Steinke. There is valuable information in this letter and I encourage you to read and absorb its content, which is applicable to our current situation.

Recently, I received the following letter from Luther Seminary President Robin J.

Dear Pastor Caroline,

We live in a time when institutional structures are changing rapidly. Despite the often-quoted admonition, "Do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring troubles of its own" (Matthew 6:34), many of us still worry about what the future holds.

What's going to happen to our congregation?
Will we be able to call another pastor next year?
Will my children and grandchildren know the love of Jesus?

These are real questions without simple or obvious answers. But as followers of Christ, we are called to believe that God brings new life out of impossible places - the margins, the sick bed, the tomb. The church.

Here at Luther Seminary, we are leaning into a vision of the future characterized by possibility, if we are willing to embrace it. As the landscape of the church changes, new forms of Christian community are coming into being and longstanding faith practices are being renewed.

A concept that explains this shift is the "mixed ecology," which describes a blend of inherited and innovative forms of Christian community. In the mixed ecology, traditional Sunday morning services exist alongside emerging practices that connect with people where they live, work, and play.

The mixed ecology signals a paradigm shift from thinking of the church as an institution to the church as an ecosystem of thriving Christian communities. This model has taken root in the United Kingdom through the Fresh Expressions movement and is becoming more widespread in North America. (You can learn more about this movement in the recent article in Story magazine, "Meeting Jesus at the Park.")

These "fresh expressions" of Christian community come in all shapes and sizes, reflecting the diversity of God's people and the places they seek meaning. Weeknight dinner meetups, "messy church" for young families, fitness and spirituality groups, and pioneering church plants meet people where they already are and invite them into deeper relationship with God and neighbor.

The more we lean into the idea of the mixed ecology, the more excited we become about the future into which the Holy Spirit is calling the church as a whole.

The mixed ecology is a radically inclusive model that, by design, provides a point of entry for people who otherwise may never set foot in church. It's a "both/and" perspective that affirms the rich inheritance of our Christian traditions while adapting to the vital questions, diverse contexts, and deep need for connection in our contemporary culture.

We are profoundly interested in what the future holds for those called to lead Christian communities. The mixed ecology model reflects a current reality - that many churches are already relying on lay leadership rather than professional clergy - but it doesn't stop there. It opens up the possibility of calling people out of the pews and into more active and engaged forms of discipleship, leadership, and ministry.

It's invigorating and humbling work to accompany thinkers and faithful pioneer who are at the forefront of this reimagination of church for our age. Sometimes scary, too. But, in fact, we're already living a version of the mixed ecology at Luther Seminary.

Our degree programs continue the vital work of equipping those whom God calls for professional leadership roles in the church. At the same time, our Faith+Lead initiative (faithlead.org) is a center for innovation - part start-up, part research and development lab, part digital convening hub. It's a site of holy experimentation that informs how we deliver theological education and build community in the digital age, and vice versa.

We're witnessing this shiftling landscape in real time. A poignant example: The congregation council of St. Paul Evangelical Lutheran Church in Sandusky, Ohio, is navigating the closure of their congregation and the use of church assets. Out of the grief surrounding the end of more than a century of ministry at St. Paul, the council looked to the future with hope, trust, and a desire to seek new ways of spreading the gospel in their community. They decided to make a legacy gift to Faith+Lead as an investment in the future of Christ's church.

Endings and new beginnings: We trust in the promise that God's love is deep and wide enough to encompass them both. As Christians, we are living not just through a period of significant change, but one of death and resurrection. We give thanks for the Holy Spirit's steadfast presence as we accompany the church and its leaders into this new era.

Thank you for your prayerful support of this exhilarating, challenging and deeply important work.

Balance Sheet

The checking acct balance is \$1,573.35. The balance at the beginning of the year was \$9,372.02. General Acct Fund balance after June is -\$27,037.72.

Income and Expense (7/12 or 58.3% through the year)

- Monthly pledge income was under budget (budget \$6,667.00 vs. \$4,355.00).
- Monthly total income was under budget (budget \$8,970.00 vs. \$6,300.25).
- YTD pledge income is 58.6% of the budget \$80,000 (actual \$46,879.00).
- YTD total income is 57.29% of the budget \$107,600.00 (actual \$61,647.56).
- Monthly expenses were under budget (budget \$12,500.00 vs. \$10,713.02).
- YTD expenses are 59.12% of the budget \$150.004.00 (actual \$88.685.28)
- The utility bill was \$795.24. Borrowed \$5,000 from the memorial fund to cover General Fund expenses.


