

s I am writing an article for All India War Cry for the month of October, I came across the life of David Brainerd (1718–1747), a young American missionary whose short but impactful life left a lasting legacy in Christian history. Born on April 20, 1718, and lost his breath on 9th October 1747. Though he lived 29 years and served only for 4 years, he left an impactful life and legacy. This would be worth reading. Nowadays, we are praying and waiting upon the Lord's blessing and His guidance for our officers. As many officers of the Salvation Army are travelling to attend the National Officer Councils in Chennai, let the life of David Brainerd be a model and inspiration for us.

In 1739, Brainerd entered Yale University to prepare for ministry. However, his time there was turbulent. He contracted tuberculosis, which plagued him for the rest of his life, and was expelled in 1742 for making a private remark about a tutor's lack of spiritual grace. Despite efforts by prominent figures like Jonathan Edwards to have him reinstated, Yale refused, prompting Brainerd to pursue missionary work instead.

Licensed to preach by the "New Lights," a group of evangelical Presbyterians,

Brainerd was commissioned by the Society in Scotland for Propagating Christian Knowledge to minister to Native American tribes. He began his mission in 1743 at Kaunaumeek, a Mohican settlement near Albany, New York. Living in harsh conditions, he endured loneliness, illness, and physical hardship, yet remained committed to his calling.

Brainerd later ministered to the Delaware Indians in Pennsylvania and New Jersey. His work at Crossweeksung, New Jersey, was particularly fruitful, where he helped establish a Native American Christian community with over 130 members. His health deteriorated rapidly due to tuberculosis. In 1746, he moved to the home of Jonathan Edwards in Northampton, Massachusetts, where he was cared for by Edwards' daughter, Jerusha. Brainerd died on October 9, 1747, at the age of 29.

Brainerd's legacy was cemented by Jonathan Edwards, who published An Account of the Life of the Late Reverend Mr. David Brainerd in 1749, based on Brainerd's journals. This biography inspired generations of missionaries, including William Carey, Jim Elliot, and Adoniram Judson. His life also influenced the founding of institutions like Princeton and Dartmouth Colleges, which aimed to

continue his mission of education and evangelism.

Though his life was brief, David Brainerd's unwavering faith, sacrificial service, and spiritual writings continue to inspire Christians worldwide. His story is a testament to the power of dedication, even in the face of suffering.

As I am reading this great life of the servant of God, let's get an inspiration on how much we may live and do for the extension of his kingdom. Through 29 years of life, 4 years of ministry 130 converts and many missionaries being inspired by his life.

Encouraging spiritual, emotional, and intellectual growth through discipleship and study. Spiritual Growth will help them to deepening relationship with God through prayer, worship, and reading the Scripture. Bible Study group, personal devotions and spiritual mentorship is needed to grow in the Lord. "But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To him be glory both now and forever! Amen." 2 Peter 3:18

Grace: For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God. Ephesians 2:8-9. Teaching the power of God's grace to them will bring great confidence and compassion. Helping individuals understand their identity in Christ. The Christ brought assurance of Salvation, Freedom from shame and sin, boldness in prayer and service.

Gospel: Preaching the gospel is very important to bring change holistically. Inspiring them to share the Good News

boldly in their communities and beyond. Empowering through gospel to overcome fear, stress and speak with clarity. Generation: Raising a generation of young women who lead with integrity, purpose, and biblical wisdom. Encourage the next generation to adopt and nurture a strong faith. Teaching them about God's love, grace, and promises which can build a foundation that they will rely on throughout their lives. We should share stories of faith, we can inspire them to seek a personal relationship with their Creator. This spiritual connection with God and Holy spirit will guide them to face every challenge and reminding them they are never alone. Hebrew 13:5 says I will never leave you nor for sake you. God is always with generations to generations.

As 5G technology connects the world, biblical knowledge connects girls to their identity in Christ, their purpose, and their calling. Let's invest in this generation God's Girls so they can rise up as leaders, teachers, and changemakers rooted in the Word.

