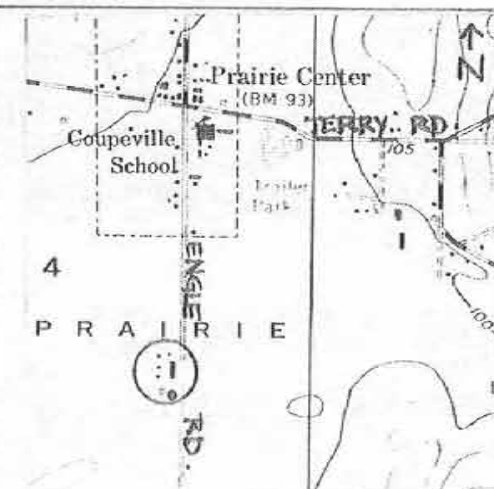
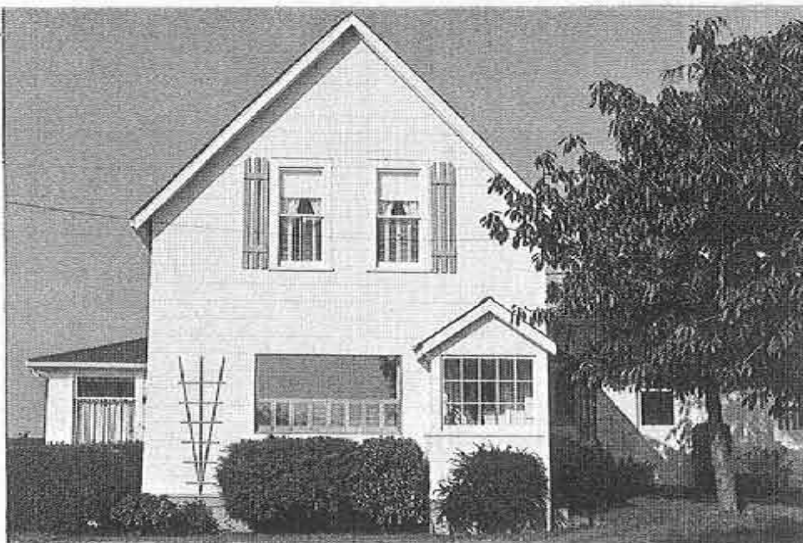

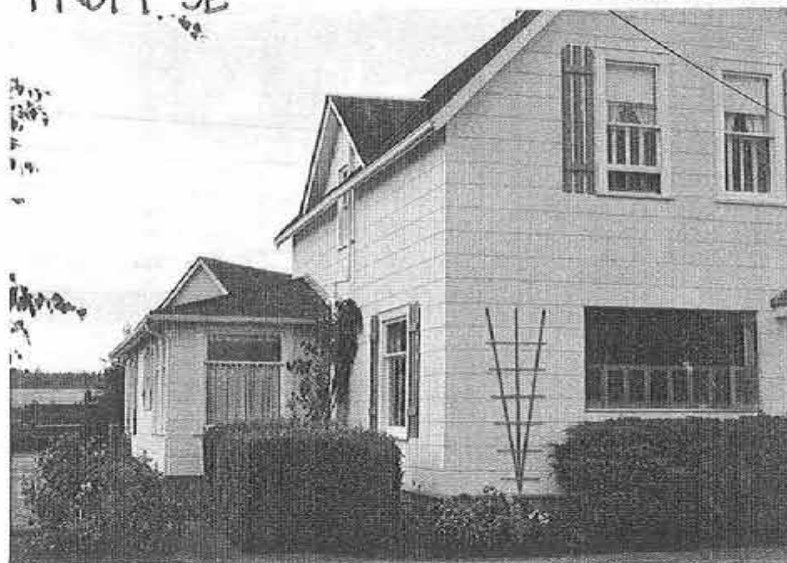

DESCRIPTION AND BACKGROUND HISTORY INCLUDING CONSTRUCTION DATE(S), PHYSICAL DIMENSIONS, MATERIALS, MAJOR ALTERATIONS, IMPORTANT BUILDERS, ARCHITECTS, ENGINEERS, ETC. Vernacular Farm house. Wood frame set on post and block foundation; irregular (42' x 44'); 2 bays wide; 1½-stories; asbestos shingle siding; wood-shingled gable roof; off-center, enclosed, gable-roofed entrance on east facade; corbelled center chimney. Exterior features include 1/1 double-hung sash with plain surrounds; large, single pane fixed sash on east facade; gable roof dormer on south facade; boxed cornice; 1-story, wrap-around, hip roof addition on south, west facades; attached garage on north facade. Notable landscape features include 6 wood frame outbuildings.			CURRENT USE Residence		ORIGINAL USE Residence		
The old Gallagher Place is located on land where the Alexander and Ebey Donation Claims intersect. Gallagher was not a farmer. In 1919, he offered his place for sale: "...Gallagher Place of 9 acres on Ebey's Prairie. Good house with hot and cold water, barn and small orchard-\$4250." William C. Schreck purchased the property and raised chickens here. Schreck also owned a steam-powered thrashing machine, using it and his sizeable crew (24 men) at various farms. Clark Sherman bought the place about 1950, and his son owns it today. It is possible that the house was moved from Prairie Center to its present site, but this has not been substantiated. 1995: one contributing building; four contributing structures.

SIGNIFICANCE This property is significant under National Register criterion A, for its association with agricultural land use patterns first established during the period of early settlement in the 1850s. This property is also significant under National Register criterion C, because it embodies the distinctive characteristics of architectural expressions and methods of construction that represent the period of community development in the Reserve, from 1871 until 1910. It retains integrity of location, setting, materials, design, workmanship, feeling and association.

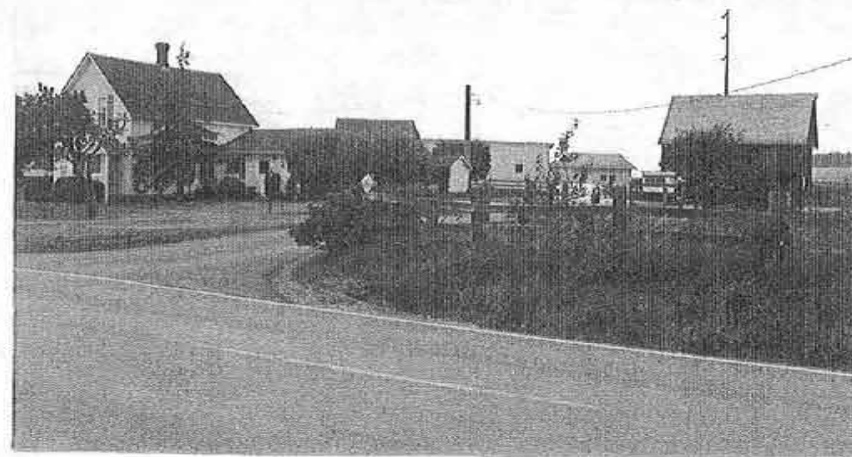
