Disclosure Questionnaire Statement

Disclosure Questionnaire Category: Industries at Risk of Human Rights Violations

Topic	Risk of forced labor, child labor, and human trafficking risks in the cocoa/chocolate supply chain
Summary of Issue	As a plant-based chocolate brand and seller (we outsource production), Hands Off B.V. operates in an industry in which human rights issues such as forced labor, child labor, and human trafficking are prevalent globally in the cocoa supply chain.
Size/Scope of Issue (e.g. \$ financial implication, # of individuals affected)	Approximately 7% of the company's supplier expenses are from cocoa suppliers. This includes the farmgate price cocoa farmers received for the beans plus the monetary premium and capacity building support
	In terms of traceability, Hands Off stated that 30% of the total amount of cocoa mass, butter, and powder sourced is traceable back to cooperation levels.
Impact on Stakeholders	The global cocoa industry has a history of forced and child labor, which subjects workers to poor working conditions, low wages, and puts children at risk for human trafficking.
Implemented Management Practices	The company has the following practices in place to address the risks associated with the cocoa/chocolate supply chain: • Hands Off reported that it supports the Cocoa Horizons Foundation. Cocoa Horizons is an impactful program dedicated to improving the quality of farm life in Ghana and in Ivory Coast. The program focuses on increasing farmer productivity and improving farming communities. The farmers receive a premium price for the cocoa beans. Cocoa Horizons publishes the progress made on a yearly basis in an extensive report. All activities and KPIs measured are verified by an independent party. So even though there is no official certification for the farmers to join Cocoa Horizons, there is a verification process in place that ensures social and ethical issues are addressed and solved. • Around 30% of the total amount of cocoa mass, butter,



	and powder we sourced is traceable back to cooperation levels. For this segregated supply chain, information on multiple KPls is available, such as the number of farmers above the poverty line, the number of farmers supported through different types of support programs, child labor cases identified and remediated as well as deforestation numbers. For the cocoa that is not yet traceable, it is only certain that it comes from West Africa. • Cocoa Horizons has made a lot of progress in identifying cases of child labor in the supply chain. Around 95% of all farmer groups have Child Labor Monitoring and Remediation Systems in place. Hands Off is working hard to increase the % of traceable cocoa sourced this year (2023) and aligned with its goal to source at least 95% of the cocoa segregated (traceable) by the end of 2023. • This means Hands Off financially supports the Cocoa Horizons Foundation by paying a premium per ton for the chocolate we buy from Barry Callebaut. We pay a premium for the cocoa butter, liquor and powder. Based on the recipe of the chocolate (% of butter, % of liquor etc.) the premium per type of chocolate (e.g. 85% dark or vegan m!lk) is calculated. The total premium we paid in 2022 differs between €92-€185 per ton of chocolate. In 2022 we supported the Cocoa Horizons foundation with a total of €20.732.