GENDER EQUITY:

A STEP TOWARDS BALANCE ROLE IN THE FAMILY AND MINISTRY

ighlighting from my previous article in the India war cry some years back the topic 'Gender Equity in Christian Ministry' was written like this - In the majority of Indian context and culture, we may still consider it a challenge to give equal status or position to women compared to what is being given to men. In such scenario, we need to take it as a challenge to get women involved and occupy the same level as that of men. But the other thing we need to consider is that, in order to accomplish the tasks that lie ahead of us, for both men and women, we need sincere commitment and full reliance upon the Lord. Also, we must be responsible and accountable to the responsibilities that we are given. The question is: are we ready?

A recent poll thar I conducted in our women officers WhatsApp group on gender equity revealed encouraging insights into how equality is perceived and practiced in various areas of life. Among 187 members the highest number of respondents i.e. 74 affirmed that they enjoy equal opportunities in the ministry, this is encouraging, yet it also highlighting that there are still genderbased barriers still exist within the ministry and in our leadership roles. However, there are still women who are individually called by God continue to face fewer opportunities to participate and often accept themselves a secondary position subjectively to stand besides men.



EQUALITY

Financial equity has also emerged strongly with 69 participants stating that both partners access their bank account. This indicates that transparency and shared responsibility in managing family resources may need to be reviewed. Similarly, less than 50% of the group members noted that household finance has been managed by them, this highlights the need for trustbased partnership in the family role. Additionally, 65 respondents agreed that both voices are heard equally in the ministry as well as within their relationship. These finding underscores the importance of mutual respect and open communication in home and community.

Overall, the poll reflects that within the Salvation Army in India, there is steady progress towards gender equity. Nevertheless, continued dialogue and practical actions continues to be necessary to ensure fairness in every sphere. Gender equity is not just equal access, equal platform or equal opportunities. In order to function efficiently, it requires shared responsibility, respect and collaboration between partners.

Gender equity not only focus on developing women, but it also involves men and women receiving equal opportunity. Unlike gender equality, gender equity may require different treatment to different people. We must do better, and we can! In giving support to







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everyone based on their unique circumstance, we can ensure that every person is equally valued in our ministry, family role and workplace. Let every voice be heard and respected for each of us deserve fairness and equal treatment according to one's own needs.

Gender equity is not about competing roles but complementing one another in love, in dedication and in services. In family it nurtures harmony and provides shared growth. In the ministry it strengthens every area of our mission in serving humanity, personal development, building confidence to create more capabilities. Where there is a healthy mission automatically growth follows.

Embracing gender equity in the ministry will lead us to inclusive leadership, where both men and women bring unique perspective, compassion and strength that will enrich our work. We need to learn to utilize God's given gift to all individual. We may preach and teach the parable of the talents, illustrating the importance of using one's gift and abilities for God's purpose. Let us also give more space and opportunity to come out with the talent and potentials which is unconsciously hidden within some people.

Ultimately a balance role in family and ministry help us to reflect the reality of God's design for unity, respect and shared purpose. There is no boundary in God's grace!

There is no discrimination when the Bible declares how much we are valued in 1Peter2;9 which says - 'But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation God's special possession, that you may declare the praise of him who called you out of darkness in his wonderful light'

Jesus and the Dignity of Girls

2. Protection



Some Challenges Faced by Girls in India

India's girls face some of the most pressing challenges globally. Here are key issues that demand urgent attention:

1. Human Trafficking, Kidnapping & Missing Girls

According to the National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB) 2022:

172 girls go missing every day

170 girls are kidnapped daily; 3 are trafficked 62,099 girls were kidnapped or abducted in 2022

94,079 girls were reported missing

1,059 girls were identified as trafficking victims The highest cases were reported in West Bengal, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, Bihar, and Delhi

These figures reflect systemic vulnerabilities driven by poverty, domestic abuse, and lack of education.

2. Educational Disparities

Despite progress: Female literacy rate is 62.3%, compared to 80% for males

Only 3 out of 5 girls are enrolled in higher secondary education

3. Gender Inequality & Discrimination

Deep-rooted cultural barriers persist: Female foeticide and infanticide remain concerns Girls often receive less nutrition, healthcare, and education

Malnourishment is more common among girls due to son preference



4. Child Marriage

India has the highest number of child brides globally:

1 in 4 young women (23%) were married before age 18

Over 50% of child brides live in Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, West Bengal, Maharashtra, and Madhya Pradesh

5. Abuse, Exploitation & Violence

Girls are disproportionately affected by: Sexual abuse and domestic violence Child labour and forced domestic work Underreporting due to stigma and fear of dishonour

A Call to Action



THAT REFLECTS THE KINGDOM OF GOD

In this article, we are reminded that gender equity is not just a concern of society, but part of God's justice revealed through His Word.

