecutive league wins (17).

The postseason started in dramatic fashion for the Conference with Texas A&M edging Baylor 5-3 in 10 innings in the Phillips 66 Big 12 Championship title contest. The Aggies rallied to tie up the contest at 3-3 behind a Brodie Greene bunt single in the ninth-inning. Greene, who earned the Most Outstanding Player award, then connected on a two-run homer to give A&M its second league postseason crown (2007).

Five Big 12 teams were chosen to compete in the NCAA Championship field, including Texas A&M which was the league's automatic qualifier after winning the postseason championship. Texas and Oklahoma hosted regional competition while Baylor and Kansas State also earned bids.

The Big 12 posted a .667 (12-6) winning percentage in NCAA Regional action, the second-highest among conferences with five or more teams in the field. Only the SEC had a better percentage (.710), recording a 22-9 mark. OU and UT advanced to their respective Super Regionals, marking the first time since '07 (Oklahoma State, Texas A&M) that more than one Big 12 team moved on to the second weekend of play.

Oklahoma filled the final spot in the Men's College World Series field, shutting out the No. 5 national seed Virginia on June 14 in the Charlottesville (Va.) Super Regional. The Sooners earned their first trip to Omaha since 1995 and 10th appearance overall. It marked the second straight season the Big 12 had a team participate in the MCWS -- Texas was the championship runner-up in '09 -- and 13th appearance overall. Six different league squads have qualified for the event in the Big 12's 14 seasons, including the Longhorns' 2002 and '05 national title runs.

OU's season ended with a 12-inning, 3-2 loss to the eventual national champion South Carolina.

Overall, the Big 12 finished the 2010 campaign with a 212-85 (.714) record against non-conference opponents.

HOME FIELD ADVANTAGE

Texas and Texas A&M headlined the Big 12's seven teams listed in the top 50 of the NCAA attendance rankings. UT and TAMU are ranked fifth and 11th, respectively, in average home attendance. The Longhorns also pace the league in total home attendance at No. 3, in addition to the Aggies holding the No. 9 spot. The Big 12 has had four or more teams place in the national top 25 every season since 1999.

UT recorded 256,278 fans during the 2010 campaign, averaging 6,571 spectators. The Aggies had 131,089 enter the turnstiles last season while drawing an average of 3,641 for their 36 home games.

Baylor, Texas and Texas A&M are three of eight schools in the nation that have averaged at least 2,700 fans each season since 2000.

NATIONAL RECOGNITION

This fall, the 2010 Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship was nominated for a SportsTravel Award in the Best Collegiate Sports Event Series or Circuit category. The accolade is presented by SportsTravel magazine, a national publication that serves the sports-based travel industry.

Sporting events are nominated and then voted on by the readers of SportsTravel. Criteria for nomination and voting include superior organization of and attendance at the event, a superior experience for the competitors and/or spectators at the event, and how the site or venue served to enhance the event.

The Big 12 Conference and the Oklahoma City All Sports Association have hosted the league's annual postseason championship in downtown Oklahoma City 12 times in the Conference's history.

The Men's College World Series took home top honors.

GOING FOR THE GOLD

USA Baseball named Missouri head coach Tim Jamieson the manager of the 2011 Collegiate National Team.

Jamieson made his Team USA debut serving as an assistant coach for fellow Big 12 colleague Steve Smith from Baylor who led the 2005 collegiate squad. Team USA posted a 16-4 record, which included games played in Japan and Taiwan.

The 2011 slate is highlighted by five games against Japan, marking the 38th time the USA Baseball Collegiate National Team has met the Japanese Collegiate All-Stars in an international friendship series. The complete 2011 schedule will be announced at a later date.

Jamieson enters his 17th season at the helm of the Tiger program this season. He is the second-winningest coach in MU history with a career record of 544-382-2.

CHAMPIONSHIP INFORMATION/HISTORY

The Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship returns to Oklahoma City's RedHawks Ballpark on May 25-29.

RedHawks Ballpark, which was opened on April 2, 1998 and seats 13,066 fans, serves as the home facility for the Class AAA Oklahoma City RedHawks, an affiliate of the Houston Astros. It has hosted 12 baseball championships in the league's 15-year tenure, including this season's event. Overall, three venues have sponsored the tournament: All-Sports Stadium, Oklahoma City (1997); RedHawks Ballpark (1998-2001, '03, '05-10) and The Ballpark in Arlington (2002, '04).

