Greatest Thing Since Sliced Bread

The Incredible Bread Machine

This is a legend of success and plunder
And a man, Tom Smith, who squelched
world hunger.

Now, Smith, an inventor, had specialized
In toys. So, people were surprised

Cost less than people could believe.

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Sliced bread is a loaf of bread that has been sliced with a machine and packaged for convenience. It was first sold in 1928, advertised as "the greatest forward step in the baking industry since bread was wrapped". This led to the popular phrase "greatest thing since sliced bread".

Otto Frederick Rohwedder of Davenport, Iowa, United States, invented the first loaf-at-a-time bread-slicing machine. A prototype he built in 1912 was destroyed in a fire and it was not until 1928 that Rohwedder had a fully working machine ready. The first commercial use of the machine was by the Chillicothe Baking Company of Chillicothe, Missouri, which sold their first slices on July 7, 1928. Their product, "Kleen Maid Sliced Bread", proved a success. Battle Creek, Michigan, has a competing claim as the first city to sell bread sliced by Rohwedder's machine; however, historians have produced no documentation backing up Battle Creek's claim. The bread was advertised as "the greatest forward step in the baking industry since bread was wrapped."

St. Louis baker Gustav Papendick bought Rohwedder's second bread slicer and set out to improve it by devising a way to keep the slices together at least long enough to allow the loaves to be wrapped. After failures trying rubber bands and metal pins, he settled on placing the slices into a cardboard tray. The tray aligned the slices, allowing mechanized wrapping machines to function.

W.E. Long, who promoted the Holsum Bread brand, used by various independent bakers around the country, pioneered and promoted the packaging of sliced bread beginning in 1928. In 1930 Wonder Bread, first sold in 1925, started marketing sliced bread nationwide. ★ - wiki

"Yankee Doodle" — Who Owns the Song?

Independence Day brings out the "Yankee Doodle" in all of us. Most Americans have been singing this song since early childhood. It may be the most familiar tune in the world, with more parodies written to its melody than any other American folksong.

But is it truly 100 percent "American"?

The Origins of Yankee Doodle

The song has had a conflicted history on an emotionally-charged journey through nearly four centuries, with both the Dutch and the English claiming its origin.

English children sang the "Lucy Locket-Kitty Fisher" version, which once had politically charged overtones, whose meaning has been lost in the past.

When Cromwell and the Puritans ruled Not-So-Jolly Olde England in the 1600s, elites in opposition turned the respectable "Nancy Dawson" lyrics into "Nankey Doodle," deriding the Puritans' plain and simple attire, not to mention their strict religious piety.

"Doodle" meant an unsophisticated fool. "Macaroni" was a knot on a hat used to fasten a feather—an unheard of decoration for a 17th-century Puritan.

The Dutch who settled in New Netherland (New York) derided their Connecticut Puritans neighbors with such name-calling as "Janke," (a "Y" sounds for the "J"), which translated to "Johnny," their term for a New Englander. When coupled with "doodle," the secular Dutch used this term to hurl insults at their rigidly-religious neighbors to the east.

"Yankee Doodle" was clearly not a 17th century version of "Make New Friends."

Another Version from the French and Indian War

The dissonant overtones of lyrics hurled at the Puritans were mild compared to lyrics popularized during the French and Indian War. The King's military forces were ordered to fight beside the untrained, motley colonial militia. Dr. Richard Shuckburgh, an entertaining wit hired as a British army surgeon, has been credited to have composed new words to what everyone knew as the "Doodle-doo" marching song.

In his parody, a gullible Brother Jonathan had just enlisted, and acted like a dimwitted Yankee:

... 'And there I see a swamping gun
Large as a log of maple,
Upon a deuced little cart,
A load for father's cattle.
And every time they shoot it off,
It takes a horn of powder,
and makes a noise like father's gun,
Only a nation louder.

...I see a little barrel, too, the heads were made of leather,
They knocked on it with little clubs to call the men
together...

Dr. Shuckburgh had taught the Yankee fifers the tune before the colonials had heard the new words. Soon companies of unwitting "Jonathans" were awkwardly marching to the melody that brought deriding laughter from the redcoats — who already knew the meaning of the mocking lyrics.

Someone added another verse, comparing the Yankees who added feathers to their un-uniformed caps —

In fact, they went one better
They charged "monopoly!"
No muss, no fuss, oh woe is us,
Egad, they charged all three!

"Five years in jail," the judge then said.
"You're lucky it's not worse.
Robber Barons must be taught
Society Comes First!"

Now, bread is baked by government.
And as might be expected,
Everything is well controlled;
The public well protected.

True, loaves cost a dollar each.
But our leaders do their best.
The selling price is half a cent.
(Taxes pay the rest!) ★ -- - R W Grant

reminding the English of Macaronis, the notorious fops or dandies who wore outrageous garb and wigs, tossed French words into their speech, and ate foreign delicacies such as macaroni-pasta.

This is the version that has stuck for generations: Yankee Doodle came to town a-riding on a pony, Stuck a feather in his hat and called it Macaroni.

A New Parody: Lexington and Concord, 1775

So how DID “Yankee Doodle” become an iconic American folksong? On April 19, 1775 after the Battles of Lexington and Concord, the song was about to change hands — and voices.

