Queen Anne Church. Wood frame set on stone/concrete foundation; rectangle (30' x 46') with hip-roofed addition on east facade; 3 bays wide; 3-stories; shiplap siding with decorative shingles in gable ends; wood-shingled gable roof with cross gable on east west facade; off-set entrances on west facade. Exterior features include multi-pane fixed sash above 2/2 double-hung sash surrounded by stained glass, with plain surrounds; molded fascia boards with carved ends; corner boards; half-circle vent in gable ends; bracketed frieze board across upper gable ends; attached 3-story square bell tower with spire and finial on northwest corner; attached 1 1/2-story square tower with hip roof and bracketed cornice on southwest corner; shed-roofed overhang with pediment and knee braces above entrances; wood panel double doors with transoms; plain wood railing and stairs. Notable landscape features include 1 wood frame, gable roof outbuilding.  1995: Addition to east built 1993; vinyl siding covers het. Church; Longine. building; I non-contributing structure.  The Congregational Church had this building constructed in 1889. From 1896-1908 the Puget Sound Academy was situated to the southeast of the Church. Those buildings have since been razed. In 1934, the Corporation of Catholic Bishops purchased the building and established the first permanent Catholic Church on Whidbey Island. From 1974 to 1976, parish members restored the building to its original appearance. The steeple and the bell tower were reconstructed and the building was painted to match the original multi-color design.