Past postseason championship winners include Kansas (2006), Nebraska (1999-2001, '05), Oklahoma (1997), Oklahoma State (2004), Texas (2002, '03, '08-09), Texas A&M (2007, '10) and Texas Tech (1998).

Live action from the 2011 championship will be video streamed on Big12Sports.com for the fifth straight year. Audio from the webcast will also be broadcast on Sirius XM Radio, a Big 12 corporate partner.

CHAMPIONSHIP FORMAT

The eight teams with the best conference records (based on winning percentage) in regular season competition will qualify for the Phillips 66 Big 12 Championship -- a two-division, double-elimination format.

In the event of a tie or ties in the standings, the following tie-breaking system will be implemented.

- (a) If two teams are tied, head-to-head competition will be used to break a tie.
- (b) If two teams remain tied, the winner of the first game of the Conference series between the two tied teams will be used.
- (c) If two teams remain tied, there will be a comparison of the records of the tied teams against the highest place team(s) in descending order from top to bottom until the tie is broken; or,
- (d) If two teams remain tied, there will be a drawing to determine the seed or qualification for the tournament;
- (e) If three or more teams are tied, there will be a comparison of head-to-head records in a 'mini round-robin' of tied teams, followed by steps (a), (b), (c), and (d). Once a team has been eliminated from a multi-team comparison, it is dropped from further comparisons.

The Phillips 66 Big 12 Championship winner earns the Big 12's automatic berth into the NCAA Championship field. If the championship is terminated before completion, then the league's regular season champion (No. 1-seeded team for the championship), will serve as the Conference's automatic qualifier to the NCAA Tournament.

THE ROAD TO OMAHA

The champions of all 29 NCAA Division I conferences automatically qualify for the championship. The remaining 35 teams will be selected at-large. The Division I Baseball Committee will also consider regular season conference standings and/or conference postseason competition.

THE BIG 12 AT THE MCWS

In 2010, Oklahoma represented the Big 12 Conference, filling the final spot in the MCWS field. The Sooners shut out the No. 5 national seed Virginia, 11-0 in the Charlottesville Super Regional to advance. OU earned its first trip to Omaha since 1995 and 10th appearance overall.

It marked the second straight season the Big 12 had a team participate in the MCWS (Texas-2009) and 13th appearance overall. Six different league squads have qualified for the event in the Big 12's 14 seasons, including the Longhorns' 2002 and '05 national title runs. Baylor (2005), Nebraska (2001-'02, '05), Oklahoma State (1999), Texas (2000, '02-'05, '09) and Texas A&M (1999) also have represented the Conference at the event. The Big 12 had an all-time high three teams in the '05 MCWS field.

Texas head coach Augie Garrido was named to the College World Series Legends Team last season, which was a part of the commemoration of the final Series in Omaha's Johnny Rosenblatt Stadium. The members of the Legends Team were former student-athletes and coaches who had the best MCWS performances throughout the 60 years the event has been played at Rosenblatt Stadium.

Garrido has made 13 MCWS appearances, including seven at Cal State Fullerton and six at Texas. He has won a total of five national championships in Omaha -- the only coach to win a national championship with two different teams and in four different decades.

Former Longhorn hurler Huston Street also was tabbed for the honor and was the only student-athlete to compete in the Big 12 among the five others who played for league institutions.

Street holds the all-time College World Series saves record with five, including a single-series record of four in 2002. He ranks third in career appearances (10). The pitcher was also named the 2002 CWS Most Outstanding Player.

CONFERENCE STAFF



Dan Beebe is in his fourth year as the commissioner of the Big 12 Conference in 2010-11 after successfully guiding the league through one of the most tumultuous offseasons ever experienced by a collegiate athletic conference. His unwavering dedication has helped poise the Big 12 to continue as one of the leaders on a national level for years to come.

This past summer, Beebe worked with 10 members of the Big 12 Conference and numerous outside partners to stabilize the league as it continues the second decade of the 21st Century. During the process, he continued to stress the value of competition between Big 12 members and the extraordinary experience it provides for the league student-athletes.