Gender Equity: God's Justice in Action

Gender equity is one of the most important conversations in our world today. While the words equity and equality sound similar, they carry different meanings. Equality means treating everyone the same, but equity means ensuring fairness by recognizing different needs and removing barriers that prevent people from flourishing. True equity ultimately leads to equality.

Origin of the Idea

The roots of gender equity are not new. From the beginning of creation, God established the value of both male and female: "So God created mankind in His own image, in the image of God He created them; male and female He created them" (Genesis 1:27). In God's design, men and women share equal dignity, worth, and responsibility. Sadly, over centuries, many cultures created systems where women had fewer opportunities, less voice, and little recognition. The call for gender equity is, therefore, not just a social demand but a spiritual reminder to restore God's original plan.

The Present Situation

Across the world today, progress has been made, but challenges remain. In many communities, girls still do not have equal access to education. Women often face lower wages for the same work. In leadership and decision-making spaces - whether in governments, workplaces, or churches - men continue to dominate. At the same time, women bear heavier responsibilities in caring for families.

Yet there are encouraging signs of change. Nations are creating policies for maternity and paternity leave, workplaces are providing safe environments, and schools are ensuring equal access for girls and boys. Global voices like Malala Yousafzai remind us of the power of education for girls. When women are supported and empowered, entire families and societies are lifted.

Examples from the Bible

The Bible itself shows us powerful examples of gender equity in action. Deborah (Judges 4-5) was chosen by God as a prophetess and judge, leading Israel with wisdom and courage at a time when women were rarely given such roles. For The Salvation Army, gender equity is part of our mission. Our work with women's ministries, education, health care, and leadership training continues to break barriers. Every time we provide space for women to learn, serve, and lead alongside men, we reflect God's justice.

Conclusion

Gender equity is not only a social responsibility but a spiritual calling. As followers of Christ, we are invited to create spaces where women and men can stand side by side, serving God with equal dignity. By practising fairness and support in our families, churches, and communities, we bring the light of God's Kingdom into the world.

May we, as Salvationists, continue to live out this truth—standing side by side, men and women together, reflecting the light of Christ in the world.

THE STORY OF RISING FROM TESTIMONY TO LEADERSHIP IN ISJG

nd what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God. Micah: 6:8

I never imagined that my small, personal journey would one day connect me to something far greater than myself. I grew up believing that my voice was too small to make a difference. But being a 16-year-old girl back then I always wanted to do something bigger and greater which no other girl of my age does. There were times when I questioned my purpose and wondered if my story ever mattered.

But God was gently writing something bigger, and I began to see that my journey was not just about me- it was about being part of his greater plan. My story was not just a testimony of survival, but of calling. God was showing me that he places each of us where we are for a reason. That realization opened doors I never expected- to speak up, to step out and to connect with others who shared the same passion.

This journey led me to the International Social Justice Girls (ISJG) which is a part of the International Social Justice Commission (ISJC), the Salvation Army's voice at the United Nations. This gave me a framework to understand that the cries for fairness, dignity and equality around the world are not distant issues but part of God's heart for his people.

It showed me that speaking up is an act of faith and justice is a form of worship. But the place where my heart truly found a home was with the International Social Justice Girls (ISJG). Here, I am no longer just one girl with a testimony - I was part of a global sisterhood. ISJG is a movement of young women from different cultures, languages and backgrounds who share one heartbeat: to stand for justice, to raise our voices and to believe boldly in change.

This space helped me learn from one another, encourage each other and act together. This year marks my second year with ISJG and the journey has been nothing short of life- changing. I now serve as the Vice Chair Mentee and as part of the leadership team of ISJG. Stepping into this role has shown me that leadership is not about titles, but about listening, encouraging and creating space for other girls' voices to be heard.

