Big 12 Conference - One True Champion

The Big 12 enters its 19th year as it continues to promote the strength and success of one of the nation's premier athletic conferences under the direction of third-year commissioner Bob Bowlsby.

TCU and West Virginia joined the league on July 1, 2012 and became the Big 12's first additions since inception, joining Baylor, Iowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas and Texas Tech.

With 10 members, the Big 12 remains as the only major conference in the nation to determine its champions in all sports directly on the field of play with a full round-robin schedule.

The Conference's hard work ethic and strong values have translated to enormous success in its first 18 years. In the fall of 2013, former Texas Tech track and field student-athlete Ifeatu Okafor was named the Big 12's first NCAA Woman of the Year. Texas became the 12th league volleyball squad to advance to the national semifinals while three teams placed in the top 15 at the NCAA Division I Men's and Women's Cross Country Championships. Big 12 football placed two teams for the sixth time in what was the final season of the BCS with Oklahoma defeating two-time defending national champion Alabama in the Sugar Bowl.

The 2014 winter and spring seasons were just as successful as Oklahoma claimed the Big 12's first NCAA Women's Gymnastics Championship and 14 student-athletes claimed individual national titles. Texas women's indoor and outdoor track & field, UT men's swimming & diving, Oklahoma men's tennis and Oklahoma State men's golf finished as NCAA runners-up. Baylor softball was one of the last four teams standing at the Women's College World Series and the Big 12 placed a nation's-best four baseball squads in the NCAA Super Regionals and three in the College World Series.

Since it began competition in 1996-97, the league can boast of 53 NCAA team titles and 552 individual national championships.

The Big 12 lays claim to five Heisman Trophy winners since 1996 and has had a finalist in 12 of its 18 seasons – tied for the most of any league. Twenty athletes have earned major individual awards in football in the past six campaigns. Overall, more than 1,900 student-athletes have earned All-America recognition in the past seven years alone.

Through its first 18 years, the Big 12 has claimed a team national championship in 17 of the sports it sponsors. The Conference finished the BCS era ranked tied for second with seven appearances in the National Championship Game. League squads combined to lead the nation in women's basketball attendance 15 consecutive years and the Big 12 is the only conference to surpass the one-million mark in season attendance – doing so six times. In men's basketball, the league has had seven teams earn NCAA bids twice in the past five years and every coach has guided a team to the NCAA Tournament, including a nation's-best six coaches that have led teams to the Final Four. During the last 10 years a total of 32 NCAA trophies have been hoisted by Big 12 institutions, with at least one national crown won in all but one year for the Conference, including 17 consecutive seasons.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the classroom, or within the community, the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

National academic accolades have always been strong in the Big 12. Danielle Robinson (Oklahoma) and Sam Acho (Texas) were selected to receive Today's Top VIII Awards – one of the NCAA's top honors.

It recognizes student-athletes who completed their athletic eligibility during 2010-11 for success on the fields and courts, in the classroom and in the community. In the last three seasons, four student-athletes were recipients of the NCAA Elite 89 Award with pitcher John Curtiss (Texas) picking up the latest honor in the spring of 2014. The honor showcases individuals who have reached the pinnacle of competition at the national championship level, while also achieving the highest academic standard among their peers.

In its short history, the Big 12 has had 571 Academic All-America recipients, averaging more than 30 each season. Big 12 student-athletes have shown commitment to their studies by earning numerous individual academic recognitions. Eleven times in the past nine years a league athlete has garnered the top academic honor for their respective sport, including Frances Silva (West Virginia) for soccer and Gabe Ikard (Oklahoma) for football in 2013.

The Big 12 can take pride in other stories that combine on and off the field success. Patience Knight (Texas Tech) was the recipient of the Honda Inspiration Award in 2008, given to an outstanding female college athlete who overcomes adversity to excel in her sport. She was diagnosed with a cancerous tumor in 2007, but rebounded to win All-America honors at the NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships. Oklahoma State women's basketball was the inaugural recipient of the "Together We R" Team Award in 2012, recognizing programs that have strived to succeed in the face of adversity. Following a devastating tornado south of Oklahoma City just before the Big 12 Baseball Championship in 2013, several league baseball teams along with other student-athletes, coaches and former Conference players contributed help in a variety of ways. Plus, the Conference contributed \$200,000 to the relief efforts.

