Sensitive issues identified through background checks may or may not be within the scope of questions in the Disclosure Questionnaire, but undergo the same review process and are subject to the same possible review by the Standards Advisory Council, including ineligibility for B Corp Certification, required remediation, or disclosure.

- 1) Intentional misrepresentation of practices, policies, and/or claimed outcomes during the company's certification process
- Breaches of the B Corp Community's core values as expressed in our Declaration of Interdependence

Disclosure Questionnaire Statement

Disclosure Questionnaire Category: Operations located in Conflict Zones

Topic	Company has suppliers located in Conflict Zones
Summary of Issue	As an agricultural company, GoodSAM has tier 1 suppliers, farmers who are located in Burkina Faso. The country is currently experiencing high levels of violence due to non-state armed groups and military operations, causing mass displacement and a humanitarian crisis, according to the Global Conflict Tracker. This directly impacts the safety and stability of farming communities that produce mangoes imported by GoodSAM. GoodSAM also has tier 1 suppliers in the Juárez region, the northern border of Mexico, where there is high levels of violence linked to organized crime and cartels based on the Global Conflict Tracker, directly affecting pecan-producing communities that supply to the company.
Size/Scope of Issue (e.g. \$ financial implication, # of individuals affected)	8.89% of the company's purchases come from suppliers that are located in regions at high risk of armed conflict.
Impact on Stakeholders	Business activities located in conflict zones are considered high-risk as they are more likely to cause or contribute to the conflict and/or sociopolitical instability.
	Countries classified as conflict zones are more likely to have a weak rule of law or a corrupt judicial system, which could undermine the effectiveness of operational grievance mechanisms for these businesses and their suppliers. In addition, the safety of the company's workers and other potential human rights violations are at risk.
Implemented Management Practices	100% of the company's purchases from the conflict zone are certified by some kind of third-party organization such as Rainforest Alliance, Organic EU /USDA NOP, Fairtrade, USDA Organic, and ISO 14001. While GoodSAM does not hold a third-party certification itself, most of its farmers and associations do hold certifications. GoodSAM continues to pay the Fair Trade/Fair for Life premiums to their farmer suppliers.



GoodSAM's approach to engaging with farming communities and associations follows a structured process that includes the following steps: Identification of farmer associations that meet specific attributes: strong community organization, willingness to implement organic and regenerative practices, ability to scale production, and openness to execute social and environmental impact projects. Joint definition of prices and purchasing frequency, based market projections and long-term sustainability of the commercial relationship. Initial field visit to evaluate the territory, the community, governance dynamics, and levels of transparency. Product testing to verify quality and formally initiate the commercial relationship. In addition, GoodSAM applies strict due diligence and control policies: Supplier selection criteria: minimum socio-environmental requirements (no deforestation, no child labor, no links to illicit activities). Anti-corruption and transparency mechanisms: clear contracts, direct payments to associations, internal audits, and digital Audits and field visits: periodic evaluations to ensure compliance with sustainable and regenerative practices. Third-party certifications are required where viable. Capacity building and technical support: training in agriculture, human rights, business regenerative management, and market access. Community programs: initiatives focused on water access, environmental education, economic resilience, and transition to organic and regenerative practices. Report GoodSam annual impact report **Management Comments** GoodSAM believes that sourcing in conflict-affected regions, while high-risk, is an essential part of its mission to support vulnerable farming communities, protect ecosystems, and build resilient supply chains.
