Exterior features include 1/1 double-hung sash; multi-pane fixed sash; exposed purlins and rafter ends; plain fascia board; plain frieze board; gable-roofed portico with vertical boards in pediment; battered posts; plain wood railing; side stairs; wood sill. Notable landscape features include 1 gable-roofed, wood-shingled outbuilding; roses growing up trellis on front porch. Pete Hockenbury lived in this house in the 1950's and willed it to the Masons. The date of the house is not known, but Hockenbury did extensive remodeling (40% interior) in 1948 and the Island County Assessor placed a new effective date of 1955 on the property. 1995: One contributing building and one contributing structure.

SIGNIFICANCE

This property is significant under National Register criterion C, because it embodies the distinctive characteristics of architectural expressions and methods of construction that represent the period of community stabilization and economic slowdown (evidenced by simpler forms lacking ornamentation) and the theme of recreation and tourism (evidenced by structures built with natural materials set in scenic locations), from 1911 until 1945. It retains integrity of location, setting, materials, design, workmanship, feeling and association.