Competitive excellence, scholarship and sportsmanship are all equal components of the Big 12 philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and Academic All-Big 12 squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons. At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsman of the Year awards.

Institutions can also nominate student-athletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gautt Postgraduate Scholarships. A total of 341 scholars have received nearly \$2.3 million in postgraduate financial aid through the first 18 years of the program.

The Big 12 sponsors 23 sports. Men's squads include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, equestrian, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming & diving, tennis and volleyball.

Big 12 institutions create a league that encompasses five states and nearly 38 million people. More than 5,000 student-athletes from across the United States and around the World compete annually in the sports sponsored by the Conference.

The Conference conducts postseason championships for 20 of its 23 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition.

In its first 18 years, the Big 12 has distributed more than \$2.04 billion to its member institutions, including a record \$220.1 million in 2013-14. The Conference office is headquartered in Irving, Texas.

Commissioner Bob Bowsby

Bob Bowsby, one of the most respected athletic administrators in the nation, was named the fourth full-time Commissioner of the Big 12 Conference on May 4, 2012. The hire was praised throughout college athletics circles as yet another step in the continuing strength and stability of the Big 12.

In his short time with the Conference, Bowsby secured one of the most lucrative television deals in college athletics and played a key role in the formation of the College Football Playoff that will begin in 2014-15, the first postseason playoff in the history of the sport. He also finalized a partnership with the Southeastern Conference in which both leagues' champions will meet each year in the Allstate Sugar Bowl in addition to confirming the league's other bowl partnerships, giving the Big 12 some of the premiere postseason destinations in college football.

Improved scheduling has been another priority under Bowsby which resulted in a men's basketball Big 12/SEC Challenge that was staged for the first time in 2013-14.

In his first two years, Bowsby has seen six national championships added to the Big 12 trophy case and 38 NCAA individual crowns. Eight additional conference squads finished as runner-up in NCAA competition and three football teams competed in BCS games.

Bowsby has been at the forefront of change in collegiate athletics as NCAA schools revise and establish new governance rules that will oversee and guide all of college sports. He also led the Big 12 Conference to record revenue amounts in 2013-14, with a record \$220.1 million - \$8.1 million more than projected.

Prior to his role at the Big 12, Bowsby spent six years directing a Stanford University athletics department that sponsors 35 varsity sports and claimed an unprecedented 17 consecutive Learfield Sports Directors Cups, emblematic of the top overall athletics program in the country. The department maintained an annual budget of \$75 million.

Bowsby arrived at Stanford after a 15-year stint as the chief administrator for the University of Iowa Department of Athletics. In his final four years, he guided and supervised the merger of the Hawkeye men's and women's athletic departments that included 24 varsity sports.



Throughout his career, Bowsby has emerged as a national leader in intercollegiate and amateur athletics. He was appointed to the United States Olympic Committee Board of Directors in 2007 and completed that term at the 2014 Winter Olympiad in Sochi, Russia. In 2002, President George W. Bush chose Bowsby to be a member of the Commission on Opportunities in Athletics.

Bowsby has previously served as president of the NCAA Division I-A Athletics Directors' Association, chair of the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee (2003-04, '04-05) and chaired the NCAA Management Council. In addition, he has also chaired the NCAA Wrestling Committee, served on NCAA committees on Financial Aid and Amateurism, the Special Committee to Review Amateurism Issues and the Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Athletics.

The National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) named Bowsby in 2001-02 as Central Region Athletic Director of the Year and Sports Business Journal selected him from the four regional award winners as the National Athletics Director of the Year. The award highlights the efforts of the athletic directors for their commitment and positive contributions to campuses and their surrounding communities.

Before his stint overseeing the Hawkeye athletic department he served in the same role for seven years at the University of Northern Iowa. A native of Waterloo, Iowa, Bowsby was named to that post in 1984. He was previously in the role of Assistant Athletic Director for Facilities at the school.

