Thrivent Action Teams are designed to help Thrivent Financial members strengthen communities. If you are a Thrivent member, you are eligible to lead up to two Thrivent Action Teams per calendar year.

Just think about an unmet need in the community and how you could help. Apply to lead the volunteer team in a one-time fundraiser, service activity or educational event that can be completed within 120 days. Projects can receive up to \$250 Community Impact Card to use as seed money to get the project off the ground and make a bigger impact.







7 FACTS ABOUT YOUR BRAIN

You are born with all the neurons that your brain will ever have.

You can't learn new things when you are old.

We don't really know how the brain works.

Dementia is an inevitable consequence of old age.

Only young people can learn a new language.

Older people are doomed to forget things.

A person who has memory training never forgets. **FACT**

Neurons are continually created throughout your life in areas of the brain through a process called neurogenesis.

Learning can happen at any age when you get involved with cognitively stimulating activities like meeting new people or trying new hobbies.

Researchers have made great strides in understanding the brain in recent years. The field of neuroscience is at the cusp of new and exciting breakthroughs.

Dementia is not a normal part of aging. There is a big difference between typical age-related changes in the brain and those that are caused by disease.

While it may seem simpler for kids—with simpler sentence structures and a lack of self-consciousness—your age isn't a limitation in learning a new language.

Remembering details is easier for some people than others, but this is true of all ages. There are strategies to help remember names, facts, etc. and paying closer attention can often help you remember better.

Keep practicing your memory skills. "Use it or lose it" applies to memory training in the same way it applies to maintaining your physical health.

In order to maintain an atmosphere of transparency to the Elim congregation, below is a stating point of a list of options for cutting costs and the possible closure of the church. **These are NOT etched in stone.** We ask that you prayerfully consider each option and urge you to come up with other options prior to the final vote on October 23. Thank you.

Options for Cutting Costs and Making Changes to Current Church

- 1. Smaller newsletter (office uses less ink and paper)
- 2. Put cell tower on property and collect rent
- 3. Use altar candles only
- 4. Close off south door of Large Fellowship Hall, then use Chapel for Worship
 - A. Rent out upstairs office space
- 5. Move church offices to lower level
 - A. Close off door on south end of Large Fellowship Hall, using the north end of Small Fellowship Hall for Worship and south end for AA meetings.
 - B. Pastor's office and storage would be in former nurse's office
 - C. Church office, copier, and storage would be in former Youth Room
 - D. Close off upstairs and install chair lift to get to lower level
 - E. Rent out upstairs office space
- 6. Sell the church, then rent Worship space with offices and kitchette, with owner taking care of maintenance expenses.
- 7. Keep parking lot because of income
- 8. We can't stay the same
 - A. Expect massive changes
 - B. Building is eating up income
- 9. Close church, leaving people to find their own church
- 10. Share Sanctuary and rent office space from Pontoppidan. This is NOT a merger, this will not create a new church, this is Pontoppidan AND Elim sharing one building, just like St. Mark's is sharing Sanctuary space with the synagogue.
- 11. Satellite space for Churches United for homeless individuals.
- 12. Grants
- 13. Ask other churches for monetary assistance in our struggles.
