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Phillips 66 Weekly Awards

A Big 12 Player, Pitcher and Newcomer of the Week will be chosen each Monday, beginning February 18. Nominations are submitted by the school media relations offices and the winners are selected by a panel of radio members who cover the league's nine baseball teams on a regular basis.

Big 12 Weekly Shows

The Big 12 Report is a weekly show that is available exclusively at Big12Sports.com. Featuring analysis/commentary by Correspondent Wendell Barnhouse, the show debuts each Thursday and focuses on the news and stories going on in and around the Big 12 that week.

The Big 12 also boasts two over-the-air weekly magazine-style shows. Each program is a 30-minute promotion of the league, with features on student-athletes, coaches, teams and conference championships. **Big 12 Showcase presented by Academy Sports & Outdoors** returns for its 17th season on FSN and has been produced by Keith Fletcher each of those years. Emily Jones handles hosting duties. **Big 12 This Week** is televised by ESPNU, with Chad McKee as the primary host. Segments of both programs are available via the Big 12 website.

Championship Credentials

Media credentials for the 2013 Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship are authorized and issued by the Conference office. An online credential system, provided through an agreement with Sports Systems Services, Inc., is the only method to submit requests. The credential system will be made available during the month of April.

Postseason Awards

The Big 12 presents the only official all-conference awards at the end of the regular season. Major award winners are chosen, along with the All-Big 12 teams. Each Big 12 head coach votes on the squads and is not permitted to vote for his own players. The awards will be announced in May prior to the Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship.

Academic All-Big 12 teams are also chosen in baseball and will be announced prior to the postseason.

Big12Sports.com

The Big 12 Conference maintains its website at Big12Sports.com with complete information on the league and its member schools.

The site boasts original content from throughout the Conference along with several video broadcasts, including a weekly show (The Big 12 Report) and a daily update (Big 12 Minute). In baseball, game highlights of selected contests will be available via the Big 12 Digital Network. **Many parts of Big12Sports.com - including video - are also available via an application on the various mobile platforms (iPhones, iPads, Android).** Comprehensive live coverage of the 2013 Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship in May is also available.

In baseball, scores throughout the league, standings and box scores are updated as games are final. Big 12 conference and team statistics are updated no later than the following morning, with weekly award winners posted each Monday. An archive of conference and team-by-team statistics for every season in league history is included as well.

Media can access Acrobat PDF files of the daily release, statistics, team-by-team statistics and the conference media guide on the website.

Big 12 Release

The Big 12 will update a media release, including team notes, results and more throughout the season. Complete league statistics, in addition to team-by-team stats for all nine baseball squads will be updated via the Conference website as well.

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RICH FETCHIET

Coordinator of Baseball Umpires

Rich Fetchiet was named Big 12 Conference Coordinator of Baseball Umpires in August 2005. He has over 35 years of collegiate, national and international umpiring and umpire-related administrative experience.

Fetchiet is currently the Coordinator of Baseball Umpires for the Big 12, Big East, Big Ten, Mid-American and Missouri Valley Conferences, as well as Conference USA and the Horizon and Summit Leagues. He is a member of the NCAA National Umpire Program Advisory Committee in addition to the NCAA Baseball Rules Editorial Committee. Rich has served as the Baseball Secretary-Rules Editor for the NCAA and Chair of the ABCA Rules Committee. He is active in numerous officiating organizations and is a teacher and instructor at umpire camps and clinics across the country.

Fetchiet retired from active umpiring after the 2000 season. Prior to that he umpired numerous Division I conference tournaments and made three College World Series appearances, including serving as the plate umpire for the 1999 national championship game. Included among Rich's international tournaments are the Pan Am Games, World Cup Qualifier, Intercontinental Cup, World Championships, the Baltimore Orioles vs. Cuban National Team Friendship Game, and the Olympic Games. In 1997 the International Baseball Association named him Umpire of the Year. In 2012, Fetchiet became only the second umpire ever inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame.

Fetchiet is a higher education administrator at the University of Michigan School of Dentistry. Rich and his wife, Kay, and two children currently reside in Ann Arbor, Mich.

The Big 12 is in the midst of its 17th year as it continues to promote the strength and success of one of the nation's premier athletic conferences.

Bob Bowlsby was named the Conference's fourth commissioner on May 4, 2012 after spending the previous six years as director of athletics at Stanford University. TCU and West Virginia joined the league on July 1, 2012 and became the Big 12's first additions since inception, joining Baylor, Iowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas and Texas Tech.

With 10 members, the Big 12 remains as the only major conference in the nation to determine its champions in all sports directly on the field of play with a full round-robin schedule.

