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Ella Langley, Lainey Wilson Lead As The 60th ACMs Kick It Old School



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Country Coda: Emmylou Harris 'Still' Resonates >page 12 "Why not me when you're growin' old?"

Wynonna Judd's line from a throwback song in the opening medley of former winning titles asked an appropriate question as the Academy of Country Music held its 60th annual awards on May 8 in Frisco, Texas.

The show leaned substantially on nostalgia, citing classic artists in its script and featuring several 20-year-old titles among its performances as the ACMs inch toward the equivalent of retirement age.

The trophies reflected a retro quality, too. **Ella Langley** rode "you look like you love me," a partial recitation with classic country roots, to five awards.

"We grew up on classic country," Langley said as she accepted single of the year, joined by collaborator Riley Green and producer Will Bundy. "There was a lot of talking in it

Lee, **David Allan Coe**. This song really changed it for me as a songwriter. It taught me to just not care so much and write what you love and write what feels good."

"How cool it is," added Green, a three-time winner, "that a song with talking verses won an award."

Lainey Wilson claimed four honors, including her second

straight wins for entertainer and female artist of the year, while joining host **Reba McEntire** and **Miranda Lambert** for the inaugural performance of "Trailblazer," a song that recognized pioneering women **Loretta Lynn**, **Patsy Cline**, **Dottie West** and **Tammy Wynette**. She did her own backward glancing dur-

ing the evening, recalling that she saw **Crystal Gayle** perform the first time she attended the Grand Ole Opry. Wilson turned the clock back even further in her final trip to the microphone.

"I remember my parents had this old hunting spotlight that we used to take off the charger all the time," she said. "My sister would turn all the lights off in the house, and she would shine the spotlight on me as I was running back and forth across the living room. I dreamed about entertaining. I love making people feel things."

Brooks & Dunn swiped duo of the year for the first time in 15

years, bringing their total in the category to 17 wins. The first of those victories occurred more than three decades ago, in 1992.

"We've been doing this for a long time," **Ronnie Dunn** told the crowd. "Not for one second have we ever taken it for granted or ever expected it."

The night prior, the duo had received the ACM diamond $^{\circ}$



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chairman's award during the ACM Lifting Lives Gala, an event that raised over \$1.3 million for the ACM's charitable arm. Dunn reflected at that event on their initial trophy night.

"We were walking off the stage," Dunn said. "I was looking this way, and [Kix Brooks] was looking that way, and we were both fighting back tears."

The duo's former Arista labelmate, **Alan Jackson**, also battled emotions during the awards as he became the inaugural winner of a trophy that bears his name: the Alan Jackson lifetime achievement award. Black-and-white images from his youth appeared behind him as he sang "Remember When," his voice cracking as the lyrics considered an earlier milestone: "Remember when 30 seemed so old."

Jackson first moved to Nashville from Georgia four decades ago, and he has only a May 17 date in Milwaukee left on what is believed to be his final concert tour.

"I came to Nashville with a paper sack full of songs and a crazy dream," he said. "All these years later, I'm standing here receiving such an honor like this—it's just mind-blowing."

Other awards and moments marked the passage of time in their own ways. **Old Dominion** set a new record by winning its eighth straight group of the year award. **Chris Stapleton** collected the male vocalist hardware for the fifth time in his career, just days after celebrating the 10th anniversary of the release of his breakthrough album, *Traveller*.

Cody Johnson's recording of "Dirt Cheap" won song of the year behind an old-school storyline fashioned the way that Nashville writers did it decades ago: one writer, **Josh Phillips**, chipping away at the song by himself.

Zach Top, who is closely associated with the resurgence of '90s country influence, performed acoustic on a satellite stage after accepting the new male artist award days earlier. **The Red Clay Strays** also earned new duo or group in advance.

Plenty of other performances dug back into the ACMs' 60 years of awards history: Johnson teamed with Brooks & Dunn on the 2003 release "Red Dirt Road"; Langley, sporting a "Mama Tried" T-shirt, joined Lambert on the 20-year-old "Kerosene"; and **LeAnn Rimes** turned her 1996 traditional-country debut, "Blue," into a 1940s-style traditional-pop exercise by using a string quartet and cobalt lighting.

Additionally, Eric Church, who has won seven ACMs since 2011, delivered his current single, "Hands of Time," hailing "loud guitars" and a bevy of influences, including songs by Bob Seger, Bob Marley, Meat Loaf, Waylon Jennings and Johnny Cash.

Music is, after all, continually building on its past, and a song about that evolution is particularly appropriate on a 60th anniversary.

So was a small gesture at the end of the evening. As Wilson walked offstage with her entertainer of the year award, presenter **Blake Shelton** made a point of giving her the envelope that had contained her name. It's a memento that has future value, perhaps when Wilson is part of the crew helping the ACM look back on its history again in 10 or 15 years. •

Riley Green, Corey Kent & Ella Langley Notch New Country Airplay Top 10s

Riley Green's "Worst Way" (Nashville Harbor) hits the top 10 on *Billboard*'s Country Airplay chart, hopping from No. 11 to No. 8 on the survey dated May 17. It increased by 10% to 16.6 million audience impressions May 2-8, according to Luminate.

