Big 12 Conference - Strength & Success

The Big 12 enters its 18th year as it continues to promote the strength and success of one of the nation's premier athletic conferences under the direction of second-year commissioner Bob Bowlsby.

TCU and West Virginia joined the league on July 1, 2012 and became the Big 12's first additions since inception, joining Baylor, Iowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas and Texas Tech.

With 10 members, the Big 12 remains as the only major conference in the nation to determine its champions in all sports directly on the field of play with a full round-robin schedule.

The Conference's hard work ethic and strong values have translated to enormous success in its first 17 years. Since it began competition in 1996-97, the league can boast of 52 NCAA team titles and 537 individual national championships.

The trophy case added more hardware in 2012-13 as Texas won the NCAA Championship in women's volleyball and the Oklahoma State men's cross country team captured its third national title in the last four seasons. Oklahoma State won the Western crown in equestrian while Oklahoma became one of just five programs to capture multiple national championships in softball. The year ended with Kansas hoisting its first NCAA trophy in women's outdoor track and field. Additionally, the Big 12 picked up 20 individual national titles.

Several other sports also made strong national showings a year ago. Big 12 football sent a national-record 90 percent of its teams to bowl games. Women's basketball claimed the top position in conference RPI for the sixth consecutive season and was the only league to place 80 percent of its teams in postseason play and 70 percent in the NCAA Championship. Baylor won the Big 12's first men's basketball NIT title. Kansas indoor track & field, Oklahoma women's gymnastics and Oklahoma State wrestling finished as runner-up in their respective national championships. Additionally, Texas joined Oklahoma in the Softball College World Series while K-State and Oklahoma competed in baseball Super Regionals.

Individually, Baylor center Brittney Griner earned consensus women's basketball national player of the year for the second season. Oklahoma State's Marcus Smart was named National Freshman of the Year by two different outlets, while Jeff Withey of Kansas was selected the National Association of Basketball Coaches Defensive Player of the Year. Texas volleyball head coach Jerritt Elliott received American Volleyball Coaches Association Coach of the Year honors.

Oklahoma pitcher Keilani Ricketts repeated as the USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year, giving the Big 12 two of the three all-time multiple winners as former Texas player Cat Osterman earned the award three times. Ricketts also claimed the Honda Award for softball for the second consecutive season and the Honda Cup, given to the nation's top female collegiate athlete by the Collegiate Women's Sports Awards. Kansas track & field head coach Stanley Redwine and assistant coach Wayne Pate each earned national accolades as the U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA) awarded the two with outdoor coach of the year honors.

The Big 12 lays claim to five Heisman Trophy winners since 1996 and has had a finalist in 12 of its 17 seasons – the most of any league. Seventeen athletes have earned major individual awards in football in the past five campaigns. Overall, more than 1,400 student-athletes have earned All-America recognition in the past five years alone.

Through its first 17 years, the Big 12 has claimed a team national championship in 16 of the sports it sponsors. The Conference ranks second with seven appearances in the BCS National Championship Game and is second with 96 football consensus All-America selections in that time. League squads combined to lead the nation in women's basketball attendance 13 consecutive years and the Big 12 is the only conference to surpass the one-million mark in season attendance – doing so six times. In men's basketball, the league is the only conference in the nation where every coach has guided a team to the NCAA Tournament, including six coaches that have led teams to the Final Four. During the last nine years a total of 31 NCAA trophies have been hoisted by Big 12 institutions, with at least one national crown won in all but one year for the Conference, including 16 consecutive seasons.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community, the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

National academic accolades have always been strong in the Big 12. Danielle Robinson (Oklahoma) and Sam Acho (Texas) were selected to receive Today's Top VIII Awards – one of the NCAA's top honors. It recognizes student-athletes who completed their athletic eligibility during 2010-11 for success on the fields and courts, in the classroom and in the community. In the last two seasons, three student-athletes were recipients of the NCAA Elite 89 Award. That honor showcases individuals who have reached the pinnacle of competition at the national championship level, while also achieving the highest academic standard among their peers.

In its short history, the Big 12 has had 537 Academic All-America recipients, averaging more than 30 each season. Big 12 student-athletes have shown commitment to their studies by earning numerous individual academic recognitions. Nine times in the past eight years a league athlete has garnered the top academic honor for their respective sport. The Big 12 had plenty of success overall in the classroom the last four years, as the Conference boasted 80 student-athletes earning Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-America recognition through the fall of 2012.