The Conference's hard work ethic and strong values have translated to enormous success in its first 16-plus years. Since it began competition in 1996-97, the league can boast of 49 NCAA team titles and 519 individual national championships.

The trophy case has already added more hardware this year as the Texas won the NCAA Championship in women's volleyball and the Oklahoma State men's cross country team captured its third national championship in the last four seasons. In addition, Texas Tech's Kennedy Kithuka and Iowa State's Betsy Saina claimed the 2012 NCAA individual titles.

In 2011-12, Baylor claimed its second national championship in women's basketball, as well as the Hunter Seat title in equestrian. In addition, Texas men's golf claimed the national crown.

Several other teams also made strong national showings a year ago. The 2011 season marked the sixth straight in which Big 12 volleyball represented with at least three teams in the NCAA Regional Semifinal field. The Big 12 finished first in NCAA Volleyball Conference RPI for the first time in its history. In addition to winning its second consecutive national title, Big 12 women's basketball claimed the top position in conference RPI for the fifth consecutive season. Kansas men's basketball advanced to the national title game and made its fourth Final Four appearance since 2002. Oklahoma finished second at the College World Series in softball. Overall in 2011-12, five of the eight sports that hold NCAA Championships where the Big 12 sponsored full round-robin competition had a school competing among the final eight teams or beyond.

The individual honors also continued with national coaches of the year in football (Kansas State's Bill Snyder and Oklahoma State's Mike Gundy), women's basketball (Baylor's Kim Mulkey) and men's basketball (Kansas' Bill Self). In addition, Texas' Matt Scoggin was named the CSCAA Diving Coach of the Year.

Baylor quarterback Robert Griffin III won the league's fifth Heisman Trophy in 2011 and the conference has had a finalist in 12 of its 17 seasons (including 2012) – most of any league. Oklahoma pitcher Keilani Ricketts was selected the 2012 USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year. Baylor center Brittney Griner garnered consensus national player of the year honors in women's basketball in addition to receiving the prestigious Honda Cup as the collegiate woman athlete of the year. The Conference has had 14 athletes earn major individual awards in football in the past four campaigns. Overall, more than 1,400 student-athletes have earned All-America recognition in the past five years alone.

Through its first 16-plus years, the Big 12 has claimed a team national championship in 16 of the sports it sponsors. The Conference ranks second with seven appearances in the BCS National Championship Game and is second with 96 football consensus All-America selections in that time. League squads have combined to lead the nation in women's basketball attendance each of the last 13 years and the Big 12 is the only conference to surpass the one-million mark in season attendance – doing so six times. In men's basketball, the league has had two teams in the regional finals in four of the past five seasons. No other conference has had multiple Elite Eight teams in a season as much during that span.

During the last nine years a total of 28 NCAA trophies have been hoisted

by Big 12 institutions, with at least one national crown won in all but one year for the Conference, including 16 consecutive seasons.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community, the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

National academic accolades have always been strong in the Big 12. Danielle Robinson (Oklahoma) and Sam Acho (Texas) were selected to receive Today's Top VIII Awards – one of the NCAA's top honors. It recognizes student-athletes who completed their athletic eligibility during 2010-11 for success on the fields and courts, in the classroom and in the community. In 2011-12, two student-athletes were recipients of the NCAA Elite 89 Award. That honor showcases individuals who have reached the pinnacle of competition at the national championship level, while also achieving the highest academic standard among their peers.

In its short history, the Big 12 has also had over 530 Academic All-America recipients, averaging more than 30 each season. Big 12 student-athletes have shown commitment to their studies by earning numerous individual academic recognitions. Nine times in the past eight years a league athlete has garnered the top academic honor for their respective sport. The Big 12 had plenty of success overall in the classroom the last four years, as the Conference boasted 80 student-athletes earning Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-America recognition through the fall of 2012.

The Big 12 can take pride in other stories that combine on and off the field success. Patience Knight (Texas Tech) was the recipient of the Honda Inspiration Award in 2008, given to an outstanding female college athlete who overcomes adversity to excel in her sport. She was diagnosed with a cancerous tumor in 2007, but rebounded to win All-America honors at the 2008 NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships. Oklahoma State women's basketball was the inaugural recipient of the "Together We R" Team Award in 2012, recognizing programs that have strived to succeed in the face of adversity.

Competitive excellence, scholarship and sportsmanship are all equal components of the Big 12 philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and Academic All-Big 12 squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons. At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsman of the Year awards.

Institutions can also nominate student-athletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships. A total of 293 scholars have received over \$2 million in postgraduate financial aid through the first 16 years of the program.

