



HAMILTON DEAD AT 49

FOLDING ★ THE ★ FLAG

To properly fold the U.S. Flag, follow these steps:


- 1. Two people face each other, each holding one end of the flag. Stretch it horizontally at waist height and fold in half lengthwise.
- 2. Fold the flag in half lengthwise again; the union (blue field) should be on the outside with edges held together.
- 3. One person holds the flag by the union while the other starts at the opposite end by making a triangular fold.
- 4. Continue to fold in triangles until the flag resembles a cocked hat with only the blue field showing. ★





The Duel: July 11, 1804

Facing each other 10 paces apart, each armed with a .56-caliber flintlock pistol. At the appropriate command each duelist raised his arm and fired his pistol. Hamilton fired high and to the right, completely missing the mark. Burr's round entered Hamilton's stomach, shattered a rib, and tore through his liver and diaphragm, coming to rest in a lumbar vertebra. The duel was the culmination of a long and bitter rivalry between the two men. Burr shot and mortally wounded Hamilton, who was carried to the home of William Bayard on the Manhattan shore, where he died the next day.★

The Curious Fate Of Stonewall Jackson's Arm

June 28, 201212:01 AM ET About hour outside Washington, Chancellorsville, Va., lies one of Gen. Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson's graves. A major Civil War battle was fought here in 1863. That's when Jackson was accidentally shot by his own Confederate troops. As Park Ranger Chuck Young tells a group of visitors, Jackson



didn't die here — but his left arm was amputated. "Both of these doctors had performed that procedure literally hundreds, if not thousands of times by this point in the war," Young says. Jackson's arm was about to be tossed on the pile of limbs outside the medical tents — until his military chaplain decided to save it. "Remembering that Jackson was the rock star of 1863 — everybody knew who Stonewall was, and to have his arm just simply thrown on the scrap pile with the other arms, Rev. Lacy couldn't let that happen," Young says. So the arm was buried in a private cemetery at Ellwood Manor, not far from the field hospital where it was amputated. Soon after, Jackson died of pneumonia, and his body was sent to his family in Lexington, Va. But, Young says, Jackson's arm was never reunited with the rest of his remains.

"When Mrs. Jackson is informed that the arm was amputated and given a full Christian burial," Young says, "they asked her if she wants it exhumed and buried with the general. She declined, not wishing to disturb a Christian burial."

But that's not the end of the story. Despite Mrs. Jackson's wishes, the general's arm was not left alone. Union soldiers dug it up in 1864. They said they reburied it; no one knows where.

In 1903, one of Jackson's staff officers set up a granite stone in the small cemetery. It's unclear if the stone marks the exact location of the arm, or if it indicates that the burial happened somewhere in the area.

Some believe the arm was stolen decades ago, or secretly put into storage. But park historian Frank O'Reilly says these are rumors. "The safe thing for us to say here is that Jackson's arm was indeed buried there, is indeed buried there," O'Reilly says. ★

AARON ★ BURR ★ CONSPIRACY

July 11, 1804 - In a duel held in Weehawken, New Jersey, Vice President Aaron Burr fatally shot his long-time political antagonist Alexander Hamilton, first secretary of the treasury. A leading Federalist and the chief architect of America's political economy, Hamilton died the following day.

Background

Hamilton had opposed the candidacy of Burr in 1796 and 1800. In 1800, both Burr and Jefferson received 73 electoral votes for the presidency. Under the electoral procedure then president and prevailing. vice president were not voted for separately; the candidate who received the most votes was elected president, and the second in line, vice president. The vote went to the House Representatives. The House endured an incredible 35 tied votes. Alexander Hamilton, who supported Jefferson as the lesser of two evils, was instrumental in breaking the deadlock in favor of Jefferson.

The Duel

Burr sealed his political fate when he shot and killed Alexander Hamilton on July 11, 1804. He would never regain his former stature among New York's political elite.

Facing each other 10 paces apart, each armed with a .56-caliber flintlock pistol. At the appropriate command each duelist raised his arm and fired his pistol. Hamilton fired high and to the right, completely missing the mark. Burr's round entered Hamilton's stomach, shattered a rib, and tore through his liver and diaphragm, coming to rest in a lumbar vertebra. He died the next day. In death, Hamilton became a saint; Burr became a villain. Burr found it impossible to remain in the East. Politically and professionally he was finished in that part of the country.

Treason Out West

The Western Country and its equally hard-edged inhabitants, some of whom were separatists at heart, would provide Burr with a theater of operations for the next three years to implement a plan he had conceived.

Burr's plan originated when he was in the office of the vice president. Knowing that the British would favor a split Union, Burr approached Anthony Merry, a British minister plenipotentiary of His Majesty's government, with his proposal to split the Western territories from the East. On August 6, 1804, Merry wrote to Lord Harrowby at the Foreign Office that he had:

"just received an offer from Mr. Burr the actual vice president of the United States to lend his assistance to His Majesty's Government in any manner in which they may think to employ him, particularly in endeavoring to effect a separation of the Western part of the United States from that which lies between the Atlantic and the mountains (Alleghenies), in its whole extent."

In an attempt to realize his plan, Burr solicited the aid of General James Wilkinson, commander of the Army of the United States. He then met with members of the Mexican Association, a group of 300 or so prominent residents whose goal was to aid an invasion of Mexico. Perhaps he could enlist their help if it were to include Texas, then a province of the Spanish colony of Mexico.

Over the next year, Burr met again with Wilkinson and made concerted efforts to recruit former naval officers to his cause, including Stephen Decatur. He was unsuccessful, however he was able to recruit former assemblyman Comfort Tyler of New York, Colonel Julien de Pestre, a veteran of both French and British armies; and General Andrew Jackson, the future president of the United States.

Jackson was then commander of the West Tennessee Militia. Jackson, like so many others who favored Burr's designs on Mexico, apparently had no inkling of Burr's treasonous plans against the United States. Rumors reached Jackson. Had Burr deceived him? Jackson wrote to Governor William Claiborne, proclaiming his unswerving loyalty to the United States:

"I love my country and Government — I hate the Dons [Mexico's Spanish rulers] — I would delight to see Mexico reduced; but I will die in the last ditch before I would yield a foot to the Dons or see the Union disunited."

Plot Exposed

By 1806, the conspirators procured boats, men, and supplies and moved on to Natchez, Mississippi. But Wilkinson decided that it was in his best interest to bail out of the conspiracy.

On October 8, 1806, Wilkinson received a ciphered letter from Burr informing him that the campaign was underway. Wilkinson informed President Jefferson in a letter that he had discovered "a deep, dark, and wicked conspiracy" to attack New Orleans and separate West from East. He then assumed the patriot martyr's pose, assuring the president that

"I shall glory to give my life to the service of my country; for I verily believe such an event is probable."

The indictment against Burr as read at his trial on August 17, 1807 accused the former vice president of "being seduced by the instigation of the devil," and "intending to raise and levy war, insurrection, and rebellion against the said United States." Burr was acquitted by Chief Justice John Marshall, but the public had found him guilty despite the Supreme Court decision. He died on Sept. 14, 1836.*


