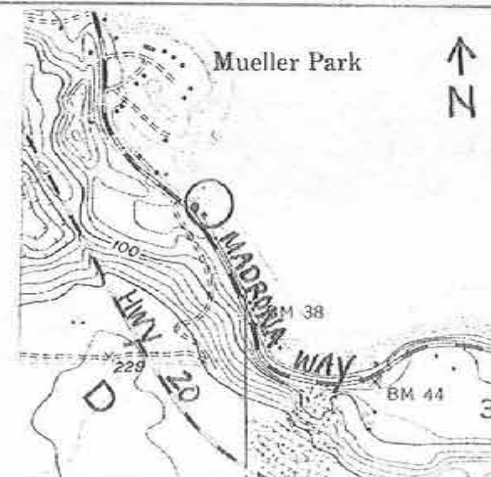

DESCRIPTION AND BACKGROUND HISTORY INCLUDING CONSTRUCTION DATE(S), PHYSICAL DIMENSIONS, MATERIALS, MAJOR ALTERATIONS, IMPORTANT BUILDERS, ARCHITECTS, ENGINEERS, ETC. Vernacular Beach Cottage. Wood frame, set on post and block foundation; rectangle; 1½-stories; clapboard siding with wood-shingled gable ends; wood-shingled gable roof with 1-story gable roof section on south facade; recessed entrance on south facade; exterior end chimney on north facade. Exterior features include 6/6 double-hung sash, 3/3 fixed sash, all with plain surrounds; plain frieze board; fascia board; corner boards. This cottage is believed to have been built from cedar chicken coops. Ralph Smith built this place for his family, and his daughter owns it today. SIGNIFICANCE This property is significant under National Register criterion A, for its association with the important theme of recreation and tourism in the Reserve and represents a period of community development (1871-1910) followed by a period of economic stability (1911-1945). This property is also significant under National Register criterion C, because it embodies the distinctive characteristics of architectural expressions and methods of construction that represent the period of community stabilization and economic slowdown (evidenced by simpler forms lacking ornamentation) and the theme of recreation and tourism (evidenced by structures built with natural materials set in scenic locations), from 1911 until 1945. It retains integrity of location, setting, materials, design, workmanship, feeling and association.