The Big 12 sponsors 23 sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, equestrian, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming & diving, tennis and volleyball.

Big 12 institutions create a league that encompasses five states and nearly 37 million people. More than 4,200 student-athletes from across the United States and around the World compete annually in the sports sponsored by the Conference.

The Conference conducts postseason championships for 20 of its 23 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition. The winner of the Big 12 football regular season championship earns the league's berth into the Bowl Championship Series.

In its first 16 years, the Conference has distributed more than \$1.6 billion to its member institutions. The conference office is headquartered in Irving, Texas.

Big 12 titles for sports without round-robin conference play are determined by the postseason championship (Cross country, equestrian, golf, gymnastics, rowing, swimming & diving, indoor/outdoor track & field). Wrestling was determined in this manner prior to 2011-12.

** - Oklahoma won the 1996 Big 12 softball postseason title prior to the first academic year of Big 12 competition (1996-97).

PRESEASON RANKINGS

Four Big 12 teams are ranked in at least one of the four national preseason polls. League newcomer TCU is ranked as high as No. 12 (*USA Today Coaches' Poll*) while Oklahoma's highest spot is No. 14 (*Collegiate Baseball*). Baylor is also ranked with a No. 23 spot on the *USA Today* list while Texas is ranked No. 21 by *Collegiate Baseball*.

The *USA Today Coaches' Poll* has five league teams ranked or receiving votes - TCU (No. 12), Oklahoma (No. 16), Baylor (No. 23), and Oklahoma State and Texas receiving votes.

Individually, six Big 12 student-athletes have been named to the Louisville Slugger Preseason All-America Teams, while five made the Baseball America Preseason teams.

Morrison was also named a NCBWA third team preseason All-American.

NEW TEAMS, NEW COACHES

The Conference welcomes two new additions with TCU and West Virginia joining the league. The Horned Frogs are one of 10 schools to make nine straight NCAA championship appearances. TCU has played in the event every season since 2004, including three Super Regional appearances in the last four years and a 2010 College World Series berth. Under head coach Jim Schlossnagle, the Horned Frogs are 388-175 with 13 conference championships. Schlossnagle is also tabbed to be the USA Baseball Collegiate National Team manager this summer.

West Virginia baseball has made 11 NCAA postseason appearances. The Mountaineers are under new direction this season with former TCU assistant coach Randy Mazey on board. Mazey has six years of head coaching experience between time at East Carolina (2004-06) and Charleston Southern (1994-96). WVU returns 19 of its 20 lettermen from 2012 to this year's squad. The Mountaineers are also upgrading their baseball facilities and will play three of their four Big 12 home series at Appalachian Power Park in Charleston, W.Va. (home to the Class A West Virginia Power).

The league also welcomes new head coaches at Oklahoma State (Josh Holliday) and Texas Tech (Tim Tadlock).

ON THE COVER

The 2013 media guide cover includes photos of some of the top returners from each team for the upcoming season.

BAYLOR - Nathan Orf, Sr., C/DH

The 2012 Big 12 Newcomer of the Year, Orf also earned All-Big 12 First Team honors as a DH last season after batting .303 and leading the league in runs scored with 61. He also established the Big 12 hit-by-pitch record last season with 35.

KANSAS - Kevin Kuntz, Sr., INF

A Kansas native, Kuntz started all 58 games at shortstop in 2012 for the Jayhawks, compiling a .251 batting average. He led KU with 10 stolen bases and 15 multi-hit games.

K-STATE - Jared King, Jr., OF

King led the Big 12 in batting a year ago with a .378 average in Conference contests. An All-Big 12 Second Team honoree, he was also in the league's top 10 in hits, runs scored, home runs, RBI, total bases, on base percentage and slugging percentage.

OKLAHOMA - Dillon Overton, Jr., LHP

Overton ranked second in the Big 12 and eighth in the nation with 126 strikeouts last season while compiling a 6-3 record and 3.15 ERA over 45 appearances. Overton set the Big 12 Championship strikeout record with 15 Ks at the event in Oklahoma City.

OKLAHOMA STATE - Robbie Rea, Sr., INF/RHP

A 2012 All-Big 12 Second Team selection, Rea led the Cowboys with a .324 batting average and 23 multi-hit games. Rea also ranked in the Big 12 top 10 in hits and doubles. He collected nine RBI and three home runs in a game on March 10.

TCU - Jantzen Witte, Sr., INF

Although Witte missed the first 18 TCU games of the 2012 season, the infielder started 43 of the Frogs' last 44 contests finishing with a .315 batting average and 22 RBI. Witte is a 2011 first team all-conference member and a 2012 second team selection.