Arrogant Lord Percy in his Charleston Headquarters had low expectations for the rebels’ resistance before dawn that morning. His 900 reinforcements marched to the “Yankee Song” as they headed toward Lexington, fully expecting to seize the day and hopefully capture the two “most wanted” rebel leaders— John Hancock and Samuel Adams—who reportedly were hiding out in that vicinity.

All the King’s Men would certainly receive their royal rewards if they could only deliver those two traitors to the infamous prison in the Tower of London. Or, perhaps, just their heads would do that honor.

Percy’s troops marched with militant precision while belting out new threatening verses that they hoped would intimidate any sort of revolt that might be hiding out within earshot:

Yankee Doodle came to town
For to buy a firelock,
We will tar and feather him,
And so we will John Hancock!

As for their king, that John Hancock,
And Adams, if they’re taken,
Their heads for signs shall hang up high,
Upon that hill called Beacon.

Before sunrise, Percy’s column entered Lexington. After their assessment of a small skirmish on the Village Green, they observed a handful of feisty but foolish farmers quickly retreat, tails between their limping legs. (No one thought infamously of “the shot heard ‘round the world” on that hot and muggy morning.)

The Brits then completed their sixteen-mile march into Concord, heard distant gunfire, and prepared to advance with bayonets sloped.

Imagine their horror and shock as they approached the Old North Bridge to see the entire hill on the opposite side covered with a motley mass of Minutemen. Stubbornly strong, muskets raised and pointed at the world’s best-trained army, these rebel “doodles” stood their ground. All were itching to use their trigger-happy fingers.

Each militia had heeded the secret command by the Sons of Liberty in Boston. Roused in the night by three galloping riders who cried the alarm, “The Regulars are coming!” en route to “every Middlesex village and farm,” the Minutemen then began to assemble for their orders to march by foot to Concord.

The intent of Percy’s troops was to seize the hidden arms and ammo stores in a coup that would stop the entire colonial rebellion in its tracks even before the first musket ball could be fired.

Americans saw things differently. The impending attack by their own King George III’s Army was in conflict with that Liberty endowed to them by God as British citizens. The rebels believed they had the right to protect what duly belonged to them—not to their possessive monarchy “across the pond.”

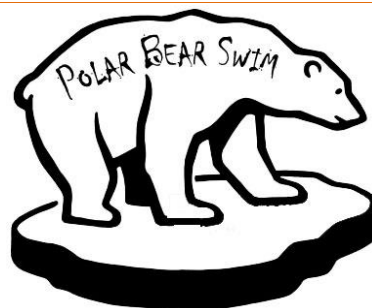
The first shots were fired, a few colonists and Redcoats fell. The King’s Regulars broke rank, fled in disarray, followed closely by the untrained, disjointed local militias. Percy’s men were in danger of being surrounded by hundreds of armed and determined Minutemen, an enemy they could not even see. ★ – Bonnie Wilder

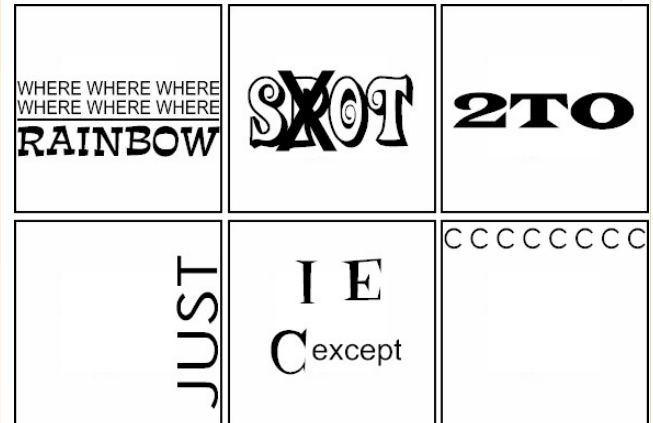

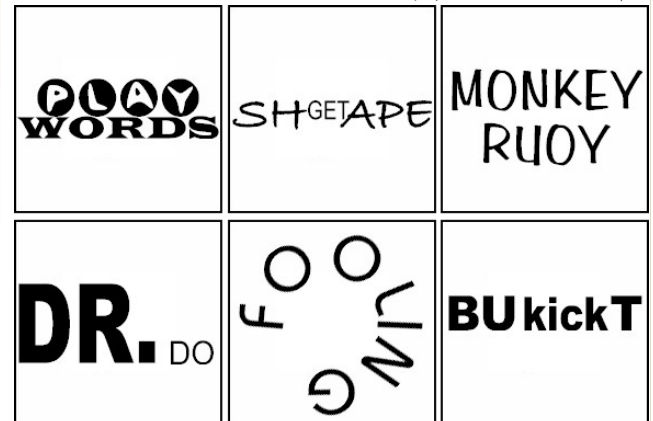

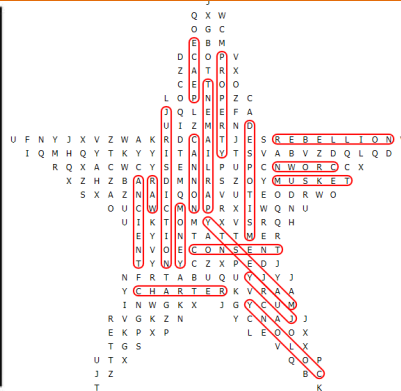
