# Vestry Report

Some highlights from the past several Vestry meetings:

January began with the seating of new Vestry members Brian DePierre and Mac Nibbs, who also was appointed as Rector's Warden. Jim Heaton, who is serving the rest of Wesley Jenkins term was re-elected as Treasurer and Cindy Kaemmerer as Secretary. Fr. Chris Bodiford shared his ministry efforts in planting an Anglican church in the South Bay area and the Vestry approved a \$5500 donation to that ministry from the 2018 surplus funds, which totaled over \$11,000!

The Ramona-based families were asked in February to pray about whether they wish to continue to hold Sunday services in Ramona and they were given until Ash Wednesday to share their thoughts. At that time they decided to continue with Sunday services at least through Pentecost (June 9) and then re-evaluate this situation.

Fr. John C. King announced via letter to the congregation read at both services on Sunday, March 3, that he and Marji are moving to Billings Montana where John has accepted a call to serve as priest in a small Anglican congregation there. The Kings last day with us at CTK will be an all-CTK service in Poway on May 19.

More of the 2018 surplus was earmarked for outreach ministry efforts including \$150a month for 6 months in financial assistance to Manuel Orendain who serves as a Yard Pastor and unpaid assistant to Fr. Russell at RJ Donovan, and \$100 a month for 5 months to the Poway Outreach Team to purchase Subway/Vons gift cards for the YIT (youth in transition) program in the Poway School District which helps provide for the needs of homeless youth in our area.

The remaining 2018 surplus funds will be transferred into the Anglican Community Service Fund for future outreach projects of Christ the King Church.

Ongoing issues and projects of the vestry include deciding on and implementing new signage on the campus, cleaning out the storage unit (April 13 is our target date for doing so) and eventually the trailer, as well as compiling an upkeep and maintenance manual for the Poway campus.

Finances have shown no major issues and will be analyzed in more depth after the 1st quarter of the year. Cindy's absences due to her sister's illness and passing meant that deposits and financial reports were a bit behind but things are getting caught up now.

Holy week services have been planned and several successful Lenten events have already taken place including the Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper, Ash Wednesday services, Soup Suppers in Ramona and the weekly Friday Fish Frys in Poway. All of these events have provided us with opportunities to invite friends and neighbors to participate in the life of our church and meet and interact with our church family.

## **POWAY MINISTRY TEAM REPORT**

***As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace..." 1 Peter 4:10 [esv]***

**North County Veterans Stand Down** took place at Green Oak Ranch on 2-7-19 through 2-10-19. It served approximately 200 or so veterans, providing a respite from the streets in the form of cabin living, catered dining, indoor VA services, medical dental, legal aid, clothing distribution, housing assistance and an array of other "Veterans and homeless assistance services." Thank you to everyone who prayed for this event or donated items or time. Those who served were blessed by God's love in action.

Lenten season is in full swing and so is the "**baby bottle drive**" to benefit **Life Choices Counseling Center**. Your pocket change will help to meet the needs and change the lives of those who are dealing with an unplanned pregnancy.

Reminder that **Life Choices** is hosting a special event on **Thursday, May 9th, from 6:30pm to 9:00pm at the Bernardo Winery** which is intended to be a "night of mingling, testimonials and learning about how Life Choices has made a difference in our community for the past 33 years. "Included will be a silent auction and donations are being solicited. These may be such things as art, gift certificates for dining or entertainment, time shares, professional services, and the like. Donor applications must be turned in by April 18<sup>th</sup> and donated items must be received by May 2nd. Applications and flyers available at church.

We will continue supporting the **Youth in Transition [YIT] Program** through the school year with food gift cards. There are 300 or so homeless youth served by the Poway Unified School District. These young people live in tents, under freeway over passes, in stairwells, in cars or temporarily "crash" on someone's sofa. By law these students must have access to education in the district.

The 27<sup>th</sup> annual **Stamp Out Hunger** event is coming up on **Saturday, May 11th** when Ranch Bernardo letter carriers will collect food from many local postal customers and bring to the old RB Post Office for unloading, sorting and eventual distribution to local food distribution drives. The event is being coordinated by the **Friends and Family Community Connection**. This year, CTK will once again participate by providing 80 "goodie bags" as tokens of gratitude for the letter carriers. **As we get closer to the event, donations of snack/granola bars and 16oz bottles of water will be welcome/needed!** Each bag will also contain a Thank You note. A **Goody bag packing party is tentatively planned for Sunday, May 5<sup>th</sup> directly after worship service.**

**Note:** In connection with the event, volunteers are being sought for "folding the many, many bags" that are saved after the food is emptied into the postal containers. This task will be scheduled for later in the afternoon of the 11th, most likely from 3:30 or 4:00 until 5:30 or 6:00. As we get closer to the event, sign up sheets will be available. (Stay tuned for further updates.)