TEXAS- Corey Knebel, Jr., RHP

Knebel is a two-time All-Big 12 First Team selection and the 2010 Louisville Slugger/Collegiate Baseball and NCBWA Freshman Pitcher of the Year. In his first two seasons at UT, Knebel has accumulated a 1.67 ERA, which is currently third on the Big 12 career list, and 28 saves, tied for seventh all-time.

TEXAS TECH - Trey Masek, Jr., RHP

Masek has made 34 appearances (17 starts) with a 7-8 record, two saves and a 4.12 ERA in his first two seasons at TTU. The junior, a Cape Cod League All-Star over the summer, fanned 46 batters in 53 innings last year.

WEST VIRGINIA - Bobby Boyd, So., OF

As a freshman in 2012, Boyd led the Mountaineers with a .321 average, 40 runs and 23 stolen bases. He also recorded seven doubles and 20 RBI along with 17 multi-hit games.

Holliday becomes the first former OSU player to serve as the program's head coach. A four-year letterwinner for the Cowboys from 1996-99, Holliday was a starter on Cowboy teams that made four NCAA Tournament appearances and reached the College World Series in 1996 and 1999. He spent the past three seasons as an assistant at Vanderbilt. Tadlock returned to his alma mater and spent the 2012 season as an assistant on the TTU staff. He was named interim head coach on May 21. Prior to his move to Lubbock, Tadlock spent time as the hitting coach at Oklahoma (2006-11) with the Sooners making five trips to the NCAA Championship, two Super Regionals and a College World Series appearance during his tenure.

The five league coaches who are not new to the Conference have all been in the Big 12 for at least eight years, including Steve Smith (Baylor) and Augie Garrido (Texas) who have coached in the Big 12 since its first season in 1997 (17 years).

2012 SEASON REVIEW

Baylor's 18-0 start in league play shattered the previous record for the best start in Conference history (Texas, 7-0, 1999). BU claimed its third regular season crown (2005, '00) and led the Big 12 in wins for the first time in league history while also ranking first in batting average, slugging percentage, hits, runs, doubles, home runs and RBI. The Bears also broke the Big 12 record for longest winning streak in conference play, passing Texas' 17-game string in 2010. BU's 24-game overall win streak was also a Big 12 record, eclipsing Texas' mark of 21 games in 2010, and a BU program record. The Bears' 20-4 Big 12 mark ranks as the second-best winning percentage in conference history (.833).

Four teams (Baylor, Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas A&M) earned berths to the 2012 NCAA Division I Baseball Championship. BU claimed the No. 4 national seed. The Big 12 has sent at least four teams to the postseason event every year. Overall, the league has had 87 appearances.

The Big 12 posted a 10-6 record in NCAA Regional play with Baylor and Oklahoma going 4-1 to claim regional series wins. Baylor clinched the Waco Regional to earn a Super Regional spot for the first time since 2005 and fourth time overall, becoming the 12th league team to host. Oklahoma took the Charlottesville Regional and made its third Super Regional appearance after advancing in 2006 and 2010. It marked the third straight season the Big 12 has sent multiple teams to Super Regional play. The Bears fell to Arkansas in three games in Waco, while the Sooners lost to South Carolina.

The Big 12 has had at least three teams with 40 or more wins in each season since 1997. For the 11th straight year, a trio of league teams ranked in the RPI top 25. Baylor finished fifth – its third top five ranking as a member of the league. Overall, the Conference has had eight teams finish in the top five.

Three league squads finished the season ranked in all four national polls. Baylor checked in at No. 9 and No. 10, while Oklahoma received a No. 14 spot in three of the four. Texas A&M's rankings ranged from No. 14, 18 and 19, with its highest coming from *Baseball America*. The Big 12 has had three or more teams in the final rankings every year since 1997. The No. 9 spot for the Bears tied their highest finish (1999), while Oklahoma has finished ranked in the top 25 for the past five years.

Nine players combined for 24 All-America distinctions, including Andrew Heaney and Josh Ludy who made all four outlets' teams. Heaney collected first-team honors from each, marking the fifth year in a row a Big 12

pitcher has done so. Ludy was a first-team member on Baseball America's list and earned second team honors from ABCA and the NCBWA as well as third-team recognition on the Louisville Slugger team. The Big 12 has totaled 477 All-America honorees.

SUCCESS ON THE MOUND

In 2012, the Big 12 was one of three conferences with five or more teams ranked in the top 50 nationally in team ERA. Texas A&M (ninth), Oklahoma State (18th), Baylor (19th), Oklahoma (39th) and Texas (49th) recorded ERAs under 3.50. The SEC and West Coast Conference were the other two leagues with five-plus teams in the top 50.

