SUMMARY OF ISSUE	As a chocolate producer, Gaston Chocolat Ltd. operates in an industry in which human rights issues such as forced labor, child labor, and human trafficking are prevalent globally in the cocoa supply chain.
SIZE/SCOPE OF ISSUE (e.g. \$ financial implication, # of individuals affected)	100% of the company's cocoa comes directly from cocoa farms of its dedicated partner cooperatives, this represents approximately 57% of the company's supplier expenses.
IMPACT ON STAKEHOLDERS	The global cocoa industry has a history of forced and child labor, which subjects workers to poor working conditions, low wages, and puts children at risk for human trafficking.
IMPLEMENTED MGT PRACTICES	"100% of cocoa sourced by the company is traceable back to the original farmer. The company is constantly on the lookout for forced labor and child labor in the company's supply chain. The company hasn't found any cases of forced labour in its supply chain. To prevent child labour, the company's approach includes paying a premium price for the cocoa it buys. The company also raises awareness for child rights. In addition, the company actively and continuously monitors for child labour cases in all its partner cooperatives. 100% of the cacao purchased is conflict free and child or forced labour free. The company has a team monitoring of the quality and process implemented closely also looking out for child labor and visits the farms with a frequency of weekly to several times a year. The company also ensure every work is paid in cash contribution, no ""in-kind"" compensation. Volume of produce is agreed before each harvest season. A first payment is made upon harvest, and balance payment when cacao is received at the factory. Double scaling applies and contractual price is agreed as gate price, any other cost borne by the Company without retainers or deductions."
