In Everything Give Thanks

"Thank the Lord! Praise his name! Tell the nations what He has done. Let them know how mighty He is! Sing to the Lord, for He has done wonderful things. Make known His praise around the world."

Isaiah 12:4-5

As we gather this Thanksgiving with hearts full of gratitude and tables full of abundance, Isaiah's words remind us that thanksgiving is more than a seasonal sentiment—it's a sacred calling.

Isaiah speaks of a time when the people of God erupt in joyful song, not just for what He has done for them personally, but for what He has done for the world. This is not quiet gratitude—it's loud, public, and contagious. It's a call to tell, sing, and make known the goodness of God.

What Has God Done?

Look around. Has He healed? Provided? Comforted? Redeemed? The "wonderful things" Isaiah speaks of are not distant miracles—they are the everyday mercies we often overlook.

This Thanksgiving, let's name them. Let's share them. Let's let our gratitude spill over into testimony. In Isaiah 12, we find a powerful blueprint for what Christian thanksgiving looks like: it's expressive, it's missional, and it's rooted in awe.

It's a Gratitude That Glorifies

As Christians, our thanksgiving begins with recognizing the source of every good gift. We don't just say "thank you" for blessings—we praise His name. We acknowledge that behind every provision, every healing, every moment of peace, stands a mighty and loving God. Thanksgiving becomes worship.

It's a Gratitude That Goes Global

Isaiah doesn't stop at personal praise. He doesn't limit praise to the sanctuary. He urges us to "tell the nations," and "make known his praise around the world." In a time when the world is hungry for hope, our thanksgiving becomes a witness.

It's a Gratitude That Speaks

This passage urges us to sing, tell, and make known. Thanksgiving isn't silent — it's vocal. It's the kind of joy that can't be contained. Whether through song, testimony or acts of kindness, our thanksgiving should echo beyond the walls of the church.

What It Means Today

In our modern world, Thanksgiving can easily become about food, family, and fleeting moments. But as Christians, we're called to something deeper. We're invited to live lives of continual gratitude—where every day becomes a chance to reflect God's goodness and share His glory.

<u>Reflection</u>: This Thanksgiving, take time to remember what God has done in your life and family. Share your story. Sing your praise. Let your gratitude be a light that points others to the One who gives us every reason to rejoice.

<u>Prayer</u>: Lord help us to live lives of gratitude and praise—not just in October, but every day. Amen.



HAPPENINGS ON OUR ASSOCIATION FRONT

September 2025 Update

The Middlesex, Lambton, Huron Association (MLHA) is currently revamping our Constitution. The process started last fall under the guidance of the newly formed Transition Team (Charlene Root, Rev. Ron Rye, Rev. Dave Adams, Rev. Eric Campbell, Susan Plumridge, Rev. Andrew Plumridge, Andrew Emmott, Miriam Kleber).

At our MLHA meeting at Arkona Baptist Church on September 20, we were able to review the first draft. In order to take a less formal approach, the document it is now called *GATHERING TOGETHER*. The team felt that this name reflects the purpose of the Association which is to strengthen fellowship among the Association Churches by gathering and working together with renewed excitement.

Our task now is to read over this document and suggest changes/wording to the Advisory Team made up of members of our Association. This team will also be making recommendations to the Transition Team. There will be further amendments prior to the Spring 2026 AGM.

I have a copy of the draft and can share it with anyone who would like to read it and give input.

The Transition Team had these main priorities in mind as they developed the document:

- fellowship is very important. There are small churches scattered over 3 counties and believers need to meet to encourage each other.
- we are people of scripture. The Bible is our guide.
- the wording must be able to go forth in the future. It is not just for existing churches but also for others that may come. We need to keep it user-friendly.

Other news

There are 14 churches in our Association. Most are struggling; this from Cid Latty, our Regional Associate and link to CBOQ which supports member churches and offers resources. He told us we are a trailblazer for other Associations that are watching how we go through this process.

The executive decided to suspend the honorariums given to the secretary and treasurer for their services to MLHA. Those in these positions are in agreement. This will help ease finances.

At the Association meeting, we were given the opportunity to take part in an interactive prayer session. Each church was asked in advance to share a story of encouragement from their church and one area of challenge. These were printed out and placed on chairs. Attendees then went around, read them and quietly prayed for the church. This really demonstrated that we face many of the same challenges. We were able to hold up each other up in prayer and show our support.

I highly recommend people attend these gatherings with our sister churches for uplifting fellowship, encouragement and to find out what is happening in our Association.

Peanut Butter Oatmeal Chocolate Chip Cookies

1 cup peanut butter (smooth or chunky)

1/2 cup rolled oats

1/2 cup chocolate chips

1/2 cup brown sugar

1 large egg

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350°F and line a baking sheet with parchment paper.

In a large mixing bowl, combine the peanut butter, oats, chocolate chips, brown sugar, and egg. Stir until well combined and the mixture holds together.

Drop spoonfuls of dough on the prepared baking sheet, spacing them about 2 inches apart. Flatten each cookie slightly with the back of the spoon.

Bake for 8-10 minutes, or until the edges are golden brown. The cookies will firm up as they cool.


