


Honoring the Past, Teaching the Present, Preparing the Future Wednesday Edition - Camp Constitution 2011

Three Dimensional Leadership For A Renewed America by Mr. Earl Wallace. A Review by The Roving Reporter

Mr. Earl Wallace is an organizational engineer. Some key points from his class are as follows.

A three-dimensional leader concentrates his/her efforts in primarily three areas: Mission, Resource, Context.

Mr. Wallace used these three points of emphases to help guide our lives as 1) God's people; 2) as good citizens of this great nation.

Mr. Wallace gave us some biblical examples of three kinds of leaders from Scripture. Samson was a one-dimensional leader (I-D). Samson was interested in selfish endeavors; he forgot his mission. He used his resource of good looks and strength, but not in the right context. (Ref Judges 13-16).

The Prophet Samuel was given as an example of a twodimensional leader (II-D). He had good skills but he did not understand the mission. II-D leaders tend to empower the wrong people. Deborah, the Judge, was an example of a threedimensional (III-D) leader. She understood the mission which was God's mission. She rallied the Israelites, empowered Barak. She knew which details mattered and served no special interest groups. (Ref Judges 4).

Mr. Wallace taught us what our Founding Fathers knew: Our inalienable rights are secured through the Ten Commandments (also called the Divine Decologue). The first four Commandments guide our relationship with God; the fifth through tenth Commandments guide our relationship with each other. (Ref. Exodus 20: 1-17). (We were challenged to live by The Ten Commandments).In summation of "Restore America by 3-Dimensional Leadership"- Be! Know! Do! Love God! Obey His Word! Live the Life!

Uncle Sam Facts

The Uncle Sam House - Museum in Mason, NH was the featured field trip today, Wednesday. Everybody knows Uncle Sam, but few know his origins and the man behind the symbol.

- * Samuel Wilson (1766-1854) was born in Menotomy, (now Arlington, MA).
- * When Samuel was 4 yrs old, he attended the funerals of the victims of the Boston Massacre.
- * Edward Wilson, Samuel's father, participated in the Boston Tea Party.
- * When Samuel was 8 yrs old, he witnessed the midnight ride of Paul Revere.
- * During the War for Independence, Samuel was used as a messenger by the Committee of Safety.
- * When Samuel was 14, his father Edward sold the farm in Menotomy, MA and bought a 100 acre farm in Mason, NH.
- * Samuel left Mason with his brother in February 1789 to make his fortune in Troy, NY. It took them 15 days of walking in the cold to reach Troy.
- * Samuel returned to Mason to marry. He later returned to Troy.
- Wilson was one of the pioneers who turned Troy into a fluorishing city.

He died in Troy in 1854.
