

In 1928, Henry Weidenbach contracted Otto Van Dyk to build this home near Cranberry Lake on Whidbey Island. When the Navy					
bought out the surrounding property to construct an air field, Weidenbach moved the house to its present site in 1958. The back porch on the east facade was enclosed in 1939, and after the house was moved, this porch was extended further in 1962.					
The house is now owned by Weidenbach's daughter and her husband. All the windows have been changed with the exception of					
the upper gable window on the east facade, and the dormer window on the south facade.

The contraction of architectural expressions and methods of construction					

This property is significant under National Register criterion C, because it embodies the distinctive characteristics of architectural expressions and methods of construction that represent the period of community stabilization and economic slowdown (evidenced by simpler forms lacking ornamentation) and the theme of recreation and tourism (evidenced by structures built with natural materials set in scenic locations), from 1911 until 1945. It retains integrity of location, setting, materials, design, workmanship, feeling and association.