With the song—from Green's LP Don't Mind If I Do, which entered Top Country Albums at its No. 8 best last November—he banks his sixth Country Airplay top 10. It follows his duet with **Ella Langley**, "you look like you love me," which led for one week in December, becoming his second chart-topper. He



first led as featured on **Thomas Rhett's** "Half of Me" for one week in November 2022. "There Was This Girl" was his first top 10 (No. 3, 2019).

Notably, Green wrote "Worst Way" solo. It's the first Country Airplay top 10 solo-penned by the artist who recorded it since **Chayce Beckham**'s "23," which led for one week in April 2024.

BIG 'HEART' Corey Kent lands his second Country Airplay top 10 as "This Heart" (Combustion Masters/RCA Nashville) rises 12-9 (16.4 million, up 12%). The song, from the Bixby, Okla., native's album *Black Bandana* (which arrived last fall), follows "Wild As Her," which hit No. 3 in May 2023.

WIND' BLOWS IN Ella Langley achieves her second Country Airplay top 10 as "Weren't for the Wind" (SAWGOD/Columbia/Triple Tigers) gusts 13-10 (15.5 million, up 12%). The single, from her 2024 LP *Hungover*, follows her chart-topping **Riley Green** team-up "you look like you love me" (see above).

ONGOING 'PROBLEM' Morgan Wallen's "I'm the Problem" (Mercury/ Republic/Big Loud) dominates Country Airplay for a fourth total and consecutive week (30.7 million, up 1%). The song marks the fifth of his 17 No. 1s to ring up four or more frames on top. His longest-leading hit, "You Proof," reigned for 10 weeks beginning in October 2022. It's tied for the longest command in the chart's 35-year history with Nate Smith's "World on Fire" (2023-24). ●

RANKINGS

Country Airplay is ranked by total audience impressions for the week ending Sunday based on monitored airplay by Mediabase of 145 stations by Luminate. Audience totals on the chart are derived, in part, using certain Nielsen Audio-copyrighted Persons 12+ audience estimates (under license © 2025, Nielsen Audio). The list of all Country Airplay chart reporters can be viewed in Luminate's online platform.

TIES

On Country Airplay, if two songs are tied in audience, the song with the larger increase in audience is placed first.

BULLETS

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles gaining audience or remaining flat from the previous week. A song will also receive a bullet if its percentage loss in audience does not exceed the percentage of monitored station downtime for the format. Titles that decline in audience but increase in detections will also receive a bullet if the total audience erosion for the week does not exceed 3%.

RECURRENTS

On Country Airplay, descending titles below No. 10 in either audience or detections are moved to recurrent after 20 weeks, provided that they are not still gaining enough audience points to bullet or if they rank below No. 10 and post a third consecutive week of (non-bulleted) audience decline, regardless of total chart weeks. Plus, songs that ascend to a peak between Nos. 1 and 5 will remain on the chart for one additional week even if dropping below No. 10.

HOT SHOT DEBUT

Awarded to the highest-ranking new entry on Country Airplay.

MOST INCREASED AUDIENCE

Most Increased Audience on Country Airplay lists the songs with the greatest week-to-week increases in total audience.

AIRPOWER

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles ranking inside top 20 in plays and audience rankings for the first time, with increases in both plays and audience.

BREAKER

Awarded on Country Airplay to titles achieving airplay (at least one detection) at 60% of reporting stations for the first time.

WILSON SET TO 'PARTY' AGAIN

After winning season 13 of *The Masked Singer* on May 7, **Gretchen Wilson** tells *Billboard* she's ready to crank things up again with an all-star *Here for the Party* reboot after being sidelined by a run of serious health issues.

"I had some post-COVID health stuff," she said during her *Masked Singer* exit interview. "I'm a long-hauler. I've got medications I'll have to take for the rest of my life—high blood pressure, asthma. These are all things I didn't have right before COVID."

Wilson also shattered a leg and an ankle in a freak accident at a wedding, confining her to a wheelchair and cast for eight months.

She is working on a reimagined version of her 2004 album, *Here for the Party*, featuring duets on each track. Participants thus far include **Travis Tritt** and **Chapel Hart**. Wilson, who was a presenter at the Academy of Country Music Awards on May 8, hopes her *Masked Singer* victory will create momentum for the project.



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45 Years Ago

Emmylou Harris' 'Still Waters' Made Waves

In 1980, the celebrated artist earned her fourth Hot Country Songs No. 1

On May 10, 1980, **Emmylou Harris** "Beneath Still Waters" left all competitors in its wake, hitting No. 1 on *Billboard*'s Hot Country Songs chart.

The song, authored by **Dallas Frazier** and produced by **Buddy Killen**, was released from Harris' album *Blue Kentucky Girl*. It became her fourth of seven Hot Country Songs No. 1s among 27 top 10s logged in 1975-89.

Harris was born April 2, 1947, into a military family stationed in Birmingham, Ala. She attended Gar-Field High School in Woodbridge, Va., and graduated as the class valedictorian. Although she won a scholarship to the University of North Carolina, she was headed toward music and eventually moved to New York, where she honed her skills in the fledgling folk music scene.

Influenced by country-rock pioneer **Gram Parsons**, Harris built a successful career in commercial country music. Her achievements include inductions into the Alabama Music Hall of Fame (2003) and the Country Music Hall of Fame (2008). Now 78, she still performs and will be on the road this summer. On July 29, she'll appear at Tanglewood in Lenox, Mass., with **Graham Nash**.