**What is the purpose of outreach?** It is not just to meet needs in the community, important as that is, it is to fulfill God's commandment to love our neighbors and to prepare people to hear the Good News of Jesus Christ. It is reaching out to the community in a personal and loving way. As we go about reaching out to our community and beyond, we need your prayers and your help. If you are new to Christ the King Church, we would love to have you join our team. The team meets regularly to pray and seek God's will as we plan. In any event, we definitely need your prayers as well as ideas on ways that we can reach out to our community with the love of Christ and His saving Grace.

# A special delivery from Papa John

## The Call

I wanted to take this opportunity to tell you all a little more about the calling Marji and I received to Billings, and maybe answer a few questions in the process.

Last fall I was invited to attend the diocese church planter's retreat. This came as a real surprise to me, as I did not think of myself as a church planter (but evidently someone did!) Right after that Marji and I attended "Always Forward" which is the ACNA church planting conference. Between those two events, I began to feel that I was, indeed, called to planting in some way. I wanted to be very intentional about "holding on loosely" to my own ideas, but we started out with the assumption that we would be remaining with CTK unless God definitively spoke to us. (I viewed – and still view – both CTK Ramona and Poway as church plants by nature of their relatively new locations and desire to reach out to the community around them).

By the time Synod rolled around in October, most people knew I was retiring in June and several were asking me to consider upcoming opportunities. A couple of churches were in Southern California, and two were in the Rocky Mountain Deanery (Billings, MT and Moscow, ID). Although we already knew many of the people at the SoCal churches, they were well-established and not what I felt called to lead.

In January Marji and I decided that we would look at 3 places: Billings, Moscow, and Reno/Carson City area (home for us). If God didn't speak directly to us about one of those places, we would feel confident we were to remain with CTK. By this time I had spoken several times with the Bishop and he encouraged me to keep an open mind and be receptive to God's leading.

I thought I would like Moscow, and thought that – if any of the places were "the" place – Moscow would be "it". But, by the first night Marji and I knew Moscow was not for us. They have a nice congregation, but (for us) not enough emphasis on the Holy Spirit/charismatic gifts. The culture of the town did not seem to fit us, either.

Reno/Carson city were a definite consideration. First of all, the hospital there was actively trying to recruit me to come as a developmental pediatrician. They had a position all lined up and it sounded REALLY nice! Second, my folks are there. But, there is very little Anglican presence there – we would essentially be starting from scratch with a church of two.

When I went to Billings, I didn't want to like it – it's far away from all our family. There is a remnant of an Anglican church there – about 15 folks. It actually reminded me a lot of the Ramona group, both in terms of age and desire to see God's kingdom grow. There were two major "lamp-posts" for me during our visit there. One was seeing the women in the congregation come around Marji and plan a day with her (while the vestry was interviewing me). The second was when I was driving around and came to a place where I could look down on all of the town. Looking at it, I realized I loved it. The culture there fit Marji and I well – lots of outdoor fishing, hunting, rodeo, etc. It is a mix of blue collar (there are 3 oil refineries and a sugar-beet processing plant) and professional (it is the major medical center for all of Montana and parts of the surrounding states). It is the largest town in Montana, with a whopping 150,000 people. Still, neither Marji nor I were 100% convinced. For one thing, there was no guarantee of a part-time developmental pediatrician job. For another, it was far away.

So, we came back with three options: CTK, Reno, or Billings. Reno felt almost “seductive” to me, and I finally figured out that what attracted me there (family and a developmental peds job) were NOT what I was called to follow. So that was out. With CTK, we love you all. There was also Kairos, and Cursillo, and friends we know from all over SoCal. The Navy, however, was undergoing some major changes in medical care and suddenly I had only a slim chance of getting hired as a civilian there. So I found myself loving the people at both CTK and Billings, and neither one with a definite part time medical job. As Marji and I kept praying, we both began feeling more called to Billings. A big deciding factor for me was that the Billings had been without a priest for 3 years, and no one else was interested in them. My journal entry from 1/15 said: “God can use me anywhere. The question is, where can I be used that might go without a priest if I don’t say “yes”? What area/place/job am I uniquely called to? I keep coming back to the fact that there is no one besides us for Billings.” The more we prayed, the more we felt that we were “made” for Billings in a unique way.