The Big 12 can take pride in other stories that combine on and off the field success. Patience Knight (Texas Tech) was the recipient of the Honda Inspiration Award in 2008, given to an outstanding female college athlete who overcomes adversity to excel in her sport. She was diagnosed with a cancerous tumor in 2007, but rebounded to win All-America honors at the NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships. Oklahoma State women's basketball was the inaugural recipient of the "Together We R" Team Award in 2012, recognizing programs that have strived to succeed in the face of adversity. Following a devastating tornado south of Oklahoma City just before the Big 12 Baseball Championship in 2013, several league baseball teams along with other student-athletes, coaches and former Conference players contributed help in a variety of ways. Plus, the Conference contributed \$200,000 to the relief efforts.

Competitive excellence, scholarship and sportsmanship are all equal components of the Big 12 philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and Academic All-Big 12 squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons. At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsperson of the Year awards.

Institutions can also nominate student-athletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships. A total of 313 scholars have received near \$2.2 million in postgraduate financial aid through the first 17 years of the program.

The Big 12 sponsors 23 sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, equestrian, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming & diving, tennis and volleyball.

Big 12 institutions create a league that encompasses five states and nearly 37 million people. More than 4,200 student-athletes from across the United States and around the World compete annually in the sports sponsored by the Conference.

The Conference conducts postseason championships for 20 of its 23 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition. The winner of the Big 12 football regular season championship earns the league's berth into the Bowl Championship Series.

In its first 17 years, the Conference has distributed more than \$1.8 billion to its member institutions. The conference office is headquartered in Irving, Texas.

Commissioner Bob Bowsby

Bob Bowsby, one of the most respected athletic administrators in the nation, was named the fourth full-time Commissioner of the Big 12 Conference on May 4, 2012. The hire was praised throughout college athletics circles as yet another step in the continuing strength and stability of the Big 12.

In his first year with the Conference, Bowsby secured one of the most lucrative television deals in college athletics and finalized the Champions Bowl, a partnership with the Southeastern Conference. He has also worked to confirm the league's other bowl partnerships, giving the Big 12 some of the premiere postseason destinations in college football.

Bowsby has also played a key role in the formation of the College Football Playoff that will begin in 2014-15, the first postseason playoff in the history of the sport. He has worked to improve scheduling, including an agreement to stage the first Big 12/SEC Challenge in men's basketball in 2013-14.

The first year for Bowsby saw three more national championships added to the Big 12 trophy case while 12 individuals earned NCAA crowns. Three additional conference squads were runner-ups in NCAA competition.

Prior to his role at the Big 12, Bowsby spent six years directing a Stanford University athletics department that sponsors 35 varsity sports and claimed an unprecedented 17 consecutive Learfield Sports Directors Cups, emblematic of the top overall athletics program in the country. The department maintained an annual budget of \$75 million.

Bowsby arrived at Stanford after a 15-year stint as the chief administrator for the University of Iowa Department of Athletics. In his final four years, he guided and supervised the merger of the Hawkeye men's and women's athletic departments that included 24 varsity sports.

Throughout his career, Bowsby has emerged as a national leader in intercollegiate and amateur athletics. He was appointed to the United States Olympic Committee Board of Directors in 2007 and will complete that term at the 2014 Winter Olympiad in Sochi, Russia.



He represented the NCAA as one of two voting members on the USOC. In 2002, President George W. Bush chose Bowsby to be a member of the Commission on Opportunities in Athletics.

Bowsby has previously served as president of the NCAA Division I-A Athletics Directors' Association, chair of the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee (2003-04, '04-05) and chaired the NCAA Management Council. In addition, he has also chaired the NCAA Wrestling Committee, served on NCAA committees on Financial Aid and Amateurism, the Special Committee to Review Amateurism Issues and the Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Athletics.

The National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) named Bowsby in 2001-02 as Central Region Athletic Director of the Year and Sports Business Journal selected him from the four regional award winners as the National Athletics Director of the Year. The award highlights the efforts of the athletic directors for their commitment and positive contributions to campuses and their surrounding communities.

Before his stint overseeing the Hawkeye athletic department he served in the same role for seven years at the University of Northern Iowa. A native of Waterloo, Iowa, Bowsby was named to that post in 1984. He was previously in the role of Assistant Athletic Director for Facilities at the school.

Bowsby earned his bachelor's degree from Moorhead State University (Minnesota) in 1975 and his master's degree from the University of Iowa in 1978. In February 2013, he was named to the NCAA 40th Anniversary Tribute Team, which recognizes the 40th anniversary of NCAA Division II competition. He was a four-year letterwinner in wrestling at MSUM and served as captain during his senior year when he won an NSIC title. Bowsby was inducted into the Dragon Sports Hall of Fame in 1998.

