Wood frame set on post and block/ stone foundation; L-shape (26' x 30') with 1-story gable roof addition on west facade; 3 bays wide; 12-stories; clapboard siding; asphalt-shingled gable roof with center cross gable on east facade; center entrance on east facade; interior brick chimney. Exterior features include 4/4 double-hung sash with plain surrounds; gothic-style windows on 2nd story; molded boxed cornice; plain frieze board; corner boards; gothic-style door opens onto 2nd story porch with plain wood posts and railings: wood panel front door with sidelights. John Alexander, Jr. built this house in 1870 and sold it to Joseph Barstow Libbey in 1871. The kitchen wing on the west facade was added at a later. The structure originally had gothic-style barge board and finials on the gable ends, and decorative brackets on the porch. Although these decorative elements have been removed, the integrity of the house has not been lost. The house is still owned by a member of the Libbey family. 1995: One contributing structure and one contributing building.


