

Sound and Banquet – Frank Stillson

The Flying season is fast coming to a close, except for a few dedicated flyers.

Now is the time to reevaluate how much sound your equipment generated this year. Most of you are well within the logical limits as to how quiet your aircraft are.

The big 4-cycle engines emit considerable noise, albeit low frequency, usually not run to max throttle, and consequently not as objectionable as some of the smaller engines that just scream.

Everyone should consider the kind of noise suppression system they are using for next year. Tuned pipes can be very loud. There are muffled pipes available. Big engines can be silenced with correct mufflers. Small engines can be helped by not exceeding excessive tip speed. There are solutions to loud aircraft, so take some time this winter to improve the muffling of the aircraft.

Don't Get In Over Your Head

Recently on a very windy day at the field I witnessed two seasoned flyers pile drive their airplanes into the ground. Both of them allowed their aircraft to get blown in over their heads, losing orientation, which resulted in the crashes. We sometimes forget that the distance traveled of the average aircraft at the field is somewhere between 60-80 feet per second at full throttle.

In the August newsletter I published an article titled "Nail Those Landings" by Dan Stahn of the Anoka County Radio Control Club, Inc in Coon Rapids, MN. One of the points in the article said "Correct flight path changes immediately – Either speed or position or whatever – if it isn't right, fix it. Don't let needed corrections pile up." When the conditions are very windy it is easy for an airplane to get blown out of the pattern. Your flight path on downwind sets the stage for your base leg and final approach turns. Having a direct crosswind will cause you to either overturn your base and/or your final approach turns.

"Have a plan – Don't let the airplane determine your approach. Plan out your landing well in advance. Maybe two or three circuits around the pattern before you make the landing."

"Plan ahead – This is very important. Compare where the airplane will go if you don't change anything to where it will go if you do. If they don't match, make it match."

"Don't fly the pattern too fast – If you fly at a reduced speed, you lessen the chance of missing the runway."

Flying directly over your head is not easy. I have a helicopter with a camera mount attached for taking aerial photographs. I spent a good portion of an afternoon just hovering 50-100 feet above my head for the purpose of taking good aerial shots without getting disoriented. Believe me it is not easy to do!

Don't let the winds scare you, but keep in mind that there may be a point where the winds will exceed the capability of the pilot and not necessarily the airplane. Keeping in this mind, fly safely and see you at the field.

For All Season Flyers (or those that want to be)

Here's a tip from Tower Hobbies (submitted by Al Phillips) for making **snow skis**.

Easy to make and durable snow skis for your R/C plane. First cut a length of 1 to 1-1/2" piece of PVC tubing to the length you want your ski. Then cut that tube in half with a band or hack saw. Pull out your trusty heat gun and heat until the halves are pliable, pressing them flat on your work surface. Round off one end, then heat and lift the tip for a perfect pair of skis. Finish by gluing a vertical wood mount drilled to match your landing gear strut and you're ready for the snow!


