

## Top 5 Wineries to Visit in Napa Valley

Once you take a trip to the wineries in Napa Valley, your life will never be the same – and you'll want to return time and time again. Having just gotten back from Napa Valley, that's exactly how I feel – as I immersed myself in the Napa lifestyle, complete with great food and fine wine, of course. Private Winery Tour & Tasting: \$55

For an all-encompassing experience, head to Raymond Vineyards in St. Helena. This historical family-owned winery had their first vintage crush in 1974 and continues to produce elegant wines with deep roots in Napa Valley. While time has passed and Raymond Vineyards is now part of the Boisset Collection, Jean Charles Boisset keeps with the family's traditions, while continuing to elevate the brand. Raymond Vineyards is a self-sustaining farm, it uses organic and Biodynamic farming practices; offers educational opportunities – from the corridor of senses to offering a 'Be a Winemaker for a Day' experience; and adds a bit of Jean Charles Boisset's eccentric tastes to the mix. For our tasting, we were greeted with a glass of rosé, enjoyed a tour of the property – both inside and out, did a private tasting of four reds and were treated to a few extra surprises.