GARRIDO & SMITH ENTER 17TH SEASONS IN THE BIG 12

Steve Smith (Baylor) and Augie Garrido (Texas) are the league's two winningest coaches in Big 12 contests. Garrido has tallied 280 total conference wins, while Smith has 247. Both coaches have been in the league since its first season in 1997 (17 years). Garrido's 1,847 wins entering 2013 are the most among all coaches in Division I.

BIG 12 CAREER WATCH LIST

Texas closer Corey Knebel is the only active player entering 2013 on any of the Big 12 career statistical lists. Knebel's 1.67 career ERA entering the season currently ranks third. The junior's 28 saves is tied for seventh, which is 13 away from the No. 1 spot held by former UT closer Huston Street.

CHAMPIONSHIP INFORMATION/HISTORY

The Phillips 66 Big 12 Baseball Championship returns to Oklahoma City's Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark on May 22-26.

Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark, which opened on April 2, 1998 and seats 9,000 fans, serves as the home facility for the Triple A Oklahoma City RedHawks, an affiliate of the Houston Astros. It has hosted 15 baseball championships in the league's 17-year tenure, including this season's event. Overall, three venues have sponsored the championship: All-Sports Stadium, Oklahoma City (1997); Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark (1998-2001, '03, '05-12) and The Ballpark in Arlington (2002, '04).

Past postseason championship winners include Kansas (2006), Missouri (2012), Nebraska (1999-2001, '05), Oklahoma (1997), Oklahoma State (2004), Texas (2002, '03, '08-09), Texas A&M (2007, '10-11) and Texas Tech (1998).

Live action of the 2013 championship will be webstreamed on Big12Sports.com for the eighth straight year.

CHAMPIONSHIP FORMAT

The eight teams with the best conference records (based on winning percentage) in regular season competition will qualify for the Phillips 66 Big 12 Championship -- a two-division, double-elimination format.

In the event of a tie or ties in the standings, the following tiebreaking system will be implemented.

- If two teams are tied, head-to-head competition will be used to break a tie.
- If two teams remain tied, the winner of the first game of the Conference series between the two tied teams will be used.
- If two teams remain tied, there will be a comparison of the records of the tied teams against the highest place team(s) in descending order from top to bottom until the tie is broken; or,
- If two teams remain tied, there will be a drawing to determine the seed or qualification for the championship;
- If three or more teams are tied, there will be a comparison of head-to-head records in a 'mini round-robin' of tied teams, followed by steps (a), (b), (c), and (d). Once a team has been eliminated from a multi-team comparison, it is dropped from further comparisons.

The Phillips 66 Big 12 Championship winner earns the Big 12's automatic berth into the NCAA Championship field. If the championship is terminated before completion, then the league's regular season champion (No. 1-seeded team for the championship), will serve as the Conference's automatic qualifier to the NCAA Tournament.

THE VENUE

After 61 years in Johnny Rosenblatt Stadium, another era in college baseball opened in 2011 at the new home of the College World Series, TD Ameritrade Park in downtown Omaha. The 24,000-seat stadium, which also is home to Creighton's baseball program, will play host to the CWS through the next quarter century.

THE ROAD TO OMAHA

The 64-team bracket provides for 16 four-team double elimination Regionals; and eight two-team, best-of-three Super Regionals, with the eight winners advancing to Omaha for the NCAA Men's College World Series.

The champions of all 29 NCAA Division I conferences automatically qualify for the championship. The remaining 35 teams will be selected at-large. The Division I Baseball Committee will also consider regular season conference standings and/or conference postseason competition.

THE BIG 12 IN THE NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

The Big 12 has sent a total of 15 teams to the Men's College World Series. The league has sent at least four teams to the NCAA Championship each year.

Six different league squads have qualified for the CWS in the Big 12's 16 seasons, including the Longhorns' 2002 and '05 national title runs. Baylor (2005), Nebraska (2001-'02, '05), Oklahoma ('10), Oklahoma State (1999), Texas (2000, '02-'05, '09, '11) and Texas A&M ('99, '11) have represented the Conference at the event. The Big 12 had an all-time high three teams in the '05 CWS field.

The Big 12 has made 87 total appearances in the NCAA postseason with an overall record of 235-191 (.552). Last season, the Big 12 sent four teams to postseason play.

League teams have combined to make 27 Super Regional trips, producing a mark of 37-34 and hosting the Super Regional round on 12 occasions. The Big 12's nine baseball teams for 2013 have made 183 total appearances in the NCAA postseason with 68 CWS visits.
