DESCRIPTION AND BACKGROUND HISTORY INCLUDING CONSTRUCTION DATE(S), PHYSICAL DIMENSIONS, MATERIALS, MAJOR ALTERATIONS, IMPORTANT BUILDERS, ARCHITECTS, ENGINEERS, ETC. Late Bungalow. Wood frame set on concrete foundation; rectangle (28' x 20'); 3 bays wide; 1 1/2-stories; wood shingle siding; asphalt-shingled gable roof; off-center entrance on north facade; off-center exterior end stone chimney on west facade. Exterior features include 8/1 double-hung sash; horizontal sliding sash; boxed cornice; pedimented arched portico on north facade with wood-shingled rail and posts; enclosed flat-roofed porch on south facade. William C. Engle built his own home in 1932 and has lived there ever since with his wife Anna. SIGNIFICANCE This property is significant under National Register criterion A, for its association with agricultural land use patterns first established during the period of early settlement in the 1850s. This property is also significant under National Register criterion C, because it embodies the distinctive characteristics of architectural expressions and methods of construction that represent the period of community stabilization and economic slowdown (evidenced by simpler forms lacking ornamentation) and the theme of recreation and tourism (evidenced by structures built with natural materials set in scenic locations), from 1911 until 1945. It retains integrity of location, setting, materials, design, workmanship, feeling and association.

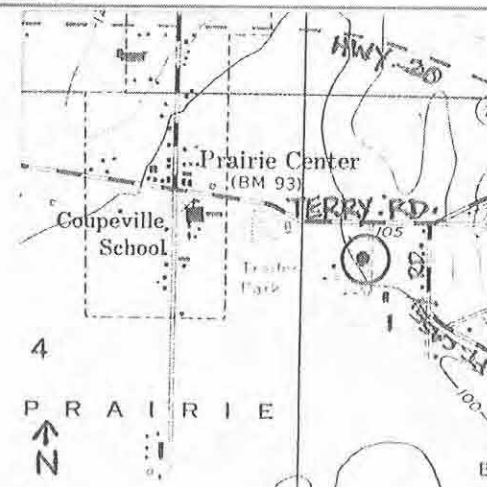