So, I “kind-of” committed to Billings, waiting to see if the hospital there could find a part-time position for me. Then God had a talk with me that basically went like this: “John – I’m calling you to Billings to be a priest. Let me take care of the rest of the details.” So, I stepped out of the boat in faith and fully committed. The second week of April Marji and I will be going up for a job interview with the hospital. It sounds like things are going well on that end, but I am still practicing the art of “being still and knowing that God is God”. The hard part is leaving you all. It is also leaving Becky, Wes, and Eli (they will be moving up to Big Bear to stay with Wes’ mom for a while).

How can you pray for us?

1. Pray for God to prepare the soil in Billings for the church to bring people to Christ.
2. Pray that we will find “persons of peace” that help us to make connections in the community.
3. Pray that I will have wisdom and discernment, love and compassion as I enter a new (and scary) phase in my life as rector of a church plant.
4. Pray for us to make friends there and to find the support that we will need.
5. Pray about becoming a regular prayer warrior for us – we will be giving out “Pray for Planters” bumper stickers to remind you to pray not just for us, but for other church planters in the diocese. We will be setting up a prayer group that we will send out updates and prayer requests to.
6. Pray for protection for Marji and me as we enter into enter into the spiritual warfare common to church planters.
7. Pray that all the “other stuff” that needs to get done is done without stress or worry (selling our house, buying a house, retiring, setting up VA stuff, and moving).

Rest assure we will continue to pray for CTK! We love you and will miss you! There will always be a place for you to stay if you come visit!

## **My Lenten Challenge: Listening to and loving my neighbor**

Ron, JK, Kerri & Douglas and Luna their dog, Mark, Stephen, Jennifer, Evelyn and Scott. These are the names of some of the wonderful and hurting people in our community. We met them outside Starbucks and Peets when they responded to our sign, "Free drink if you will tell us your story." I am sure by the time this appears in the Monarch there will be many more beloved ones of God that we meet before Easter.

The idea of this challenge came from something I heard on K-Love radio. A man went to a coffee shop and put up a sign that read "Free drink if I can tell you my story." No one took him up on the offer. Then he changed his sign to "Free drink if you will tell me your story." He got many takers then. I was nervous about going out to do this. Really. The first time I went by myself to a Starbucks near our church. I said "Good morning" to people walking in the coffee shop to get their attention, hoping they would read the sign. I had one man stop on the way and tell me his story. As we engaged in conversation, another man came over. That day was a slow, but good beginning.

The next week I went out with Father Paul Gibbons, rector of Holy Trinity, Ocean Beach and our own Joanie Pisani. We prayed together for the Holy Spirit to lead us. We sat outside Peets with our sign and Joanie showed me how it was done! She asked every single person who walked by if they would like a free drink. We had deep conversations and prayed with one couple and two individuals. One of our new friends said God told him to sit down with us. His father unexpectedly died of a heart attack the week before. The couple was looking for a church and Father Paul invited them to his. The other man was a theology professor at PLNU. He had some students in desperate situations and we joined him in prayer for them. All this is in only one hour sitting outside a coffee shop! It was so much fun!

I went out again on my own to Starbucks near our church. I channeled Joanie's straightforwardness and asked people if they would like a free drink. I made three friends, prayed with one, and invited all to the fish fry (my treat).

The most interesting conversation I had was with Scott. He told me I wouldn't want to hear his story because it was a horror story. I assured him that I would and he could tell me on his way out. Scott wanted to know why I was doing this. I told him that I wanted to meet neighbors. I wanted to know what they cared about, what they were concerned about. When I said I go to a church that wants to serve our community he almost recoiled. At the word "church" he said "oh" in a negative way.

However, the Holy Spirit did a number anyway. He rattled off all the things that were, in his opinion, wrong with this world. It was a long list! I listened to him and to the Holy Spirit at the same time. He concluded by quoting his father, "the world is going to Hell in a handbasket." I told him that I shared many of his concerns about the world. But, I am a parent and I hope to be a grandparent someday, so I can't stay negative. I have to have hope for this world and the people in it. I just do what I can do to make the world better instead of focusing on the negative. Lo, and behold, he agreed with me! He said mine was a better way of thinking. I hope I see him again in the coming weeks, so we can continue our conversation. God has started something here. Scott lives near the church and took an invitation to the fish fry. But, he works until 10:00pm. Please pray with me for Scott.



It doesn't need to be any special time of year to do this challenge. You can just decide, then pray. If you want to try it I am sure you can find a buddy in me or Joanie.
