DESCRIPTION AND BACKGROUND HISTORY INCLUDING CONSTRUCTION DATE(S), PHYSICAL DIMENSIONS, MATERIALS, MAJOR ALTERATIONS, IMPORTANT BUILDERS, ARCHITECTS, ENGINEERS, ETC. Vernacular Beach Cottage. Wood frame set on post and block foundation; rectangle (14' x 20'); 3 bays wide; 1-story; coursed wood shingle siding; asphalt-shingled gable roof with slightly extended eaves; center entrance on north facade; interior end chimney on west facade. Exterior features include multi-pane sliding sash with plain surrounds; plain fascia board; gable roof overhang above entrance, supported by plain posts and rails; flower box supported by knee braces on north facade; large double doors to basement on north facade; clapboard siding covering basement level. This was one of several beach cabins build c. 1920's on Good Beach by the Smith family (Ed, Ralph, Harold). They sat along the water's edge and were rented out to visitors. SIGNIFICANCE This property is significant under National Register criterion A, for its association with the important theme of recreation and tourism in the Reserve and represents a period of community development (1871-1910) followed by a period of economic stability (1911-1945). This property is also significant under National Register criterion C, because it embodies the distinctive characteristics of architectural expressions and methods of construction that represent the period of community stabilization and economic slowdown (evidenced by simpler forms lacking ornamentation) and the theme of recreation and tourism (evidenced by structures built with natural materials set in scenic locations), from 1911 until 1945. It retains integrity of location, setting, materials, design, workmanship, feeling and association.

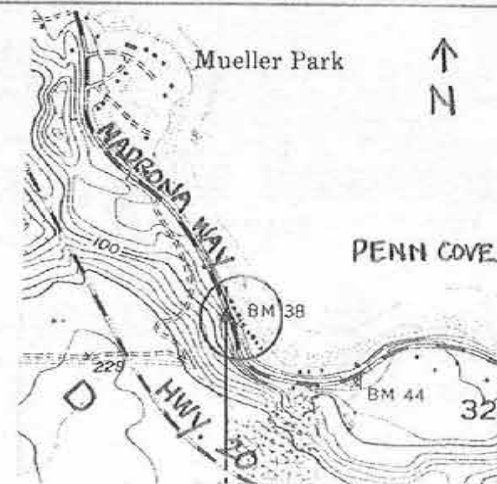
PHOTOGRAPHS AND SKETCH MAP OF LOCATION