It has been both humbling and empowering to grow alongside such an inspiring community. Through ISJG, I have seen the power of girls rising. Whether it is leading workshops in schools and churches or simply starting conversations that matter, we are proving that young women can be a force for transformation. ISJG taught me that even the smallest action -when rooted in faith can ripple outwards to touch lives across the world.

n observance of the International Day Against Human Trafficking, The Salvation Army India South-Western Territory conducted the Blue Heart Campaign on July 27, 2025, across the territory. The campaign aimed to raise awareness about Human Trafficking through a series of impactful activities including rallies, awareness classes, seminars, public meetings, indoor gatherings, sessions with women's self-help groups (Kudumbashree), and community outreach programs.

transformative three-day Child Protection Training was held from June 10 to 12, 2025, at the CNI Diocesan Centre, Khaybar House, Dalhousie. The event brought together 30 dedicated delegates from various Corps, Divisions, and the Territorial Headquarters of India Northern Territory, all committed to strengthening child safeguarding practices within The Salvation Army.

The training was led by Captain Charles Chalrimawia, Zonal Child Protection Specialist, who guided participants through a comprehensive curriculum rooted in The Salvation Army's International Child Protection Policies. These policies are deeply grounded in biblical theology, emphasizing that child protection is not merely a legal or social obligation, but a sacred spiritual responsibility.

The theme of the training was inspired by Psalm 127:3 – "Children are a heritage from the Lord, offspring a reward from Him." This verse served as a powerful reminder of the divine value and dignity of every child.

Key Theological Foundations Explored:

- 1. Children are made in the image of God.
- 2. They are gifts from God.
- 3. They are developing beings.
- 4. They are dependent.
- 5. They are models of faith.
- 6. They are partners in mission.

Participants were introduced to the Global Strategic Framework for child protection and trained in practical approaches to safeguarding. Topics included preventing harm, responding appropriately to abuse, and implementing positive discipline. The



training emphasized the principles of awareness, response, and continuous improvement, equipping delegates with tools to create safer environments for children in all ministry contexts.

Engaging and Enriching Activities:

SEMINAR ON SUICIDE PREVENTION AWARENESS AT RED SHIELD GUEST HOUSE, KOLKATA, INDIA

transformative four-day seminar on Suicide Prevention Awareness was held from August 19–22, 2025, at the Red Shield Guest House, Kolkata. Centered around the theme "Changing the Narrative on Suicide," the event aimed to address





the pressing issue of suicide and its impact on individuals, families, and communities. The seminar was organized by Colonel (Dr.) Andrews Christian and Colonel Sunita Christian serving as National Executive Officer and National Secretary for Women's Development, respectively.

The seminar was inaugurated by Commissioner Mani Kumari Dasari, International Secretary for the South Asia Zone, IHQ, London, who served as the Chief Guest. Her presence underscored the importance of collaborative and faith-based approaches to mental health and suicide prevention. The opening ceremony featured a symbolic candle-lighting, led by the Chief Guest and resource persons, accompanied by a spiritually uplifting message: "Jesus said, "I am the Light of the World.' As followers of Christ, we carry His light to those in darkness."

Commissioner Mani Kumari delivered a



powerful keynote address, expressing gratitude to the General, Chief of Staff, and the World President of Women's Ministries for their support. She emphasized the integration of spiritual values with social responsibility, quoting Psalm 139:14 — "I praise you because I am fearfully and

- The Mind of the Suicidal, Mental Health vs. Mental Illness
- ▶ Panic Attacks, Self-Harm, and Psychological First Aid
- ▶ Dealing with Suicidal People and a Mock Session for practical application

A special segment titled Voice of Hope, led by Commissioner Mani Kumari Dasari, encouraged women officers to use their Godgiven voice to uplift others. Colonel Andrews Christian presented The Salvation Army's Perspective on Suicide Prevention, stressing that life is a sacred gift and urging delegates to respond with compassion and advocacy.



The Closing Session, themed "A Light Shines in the Darkness - The Legacy of Rahab," highlighted transformation and redemption. A vibrant Cultural Evening and City Exploration added a refreshing touch, celebrating Kolkata's heritage and fostering unity.

Feedback & Evaluation: 25 senior women leaders participated, leaving spiritually enriched and empowered. Commissioner Kumari's devotions inspired a renewed commitment to serve.

Conclusion: The seminar was a deeply impactful experience, blending practical training with spiritual insight. Delegates departed with renewed purpose—to be voices of hope and agents of change in suicide prevention.
