

As we celebrate Independence Day, we rightly remember the sacrifices made for our nation's freedom—freedom from colonial rule, oppression, and injustice. It



is a day of pride, gratitude, and reflection. Yet even as we rejoice in our political freedom, we must ask ourselves a deeper question: Are we truly free in our personal lives?

Today, many of us live in a new kind of bondage—not physical, but spiritual and emotional. Unlike the visible chains of the past, this modern bondage is subtle and often invisible. It shows up in the constant pull of our mobile phones, endless hours spent binge-watching television, or the grip of unhealthy habits like procrastination, fear, negativity, or addiction. These things, though seemingly harmless or even convenient, can quietly enslave our hearts and minds, drawing us away from God's purpose for our lives.

Modern bondage refers to the subtle ways we become captive to things meant to serve us. Technology, entertainment, and comfort are not inherently bad, but when they begin to dominate our lives, they rob us of our freedom, purpose, and peace. We were created to master these tools—not be mastered by them.

True freedom in Christ is not about rejecting technology or comfort but about living intentionally and reclaiming control over our choices. It means examining our habits and asking: Do these lead me toward God's best? Do they help me live a life of purpose, love, and service?

As we wave our flags and sing our anthems this Independence Day, let us also examine our hearts. Are we truly free? Or are we still bound by habits, distractions, and desires that keep us from God's best?

Let this Independence Day be more than a national celebration. Let it be a personal declaration of freedom. Freedom from fear. Freedom from addiction. Freedom from anything that holds us back from living the life Christ calls us to—a life of purpose, joy, and true spiritual freedom. As the scripture told in 2 Corinthians 3:17 "Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom".

elebrate 79th Independence day with strong spirit of unity in diversity, As we received freedom from British rule. Jesus came to this world to give freedom to each one of us. It teaches that true freedom comes from knowing and following Jesus, who reveals the truth about God and offers liberation from the bondage of sin. Christians are expected to live on the foundation of the Truth. When truth is our foundation, faith becomes not just a belief but a way of life that reflects the heart of God.

1. Truth Establishes the Faith: Truth is not optional in the life of faith but it is essential. Faith begins with knowing God, and that knowledge comes through truth. Scripture says, "Sanctify them by the truth; your word is truth" (John 17:17). The Word of God is not just informative

but it is transformative. It reveals God's character: His holiness, love, justice, and mercy. Without truth, our understanding of God becomes distorted, and our faith unstable. Jesus prays, "Sanctify them by the truth; Your word is truth." (John 17:17).

2. Truth is Anchor: "We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and steadfast". Hebrew 6:19. God is our anchor and encourages to believe and trust in His promises and remain steadfast

in trials, and find hope in the assurance of their salvation. Every believer called to anchor their lives in the truth of God's Word, allowing God to guide us in the midst of storms. In our personal, spiritual, or societal life truth is our anchor. Faith grounded in truth does not wave with emotion or circumstance. Samaritan woman was drawing water from a well, Jesus spoke to her the truth about her life which led her to come out of the fear of sin and brought the community to meet Jesus.

4. Truth Demands Integrity: Faith is not just belief—it is a way of life. When truth is our foundation, integrity becomes our expression. This verse highlights the protective and guiding nature of integrity. "May integrity and uprightness preserve me, for I wait for You." (Psalm 25:21). Recognizing:

Relationship:

Jeremiah's call is a direct and personal commission from God. Jeremiah expressed all the excuses for God's call, saying, "Ah, Lord GOD," I said, "I surely do not know how to speak, for I am only a child!" Jeremiah 1:6. A CALL TO CELEBRATE TRUE FREEDOM

s India prepares to celebrate its **79th Independence Day on August 15, 2025**, we reflect with gratitude on the 78 years of freedom we have enjoyed since the historic day in 1947. This freedom, hard-won through the sacrifices of countless brave souls, is a legacy we cherish deeply. Yet, as we honour our national liberty, we are also reminded of a greater, eternal freedom—the freedom from sin through Jesus Christ.

