Exterior features include 1/1 double-hung sash, single and multi-pane fixed sash, all with plain surrounds; 3-sided bay window on west facade; shed-roofed dormer on west facade; plain fascia board and frieze board; corner boards; low-pitched, shed-roofed porch supported by plain posts with deck above, on east facade; enclosed hip-roofed porch on east facade. Notable landscape features include 1 wood frame, square, hip-roofed storage building north of house; wood frame chicken house, garage, and two other outbuildings. 1995: One convibuting building and twee convibuting structures. Samuel Libbey's house was built on his Donation Claim, which he filed April 1, 1854. Libbey took 311 acres of land that were north of present day Libbey Road. His family joined him in 1859. He cleared his claim, selling the timber to the San Francisco market, and worked at his brother-in-law's store, more popularly known as Barstow's Store. Libbey held many public service positions such as County Treasurer and Auditor. The family lived on the claim for a year until Indian parties harassed them and they fled to Coveland. Eventually they returned to the farm, which was passed on to a son George. George farmed until 1904, when he and his wife Annie, retired to Penn Cove (Kennedy's Lagoon). 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This property is significant under National Register criterion A, for its association with early Euroamerican settlement in the Pacific Northwest and the Donation Land Claim Laws, in the period between 1850 and 1870.

This property is also significant under National Register criterion C, because it embodies the distinctive characteristics of architectural expressions and methods of construction that represent the period of early Euroamerican settlement in the Reserve beginning in the 1850s through 1870. It retains integrity of location. setting, materials, design, workmanship, feeling and association.



Continued: a number of owners until the Hansen's purchased the place in 1948. By this time, a guesthouse had been built (1932). In 1940, alterations had been made to the house, and the Hansen's have continued to make changes as their needs have changed.