Born on January 10, 1952, Bowsby is married with four children and two grandchildren.

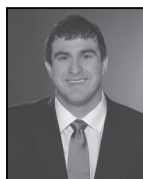

Phillips 66 Big 12 Women's Basketball Championship

The 2014 Phillips 66 Big 12 Women's Basketball Championship will be played in Oklahoma City's Chesapeake Energy Arena for the first time in Conference history, and will be contested in OKC for the third time. The 2007 and 2009 postseason events were played in Cox Convention Center.

The Chesapeake Energy Arena is a multi-purpose arena, located in Bricktown in downtown Oklahoma City. The venue serves as the home to the Oklahoma City Thunder of the National Basketball Association. The arena is also used for concerts and other live entertainment. It opened in 2002 at a cost of \$89.2 million with an additional \$114 million expansion completed in 2013.

Seven different teams have won the previous 17 women's championships, led by Baylor with five titles, including the last three.

Big 12 Scheduling and Championship Tiebreaker

Scheduling Format

The Conference schedule is a double round robin consisting of 18 games.

Tiebreaking Format

The first criteria in the breaking of ties in the standings shall be head-to-head competition of tied teams. The following procedure will be used to establish the postseason championship seeds when ties exist.

Ties Involving Two Teams

- Results of head-to-head competition during the regular season.
- Each team's record vs. the team occupying the highest position in the final regular-season standings, and then continuing down through the standings until one team gains an advantage.

When arriving at another group of tied teams while comparing records, use each team's record against the collective tied teams as a group (prior to that group's own tie-breaking procedure), rather than the performance against individual tied teams.

- A comparison of the tied teams Conference-games only road record.
- A comparison of the tied teams Conference-games only road record vs. the team(s) occupying the highest position in the final Conference regular season standings, and then continuing down through the standings until one team gains an advantage.

When arriving at another group of tied teams while comparing records, use each team's record against the collective tied teams as a group (prior to that group's own tie-breaking procedure), rather than the performance against individual tied teams.

- Draw. In the event tiebreaking procedures are unsuccessful and a draw is necessary in determining any portion of seeding, the following procedure will be used:

(1) The draw will be conducted in public or with media attendance.

- Institutions involved in the drawing have the right to have a local representative in attendance at the drawing.

- A single slip of paper for each institution (with name or logo) will be placed into a container and will be drawn in order of seeding from highest to lowest.

Ties Involving More than Two Teams

- Results of collective head-to-head competition during the regular season among the tied teams (mini round-robin).

- If more than two teams are still tied, each of the tied team's record vs. the team occupying the highest position in the final regular season standings, and then continuing down through the standings, eliminating tied teams with inferior records until one team gains an advantage.

When arriving at another group of tied teams while comparing records, use each team's record against the collective tied teams as a group (prior to that group's own tie-breaking procedure), rather than the performance against individual tied teams.

- If more than two teams are still tied, a comparison of the tied teams Conference-games only road record.

- If more than two teams are still tied, a comparison of the tied teams Conference-games only road record vs. the team(s) occupying the highest position in the final Conference regular season standings, and then continuing down through the standing until one team gains an advantage.

When arriving at another group of tied teams while comparing records, use each team's record against the collective tied teams as a group (prior to that group's own tie-breaking procedure), rather than the performance against individual tied teams.

- If at any point the multiple-team tie is reduced to two teams, the two-team tie-breaking procedures above will be applied.

- Once a team is eliminated from a multi-team comparison, it is dropped from further comparisons.

