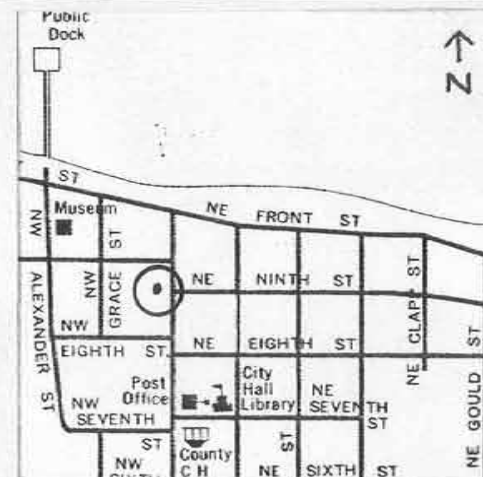

DESCRIPTION AND BACKGROUND HISTORY INCLUDING CONSTRUCTION DATE(S), PHYSICAL DIMENSIONS, MATERIALS, MAJOR ALTERATIONS, IMPORTANT BUILDERS, ARCHITECTS, ENGINEERS, ETC. Bungalow. Wood frame set on post and block/stone foundation; rectangle (20' x 30'); 3 bays wide; 1½-stories; wood shingle siding; wood-shingled gable roof; off-center entrance on east facade; exterior end chimneys on south, north facades. Exterior features include 1/1 double-hung sash; exposed rafter ends; plain fascia board; multi-pane enclosed porch across east facade; porch on west facade with latticework. Notable landscape features include 1 wood frame gable-roofed outbuilding connected to main house by covered walkway. This house was built by a local attorney and judge by the name of Lester Still. Judge Still, also a local land speculator, built upon the old Puget Sound Academy foundation. The Academy was conceived by the Congregational Church for advanced learning, as there were no high schools located in the lower Puget Sound region. The Foundation was moved to a site south of here. Dr. Earl F. Ristine bought the house from Judge Still, practicing medicine in the adjoining building on the west side. Flora A.P. Engle, who bought the house from Dr. Ristine, was a well-known local historian, a leading member of the Ladies of the Round Table organization, and a member of early pioneer families. She resided in the home from W.W.I until her death in 1936. The house was then sold to a Captain Vane, retired Army Officer from Fort Casey. SIGNIFICANCE This property is significant under National Register criterion C, because it embodies the distinctive characteristics of architectural expressions and methods of construction that represent the period of community stabilization and economic slowdown (evidenced by simpler forms lacking ornamentation) and the theme of recreation and tourism (evidenced by structures built with natural materials set in scenic locations), from 1911 until 1945. It retains integrity of location, setting, materials, design, workmanship, feeling and association.
