

CURRENT USE ORIGINAL USE PHYSICAL DIMENSIONS, MATERIALS, MAJOR ALTERATIONS, IMPORTANT Hay Storage BUILDERS, ARCHITECTS, ENGINEERS, ETC. Grainery Vernacular Barn. Wood frame set on post and block foundation; rectangle (30' x 22'); 1 bay wide; 1 1/2 stories; shiplap siding on east and west facade; horizontal wood panel siding on south facade; wood-shingled gable roof with extended eaves; elevated center entrance on east facade with plain surrounds. Exterior features include boarded up windows on north and south facades, with plain surrounds; boxed cornice; plain frieze board: corner boards. "Ernest J. Hancock ... cleared forty-five acres and made many improvements, erecting the most elegant residence on the island ... He had a large orchard... and continued the cultivation and clearing of the land until he had one of the most desirable farms in the county." This was recorded in 1893. The main house was torn down after being vacant for a few years, and the grainery is the only remaining structure from the Hancock place. It is being used for hay storage by the Sherman family. 1995: Onerstructure contributing