IN Remembering Our National Freedom

The journey to India's independence was long and arduous. The **First War of Independence in 1857** marked the beginning of a nationwide struggle against British rule. Though unsuccessful, it ignited a flame that would burn for decades. was on the road to Damascus persecuting Christians. The prodigal son was in a pig pen. Peter was in a boat fishing. Samaritan woman was drawing water from a well. Another woman found freedom when caught in adultery. A thief was on a cross of execution when Jesus set his soul free. Christ is the only one who can set us free to enjoy the life as a child of God instead of living as a slave of the world.

Freedom has a process:

Jesus identifies a process for experiencing true freedom with the words, "If then" The process should not be confused

> with a legalistic formula. He does not say, "If you have a daily quiet time with thirty minutes of prayer, tithe faithfully, and only miss Sunday School twice a year, then you can be free." While Jesus does not prescribe a formula, His words do reveal a way in which things operate in His

kingdom. For example, you are free to watch the sun rise each morning, but you must do two things to see it. You must get up early in the morning, and you must face east. If you sleep until ten o'clock and look west, you will miss the sunrise even though you are free to watch

REDEEMED FOR FREEDOM

t is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery." Galatians 5:1

On August 15th, we celebrate Independence Day, a powerful reminder of our nation's liberation from colonial rule. It is a day to honour the sacrifices of countless freedom fighters who paid the price for our political freedom. Their courage and vision gave birth to a sovereign nation where we could live with dignity and hope.

But freedom is not just a historical event—it is a living reality that must be protected and extended to all. The theme of "redemption" reminds us that true freedom often comes at a cost. Just as our national heroes paid the price for our liberty, the Bible tells us that Jesus Christ paid the ultimate price to redeem humanity from spiritual bondage (1 Corinthians 6:20) as well as from all types of Physical slavery. When we were all under the bondage of sin and living in darkness, Jesus came into the world, shed His blood on the cross to pay the ransom for our freedom, was buried, rose again, and ascended into heaven. In the ancient world, a ransom was a payment made to redeem someone and secure their freedom. (Romans 6:17, Romans 5:12Galatians 3:13, Colossians

The word "redemption" originates from the Latin term redemption, meaning "a buying back" or "a ransoming." It is derived from the verb redeemer, which combines re-(meaning "back" or "again") and emere (meaning "to buy" or "to take").

The verse mentioned above is derived from the Epistle of Paul to the churches in the region of Galatia, written around 50-57 AD. Paul wrote this letter in response to two major concerns.

On one hand, the people of Galatia were living under the oppressive rule of the Roman Empire. They bore the economic burden of supporting the Roman army and its legal system. The sale of slaves was common, and while a few individuals held power and land, the majority—peasants, labourers, humble artisans, and slaves—lived in poverty and marginalisation. Cattle rearing was a primary

means of livelihood, but it offered little relief to the suffering masses.

On the other hand, some Jewish Christians insisted that Gentile converts must observe the Mosaic Law, including circumcision, to be fully accepted by God. In his epistle, Paul strongly emphasized that the sacrifice of Christ had set believers free—not only from the Mosaic Law but also from governmental oppression and all forms of slavery. His message was one of spiritual liberation and equality through faith in Christ.

Today, though we are celebrating Independence Day in India and preach the gospel of redemption and freedom to the entire world, but still millions remain in bondage:

Over 27 million people are currently subjected to human trafficking worldwide Human trafficking continues to exploit vulnerable men, women, and children for labour and sex. This includes forced labour, sex trafficking, and other forms of exploitation. Forced labour is the most common, especially in sectors like agriculture, construction, domestic work, and manufacturing. Forced labour and debt bondage trap people in cycles of poverty and abuse. Domestic workers, migrant labourers, and factory workers in many parts of the world face inhumane conditions and lack basic rights. Sex trafficking disproportionately affects women and girls, though men and boys are also victims. Child Trafficking: Children make up a significant portion of trafficking victims, often exploited for labour, begging, or sexual purposes.

These are the modern "yokes of slavery" that Paul warned against. Just as in Galatia, Christ's message remains profoundly relevant today: "He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour" (Luke 4:18–19). This declaration, often referred to as the Nazareth Manifesto, outlines Jesus' mission on earth—a mission of liberation, justice, and restoration.

The "year of the Lord's favour" refers to a time when everyone is equally valued,

and all people enjoy their God-given dignity, rights, and freedom. It is a vision of a just society where no one is enslaved, marginalised, or forgotten.