Bowsby earned his bachelor's degree from Minnesota State University (Moorhead) in 1975 and his master's degree from the University of Iowa in 1978. In February 2013, he was named to the NCAA 40th Anniversary Tribute Team, which recognized the 40th anniversary of NCAA Division II competition. He was a four-year letterwinner in wrestling at MSUM and served as captain during his senior year when he won a NSIC title, and in 2013 he received the Alumni Achievement Award. Bowsby was inducted into the Dragon Sports Hall of Fame in 1998 and the University of Northern Iowa Hall of Fame in 2007. He also serves on the National Advisory Board of the Positive Coaching Alliance and the Board of the National Football Foundation.

Born on January 10, 1952, Bowsby has been married to his wife, Candice, for 36 years and they have four children and three grandchildren.

Phillips 66 Big 12 Women's Basketball Championship

The 2015 Phillips 66 Big 12 Women's Basketball Championship will be played in Dallas' American Airlines Center for the second time in three years. The Conference championship was also contested in Dallas in 2006, 2004 and 2003, however those were held in Reunion Arena. The 2013 event at American Airlines Center averaged 7,037 fans per session, the second-highest attendance in league history.

The American Airlines Center is a multi-purpose arena, located in the Victory Park neighborhood, near downtown Dallas. The venue serves as the home to the Dallas Mavericks of the National Basketball Association, and the Dallas Stars of the National Hockey League. The arena is also used for concerts and other live entertainment. It opened in 2001 at a cost of \$420 million.

Seven different teams have won the previous 18 women's championships, led by Baylor with six titles, including the last four.

Big 12 Scheduling and Championship Tiebreaker

Scheduling Format

The Conference schedule is a double round robin consisting of 18 games.

Tiebreaking Format

The first criteria in the breaking of ties in the standings shall be head-to-head competition of tied teams. The following procedure will be used to establish the postseason championship seeds when ties exist.

Ties Involving Two Teams

- Results of head-to-head competition during the regular season.
- Each team's record vs. the team occupying the highest position in the final regular-season standings, and then continuing down through the standings until one team gains an advantage.

When arriving at another group of tied teams while comparing records, use each team's record against the collective tied teams as a group (prior to that group's own tie-breaking procedure), rather than the performance against individual tied teams.

- A comparison of the tied teams Conference-games only road record.
- A comparison of the tied teams Conference-games only road record vs. the team(s) occupying the highest position in the final Conference regular season standings, and then continuing down through the standings until one team gains an advantage.

When arriving at another group of tied teams while comparing records, use each team's record against the collective tied teams as a group (prior to that group's own tie-breaking procedure), rather than the performance against individual tied teams.

- Draw. In the event tiebreaking procedures are unsuccessful and a draw is necessary in determining any portion of seeding, the following procedure will be used:

- The draw will be conducted in public or with media attendance.

- Institutions involved in the drawing have the right to have a local representative in attendance at the drawing.

- A single slip of paper for each institution (with name or logo) will be placed into a container and will be drawn in order of seeding from highest to lowest.

Ties Involving More than Two Teams

- Results of collective head-to-head competition during the regular season among the tied teams (mini round-robin).
- If more than two teams are still tied, each of the tied team's record vs. the team occupying the highest position in the final regular season standings, and then continuing down through the standings, eliminating tied teams with inferior records until one team gains an advantage.

When arriving at another group of tied teams while comparing records, use each team's record against the collective tied teams as a group (prior to that group's own tie-breaking procedure), rather than the performance against individual tied teams.

- If more than two teams are still tied, a comparison of the tied teams Conference-games only road record.
- If more than two teams are still tied, a comparison of the tied teams Conference-games only road record vs. the team(s) occupying the highest position in the final Conference regular season standings, and then continuing down through the standing until one team gains an advantage.

When arriving at another group of tied teams while comparing records, use each team's record against the collective tied teams as a group (prior to that group's own tie-breaking procedure), rather than the performance against individual tied teams.

- If at any point the multiple-team tie is reduced to two teams, the two-team tie-breaking procedures above will be applied.