Big 12 Notebook

- The Big 12 has won three national championships and two WNIT titles since 2005.
- The Big 12 has finished the past six seasons ('08-'13) as No. 1 in conference RPI.
- The Big 12 has eight Women's Final Four appearances since 2002 and has placed at least one team in the national semifinals four of the last five seasons.
- Seven teams participated in the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championship for the seventh year and fourth straight in 2013. The Conference also had seven NCAA bids in 2001, 2002, 2004, 2010, 2011 and 2012.
- The Big 12 led all leagues with 70 percent of its teams in the 2013 NCAA Championship and 80 percent in postseason play. It marked the second consecutive year for the Conference to lead in both categories.
- Since 2000, the Big 12 has made 90 NCAA Tournament appearances, which is second nationally.
- The Big 12 is one of two leagues to have at least six NCAA appearances each year since 2007.
- The Big 12 has earned eight No. 1 seeds and five consecutive, including the overall top seed in 2012 and 2013.
- The Big Conference advanced at least three teams to the Sweet 16 for the fifth consecutive season in 2013.
- The Big 12 swept both national postseason titles (NCAA and WNIT) in 2012.
- The Big 12 led all leagues in non-conference win percentage the last three seasons (2011-13).
- Every Big 12 team has completed the non-conference portion of its schedule with a winning record for six consecutive seasons.
- The Big 12 has had a unanimous first team All-America selection 14 years, including 13 consecutive.
- In 2010, the Big 12 had two teams (Baylor and Oklahoma) compete in the Women's Final Four in the same season for the first time in Conference history.
- In 2008, a Big 12 record eight teams competed in the NCAA Championship.
- In 2008, the Big 12 was the first league in the history of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championship to post an 8-0 record in first round games.
- The Big 12 Conference has made 140 postseason appearances (105 NCAA, 35 WNIT) in its 17 years of existence.
- In 17 years, 264 Big 12 men's and women's teams have advanced to postseason play, 204 in NCAA Tournaments and 60 in the NIT/WNIT/CBI.
- Big 12 Conference schools have been chosen to host NCAA first and second rounds 17 times in the last nine years of predetermined sites.
- The Big 12 was picked to host NCAA Regionals four consecutive years from 2008-11, and hosted the 2013 Oklahoma City Regional.
- Every Big 12 Conference team has participated in the NCAA tournament.
- The Big 12 has had a team ranked in every Associated Press (318) and USA Today/ESPN (323) Top 25 poll the past 17 seasons.
- The Big 12 has been rated No. 1 in the coaches' poll 43 weeks in Conference history and 41 in the AP edition.
- In the Associated Press Poll, Big 12 schools have been ranked 1,389 times, including 463 appearances in the Top 10 in the past 17 years.
- The league has had a conference-high seven teams ranked in 21 AP and 26 USA Today/ESPN polls in Big 12 history. The Conference has had at least six teams ranked on 75 occasions.
- The Big 12 crossed the million-fan threshold five consecutive years (2007-11) and six times overall (also 2002) when its membership included 12 teams. The Big 12 remains the only league to draw one-million spectators.
- The Big 12 has captured the past 14 NCAA average attendance crowns and has averaged over 5,000 fans eight times in its 17 years. The league holds NCAA records for cumulative attendance (1,091,289/2010) and average attendance (5,381/2004).
- Baylor is the only Division I men's or women's program to reach 40 wins with its 40-0 record in 2011-12.
- Former Texas head coach Jody Conradt was the second woman in history to be inducted into the Naismith National Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame. Former Kansas player Lynette Woodard was inducted in 2004. Conradt was a member of the first class (1999) inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame.
- Other Big 12 representatives in the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame include Baylor head coach Kim Mulkey (2000), Kansas State associate head coach and former Texas All-American Kamie Ethridge (2002), former Texas Tech head coach Marsha Sharp (2003), former Kansas head coach Marian Washington (2004) and former Baylor head coach Sonja Hogg (2010). They are joined by Woodard (2005) and former UT players Clarissa Davis-Wrightsil (2006), Andrea Lloyd Curry (2007) and Annette Smith-Knight (2013).
- Kim Mulkey (2003) is also a member of the CoSIDA Academic Hall of Fame.
- Student-athletes from Big 12 Conference schools have been named to the coaches All-America first team 39 times.
- Student-athletes from the Big 12 have won five Naismith trophies, seven Wade trophies, four WBCA Player of the Year awards, two Wooden Awards, one Honda Award for women's basketball and one Honda Cup that includes all women's sports.
- Players from current Big 12 schools earned one spot each on the NCAA 25th Anniversary Team (Sheryl Swoopes) and on the NCAA Team of the Decade for the 1980s (Clarissa Davis-Wrightsil). Add to this nine student-athletes on Olympic Teams and 20 spots on Academic All-America first teams.
- In the summer of 2013, Oklahoma head coach Sherri Coale and guard Aayn Ellenberg, along with Baylor guard Odyssey Sims earned a gold medal with the USA Women's World University Games team.
- The Big 12 was represented by Baylor senior Odyssey Sims, former BU standouts Brittney Griner and Sophia Young along with former Oklahoma great Danielle Robinson at the 2013 USA Women's National Team mini-camp. The event was used to identify players for the USA National Team pool from which the 2013 USA World Championship Team will be selected.