While many of us today enjoy the blessings of freedom, millions of our brothers and sisters remain trapped in modern slavery and human trafficking. This reality calls us to action. As followers of Christ, we are not only recipients of His redemption—we are also called to continue His mission: to set the captives free.

To continue Jesus' Mission The salvation Army has responded and addressed the issues of Modern Slavery and Human Trafficking from 1865. The Salvation Army officially launched its "Fight for Freedom" strategy—an international response to modern slavery and

STILL SINGLE?:

A REMINDER FOR WAITING HEART!

t was about to rain just after we finished our Holiness meeting. My sister and I were in a hurry to reach home before the weather turned worse. As we stepped out church gate, two middle-aged women, probably in their late 50s or early 60s, stopped us unexpectedly. Without any proper introduction, one of them directly asked, "Have you started seeing anyone lately?" Taken aback, she continued, "Are you by any chance looking for an opportunity to meet someone?" I managed a smile and said, "Not sure." No body would be sure of meeting someone after church without plans. I was only sure of cooking butter chicken and rice that day after church.

And before I could even process my discomfort, they offered to visit our house with a potential match on the very same day, someone I had never heard of, never asked about.

Trying to keep calm, I responded, "I'm really not sure about this." Then, to understand who they were and where this was all coming from, I asked, "May I know your name and where you are from?" Aunties laughed and without telling their name went off.

In a world that defines success by milestones, a good career, marriage by a certain age, children, or social status, it's easy for even the most faithful believer to feel "behind" or "incomplete." Questions like "When will you settle down?" or "Still single?" often come from well-meaning people, but they carry an assumption: that something is missing.

But what if nothing is missing?

Our churches are still very much part of the society we live in. People's minds are often shaped by cultural expectations and to some extent, we Christians (Christ followers) do understand where they're

As followers of Christ, our identity is not anchored in societal timeliness, but in the finished work of Jesus. Colossians 2:10 reminds us, "And in Christ you have been brought to fullness." The world may suggest you're lacking something, but scripture says you're already complete.

Marriage is seen as the right thing to do, especially when done at the right time. And yes, marriage is a beautiful covenant, designed by God. I don't dismiss that. But sometimes, in our effort to do what's "right," we forget that timing is God's, not ours. That being single doesn't mean being incomplete.

A book I am currently reading titled Lady in Waiting by Jackie Kendall & Debby Jones gave me a new perspective of being single and highly recommended

to anyone who has started facing questions like still single? Not married yet? Don't be so picky! statements from people woman when she around.

> Whether you're single, married, waiting, grieving, or growing in God; faith means letting go of your own script and allowing God to write His.

"Singleness is an enviable condition. An unmarried woman has something that married woman gives up on her wedding day: extra time for Jesus." - Enviable Singleness is an excerpt from Lady in Waiting.

Marriage is a beautiful gift, a sacred covenant designed by God (Genesis 2:24), but it is not a prerequisite for purpose. The Apostle Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 7:34, "An unmarried woman or virgin is concerned about the Lord's affairs; her aim is to be devoted to the Lord in both body and spirit." He doesn't

diminish marriage but he rather elevates singleness as an opportunity for undivided devotion.



SACRED STILLNESS IN THE STORM

ugust is here. The monsoon clouds are heavy over many parts of India. For some, rain brings relief; for others, it brings flooding, muddy paths, and cancelled meetings. Life does not always move smoothly. Storms – both in weather in our hearts – come suddenly, without warning. But in the middle of this, the Lord speaks a gentle but powerful command: "Be still, and know that I am God." – Psalm 46:10. In these months leading up to Christmas, as the world slowly turns its attention towards year-end gatherings, shopping, and celebration, I want to invite you to pause. To be still. Not just physically, but deep in your heart, where God can meet you.

Growing Up in Faith

I was born and raised in India in a family that loved the Salvation Army deeply. My grandparents were simple, yet their dedication to the mission of the Salvation Army was strong. Their worship extended far beyond music and clapping; it was a life poured out in service. They visited the sick, helped the poor, and supported officers financially, often quietly, without telling anyone. They believed it was their offering to God. My grandfather was a local corps secretary, a man of strong faith and simple living. When our small church in the village needed renovation, he did not just collect donations, but he gave from his own pocket. The church wall was built so close to our home that it was almost part of it. In fact, the church's heartbeat could be heard in our living room. That wall carried not just bricks, but generations of prayers, sermons, and Sunday School songs.