- Once a team is eliminated from a multi-team comparison, it is dropped from further comparisons.

Big 12 Notebook

- The Big 12 has won three national championships and two WNIT titles since 2005.
- The Big 12 has eight Women's Final Four appearances since 2002 and has placed at least one team in the national semifinals four of the last six seasons.
- 2014 marked the fifth-straight year for the Big 12 to lead the nation in percentage of teams in the NCAA field. The Conference has led or tied for the nation's top spot in seven of eight years dating back to 2007.
- The Big 12 has placed at least six teams in the NCAA Championship eight-consecutive years and 14 times overall since inception in 1996-97.
- The Big 12 advanced at least two teams to the NCAA Championship regional semifinals for the sixth-straight year in 2014 to total 15 appearances since 2009.
- Since 2000, the Big 12 has made 96 NCAA Tournament appearances, which is second nationally, just one off the top spot.
- The Big 12 is the only league that has had at least six NCAA tournament appearances every year since 2007.
- Eight current Big 12 members have won a Big 12 regular season title and five have captured a Conference postseason championship.
- The Big 12 is the only among the peer conferences to conduct a double round-robin schedule in which every team plays the other league members twice for a total of 18 games.
- Every Big 12 team finished the non-conference portion of its schedule in 2013-14 with a winning record for the seventh-consecutive season.
- The Conference has 98 WNBA draft choices with 32 in the first round in the 18 years since the inception of the professional league, which coincided with the inaugural season of the Big 12 in 1996-97.
- The Big 12 finished six-consecutive seasons ('08-'13) as No. 1 in conference RPI.
- The Big 12 swept both national postseason titles (NCAA and WNIT) in 2012.
- The Big 12 has had a unanimous first team All-America selection 15 years, including 14 consecutive.
- In 2010, the Big 12 had two teams (Baylor and Oklahoma) compete in the Women's Final Four in the same season for the first time in Conference history.
- In 2008, a Big 12 record eight teams competed in the NCAA Championship.
- In 2008, the Big 12 was the first league in the history of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championship to post an 8-0 record in first round games.
- The Big 12 has made 147 postseason appearances (III NCAA, 36 WNIT) in its 18 years of existence.
- In 18 years, 281 Big 12 men's and women's teams have advanced to postseason play, 217 in NCAA Tournaments and 62 in the NIT/WNIT/CBI.
- Big 12 Conference schools have been chosen to host NCAA first and second rounds 19 times in the last 10 years of predetermined sites.
- The Big 12 was picked to host NCAA Regionals four consecutive years from 2008-II, and hosted again in 2013.
- Every Big 12 Conference team has participated in the NCAA Championship.
- The Big 12 has had a team ranked in every Associated Press (338) and USA Today/ESPN (344) Top 25 poll the past 18 seasons.
- The Big 12 has been rated No. 1 in the coaches' poll 43 weeks in Conference history.
- The Big 12 has had a team ranked No. 1 in the AP Poll a total of 41 weeks.
- In the Associated Press Poll, Big 12 schools have been ranked 1,460 times, including 487 appearances in the Top 10 in the past 18 years.
- The league has had a conference-high seven teams ranked in 21 AP and 26 USA Today/ESPN polls in Big 12 history. The Conference has had at least six teams ranked on 75 occasions.
- The Big 12 crossed the million-fan threshold five consecutive years (2007-II) and six times overall (also 2002) when its membership included 12 teams. The Big 12 remains the only league to draw one-million spectators.
- The Big 12 has captured the past 15 NCAA average attendance crowns and has averaged over 5,000 fans eight times in its 18 years. The league holds NCAA records for cumulative attendance (1,091,289/2010) and average attendance (5,381/2004).
- Baylor was the first Division I men's or women's program to reach 40 wins with its 40-0 record in 2011-12.
- Student-athletes from Big 12 Conference schools have been named to the coaches All-America first team 40 times.
- Student-athletes from the Big 12 have won five Naismith trophies, eight Wade trophies, four WBCA Player of the Year awards, two Wooden Awards, one Honda Award for women's basketball and one Honda Cup that includes all women's sports.