In his tenure as commissioner, Beebe has enjoyed eight national championships and five teams in the Bowl Championship Series in addition to numerous individual NCAA crowns. Off the field, he guided league institutions to a continuation of their revenue sharing model which returned a record \$139-million back to its membership in 2009-10. He has also ensured future revenue security for each of the members going forward.

He represents the Big 12 on three national boards - the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee and the Executive Committee of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA). As a basketball committee member, he worked as part of the group that secured a record television arrangement for the NCAA and also contributed to the decision to expand the field to 68 teams starting in 2011. His tenure began in September 2009 and runs for four years, while the NACDA appointment will expire in June 2013. Beebe is also a board member of the Collegiate Women Sports Awards and Honda Award and is also Chair of the Collegiate Commissioners Association Football Bowl Subdivision group.

The Walla Walla, Washington-native was part of the BCS television negotiating team that reached a new agreement with ESPN resulting in a significant increase in revenue for the Big 12. He orchestrated the conference's new arrangements with its non-BCS Bowl partners that resulted in a 33 percent increase in revenues. He has also spearheaded a continued and expanded Big 12 relationship with Special Olympics in each of the league's states.

Beebe was named commissioner on September 5, 2007, after serving as senior associate commissioner and chief operating officer for the league since February 2003.

While in his previous role at the Big 12, Beebe handled issues related to governance, national policy and legal affairs, in addition to coordinating the day-to-day activities of the conference office. He also served as the conference liaison to the Big 12 Board of Directors. Beebe has been involved in site selection for future league championships, extending television contracts and enhancing football bowl opportunities. In addition, he was active in establishing the conference's sportsmanship policies and procedures.

Prior to joining the Big 12, Beebe was commissioner of the Ohio Valley Conference from 1989-2003. Upon his appointment, he became the youngest leader of a Division I

football-playing conference.

During his tenure, Beebe made the OVC more attractive in areas of television appearances as exposure nearly tripled. He also enhanced championships and revenue generation, ensured sportsmanship and fair play, promoted gender equity, and gained national recognition for the league. He was a strong proponent of providing opportunities for female student-athletes, as the league added three women's championships during his time.

Under Beebe's direction, the OVC added five new members. He also placed an emphasis on ethics and sportsmanship within the league, producing a nationally recognized sportsmanship statement and participating in regional and national seminars on the topic.

Over the course of his career, Beebe has built a strong reputation nationally in college athletics and has been selected to some of the NCAA's most significant committees. In addition to his recent appointments, he was a member of the prestigious NCAA Management Council, serving as chair of the Council's I-AA Governance Committee. He also chaired the Council's Committee on Fines and Forfeitures and was part of its Subcommittee for Student-Athlete Issues. Beebe was picked to fill the required commissioner's position on the initial NCAA Athletics Certification Committee that formalized and implemented the program adopted by the NCAA membership. He also previously served on the NCAA Nominating, Professional Sports Liaison, Football Issues, I-AA Football and Federal Arbitration Act committees.

Prior to his conference work, Beebe was a Director of Enforcement at the NCAA. He started at the NCAA in 1982 as an enforcement representative and was involved with numerous high-profile cases. That tenure was interrupted by a one-year stint as an Assistant Director of Athletics at Wichita State University in 1986 before he returned to the NCAA office where he earned his Director of Enforcement promotion in 1988.

Beebe attended Walla Walla Community College from 1975 to 1977, and then transferred on to California State Polytechnic University (Cal Poly-Pomona) where he earned his Bachelor of Science degree, cum laude, in social sciences in June 1979. Beebe received his law degree from the University of California Hastings College of the Law in 1982 and is a member of the Washington State Bar Association.

Besides his life's work, Beebe's ability to relate to student-athletes and others directly involved in college sports results from his own experience as a recruited football player. As an offensive lineman, Beebe was a four-year starter and served as captain of the varsity football teams at Walla Walla Community College and Cal Poly-Pomona. He continued his participation in athletics well after his college days, playing rugby, basketball, tennis, golf and other sports.

He was selected as one of the Outstanding Young Men of America in 1989 in recognition of his outstanding professional achievement, superior leadership ability and exceptional service to the community. In 1995, he was named an Institute for International Sport Ethics Fellow. Beebe has also served on various community boards, including the YMCA and Nashville Sports Council.