I moved to Australia in 2006, but those memories are still fresh. When I visit my hometown and walk into that church, I can still feel the presence of God. I remember sitting on the dusty wooden bench, singing Gujarati Salvation Army songs with my grandfather. I didn't understand the depth of those words back then. But now, as life has brought its share of storms, I realise how deeply those songs and scriptures were shaping me for the battles ahead.

When Grief Hit Us

In 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic turned the world upside down. One morning, I woke up at 4 AM for a work. I checked my phone and saw a flood of condolence messages. My father-in-law, and a Salvation Army officer, had suddenly been promoted to glory due to a cardiac arrest. My heart sank. In our home in Australia, my wife and I sat on the couch, eyes fixed on a

phone screen. We were watching his funeral on Facebook. Thousands of kilometres away, in India, our family was gathered, grieving together. And here we were—helpless, silent, and heartbroken. We wanted to be there, to hug our loved ones, to honour the man who had served God so faithfully. But borders were closed, planes were grounded, and the only thing that filled our living room was silence.

It was one of the darkest storms in our lives. But even in that darkness, God whispered to us through Psalm 46:10 — "Be still, and know that I am God." Being still didn't mean doing nothing. It meant trusting God when I couldn't understand what was happening. It meant sitting in the sorrow, not running from it, and letting Jesus hold us close. It meant remembering that even when our hearts break, God is still on the throne. He is still good.

Sacred Stillness in Everyday Life

When we hear the word stillness, we often think of silence or meditation. But the stillness God invites us into is something deeper. It's the stillness that comes from knowing that He is in control — even when the world is not. This kind of sacred stillness is not easy to find in today's India — or anywhere in the world. There is too much noise. Mobile phones buzzing. Traffic honking. Social media shouting. News headlines that leave us breathless.

Yet in the middle of this, Jesus still calls out to His children: "Come away with me... be still... know Me." My parents still live in India, continuing the legacy my grandparents started. Our corps is small, but our faith is big. Many times, throughout the year, my parents host thanksgiving meetings at their house. They invite officers, cook food, prepare songs, offer small gifts — all for the joy of serving Jesus. Even in their retirement age, they choose to serve others rather than sit. But I know — and they know — that the strength to serve comes from quiet time with God. They pray together and attend the church faithfully. These are small things, but they are sacred. That stillness with God becomes their fuel.

Jesus in the Storm

In Mark 4, when Jesus calmed the storm, the disciples were terrified. The boat was filling with water. They shouted, "Teacher, don't You care if we drown?" Jesus stood up and said, "Quiet! Be Still!" And the storm stopped immediately.

Today, Jesus is still saying those words over your life. Whether you are facing grief, financial

stress, illness, or just the overwhelming busyness of life — He is present. He does not shout. He whispers. And His voice calms the storm. We do not have to wait until December to find peace. We do not need to be in a big worship meeting to experience stillness. We can meet Jesus even now, in the quiet corners of our homes, in early morning walks, in whispered prayers in the kitchen, or in the tired silence of a long day.

One Step at a Time

As we move from August towards the Christmas season, let us take this theme of stillness with us. Before the lights, before the decorations, before the loud carols — let us take time to be still before the Lord.

Ask yourself:

- · Have I made space for Jesus in my daily life?
- \cdot Am I running so fast that I have no time to listen to His voice?
- · What is one simple way I can retreat into God's presence this month?

This August, take one step. Maybe it's waking up 15 minutes early to read a Psalm. Maybe it's turning off your phone for one hour each evening. Maybe it's just sitting quietly and thanking Jesus for His presence, even if you don't have the words.

Let that stillness become a holy ground. Let that silence prepare you for the joy that is coming, not just the joy of Christmas, but the joy of Emmanuel - God with us.

In storms, we often search for safety, answers, or a way out. But sometimes, God does not remove the storm. Instead, He invites us into His peace within it. That peace — that sacred stillness — becomes our testimony. And as we journey towards December, let us carry that testimony in our hearts. Let the stillness speak louder than the storm.
